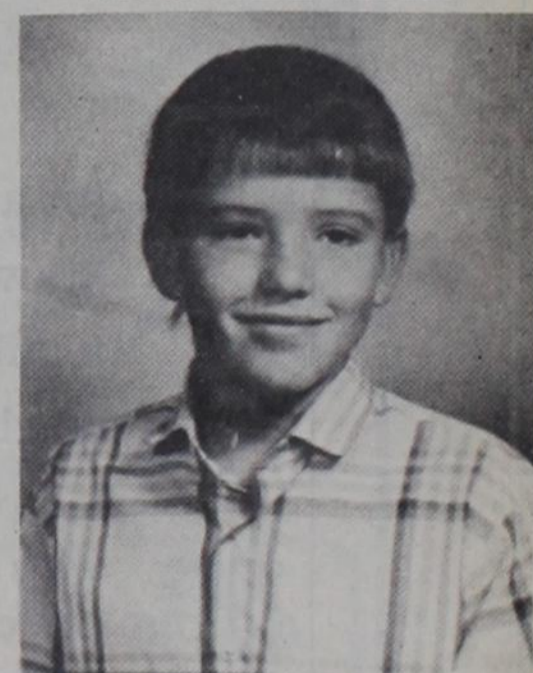

From The Minister's Desk:

A college football team that is perennially ranked among the top teams in the nation is the Oklahoma Sooners. And the Sooners usually meet or excel their ranking. Yet for the last few years their winning tradition on the football field has been overshadowed by an anything-goes attitude which many of the Sooners players have demonstrated.

This attitude was clearly seen at the end of the last season. Three players were arrested for gang-raping a girl in the athletic dormitory. Another player shot a teammate after a late-night argument in the athletic dormitory. And a player was arrested after he sold seventeen grams of cocaine to an undercover drug agent. After these incidents it became obvious to most Sooners fans that one individual -- head coach Barry Switzer -- was largely responsible for this attitude. For this reason he was forced to resign.

Coach Switzer had an impressive 157-29-4 record, winning three national championships. He also had an undisciplined football program which he once described as a "loose ship", saying: "We don't inhibit, muzzle, or restrict our players. You can't manage kids that way. I don't want to be managed that way." With such an attitude it is not surprising that Coach Switzer reaped what he had sown.

But there are many college football coaches that do not have the attitude of Coach Switzer. For example, there is Lou Holtz, the head coach of Notre Dame. He is a firm disciplinarian who expects the Notre Dame players to abide by the guidelines of the Notre Dame football program. His attitude was clearly seen last season when he suspended two players before Notre Dame's game with second-ranked Southern California. During the season these two players, the team's leading rusher and leading receiver, had repeatedly been late to the team's meetings. And when they were forty minutes late for a team meeting before the game with Southern California, he suspended them from the game.

Such discipline is not unprecedented in Coach Holtz's career. When he was the head coach at the University of Arkansas, he suspended three players

before the 1978 Orange Bowl Game with Oklahoma. These players composed about seventy-eight percent of the Arkansas offense, but they violated what Coach Holtz called his "do-right" rule and he suspended them from the game.

Perhaps many parents could learn a lesson from Coach Holtz. By nature children do what they want not what they should. And for this reason the Bible admonishes parents to discipline their children until they can discipline themselves. The quotation, "Spare the rod and spoil the child," is not an accurate Biblical quotation. The exact Biblical quotation is: "He who spares the rod hates his son, but he who disciplines him diligently . . ."

The Hebrew word for discipline in this text is *yahsaar* and it means "chastise", suggesting the use of physical pain or punishment in the training of children. This discipline would be what is commonly referred to as a spanking or "taking a licking." And according to Proverbs 13:24, parents who neglect such discipline in the training of their children hate -- not love -- them.

Yet the Bible also emphasizes that discipline is not always physical punishment. There is another Hebrew word for discipline and it is *yahkaag*. It is a term that literally means "to prove", "to convince", or "to convict", suggesting instruction or education. Parents who love their children will chastise them, but they will also instruct or educate them.

Proverbs 29:15 gives the proper mixture of this discipline when it says: "The rod and reproof give wisdom, but a child who gets his own way brings shame to his mother." Proper discipline is a mixture of *yahsaar* and *yahkaag*. It chastises and instructs. And the proper training of children requires that parents discipline them with a mixture of chastisement and instruction.

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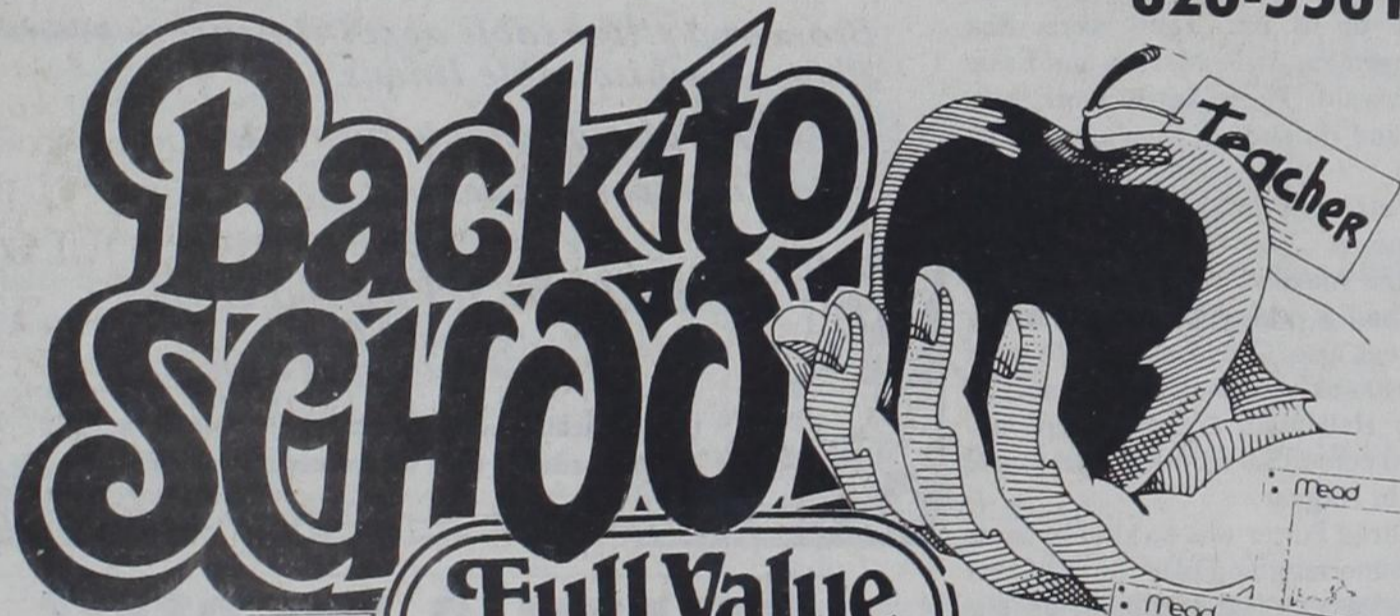

I. BACKGROUND

Northern Natural Gas Company, a division of Enron Corp., gathers helium bearing gas from wells located in the Hugoton field area in southwest Kansas and Oklahoma and from Northern's "Texas A" line located in the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandle area, which gas is or may be processed for the extraction of helium at the Bushton Helium Plant, near Bushton, Kansas. Class action litigation spanning a 25 year period was settled in the summer of 1988 regarding payment for helium sold by Northern commencing in 1963. The funds attributable to helium extracted from gas delivered to Northern from 1963 through most of 1986 have already been distributed, pursuant to the Settlement Agreement and orders of the United States District Court for the District of Kansas and the Sedgwick County District Court.

Pursuant to the court approved Settlement Agreement, Northern agreed to pay for all helium extracted at the Bushton Helium Plant and sold in the future. The "future" is defined in the Settlement Agreement as the time period after and including January 1, 1988. The Court in the above-referenced case will supervise distribution of helium proceeds attributable to sales in 1988 and to a portion of 1989. Thereafter Northern will distribute payments, on a monthly basis in most situations, directly to the owners of the wells which supplied the helium bearing gas.¹

A. DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF HELIUM FUNDS TO BE "ALLOCATED" TO EACH WELL.

Pursuant to the Court's April 3, 1989, Order, on August 1, 1989, Northern must file certain detailed exhibits/schedules with the Court. Northern's "allocation schedules" will show the amount of helium allocated to each well or other input point. Several thousand wells supply helium bearing gas into the portion of the Northern pipeline system which feeds the Bushton Helium Plant. The amount of helium allocated to a given well will be weighted based upon a variety of factors, including the gas volumes delivered to Northern, the helium content of the gas from the well,² and the location of the well.³

B. COMPILING A LIST OF "PAYEES" FOR THE PROCEEDS ATTRIBUTABLE TO A GIVEN WELL.

Based upon the amount of helium allocated to a given well, as described above, the next step is determine the amount to be paid to the various "payees" for that well. The schedules filed by Northern on August 1, 1989, will show the payees for the helium allocated to each well. The funds for the 1963 through 1986 time period were distributed to Northern's historical payees, based upon Northern's payment records. Commencing in 1986, however, there were vast changes in the natural gas industry. Pursuant to Federal Energy Regulatory Commission Order No. 451 and other rules and regulations, Northern no longer purchases gas from many of the individual wells which deliver gas into Northern's pipeline system (during the 1963 through 1986 time period Northern purchased the gas for these wells pursuant to gas purchase contracts). For wells in which the gas purchase contracts have been terminated, Northern now "transports" the gas on a B.T.U. basis. Gas which is not purchased, but which is transported by Northern and processed at the Bushton Helium Plant for the extraction of helium shall hereinafter be referred to as "transportation gas" and the individual wells which produce such gas shall hereinafter be referred to as "transportation wells." Northern does not maintain records regarding the owners of the wells which supply the transportation gas. In many instances, Northern's records show the name of the company which delivers transportation gas from such wells, but these delivering companies in many instances do not own the working interest in the well; these delivering companies are intermediaries which purchase the gas from the working interest owners, deliver the gas for transport on Northern's system, and sell it to end users. In some instances there are several tiers of such sales/purchase transactions prior to the entry of the gas into Northern's system covering the production from a single well.

¹The prior payout included Northern's helium sales through December 31, 1987. Because Northern had substantial volumes in storage as of December 31, 1987, the helium produced in 1987 had not yet been sold as of that date. Thus, the payout of helium sales from 1988 will be allocated to 1987 production (which was placed in storage during 1987 and sold during 1988) and 1988 production (which was sold during 1988).

²On average, helium is usually about .3 percent to .5 percent of the gas stream, but the percentages fluctuate above and below those ranges for some wells.

³Wells from certain areas are located along portions of the pipeline system the gas from which is almost always processed for helium. Gas from wells in other areas is usually only processed for helium when the normal pipeline sources do not have adequate gas volumes to ensure that the plant is operating at the desired capacity.

The Settlement Agreement requires, and the Court has ruled, that the working interest owners of the wells which supply the helium bearing gas from which helium is extracted at the Bushton Helium Plant are entitled to the payments for helium as to which royalty must then be paid to royalty owners. The procedures set forth in this Legal Notice describe the procedures the Court utilized to ensure that the helium funds are paid to the working interest and royalty owners from the wells which produce the transportation gas and from the wells where Northern purchases gas.

1. GAS "PURCHASED" PURSUANT TO GAS PURCHASE CONTRACTS.

In those situations where Lessee-Producers have sold gas to Northern pursuant to a gas purchase contract, Northern will distribute helium payments based upon the historical "division of interest" (i.e. list of payees) utilized to distribute payments for natural gas.⁴

2. GAS "TRANSPORTED" ON NORTHERN'S SYSTEM.

The Court's April 3, 1989, Order established a detailed procedure for determining the proper payee(s) for helium proceeds attributable to gas which was "transported" on Northern's system. On May 19, 1989, Northern mailed certain materials (as required by the Court's Order) to the well operators of those wells from which Northern received "transportation gas." Northern also wrote to other Lessee-Producers who previously had gas purchase contracts regarding these wells. The well operator was authorized to return an affidavit which listed the appropriate payees for the helium funds attributable to the transportation gas. The Court's April 3, 1989, Order provided that if the well operator did not return the affidavit to Northern, the well operator would be deemed the proper payee for all helium funds attributable to transportation gas.

The well operators have, in many instances, returned properly completed affidavits to Northern. Payment for helium funds attributable to transportation gas will be distributed pursuant to these affidavits. Where no affidavit was returned, the helium funds will be distributed to the well operator.

C. DETERMINING THE AMOUNT OF COMPENSATION DUE FOR HELIUM ATTRIBUTABLE TO A GIVEN WELL OR OWNER.

The amount of compensation to be distributed to a given payee will be based upon the terms of the Future Helium Compensation Agreement or other Agreement in effect between Northern and the producer who supplied the helium bearing gas. Prior Orders of the Court imposed the terms of a standard "Future Helium Compensation Agreement" upon all Lessee-Producers and other suppliers of helium bearing gas who did not execute such agreements.

II. PROCEDURE FOR DETERMINING IF ALLOCATION, PAYMENT, AND OTHER SCHEDULES/EXHIBITS SHOULD BE APPROVED.

A. EXHIBITS TO BE FILED WITH COURT CLERK.

On August 1, 1989, Northern must file certain allocation, payment and other schedules with the Court. These schedules will be on file with the Clerk's office and will be available for inspection during regular business hours.

B. INFORMATION TO BE MAILED TO PAYEES.

On August 1, 1989, Northern will mail to each payee the pertinent portion of the payment schedule applicable to such payee, along with certain explanatory materials.

C. DEADLINE FOR FILING OBJECTIONS.

Any objections to the allocation, payments or other schedules, or regarding other matters, must be filed in writing with the Clerk of the District Court on or before August 25, 1989. Copies of all such objections shall also be served upon Mr. Michael Moran, counsel for Northern (Address: P.O. Box 1188, Houston, Texas 77251-1188), and upon the Special Master (Jim H. Goering, 700 Fourth Financial Center, Wichita, Kansas 67202). Persons who have questions or objections to the schedules prepared by Northern are encouraged to contact Mr. Steve Gilbert (address and phone number below) before filing an objection, to discuss the problem with Mr. Gilbert.

D. COURT HEARING

On September 11, 1989, at 9:00 a.m. the Court will hold a hearing to determine whether the allocation, payment and other schedules should be approved. Said hearing may be continued to such future date and time as the Court may deem appropriate, without additional notice. If such schedules are approved, the Court will finalize the procedure for distribution of the Settlement Funds and the Court will consider any other unresolved items which may exist. If the allocation, payment and other schedules are approved the Court presently anticipates that the settlement funds will be distributed by Northern on September 22, 1989.

⁴In many instances Northern distributes payments for 100% of a given well's production to a single Lessee-Producer, who, in turn, makes payment to its royalty owners and working interest partners. This same general procedure will be utilized to distribute funds attributable to the helium proceeds associated with gas delivered to Northern pursuant to gas purchase contracts.

CRP Weed Control

It appears that it's been a good year for establishing grass on CRP acreage. Most of the lovegrass and plains bluestem that was planted this year is looking good. But along with the grass, the good rains we've received have also helped the weeds stay healthy. Most of the weed problems this year have included pigweed, mare's tail, nightshade, tumbleweed, kochia, and sunflowers.

Most of the acreage that has been sprayed with a pre-emerge herbicide such as Ally or Glenn had good results this year, probably because the rainfall soaked the chemical into the ground better. Contact herbicides such as 2, 4-D worked well also this year, because the weeds were actively growing following the rains.

Although in most cases it is too late to spray weeds, shredding is an alternative for weed control this time of year. Shredding will allow sunlight to get to the grass seedlings and conserve moisture in the soil. Another alternative to shredding is swathing. This method will work if the weeds are not too thick or if a shredder is not available. It may be necessary to shred or swath two or three times during the summer months to keep weeds under control.

It is the responsibility of the producer to control weeds on CRP acreage. On contracts bid in the sixth bid session and after, there is a limit of one cost-shared weed control after the grass is planted. Any additional weed control after the first one will still be necessary to establish the grass, but will not be cost-shared.
