WHEELER MUSTANGS WIN

NARROW VICTORY OVER MEMPHIS

[Editor's Note: The following story was taken from the Sunday, September 24, 1989 Pampa News.)
Senior quarterback Shawn Brad-

street threw two touchdown passes as Wheeler held off Memphis for a 15-6 win Friday night.
Wheeler was leading 8-6 in the

third quarter when Bradstreet threw a 24-yard scoring toss to Kelly Aderholt on a fourth and one situation.
Bradstreet, who completed 10 of 18

passes for 160 yards, teamed up with Kyle Sword on a 47-yard pass play in the first quarter to give the Mustangs the early lead.

Michael Kenney was Wheeler's top rusher with 100 yards in 24 attempts. "It feels good to win one again," said coach Ronnie Karcher, whose Mustangs lost to Shamrock 21-17 last week.

Also, Sid Sawdey, formerly of Wheeler, now of Miami, OK. pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance in 31st District Court and received a 10 year deferred sentence for that guilty plea. Sawdey was arrested by Wheeler Co. Sheriff's officers January 5, 1989 after receiving 27.5 grams of Meth amphetamines in the mail from San Diego. Sheriff's officials had received information about Sawdey's drug dealings and the date and method of delivery. This information lead to the arrest and conviction of Sawdey.

County 4-Hers Participates In Panhandle 4-H Bake Show

Melissa Reynolds, Shamrock 4-H member from Wheeler County, participated in the Panhandle 4-H Better Bake Show held Saturday, September 16, at the Tri-State Fair in Amarillo. Melissa received a ribbon and prize money donated by the Amarillo Tri-State Fair and a 2 lb. sack of whole wheat flour donated by Arrowhead Mills, Inc. of Hereford.

County bake show junior and senior product and record winners from the twenty county Top of Texas area were eligible to compete in the contest which is an exclusive District Contest held to promote wheat consumerism, teach nutrition and develop additional food preparation and skills.

In the baked product division, the 4-Hers prepared a product using a minimum ratio of 1:2 parts whole wheat to white flour. The emphasis was on the nutritional value of the recipe chosen, the taste, texture and appearance of the product.

Juniors (ages 9-13) prepared a quick bread recipe of their choice and seniors (ages 14-19) prepared a yeast-leavened recipe.

Johnson was arraigned for the theft and was bonded out on \$2500 bond.

Mr. Turlington worked overseas for Exxon Exploration for the past 11 years. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church of Bellville, Bellville Masonic Lodge, Bellville Optimist Club, Bellville VFW and Kenny Agricultural Society. Mr. Turlington was born in Wheeler, Texas.

Mr. Turlington was killed when a bomb exploded aboard the UTA airlines flight he was traveling on.

From The Minister's Desk:

The definitions of words can be very educational. For example, Webster Collegiate Dictionary defines "tolerance" as "sympathy or indulgence for beliefs or practices differing from or conflicting with one's own." And with this definition an important question is raised. This question is "what attitude should Christian have towards people who do not practice biblical truth?"

This question poses a serious dilemma for Christians. This dilemma consists of a commitment to Biblical truth which they will not compromise and of a sympathy for people who do not have this commitment. To solve this dilemma many Christians have embraced one of two extremes. These extremes are:—

Rigidity

Some Christians have tried to resolve this dilemma by a rigid belief and practice of Biblical truth, despising tolerance as compromise. And this attitude has often been the cloak for the most unChrist-like behavior.

Perhaps the best illustration of such behavior is found in a text in the ninth chapter of Luke. According to this text, Jesus and His disciples are denied lodging in a Samaritan village which deeply offended two of His disciples. These two disciples—James and John—asked Jesus if He wanted them "—to command fire to come down from heaven—" and destroy the Samaritans. But Jesus rebuked them, saying: "You do not know what kind of spirit you are of: for the Son of Man did not come to destroy men's lives but to save them" (Verses 55-56)

Jesus came to save people not to destroy them. And His disciples should have the same purpose. The Apostle Paul said that the gospel of Jesus "—is the power of God for salvation—" but he also taught that it cannot be successfully communicated by ugly disposition-s. (Colossians 4:5-6, II Timothy

2:24-26)

Disciples of Jesus must have a strong commitment to Biblical truth which they will not compromise. But they will graciously allow other people to question and challenge this commitment. The proverbial "bottom line" is that the world will not be influenced by intolerant Christians.

Compromise

But while some Christians have tried to resolve the dilemma by a rigid commitment to Biblical truth which considers tolerance to be compromise, others have honored tolerance at the expense of Biblical truth.

Tolerance, then, can be a pleasant word for a lack of conviction. The open mind is often the vacant heart that has no cherished beliefs or convictions. Such Christians are extremely tolerant because they have no conviction. The lowest level of conviction will always produce the highest level of tolerance.

Either of these extremes — rigidity and compromise — is wrong. Disciples of Jesus must maintain a balance between these extremes. They must be deeply committed to the truth of God's will. But they must also be genuinely tolerant of people who are not. Perhaps the key to this balance is found in their attitude towards people. Like their Lord, disciples of Jesus will hate sin, but love sinners. They will be uncompromisingly intolerant of erroneous beliefs, but they will be genuinely tolerant of the people who hold them.

Is such a balance possible? It was for Jesus! His commitment to the truth of God's will could not be shaken by a death upon a cross. Yet as He died, He prayed: "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." (Luke 23:34) His disciples must walk in His footsteps, hating sin, but loving sinners.

DIETARY—MEDICAL QUACKERY

Quackery in the U.S. today costs more than \$25 billion. These unsound dietary-medical treatments can prevent consumers from seeking proper treatment.

To recognize the dietary-medical quackery device, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) and the Council of Better Business Bureaus provide these personal protection tips:

1. Be wary if a product's label or advertising promises immediate, effortless or guaranteed results.
2. Be wary of testimonials in ads or on labels from satisfied users. They rarely can be confirmed.
3. Don't be taken in by a "money-back guarantee". A guarantee is only as good as the company that backs it.
4. Be wary of promises that a product is effective for a wide variety of ailments.
5. Be wary of promises of complete relief from pain.
6. Don't be taken in by promises that a product offers a "cure".
7. Watch out for claims that a treatment or product has been approved by the FDA. Federal law doesn't permit mention of FDA in any way that suggests marketing approval for any drug or medical device.
8. Don't give too much importance to the term "natural ingredients". The definition of "natural" is elusive, and the word is often abused.
9. Look out for other misleading words such as "amazing", "secret", "miracle", "special", "vanish", "painless", "discovery", "break-through", "exclusive", "instant", "immediate", "quick", or "fast".
10. If the product sounds too good to be true, it probably is.

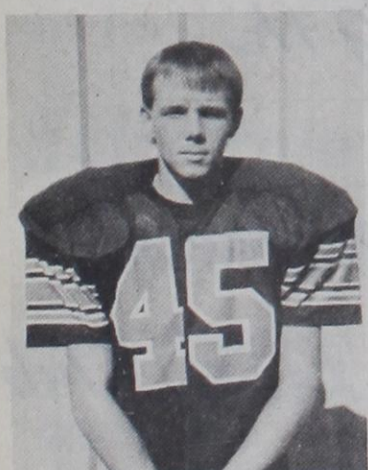

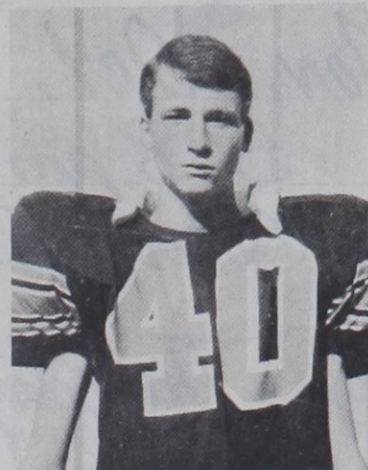

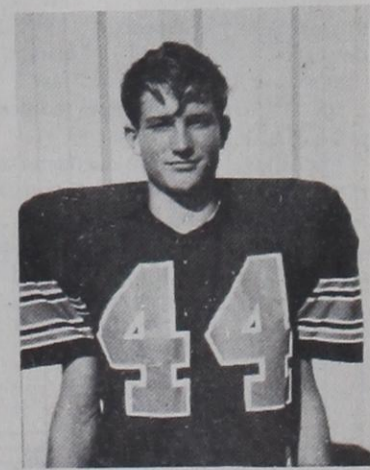
