10-Year Prison Term Given in Drug Trial

A 31st District Court Jury handed down a 10 year prison sentence to a Wheeler County resident Tuesday in Wheeler. Ron Settle of Shamrock was convicted of the sale of a controlled substance to a Task Force undercover narcotics officer. The State asked that the jury set the standards for Wheeler County on drug control. The jury set the sentence of 10 years in the Texas Department of Corrections.

Ether Lee Dyson, 85, died Thursday, July 6, 1989 in Sayre, OK.


Ether Lee Meek born in Cook County was reared in Mobeetie and lived there most of her life until 1981 when she moved to Pampa.

PARENTS HOLD THE KEY TO **GARAGE DOOR DEATHS**

Citing the deaths of 36 children trapped under automatic garage doors since 1982, government safety experts are warning parents to take steps to prevent children from operating the garage doors.

According to the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission, the children who died were between the ages of 2 and 14, and some of them were believed to have been playing "the garage door game" when the accident occured. In the game, children activate the control for the raised garage door, then dart under as it closes. The children died when they were pinned under the doors.

CPSC urged parents to keep remote control door opening devices secured in the car's glove compartment at all times. Wall-mounted push-button controls should be relocated so they are inaccessible to children. Prohibiting youngsters from playing in the garage is also recommended.

Homeowners, particularly parents and grandparents, should replace any garage door opener that does not have an automatic reverse function. Homeowners should install an opener equipped with an automatic reversing feature that has been certified as meeting the 1982 industry standard (Underwriters Laboratories 325 standard for door, drapery, gate, louver,

and window operators and systems). Homeowners having a garage door opener should test the automatic reverse feature every 30 days accorddoesn't reverse on striking the block, in the mail. the opener should be repaired or replaced with one certified as meeting the 1982 standard.

CPSC said garage door fatalities involving children have been reported in 21 states over the last seven years. Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service Serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.
