Fortunately it was quite a bit later and when she arrived on the scene of the accident, Wayne was well on his way to Amarillo in the Panhandle Ambulance and I 'limped' over to assure her that he had made it through the accident without injury—the bruise showed up later.

While waiting for our ride back to Wheeler, I had the opportunity to visit with a fellow newspaper individual. The "Panhandle Herald" was on the scene to cover the story. Betty Biggs had camera 'in hand' and later sent us the pictures for our use.

A paramedic from White Deer was remodeling the 'quick stop' at the intersection and came over to attend Mary K. while we waited for our ride.

Mary K. and I were concerned what the spouses were hearing on the radios back home. Fortunately neither had heard anything to make them overly concerned. However the first report had one of the local people in critical condition.

We both preferred to come home for the 'tender loving care' at Parkview.

Thanks to Jimmy for the ride back, the staff at Parkview, and everyone for their concern.

The Fun Run will kickoff the day Tuesday at 7:30 under the direction of Robert Ford.

The Punt, Pass & Kick competition under the direction of Wayne Wheeler and Richard Smith will be at 8:00 a.m. at the track field.

Added to the annual event this year will be Sky Divers from Amarillo. The show will be at 9:00 a.m. at the track. Mary Meadows is in charge of making the arrangements for the divers.

For the second year, model airplane enthusiasts from Pampa and Wheeler

will present a model air show at the track. This will begin at 9:00 immediately after the sky divers land. The Pampa Prop Club presented a very enjoyable display last year.

Activities at the park will begin at 10:00 a.m. The booths will open and children's games will begin. Live entertainment will be provided. Volleyball and horseshoes will be available for anyone wishing to play. Enjoy food, fun and entertainment all day.

The entertainment at the park will begin at 12:00 noon and continue 9:00 or 9:30 p.m. or the start of the fireworks.

Anyone with a talent who would like to perform is invited to contact Zodell Swift.

Activities scheduled for the youngsters at the park include Turtle Race, Balloon Toss, Swim Meet and Bicycle Rodeo.

The Turtle Race and Balloon Toss

will be under the direction of Thursday Review Club beginning at 10:00 a.m.

The Swim Meet will begin at 12:00 noon. Kim Goad and Teresa Rose will oversee the activities at the pool.

The Bicycle Rodeo will be at 4:00 p.m. under the direction of Brenda McWhorter.

Food booths will feature cokes, lemonade, tea, snow cones, ice cream, hamburgers, brisket burgers, polish sausage, steak on a stick, baked

potatoes, suckers and other delicious items. Game booths will feature dunkin board, plinko, bean bag toss, pie in the face, jail and face painting.

A number of booth spaces have been reserved, but additional spaces remain. An effort will be made to eliminate duplication. This is an excellent opportunity for clubs and/or organizations to raise money. Booth spaces may be reserved by contacting Lou Trimble at the Chamber of

The fireworks display at dusk will conclude the day's activities at the park with the street dance to begin immediately after the firecracker explodes; there is no admission charge for the dance. Jimmy Adams will be in charge of the fireworks display and Bob McCain will arrange and provide the recorded music for the street dance.

A donation box will be at the Chamber of Commerce booth for the collection of donations toward the purchase of fireworks next year. Each year the money is collected prior to the annual celebration. Since donations have been offered at the park in years past, it was decided to have the box available and "pass the hat" prior to the display this year. Donations are voluntary.

## LOCAL AMBULANCE INVOLVED IN ACCIDENT

One of Wheeler's ambulances was involved in an accident Wednesday morning in Panhandle. Three vehicles were involved with only minor injuries reported. The collision was caused around 11:00 a.m. when a passenger car failed to yield the right of way.

The Wheeler Volunteer Ambulance service was enroute, code 3, to St. Anthony's Hospital in Amarillo. Mary K. Christner was the driver of the ambulance. Louis Stas was attending the patient, Wayne Edwards.

The ambulance had slowed its speed to approximately 50 as it traveled with lights flashing through Panhandle on Highway 60. A passenger car, traveling north, approached the main intersection in Panhandle and did not stop; the intersection is marked with a stop sign and flashing light. Christner did everything possible to avoid the accident.

The brakes were applied and the wheels turned to prevent a direct hit in the passenger side of the auto. The ambulance struck the right front of the car and continued on the strike left front of a pickup stopped at the intersection. The pickup had been traveling north and was waiting for the ambulance to pass before continuing.

The individuals in the pickup and an "off duty" police officer witnessed the accident and had nothing but praise for the evasive action taken by Christner to avoid the accident.

The Panhandle Volunteer Ambulance Service was called to the

scene. The passenger in the car was treated and loaded into the Panhandle unit. Edwards was transferred to the other ambulance and taken on to Amarillo.

A Claude ambulance was later called to take the driver of the car to Amarillo to be checked for possible injuries.

After "shutting everything down" Christner immediately jumped from the ambulance to provide aid to those injured in the collision.

After the others had been treated and transported, Christner finally "gave in" to some treatment for her

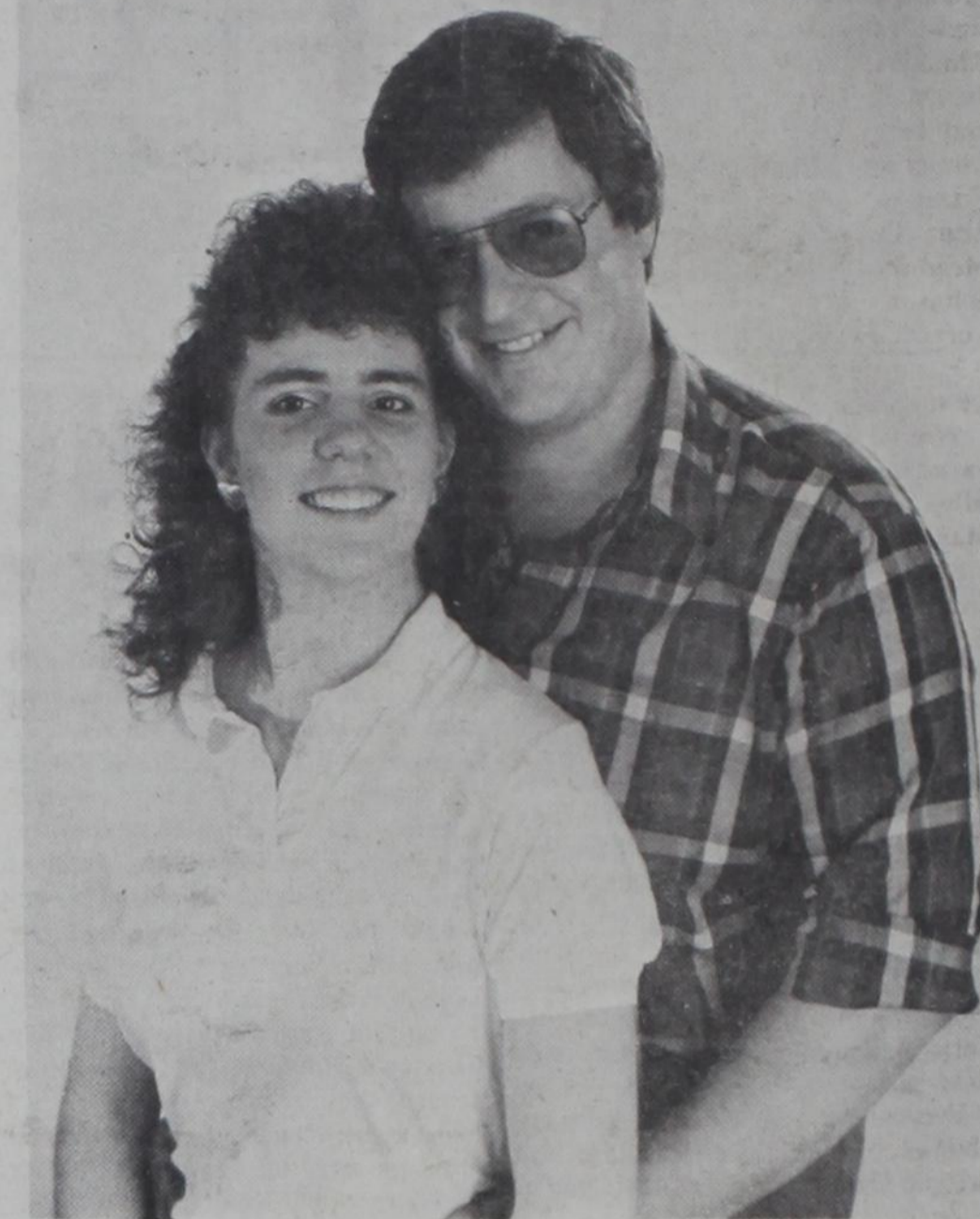

From The Minister's Desk:

During World War II, one of the Navy's finest admirals was Admiral "Bull" Halsey. His nickname, "Bull" was given to him because of the determination and persistence that he demonstrated in his command.

In October of 1942, Admiral Halsey was appointed commander of the Allied Forces in the South Pacific. Under his command, the Allied Forces defeated the Japanese in several decisive battles. And in one of these battles, an incident occurred which clearly demonstrated the effectiveness of his command.

Admiral Halsey's staff had intercepted a Japanese communique that revealed the location of a submarine, carrying an important Japanese general. When Admiral Halsey read the communique, he ordered three destroyers to intercept and sink the submarine. But a member of his staff respectfully suggested that one of these destroyers—England—not be sent on this very crucial mission.

When asked about a reason for this suggestion, Admiral Halsey was told that the crew of the England had a dismal performance record. And he was told that several members of the crew were brawlers who were often arrested when they were on leave in Honolulu.

After hearing this report, Admiral Halsey laughed and commanded that the England be sent on this mission, expressing his conviction that the crew would efficiently perform. Three days later, a message was received at Admiral Halsey's headquarters which reported that the England had intercepted the Japanese Submarine and sunk it. And for the duration of the war, the crew of the England performed superbly, sinking five other enemy ships.

Halsey did not make the mistake that the member of his staff made. He did not merely see what the crew was. Rather he saw what the crew could become.

It is a common mistake to see what people are, but fail to see what people can become. But while it is a mistake that people may make, it is not a mistake that God makes.

The attitude of God can clearly be seen in the ministry of Jesus. During His ministry, Jesus did not see people as a "bad egg", a "hopeless case", or a "leopard who cannot change his spots". Jesus always saw what people could become not merely what they were.

For example, He could see the treasonous tax-collector Matthew, but He could also see a man who could write an inspired account of His life. Jesus could see Zachaeus, another greedy tax-collector, but He could also see a man who would say: "Half of my possessions I will give to the poor, and if I have defrauded anyone of anything, I will give back four times as much." (Luke 19:8) and Jesus could see a blundering fisherman—Simon Peter—who would deny Him three times, but He could also see a powerful personality who could become a leader in the Kingdom of God.

As clearly seen in the ministry of Jesus, God can change people. This change is produced by an obedient faith which is demonstrated by baptism into Jesus. (Romans 6:1-11, Galatians 3:23-29) then the promise of God is: "...If any man is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come." (II Corinthians 5:17)

Admiral Halsey believed that inefficient brawlers could become superb sailors. And God believes that through faith in Jesus Christ weak, sinful people can become new creatures.
