BRETT BUCKINGHAM GIVEN \$8000 4-YEAR SCHOLARSHIP

Billy Brett Buckingham was awarded an \$8,000, four-year Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo FFA scholarship tonight in special ceremonies at the 61st annual Texas FFA Convention, now underway in Houston's Astroarena.

Brett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Buckingham, Wheeler, recently graduated as valedictorian of his class from Kelton High School. An active FFA member for four years, Brett served as district treasurer and chapter president. He earned the Lone Star Farmer degree and received the Star Greenhand, Star Chapter Farmer and Star Lone Star Farmer awards. He was a member of the land judging, livestock judging and farm radio teams.

While in high school, Brett was president of the National Honor Society, president of the senior class and captain of the basketball and baseball teams. He was named to the all-district basketball team and was a member of 4-H.

Brett who plans to attend Texas

Tech University and major in agricultural economics, was one of 50 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo FFA scholarship winners honored.

"These young people have demonstrated their outstanding leadership and scholastic abilities," said Show president Hal Hillman. "We're proud to play a part in their futures."

"We're also pleased that the Texas FFA selected the Astroarena as the location of this year's convention," said Hillman. "Although our scholarship winners come from all over the state, we're especially proud to present these scholarships in a facility built and paid for by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo."

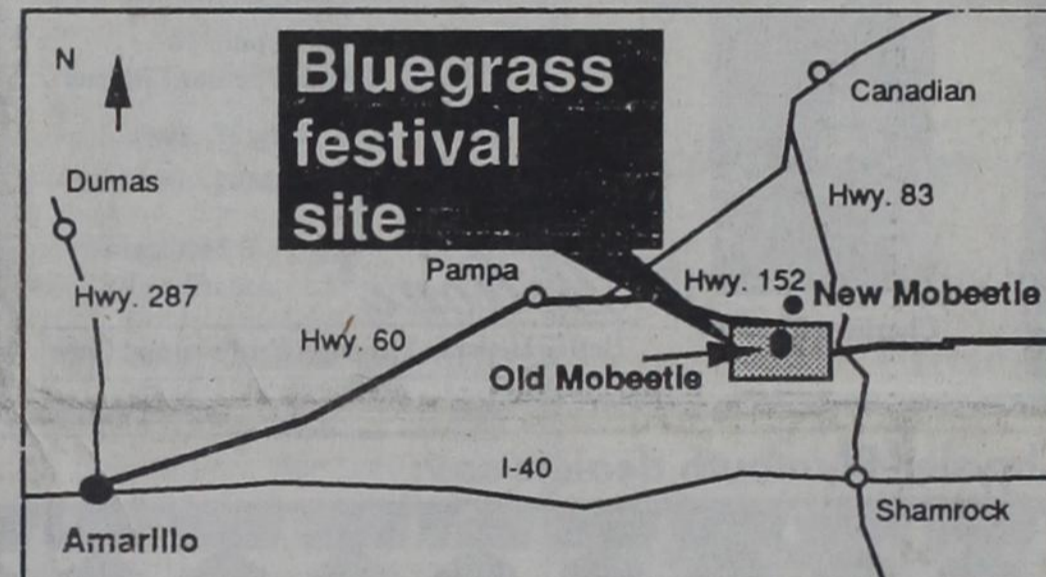
In addition to the 50 FFA scholarships, the Show awarded 50 four-year, \$8,000 scholarships at the Texas 4-H Roundup on June 6 in College Station. As in past years, all FFA and 4-H recipients must pursue a bachelor's degree at a Texas college or university. This scholarship program has been expanded, however, to include life science as well as agricultural majors.

Scholarship funding is provided by revenues earned at the annual Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, a civic and charitable event made possible by the efforts of more than 6,000 volunteers. To date, the Show has committed more than \$1.14 million in educational funds for the upcoming school year.

Included in this commitment are 24 new, \$8,000, four-year metropolitan scholarships, awarded at a special Million Dollar Scholarship Luncheon on June 20 in Houston; the Area Go Texan scholarships, presented at rodeo performances during the 1989 Show; and, school art scholarships, awarded to recipients selected during this year's school art contest.

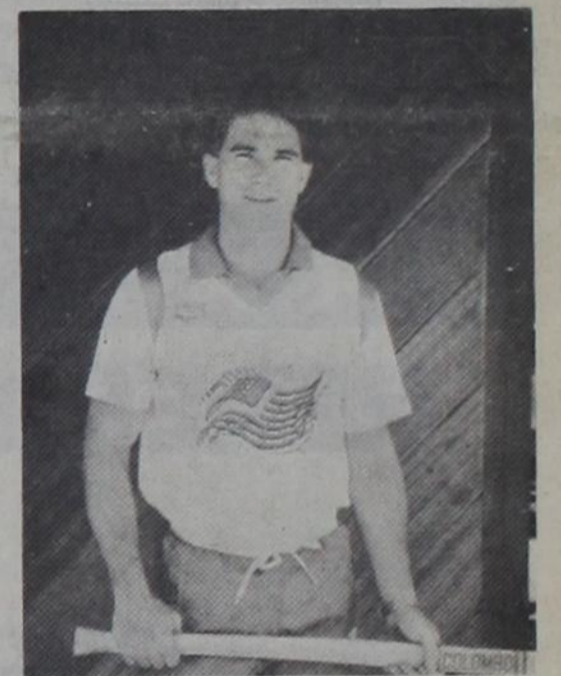

Roller hockey is a non-contact game that is fast and exciting. It is similar to ice hockey with five players on the floor at one time instead of 6. The hockey puck is replaced with a 6 oz. ball; the stick used to move the ball is curved stick similar to the one used in field hockey. Shin pads, knee pads, gloves and helmets are worn for protection. Points are earned by putting the ball in the cage—goal.

Bracken has competed internationally in Mexico City in '86-'87. He returned from Montreux, Switzerland in April—the U.S. team took fifth place.

Roller hockey is the second leading sport behind soccer in Europe and South America. There they have professional leagues and play year round. Roller hockey will be an exhibition sport in the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona Spain. The U.S. team trains four weeks out of the year at the olympic training center in Colorado Springs.

The games at the Olympic Sports Festival will be played at the Myriad in Oklahoma City on Saturday, Sunday and Monday of this week.

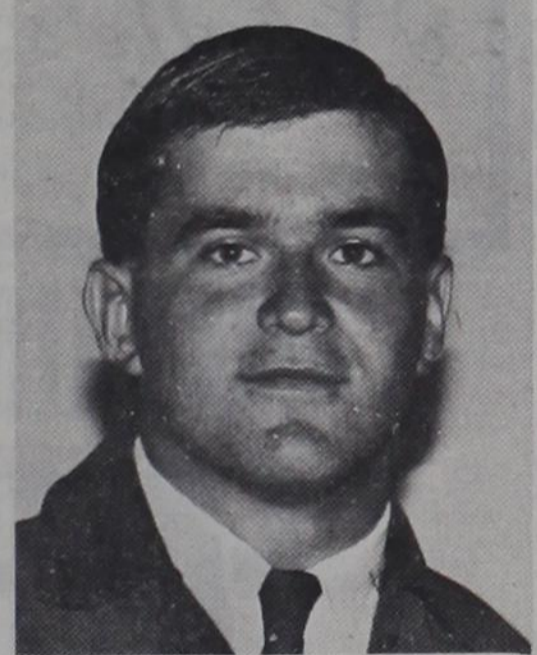

From the Minister's Desk:

"The Myth Of The Greener Grass" is the title of a recent book that discusses the social problem in infidelity. In this book, the author, J. Allan Petersen, makes some interesting observations about this serious social problem.

For example, he emphasizes that infidelity is not a new problem, but he also emphasizes that society's attitude about infidelity has gradually changed. To illustrate the change that has occurred in the 1980's, Mr. Petersen cites a poll that was conducted in the early 1980's by Mr. Louis Harris. This poll concluded that "...the increased emphasis people are placing on self-fulfillment, pleasure, and doing one's thing is dramatically altering American's traditional value system. The emerging self-oriented values represent a new personal liberalism."

Translate this philosophy to marriage and it says, "Fidelity is passe and infidelity is acceptable. If your marriage does not provide at all times all you've ever expected, dreamed, or fantasized, and fails to bring you to the constant sensory pleasure and fulfillment you deserve, find it elsewhere, have an affair." While society may approve such a philosophy, the Bible does not. Rather it teaches that infidelity is sin, calling it adultery.

sinful. When God created mankind He created male and female, declaring that His creation was "...very good." (Genesis 1:31) He also instructed the first husband and wife to "...be fruitful and multiply..." which clearly approves sexual intercourse. (Genesis 1:28) Centuries later the Hebrew writer wrote: "...Let the marriage bed be undefiled; for fornicators and adulterers God will judge." (Hebrews 13:4) From these texts, it should be obvious that sex is given to people who are married to each other and if it is shared by people who are not married to each other, it is sin.

While infidelity is sin, it is not an unpardonable sin. There is no sin that the blood of Jesus cannot forgive. The Apostle Paul wrote the church at Corinth and said: "...do not be deceived; neither fornicators, nor idolators nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor homosexuals, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards nor swindlers shall inherit the kingdom of God. And such were some of you; but you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus..." (1 Corinthians 6:9-11) Like every other sin, infidelity can be forgiven by the blood of Jesus.

But God expects marriage to be characterized by fidelity. The grass may look greener on the other side of the fence, but it is off-limits.

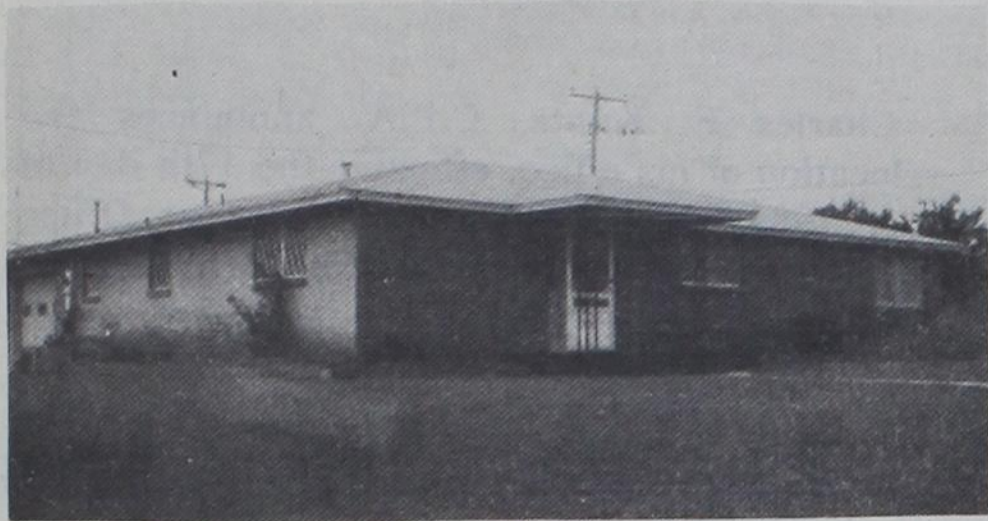

Wheeler Care Center Staff Completes Testing

On July 11, 12 and 13th Nursing Assistants at the Wheeler Care Center were tested for state certification. A federal program calls for all Nursing Assistants employed at extended care facilities to be certified.

To meet the requirements for certification a Nursing Assistant must first pass a hands on skills exam, then a written exam. 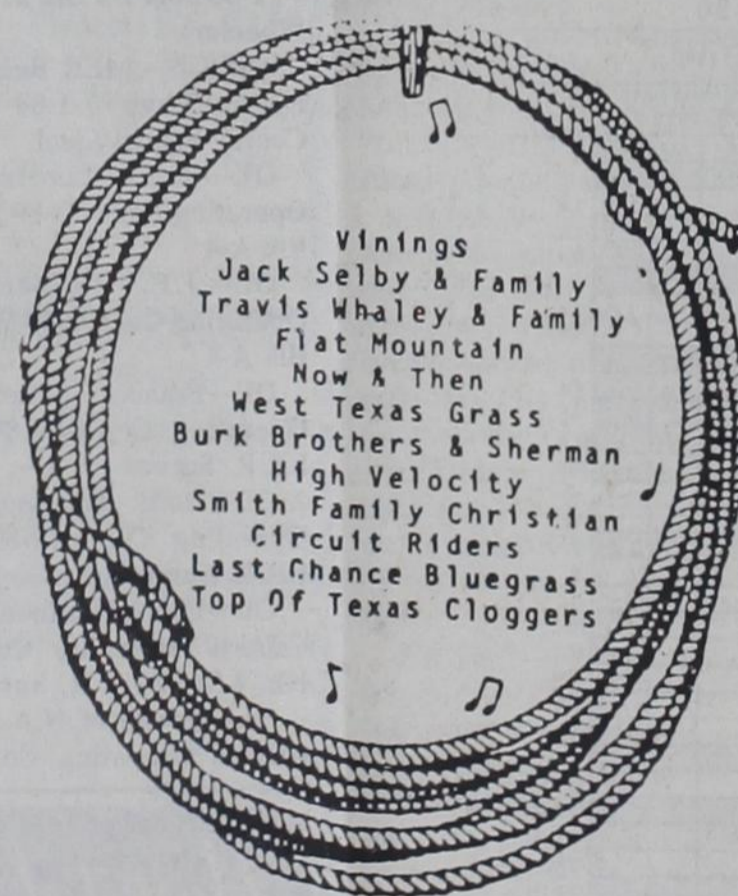

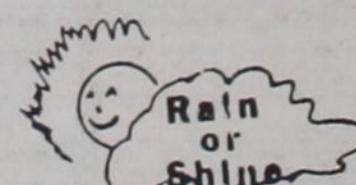

Locals Complete LVN Training In Shamrock

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was taken from the Shamrock Texan by Priscilla Vermillion, April 27, 1989.)

The current Shamrock Class of Clarendon College School of Nursing began training in February, 1989, with eight members.

One hundred twenty students have graduated from the School and gone on to receive Licensed Vocational Nursing degrees by passing the State Test.

The local class started with Juda Bechtal as instructor in 1973. The class was affiliated with Frank Phillips School of Nursing. Later it became a class of Clarendon College.

Through the years 18 classes have graduated from the Shamrock school under instructors Juda Bechtal, Kitty Hanson, Paula Parker and present instructor Betty Hobbs, R.N.

Three of the classmates have continued their training and became registered nurses and work in the area at the present time. Karen Thomas and Bumby Hiltbrunner both work at Shamrock General Hospital and Mary Kay Tallant serves as the local school nurse for Shamrock Independent School District and part time at Samnorwood School.

Graduates with LVN degrees living and working in Shamrock are: Debbie Simpson, Jewette Hayes, Georgia Porter, Peggy Simpson, Zola Tate, Denise Kidd, Rachel Stacy and Billie Roberts. Patsy Henry and Becky Wolf are working in Wheeler.

Members of the 1989-90 Class are Debra Cook Brenda Brannum, Claudia Renee Cook and Bobby Harper, all of Shamrock; Cindy Lewis of Samnorwood; Christi Jones, Patti Bradstreet and Lee Ann Lehman, all of Wheeler.

The course includes class-room hours at 104 North Texas in a three-room house and practical work in Shamrock General Hospital. Besides the classroom, the house features a kitchen equipped with a four-burner gas stove, microwave oven and a small refrigerator. This helps the students who must carry lunches to have a hot meal. Equipment in the kitchen has been purchased by past classes with special fund raising projects.

The third room is furnished to represent a room at the hospital with a hospital bed complete with Mrs. Chase, a manikin especially prepared for the students to learn how a tracheotomy is done and to simulate

care for a patient who has had serious surgery. There is also Betsy Sue, a baby doll for the teaching of bathing and care for an infant.

While touring the school, you will meet Jasper, a skelton used for teaching the different bones in a human body, and Buford, a manikin who helps the students learn the location of organs in the human torso. Buford's front opens up and the heart, lungs, stomach, etc. are removable.

Many of the present students started as nurses' aides.

When asked why they are going to the class, most of the students' answers were "to better prepare ourselves to serve mankind and to be able to help people in need."

A person making a good nurse must have a special talent, a dedication and desire to be with and help people.

A number of the 1989-90 class members say their hopes are to continue their education and to become registered nurses, a very much needed profession throughout the world.

The class, midway in the year of study, will be honored with a Capping Ceremony sometime in August.

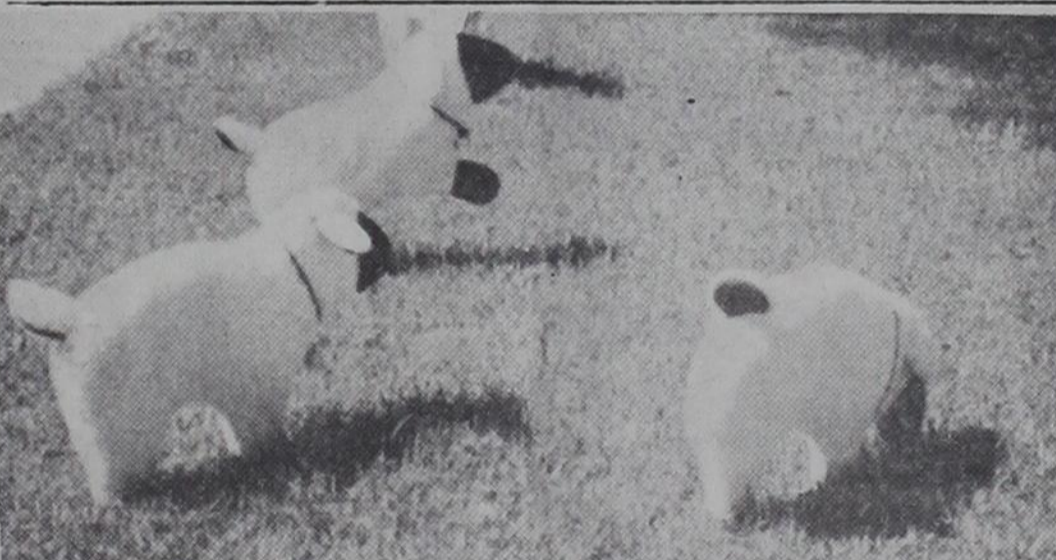
