## Boy Scouts To Sponsor Bass Tournament

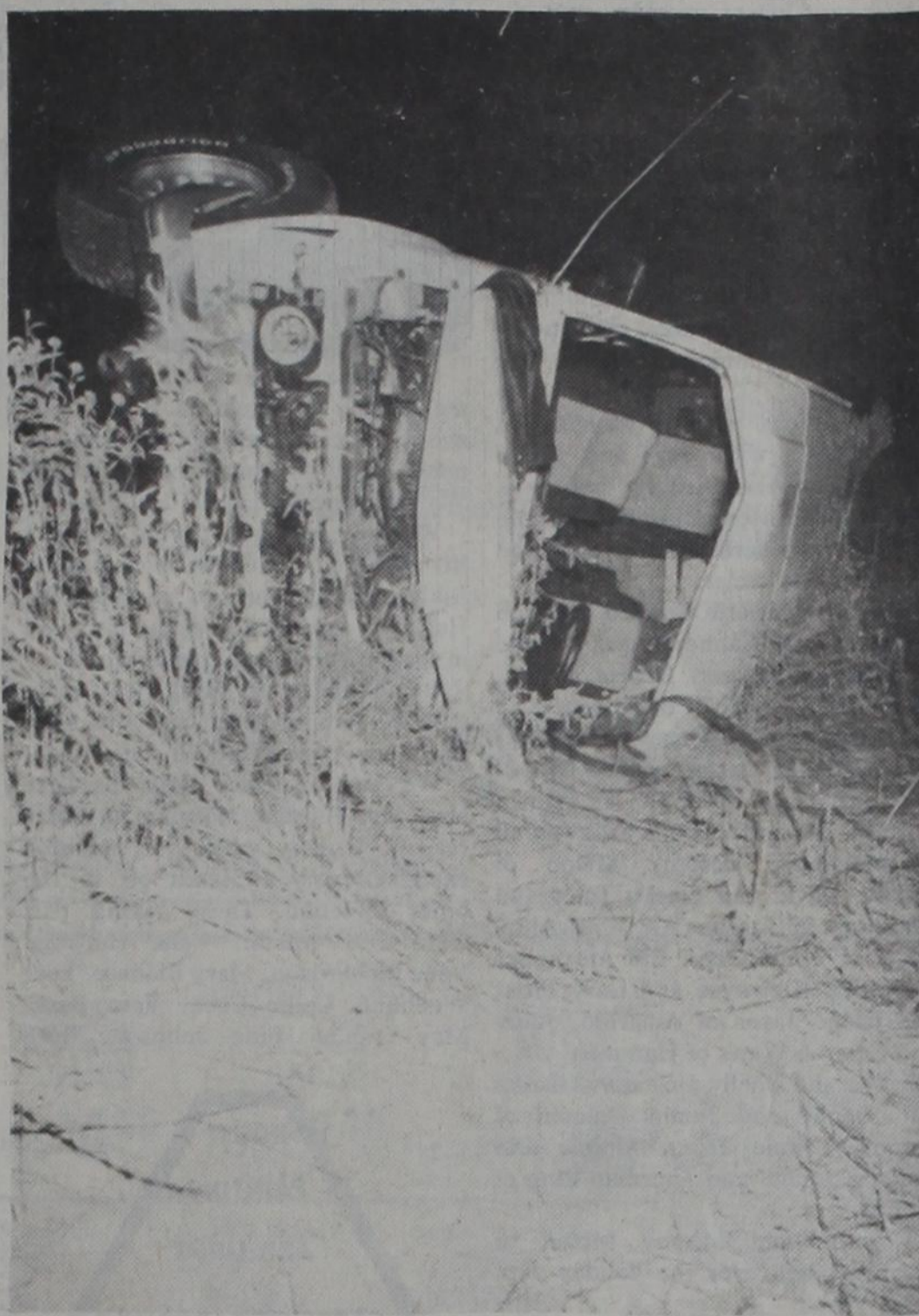

**WRECK:** Four individuals were injured in this one vehicle accident two miles north of Wheeler. The 1989 Isuzu Trooper was traveling south on Highway 83, left the roadway to the left, traveled 600 feet, crossed a county road, struck an 4.5' embankment and cleared a 5 strand barbed wire fence, coming to rest on the left side. The driver was projected approximately 60' through the wind-

shield when the van struck the embankment. The auto came to rest 3' from the driver. One of the passengers went to the nearest house and was taken to Parkview. The accident was reported to the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department; the ambulance arrived on the scene at 4:03 a.m. The vehicle had recently been purchased in California and odometer registered 16,800 miles. The victims ranged in age from 16 to 57. Each individual suffered multiple injuries and all four were transferred by ambulance to Amarillo.

## MUSTANGS WIN 21-8

It really wasn't pretty but it was a win as the Wheeler Mustangs defeated the Beaver Dusters last Friday night 21-8 at Nicholson Field. The victory came in the opener of the '89 season for both clubs.

The young Mustangs could have put the Dusters away early but they couldn't take advantage of but one of three great opportunities in the first quarter and had to come from behind in the second quarter after the Dusters had driven 73 yards to go on top 8-7.

Beaver fumbled on the game's second play and Wheeler recovered at the Duster 28 but turned the ball over on downs when Michael Kenney came up a yard shy on fourth down at the 19.

The Dusters second mistake of the game led to the opening TD for Wheeler when the snap on fourth down went over punter Travis Clower's head and the Mustangs recovered at the Beaver four yard line. Quarterback Shawn Bradstreet got the Mustangs first touchdown from the 1 and Arthur Altamirano kicked the extra point and Wheeler had a 7-0 margin at 5:27 of the first quarter.

A 24 yard run by fullback Mack Marshall to the 18 on the Mustangs next possession went for naught as Kenney lost 8 and the ball on the next play and instead of the possibility of being on top by three touchdowns, the Mustangs led by just 7-0.

Beaver got their only touchdown and lead in the game on the ensuing 73 yard drive as Clower got to paydirt from the 1 yard line. Clower passed to Bo Burns for the two pointer and Beaver was ahead 8-7 with 4:37 expired in the second quarter.

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## Mustangs Looking For Win No. 2 Against Clarendon

Nicholson Field will be the site of the Wheeler Mustangs second game of the year Friday night with the Clarendon Broncos furnishing the opposition for the 8:00 p.m. kickoff.

With a 21-8 win over Beaver last week, the Mustangs will be seeking their second win of the year against the Class 2A Broncos. This will be the opening game of the year for the Broncos.

Clarendon returns basically the same team that the Mustangs whipped last year but a new coaching staff is in place at Clarendon and the Broncos will operate out of the wing T on offense and play a 5-3 defense.

"Clarendon has real good speed as they won several track meets last spring with the same kids that are

playing football," Coach Ronnie Karcher said this week. "We will have to keep them from breaking the big play on us as they definitely have a faster team than we do".

The Mustangs coaching staff was relatively pleased with the play of the Mustangs against Beaver but were not happy that the Mustangs didn't take advantage of their opportunities and put Beaver away early. "We can't blow those chances against good teams and expect to win," Karcher said.

The Mustangs head coach added that the schedule doesn't get any easier and the Mustangs need to learn from their mistakes each week if they hope to challenge for a playoff spot in District 1A.

Al Cavaness and Sallie Harris, were in the entrance to welcome each guest as they came through to register, in the museum. Maurita Stribling stated that there approximately 680 persons who registered coming from many parts of Texas, some from Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona and California and probably from other states.

After registering people sauntered outside to the arbor, meeting friends as they went to the long wooden benches to be seated and listen to the

lovely music presented by the "Midnight Strangers" from Wheeler, who furnished the music. They even played old time songs requested by the crowd with great enjoyment.

At 11:30 lines formed on the north and south of the barbecue tables, to be served by the local Mobeetie men who brought, barbecue and served, free of charge beef to the probably 700 persons. The plate consisted of beef, onions, pinto beans, bread and apricots and coffee. The school children of Mobeetie were the people who carried plates of food to all the old

timers seated under the arbor and not able to stand in line. Homemade ice cream was on hand for those who wanted it. Soda pop was available.

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## ABRAHAM MEMORIAL HOME 25th ANNIVERSARY OBSERVED

Canadian's Edward Abraham Memorial Home, a regional facility for the elderly, will be celebrating its 25th anniversary next Saturday, September 9, with a Silver Celebration.

The event will be held from 11 to 3 on the grounds of the Home at 6th and Birch. There will be a variety of food booths and fun booths sponsored by almost twenty community organizations. An art exhibit by Marquerite Schultz, a resident of the Home, will be on display in the Activity Center.

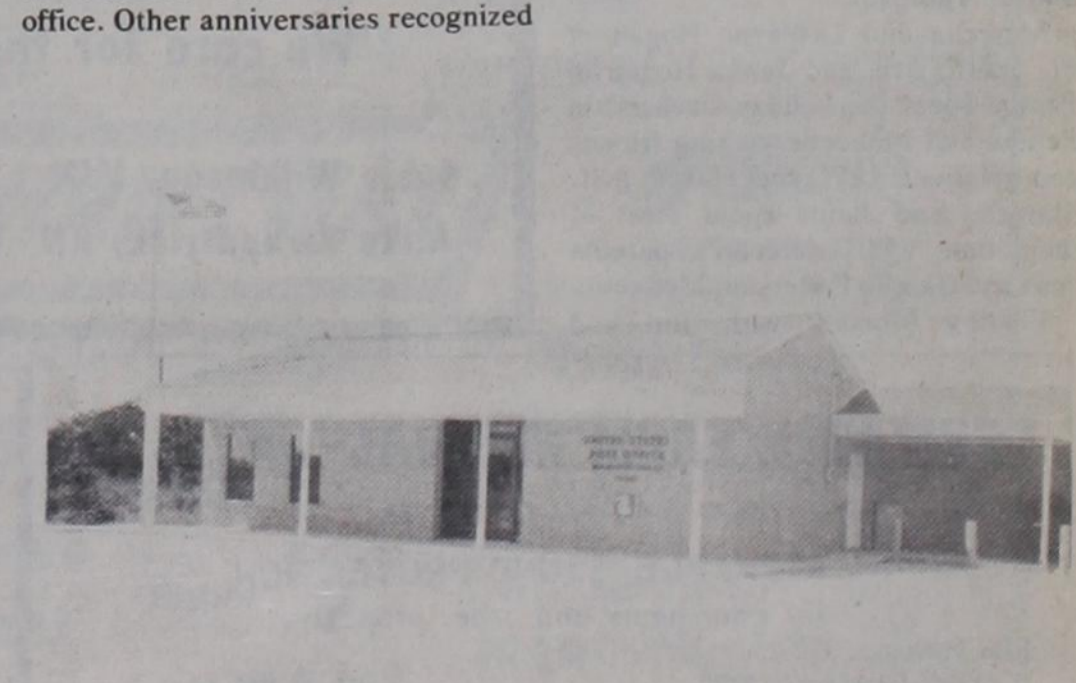
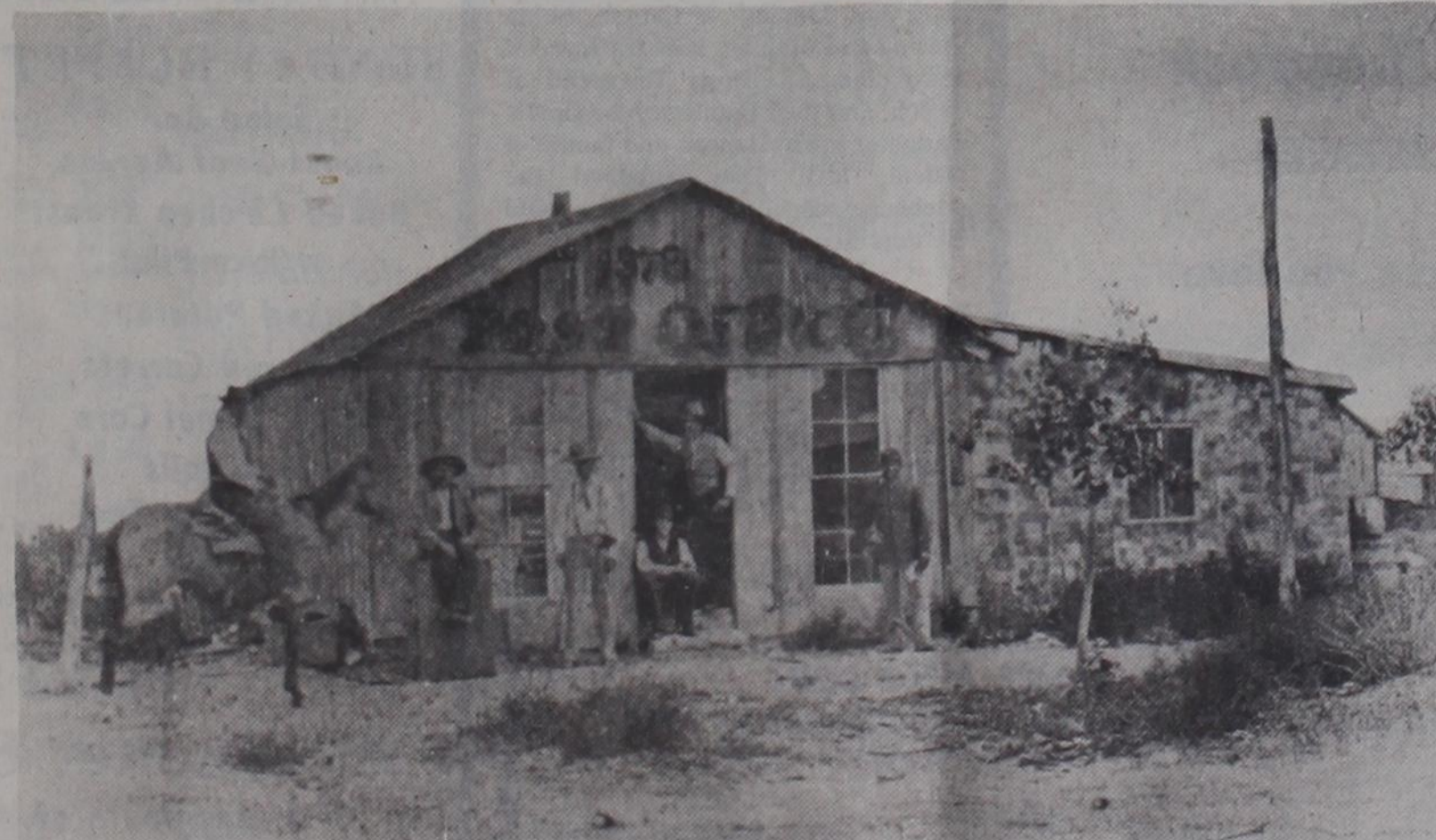
The Edward Abraham Memorial Home, which opened its doors 25 years ago was "an impossible dream" conceived, created and financed as a community effort. After a quarter of a century it continues as a cooperative community enterprise which over the years has been home to about 600 people.

Following a pattern set by Eddie Abraham, who had a special love and concern for the elderly and who proposed such a facility to the Canadian Chamber of Commerce, the Abraham Home has taken care of its "own folks" without help from government at any level. Eddie Abraham died of a heart attack only weeks after his proposal to the Chamber of Commerce, but his dream did not die.

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**ANNIVERSARY:** The United States Post Office in Mobeetie observed its 110th birthday on September 4, 1989. 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## HOW SCHOOLS COMMUNICATE WITH BOTH PARENTS

Dave Summers, Supt. M.I.S.D

It has been found that a definite link exist between home-school communication and student success. When there is open communication between teachers and parents, children are apt to do better work in school. When teachers an parents work together, everything from a child's performance to his or her attitude is affected for the better. Knowing that positive home-school communication is a vital part of a successful school year, our schools are taking steps to insure that open communication is taking place with parents—both parents.

Most of the steps our schools take when communicating with parents are familiar, but there are details in each step that help our schools reach both parents.

The first step is to invite all parents to back-to-school night. This activity, held at the beginning of the school year, is the initial opportunity for teacher-parent communication. Parents meet with teachers to talk about the curriculum, school policies, and classroom rules, and regulations. If any parent is unable to attend back-to-school night, a letter containing the information given that night can be sent home. The teacher can be contacted before or after the activity and asked to forward the materials.

The second step our schools take in order to communicate with both parents is to schedule private parent-teacher conferences. At these conferences, teachers will meet with both parents or one parent at a time. The important thing is that both parents know what is happening in their child's school life. In addition, if at anytime parents have any questions or concerns, or have noticed a problem and want to discuss it with a teacher, there is an open invitation to call the teacher and arrange a conference. Our

schools are always available to talk with parents or concerned community members.

The third step taken by our schools that provides a constant line of information for parents is the distribution of newsletters, notices of achievement, and school announcements. This information is usually sent home with the children and can be obtained from the school office as well. Duplicates of the information can be sent home with children upon request. Parents who do not live with

their children can receive this information by notifying a teacher or the school office of their address.

The fourth step is to send home grade cards and progress reports that communicate to parents how their children are doing in school. Duplicates of these papers will be made upon request and sent to parents who do not live at the same address as their children. Our schools know that children's academic successes are important to parents, and that's why communicating this information to them is important to our schools.

Our schools communicate with children every day and therefore know and understand the importance of clear and open communication. But this positive communication does not end with children; it must and does extend to the children's parents and all community members. Our schools' mission is not only to teach children but also to serve families. To fulfill this mission, our schools will continue to take these steps to communicate with both parents.

### From the Minister's Desk:

When Benjamin Franklin wanted to convince the people of Philadelphia about the value of street lighting, he did not simply talk about it. Rather he hung a lantern on a bracket by his door and he would light the wick every evening at dusk. Franklin's neighbors soon recognized the value of this light and they began to put lanterns beside their doors. The entire city of Philadelphia was shortly enjoying the benefits of street lighting.

I think that Jesus would appreciate the actions of Mr. Franklin because Jesus used this same concept to describe His disciples. He described them as "...the light of the world-". (Matthew 5:14) The significance of this description is strengthened when the characteristics of light are considered. For example, light does not make a loud noise, boasting of its power, it does not advertise its virtues, boasting of its influence. Light simply shines and disciples of Jesus simply live their faith.

And as they live their faith, the disciples of Jesus will exert a powerful influence upon other people. Jesus emphasized the influence of His disciples when He

said: "Let your light shine before men in such a way that they may see your good works and glorify your father who is in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)

Perhaps an event that occurred during a religious service on the east coast can well illustrate the influence that disciples of Jesus can have on other people. This service, which was being held in a large football stadium, was interrupted when the lights of the stadium went out. As darkness settled over the stadium, the speaker calmly said: "Please stay calm. I will light a match." Then from the front of the stadium the audience saw the faint gleam of a tiny yellow flame. Again, the speaker spoke: "Now will each one of you please light a match." Here and there a small flame appeared until the entire stadium was aglow with light. But it began with one light.

When disciples of Jesus live "...sensibly, righteously, and godly in the present age-...", they are the "...light of the world-". And the influence of their lives will "light" the path of many people who presently walk in darkness.

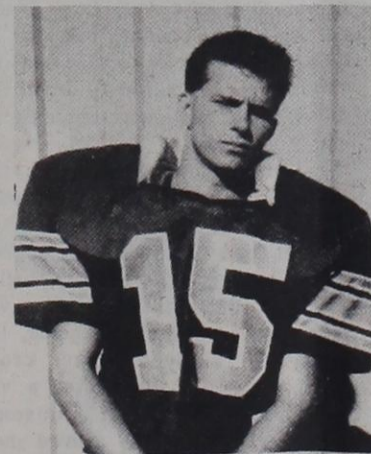

PLANTING A DEAD LITTER CROP  
It's that time again for new CRP producers to begin to plant at dead litter cover. A cover crop is mandatory for native grasses but not for weeping Lovegrass. In certain instances weeping Lovegrass would need a cover crop when a field is very susceptible to blowing winds.

The primary purposes for a cover crop is to reduce soil loss, improve soil tilth, conserve soil moisture and increase water infiltration. A cover crop may be a small grain such as wheat or rye that is allowed to grow until the heads are in the soft dough stage and then shredded or sprayed to prevent seed production. Plant wheat or rye September thru October at 30 to 40 lbs. to the acre; shred or chemically controlled about April 20 thru May 1; and then plant grass as soon as the wheat is controlled.

In the past two years, CRP producers have been getting a real good stand of grass in wheat. Wheat has a tendency to have a cleaner seedbed than haygrazer. Haygrazer cover has a tendency to have more weeds in the seedbed. CRP producers have been getting their worst stand of grass in Haygrazer.

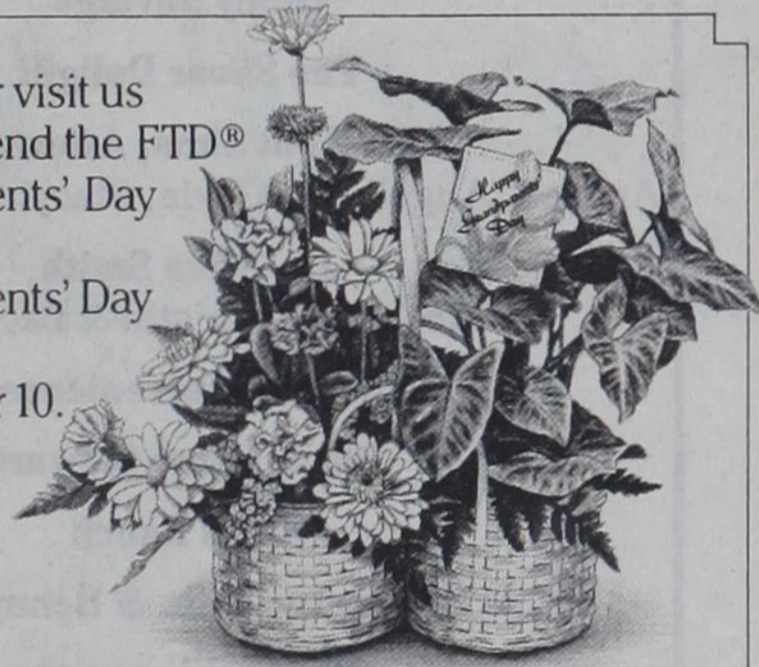
