COUNTY RANGE TOUR AUG. 23

The annual Wheeler County Range Tour is scheduled for Wednesday, August 23. The tour is sponsored each year by the Livestock, Range and Pasture Committee, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, and the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District.

The tour will leave from Maxey's Steakhouse at Wheeler at 9:00 a.m. First stop on the tour will be at the goldaster control plots southeast of Wheeler. Eight different treatments have been applied to the goldaster.

Also on the tour will be a visit to the Glenn Williams ranch 3 miles south of Wheeler. Mr. Williams has used weed and brush control and grazing management to develop this ranch.

Basic Certification For Firefighters Offered

Beginning August 31st, 1989 Texas State Technical Institute instructors will present basic certification classes for your benefit. These classes will be at the Wheeler Fire Station on the first, third and fifth Thursday of each month.

Hours for classes will be from 7-9 p.m. or 7-10 p.m. nightly. Each department will receive a detailed schedule.

The State Fireman's and Fire Marshal's Certification program includes 24 subject areas for a total of 162 hours in the basic portion. All 162 hours will be presented at the Wheeler Fire Station during the next 36-40 months.

Certification hours will be computer processed and updates will be available at regular intervals.

All firefighters are urged to attend as many classes as possible.

Wheeler ISD Offering Registration Packets

For parents of all kindergarten students and of students new to the district, Wheeler ISD is offering registration packets. These will become available Thursday, August 17, and may be picked up in the hall outside the superintendent's office between the hours (on business days) of 8:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. Parents of returning students will only need to fill out the Registration/Emergency Card; these will be available in the same location for parents who wish to fill it out prior to Friday, August 25, registration day.

The required forms included in the packets are: 1. Registration/Emergency Card; 2. STUDENT HEALTH INFORMATION (a two page questionnaire); 3. Home Language Survey. The parent/guardian must provide all the requested information (please use full legal names) before his/her child can be enrolled in school. Parents of students who attended pre-kindergarten at Wheeler do not have to fill out the Home Language Survey, or the STUDENT HEALTH INFORMATION as it is already in your child's permanent records. The estimated length of time needed to finish these documents is from 15 to 30 minutes; some of the information required (for example, the date of the last dental exam or the phone number of preferred hospital) is generally kept with other personal records at home or may even require a call to your family doctor.

Because of these factors, coupled with the usual, unavoidable registration "traffic jam" of waiting in line to complete the enrollment process, school personnel believed some parents might prefer the option of completing these documents in the quiet and privacy of their own homes. Parents who prefer to wait until registration day (Friday, August 25) are welcome to do so.

Federal Heat Stress Relief Program

Low income households with a medical need for cooling may be eligible for a one-time cash benefit under the federal Heat Stress Relief Program. The program runs through September, but funds are limited and will be given on a first-come, first served basis. The one-time benefit may range from \$48.00 to \$138.00.

Applications, including a form to verify medical need, and further information for persons in Gray, Donley, and Wheeler counties may be obtained from the American Red Cross office.

The funds for the Heat Stress Relief Program are being provided under the low-income home energy assistance block grant and are being allocated on the basis of the poverty rate within each county.

they are to "exult in their tribulations—" But why? Because it is through tribulations that the "—proven character—" of Jesus is shaped, tempered, and polished. Perhaps the best illustration of this "—hope—" is an analogy that is taken from the story of Jacob wrestling with an angel. According to this analogy, Jacob struggled with his attacker all night and finally pinned him. The attacker begged Jacob to release him, but Jacob said: "I will not let you go unless you bless me." Christians should have this same attitude! When they are confronted by tribulations, their attitude should be: "I will not simply overcome you! I will squeeze a blessing out of you."
