Roller hockey is a non-contact game that is fast and exciting. It is similar to ice hockey with five players on the floor at one time instead of 6. The hockey puck is replaced with a 6 oz. ball; the stick used to move the ball is curved stick similar to the one used in field hockey. Shin pads, knee pads, gloves and helmets are worn for protection. Points are earned by putting the ball in the cage-goal.
