MUSTANGS WIN 20-6, GRUVER GREYHOUNDS FIRST DIST. VICTIM

Tied at halftime 6-6 with the underdog Gruver Greyhounds, the Wheeler Mustangs came on in the final two quarters to register a 20-6 victory in their District 1-1A opener at Gruver.

Wheeler had to fight from behind in the second quarter to gain the halftime tie as they gave the Greyhounds an easy six points at 9:06 of the second quarter.

On their third possession of the game, the Mustangs found themselves in the hole at their own 6 yard line following a punt and were able to move out to the 21 where Michael

Kenney fumbled and the Greyhounds recovered at the Wheeler 21.

Five plays later the Mustangs were behind 6-0 when Dan McCloy went over from the 4 and Gruver went for two but the pass attempt failed and the Mustangs were forced to play catchup against the punchless hosts.

Maybe the week layoff didn't do the Mustangs any good or it was something else, but the Mustangs didn't look like the same ball club that had played such a sterling game in their

last outing against Quanah.

Trailing by a touchdown might have lit a fire under the Mustangs because they took the ensuing kickoff and drove 64 yards for the tie in ten plays but saw a bad snap on the PAT break Altamirano's streak of ten straight point after kicks go by the way and the Mustangs had to settle for the 6-6 deadlock at the half. Kenney capped the drive by going over from 4 yards out.

YOUTH ARE FIRST IN 4-H

Linda Daughtry
Youth always come first in 4-H, and one way of putting them first is with the child-centered approach.

This approach focuses on the needs and interests of the youth. 4-H is open to all youth ages 3rd grade through 19 regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

Project and organizational leaders and parents found the child-centered approach helpful when working with

4-H'ers. Youth set their own goals, make plans to achieve them and carry them out. Also, they assess their own progress in reaching these goals.

The child-centered approach does not mean that children should do whatever they want. 4-H is a youth program with guidance by adults. Leaders and parents help youth achieve through understanding, encouragement and recognition.

This approach encourages the child's natural curiosity, enthusiasm, inquisitiveness, energy and willingness to perform tasks.

It helps adults to consider individual needs and desires of youth, listen to them, try to see things as children do, accept children for what they are and make them feel wanted and respected.

Leaders and parents using the child-centered approach for the first time may need to change leadership style. Different styles of leadership are appropriate at different times.

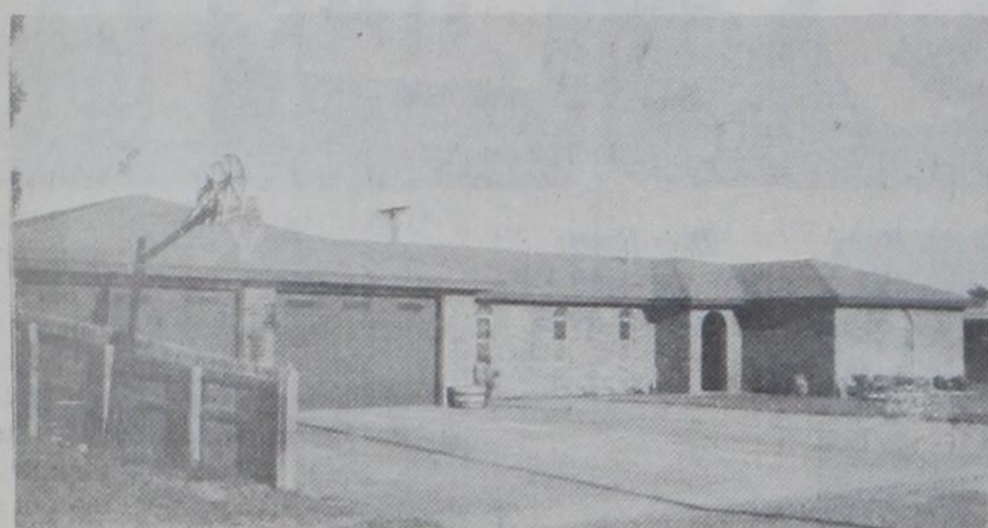

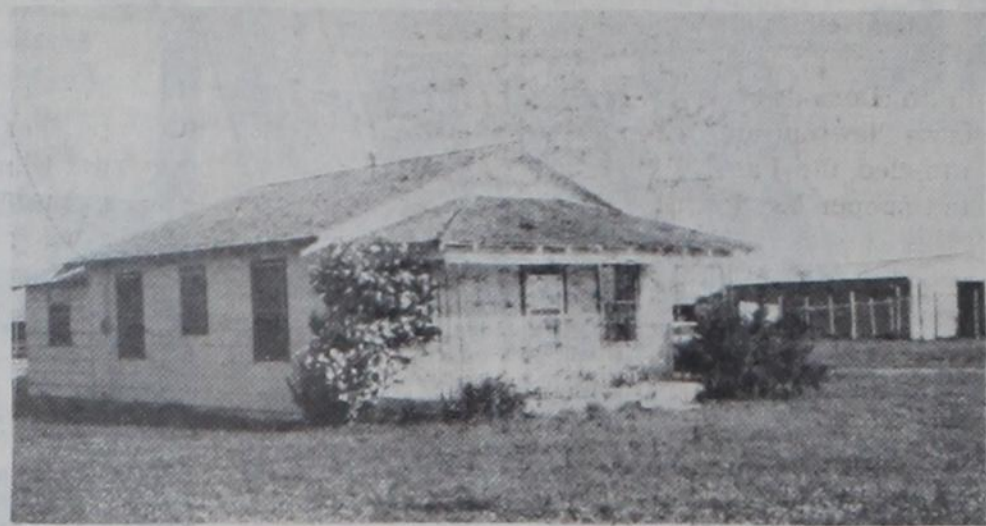

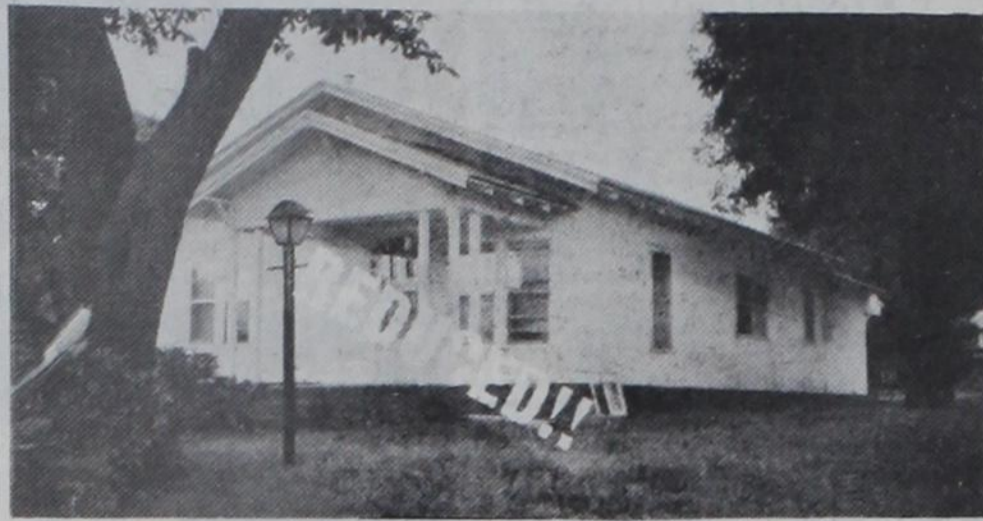

From the Minister's Desk:

Will Rodgers once observed that there are three stages of American history—the passing of the buffalo, the passing of the Indian, and the passing of the buck.

It is fairly obvious that the passing of the buck is a prominent characteristic of the twentieth century. It is easier for people to blame someone else than it is to accept responsibility for their own life. And since this characteristic is so prominent, it is not surprising that Christianity has been affected.

Perhaps this affect can best be illustrated by a question. This question is: "Who will be responsible if you are not saved?" There are three possible answers to this question which are: --

God will be responsible. One of the most popular religious ideas is predestination which advocates that God has predetermined the people who will be saved and the people who will be lost. But the New Testament says that God is "...not wishing for any to perish, but for all to come to repentance." (II Peter 3:9)

It is extremely hard to understand how anyone could truly believe that God is responsible if someone is not saved. The New Testament clearly describes the costly provision that God has made for the salvation of people. He gave His son, Jesus Christ, as a substitutionary sacrifice for the sins of the people. (Romans 3:21-30)

God is not responsible if you are not saved.

The church is responsible. It is extremely important for the church to remember the Biblical admonitions against being "...a stumbling block..." to someone. (Matthew 18:7-10, Romans 14:13) But it is also important for people to

remember the nature of the church. The church is composed of people who are saved by the grace of God, not their sinless perfection. (Ephesians 2:4-10, Titus 2:11-14, 3:4-8)

To expect sinless perfection from the church is an expectation that God Himself does not have. He does not want the church to sin, but He knows that it will. And for this reason the church has "...an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous; and He Himself is the propitiation for our sins; and not ours only, but also for those of the whole world." (I John 1:8-10, 2:1-2)

Hypocrisy must not be sanctioned in the church, but it must constantly be remembered that the church is justified by its faith in Jesus Christ, not by its sinless perfection. And it is wrong for anyone to use the church's imperfections to justify their failure to obey and serve God.

The church is not responsible if you are not saved.

If God is not responsible and if the church is not responsible, who, then, is responsible if you are not saved? The only possible answer is you! The personal pronoun "I" is included in life's most important question which is: "What must I do to be saved?" With the sacrificial death of Jesus, God has provided forgiveness for all the sins of people, but it is the responsibility of each person to accept or reject this forgiveness.

Do you want to be saved? Then do not "pass the buck". Accept through an obedient faith the forgiveness of your sins which is provided by the death of Jesus Christ.

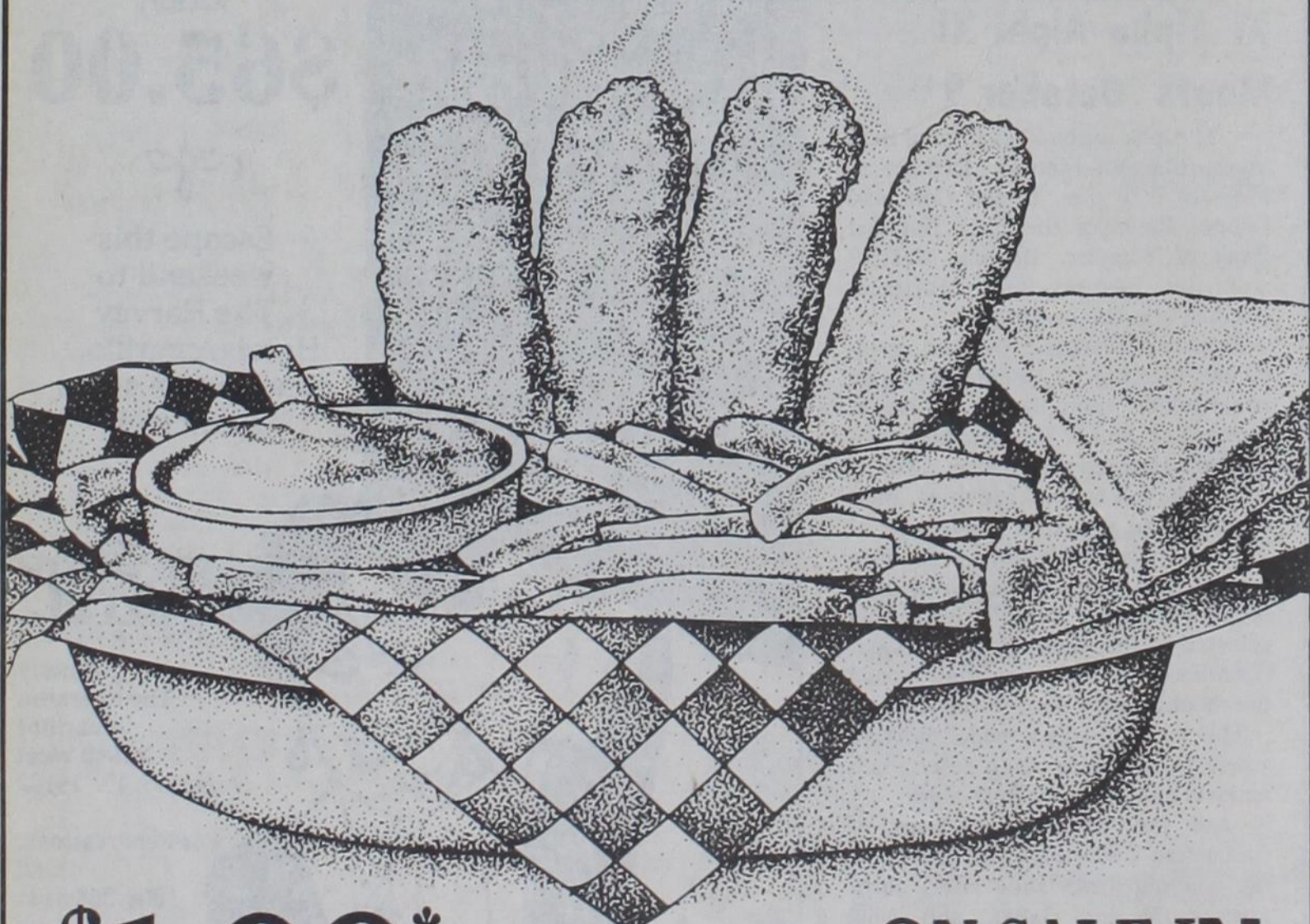

Absentee Voting

Begins On Amendments

Voters in Wheeler County can cast absentee ballots on 21 proposed constitutional amendments beginning Wednesday, October 18, 1989.

Absentee ballots can be cast in two ways. Any eligible voter can vote by personal appearance. Other voters meeting certain requirements may vote by mail.

To cast a ballot by personal appearance, voters must show their voter registration card. If a voter does not have a card, election officials will accept another form of identification such as a drivers license, PROVIDED that the voters name is on a list of registered voters.

To vote by mail, a resident must have an application in to the county clerk by October 31st, and must meet one of the following requirements: be more than 65 years old, have a religious belief that will keep them from voting on election day, be disabled or expect to be absent from their voting county during the period allowed for voting by personal appearance.

Wheeler County voters may vote by personal appearance at the Courthouse in Wheeler from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, ending on November 3rd.

All voters are encouraged to remember to take their registration cards with them on election day. Failure to do so only takes more time and paper work at the poll.

Wheeler County SWCD News

Clarence Zybach of Briscoe, Texas was recently re-elected to the Wheeler County SWCD Board of Directors October 5, 1989. Mr. Zybach represents zone 5 of the District.

The purpose of the Wheeler SWCD, with headquarters in Wheeler, Texas is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and ranchers on conservation matters.

The Board of Directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

As one of five individuals serving on the District Board of Directors, Mr. Zybach will be responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas soil conservation district law.

In other areas of leadership, Mr. Zybach has been active in Farm Bureau, Briscoe School Board, and many other agencies. He has served on the Wheeler County SWCD since 1948.

He has been recognized by Farm Bureau for his contributions and by the State SWCD for 40 years of service.

In Texas there are 210 soil and water conservation districts. Each is a legal sub-division of state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board. Unlike most other legal sub-divisions of state government, SWCDs do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the districts are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

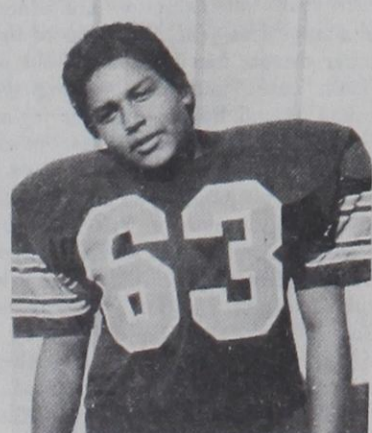
