



There was no further business and the meeting was adjourned at 7:15 p.m.




Dear Friend,

" Bare Necessities and Good Friends," are what a lot of folks counted on back in the 1940's. So, this is the first short story of things I experienced and feel sure many of you will relate to. I hope you enjoy these articles, as much as I've enjoyed writing and remembering all the "good times"

I was raised on a farm located four miles east of Wheeler. We moved here in 1945 when my Dad got out of the Navy after WWII ended. He rented a farm that was 1 1/2 miles off of the highway and it had a two-roomed house on it. Sure looked big to a kid. The fact that it sat in the middle of an old. shinnery infested pasture, made it look even better to me. I could already see all the great adventures I could have. Exploring, hunting, digging for arrow-heads, or whatever. I could only guess at what buried treasure I would find in all that sand. How good could it get for a wide-eyed, six year old boy with a big imagination?

We raised cotton, milo, hogs, cows and most important to me...WATERMELONS!

A few farms were getting electricity, but this wasn't one of them. We had the old kerosene lamps with the wick. It worked just fine as long as you were close to it. That's the key...close. When it came night time in the summer and the lamp was burning, all kinds of flying bugs would come in and fly around it like crazy. The expression, "like a moth to the flame" is true. Winter time, we pretty much had the lamp to our-

selves. Sometimes, it would be really dark outside and the old wick lamp was all the light we had if the moon wasn't shinning. One dark night in our house, my Mom walked by me and the 'coveted source of light' that was sitting on a table, right beside me. She never missed a beat, just reached over and snagged that lamp while on her way to fetch another iron that was heating on the stove. Not wanting to sit there in the dark all by myself, I jumped up to follow her. I didn't realize it, but one of my legs had gone to sleep. I immediately fell in the laundry basket and panic time hit! I was like a fish out of water, but a fish with a voice. I'm not sure if you would describe me screaming or bawling. Between dark...and a leg that felt like it was missing, I was one

scared kid. Slowly, feeling started Wayne, was about three years coming back in my leg. I felt like this whole thing was one big accident and I was lucky to have my leg back. Mom, sure wouldn't do that again, I thought, but I'd better not count on that. I'm sure she got a chuckle out of it all when I wasn't looking.

When the "Aladdin Lamp" became available, we got one. It was really a step up. Not electricity, but definitely a step up.


Mom, had an old wooden icebox that had two doors on the front and a big lid on top. It would hold a 50 pound block of ice that we'd buy at the grocery store when we went to town. To get it home, they'd wrap it in a thick blanket to keep it from melting. We'd chip off with an ice-pick, what we wanted to use each time. I remember it really tasting good! A lot of my generation still refers to refrigerators as "iceboxes".


Our water came from a windmill that was a quarter-mile from our house, so...Dad built a sled, put a 30 gallon barrel on it, hooked it up to the tractor and hauled water from the windmill to our house. We used a water bucket with a "dipper" in the house. Everyone, drank from the same dipper, and not a soul died!

Our closest neighbors were the "Hill" family. They had two boys. Jimmy, the oldest, started first grade with me. His brother, vounger.

I spent a lot of time at their house and couldn't help noticing that their outhouse was a lot nicer than ours. It had a concrete floor and two holes with lids that had hinges. It was also, closer to the house. I really liked that, just in case you had to make a run for it after dark. Most of my cousins and I, were scared of the dark. A trait connected mostly to my Grandma Holt. TV hadn't been invented yet, but Grandma, felt duty-bound to tell us ghost stories and scare the liver out of us; she did a good job of it, too. Back to the subject of out-houses. I never could understand why so many were built with two holes, sometimes, called a two-seater. I never personally knew anybody who wanted a copilot.

Free and Reduced-Price Meals

The Fort Elliott CISD and Wheeler ISD today announced its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch and School Breakfast Program. A copy of the policy, which may be reviewed by any interested party, is on file at the Superintendents' Offices: 501 E. Wilson, Briscoe, Texas and #1 Mustang Drive, Wheeler, Texas.

The household size and income criteria below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.



Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reducedprice meals for their children. Applications also are available at the office in each school. To apply for free and reduced-price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification data. Applica-

tions may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reducedprice benefits, households receiving food stamps or TANF only have to list their child's name, food stamp or TANF case number, and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp or TANF case number must list the names of all household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a Social Security number, the household member must indicate that a Social Security number is not available by writing the word "NONE", "No Number," or some indication that the person does not have a Social Security number ... The application must be signed by an adult household member. Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy the school reviewing official will review the applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to the Superintendent of the school. Households that list a food







NOTICE OF DRINKING WATER NITRATE VIOLATION

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) has notified the City of Wheeler water system that the drinking water being supplied to customers had exceeded the Maximum Conttaminant Level (MCL) for NI-TRATE. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S, EPA) has established the MCL for NITRATE at10mg/L, and has determined that it is a health concern at levels above the MCL. Analysis of drinking water in your community for NITRATE indicates a level of 13mg/L. This violation occurred the 2nd guarter of 2009.

Infants below the age of six months who drink water containing nitrate in excess of the MCL could become seriously ill and, if untreated, may die. Symptoms include shortness of breath and blue baby syndrome. If your child is under the age of six months, the child must be given an alternative water supply for any consumption. Boiling the affected water is not an effective treatment for nitrate removal.

Most consumers do not need to use an alternatiave water supply. However, if you have health concerns, you may want to talk to your doctor to get more information about how this may affect you. At this time, the health effects to fetuses of pregnant women is unclear. If you are pregnant, you may also choose to use an alternative source of water for drinking and cooking purposes.

tremely large grove of trees. SPS attempted to minimize constructing double circuit with Circuit K54 due to the critical nature of the line serving Public Service of Oklahoma and the safety issues involved with performing maintenance or emergency work on one circuit when the other is energized.

(2) [69 kV transmission line (Circuit Y62)] The proposed 115 kV transmission line becomes double circuit with Circuit Y62 for 735 feet in order for both circuits to follow the outer edge of the cemetery and enter Howard Substation. By becoming double circuit with Circuit Y62 into Howard Substation, this allows for future transmission access into Howard Substation.

The new Wheeler Substation will be designed to accommodate two 230 kV transmission line terminals, a 230/115 kV - 250 MVA autotransformer and one 115 kV transmission line terminal. This line is not designed or intended to carry the full output of the 230/ 115 kV transformer. This transformer is sized for possible future 115 kV lines being served from the Wheeler Substation 115 kV bus. Wheeler Substation will be served with a 230 kV source from SPS's existing transmission line Circuit K54 in Wheeler County. The Wheeler Substation site is located approximately 2,000 feet west of the intersection of U.S. Highway 83 and County Road Q. The substation location is on the north side of County Road Q about 200 feet north of the existing 230 kV Circuit K54 which is located on the south side of County Road Q. The 230 kV line will be tapped and brought into Wheeler Substation utilizing steel structures for the inand-out lines. The Wheeler Substation site was determined by the accessibility of paved roads for transporting equipment and for emergency operations. Alternative substation site locations would have required the construction of several miles of all-weather road for access. The new 115 kV transmission line will be constructed from Wheeler Substation to the new Howard Substation located in Wheeler County. The new Howard Substation will consist of one 115 kV transmission line terminal, a 115/69 kV - 40/46 MVA autotransformer, a 115/13.2 kV - 10 MVA transformer, and two 69 kV transmission line terminals. -The existing Grave Substation would have been the terminus for the proposed project; however, SPS determined that the Grave Substation was inadequate and that a new site for the substation was necessary for several reasons. SPS required 8.0 acres for the substation, but the Grave Sub-8.0-acre site will accommodate future expansion of the substation to set up mobile substations for maintenance or in the event of emergency switching conditions. An expansion of the Grave Substation is not possible due to limitations of existing development features including the proximity of existing roads and other obstructions. Grave Substation is bound on the west side by South Osage Road, on the south side by FM 2473, on the east side by a large, above-ground tank, and on the north side by a residence. Although, all property owners adjacent to the Grave Substation were contacted in an attempt to expand the existing site, there were complications in acquiring property either due to no interest in selling or an inflated purchase price. Upon completion of this project, the load from the Grave Substation will be transferred to the new Howard Substation located approximately 2,000 feet to the south and at that time, the Grave

Segment A continues west for approximately 0.5 miles where it becomes double circuit with an existing 230 kV transmission line (Circuit K54) for approximately 0.5 miles to a point in the southeast corner of Section 39. SPS is proposing to construct a single-circuit, 115-kilovolt (kV) electric transmission line between the new Wheeler Substation, located approximately 2,000 feet west of the intersection of U.S. Highway 83 and County Road Q on the north side of County Road Q and the new Howard Substation located approximately 917 feet due south of the intersection of South Osage and FM 2473, directly east of the Wheeler Cemetery. The line will be built using single-pole, self-supporting steel structures. Depending on which route is ultimately selected, the proposed project would be approximately 7 miles long and located entirely within Wheeler County, Texas. Depending on the route selected, the total estimated cost of the project, including the transmission line and substation. costs, is \$13,720,014.
