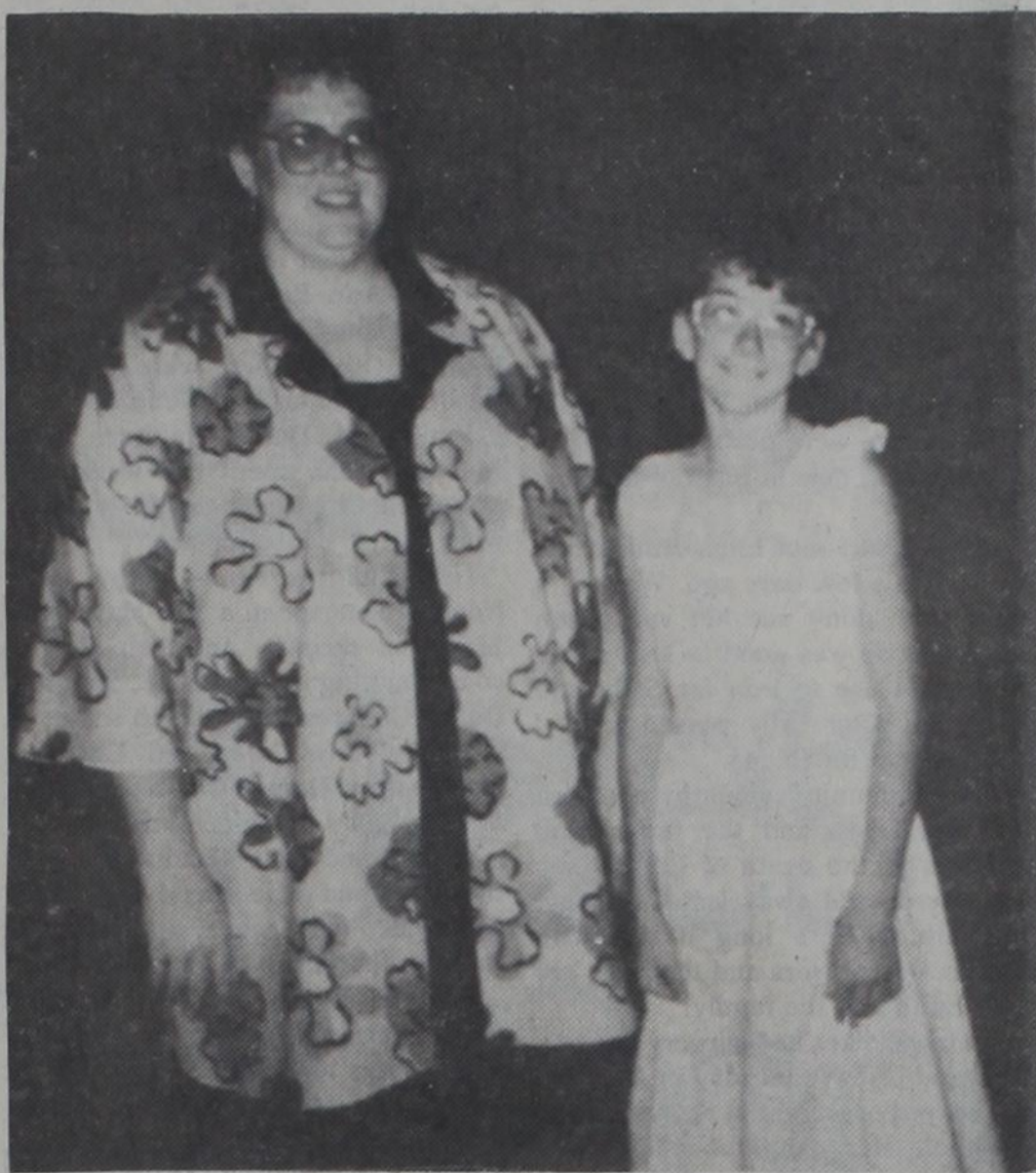

10-Year Prison Term Given in Drug Trial

A 31st District Court Jury handed down a 10 year prison sentence to a Wheeler County resident Tuesday in Wheeler. Ron Settle of Shamrock was convicted of the sale of a controlled substance to a Task Force undercover narcotics officer. The State asked that the jury set the standards for Wheeler County on drug control. The jury set the sentence of 10 years in the Texas Department of Corrections.

Juries in Wheeler County have spoken out on other Drug trials with-in the past 7 months assessing prison terms of 18, 15, 13 and 10 years in Huntsville. The people have spoken out against Drugs. We the law-enforcement of your county, city, state say Thank You to those citizens that have also decided to join in the War On Drugs and Drug Dealers. Make these messages strong and severe and very clear to anyone that would possess, transport or sell drugs in Wheeler County. Each voter in Wheeler County may be called upon to hear these cases, make sure that you deliver these Drug Dealers to Huntsville where for a period of time they cannot hurt you or your children. 1. Motion by Mr. Wills, seconded by Mrs. Hennard to accept the resignation of Jeannie Hennig as cafeteria worker. Motion carried unanimously.

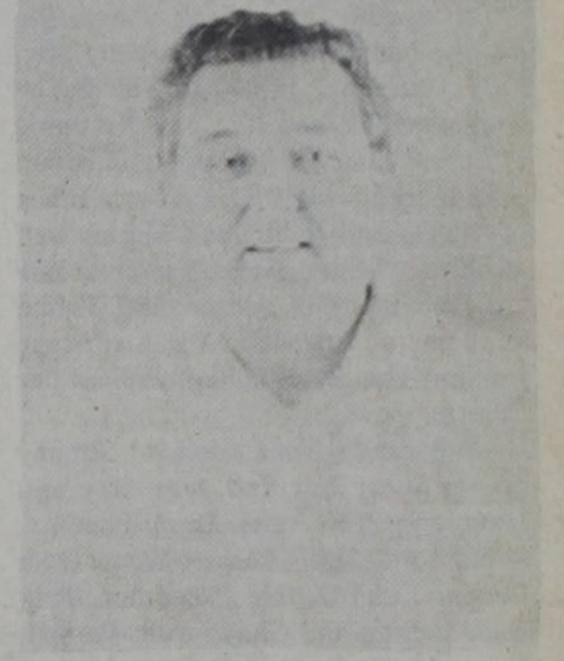

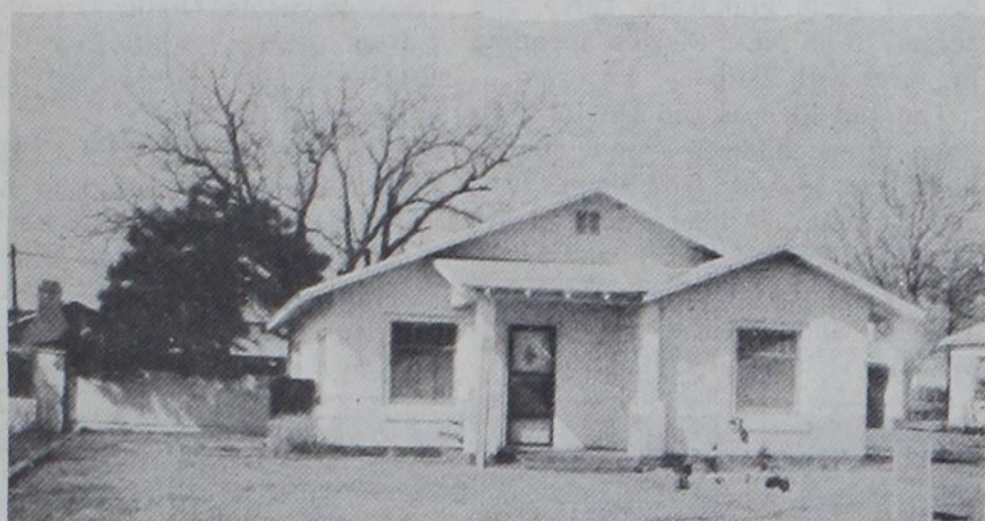
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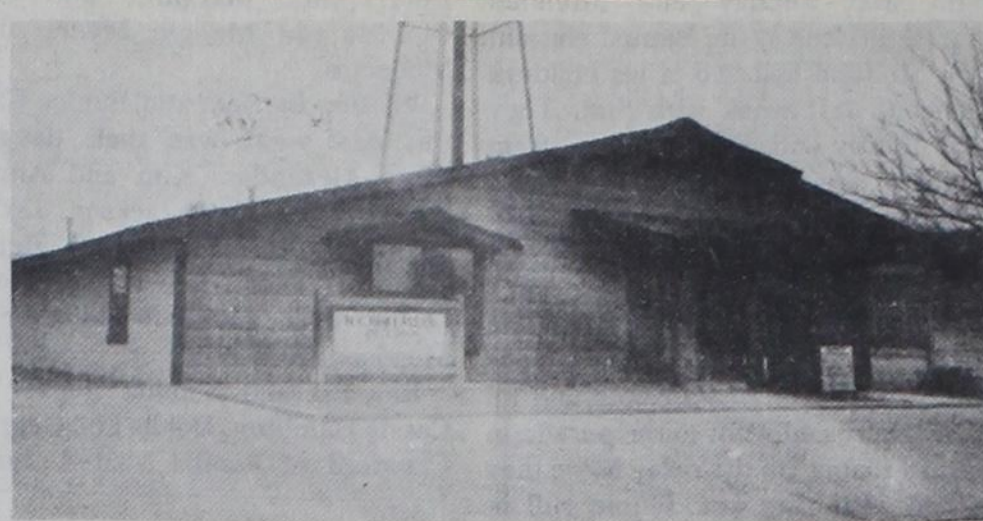

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PARENTS HOLD THE KEY TO GARAGE DOOR DEATHS
Citing the deaths of 36 children trapped under automatic garage doors since 1982, government safety experts are warning parents to take steps to prevent children from operating the garage doors.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, the children who died were between the ages of 2 and 14, and some of them were believed to have been playing "the garage door game" when the accident occurred. In the game, children activate the control for the raised garage door, then dart under as it closes. The children died when they were pinned under the doors.

CPSC urged parents to keep remote control door opening devices secured in the car's glove compartment at all times. Wall-mounted push-button controls should be relocated so they are inaccessible to children. Prohibiting youngsters from playing in the garage is also recommended.

Homeowners, particularly parents and grandparents, should replace any garage door opener that does not have an automatic reverse function. Homeowners should install an opener equipped with an automatic reversing feature that has been certified as meeting the 1982 industry standard (Underwriters Laboratories 325 standard for door, drapery, gate, louver, and window operators and systems).

Homeowners having a garage door opener should test the automatic reverse feature every 30 days according to instructions in the owner's manual. A two-inch wooden block can be placed on the floor in the path of the descending door; if the door doesn't reverse on striking the block, the opener should be repaired or replaced with one certified as meeting the 1982 standard.

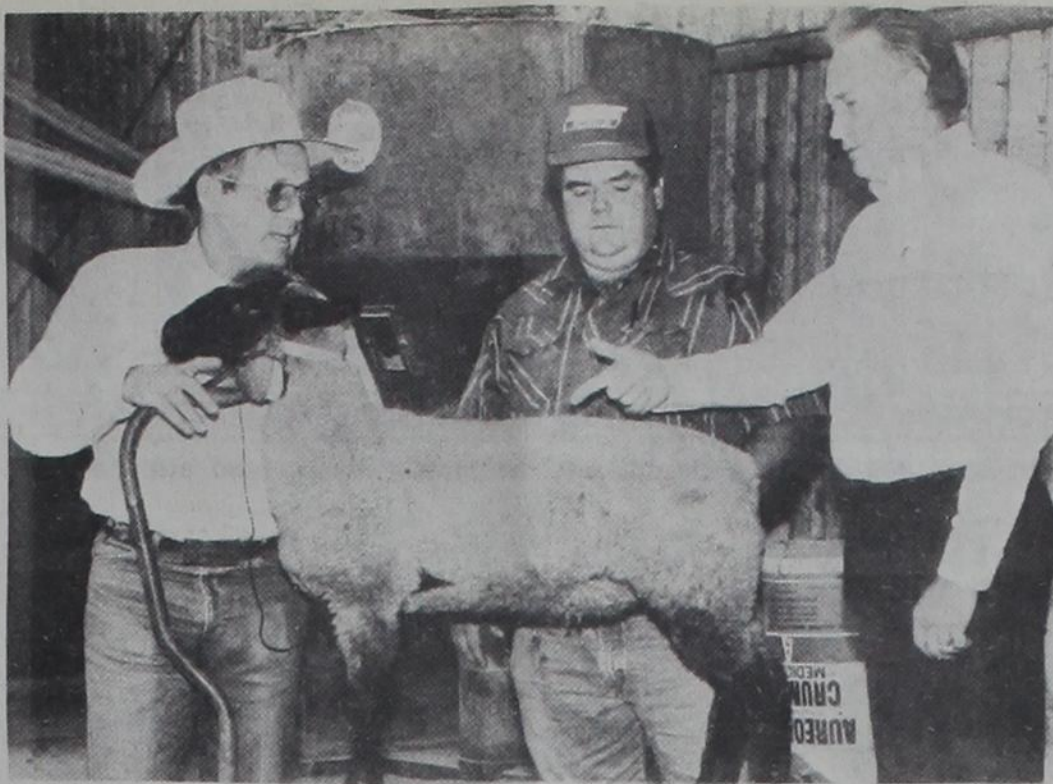

LEGS CONTEST

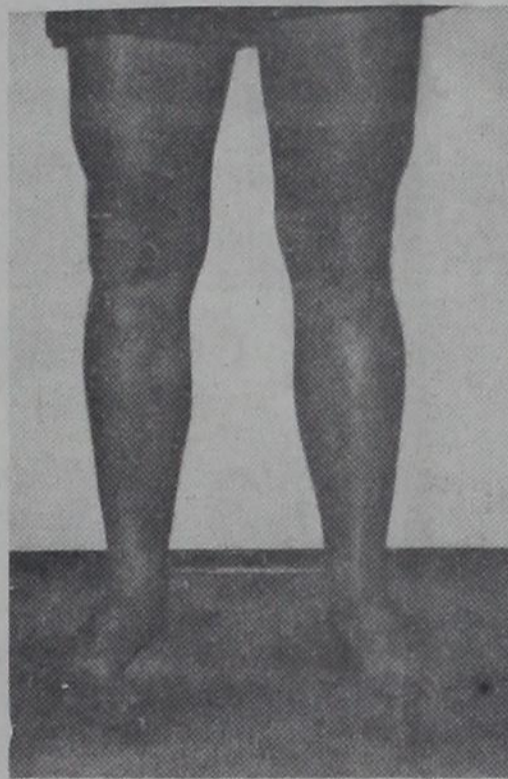

Voting was accomplished by placing tickets in the cans behind the pictures. Look at the pictures and see if you can

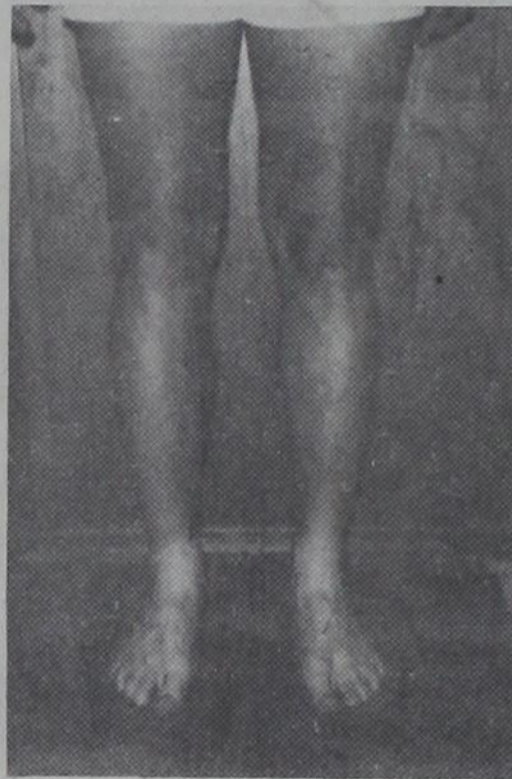
