The purpose of the Wheeler SWCD, with headquarters in Wheeler, Texas is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

The Board of Directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its

As one of five individuals serving on the District Board of Directors, Mr. Zybach will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In other areas of leadership, Mr. Zybach has been active in Farm Bureau, Briscoe School Board, and many other agencies. He has served on the Wheeler County SWCD since

He has been recognized by: Farm Bureau for his contributions and by the State SWCD for 40 years of

In Texas there are 210 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal sub-division of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal sub-divisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.
