### EXES REUNION A SUCCESS; 380 GATHERED FOR LUNCH

The attendance continues to grow for the bi-annual Wheeler Ex-Student & Teacher Reunion. The exact number of ex-students and ex-teachers signing the register was not available at press time Wednesday.

The number gathered for the noon meal was 380. In 1987 346 individuals were fed at the school cafeteria.

The classes graduating in years ending in "0" and "9" were the honor years. The honor classes were recognized at the 2:00 p.m. business meeting. The class of 1929 was represented by 3 individuals, 1930—8; 1940—4; 1949—5; 1950—3; 1959—12; 1960—2; 1969—9; 1970—1; 1979—1; 1980 & 1989—0.

The class of 1929 celebrated their 50th anniversary. Harrison Hall was

called to the podium. Of the 30 graduates in 1929, 19 are living. Hall went to extra effort to get the class together and had a turnout of 6. The Halls hosted a house party for the class later at their home Saturday evening. Also in the audience was the class of 1929's first grade teacher, Wynona Adams Kong.

Gordon and Bennie Mae Whitener were recognized; they observed their 55th wedding anniversary Saturday.

The oldest ex-teacher was also the oldest ex-student present. C. B. Witt, age 90, was a member of the 1913 class.

Bonnie Adams Harmon and Wynona Adams Kong tied for recognition as ex-teachers having traveled the farthest to attend.

Lewis Simmons, class of 1969, was recognized as the ex-student traveling

Jean V. Anderson, 76, a resident of Clarkston, Wash. died Wednesday evening May 31 at the North Central Care Center at Spokane, Wash. of complications caused by age. She had lived there since July of 1988.

She was born May 31, 1913 to Cull W. and Cora Lucile Whiteley at Kelton, TX. She grew up at Kelton and graduated from High School there in 1930. She then attended Amarillo Jr. College.

As a third grade teacher, she lived at Kelton and taught there for two years; then moved to the San Francisco Bay area.

On June 8, 1937 she married Paul A. Anderson at Fallow, Nev. He survives her at their Clarkston home.

While living in San Francisco she was a homemaker, worked at a dry cleaners as a clerk, and later worked as a teacher assistant until retiring in 1976.

She was a former member of Banana Belt Senior Citizens and enjoyed bowling. In addition to her husband, survivors include a daughter Pat Valeados of Lewiston, Wash., a son Michael P. Anderson of Gresham, Oregon; a sister, Lovella Carr of Clarkston, Wash.; two brothers Dick Whiteley of Austin, Texas, and L.D. Whiteley of Lubbock, Texas and six grandchildren.

A sister Katherine died previously. The memorial service was held at 3 p.m. Sunday, June 3, 1989 at Vassar Rawls Funeral Home with Rev. Joseph Schmidt of Our Lady of Lourdes Catholic Church officiating.

**Man of La Mancha** was the title of one of Broadway's most popular plays. When this play opened in November of 1965, there was not much anticipation or excitement about it. But the play had an electrifying impact on the literary world because of the idealism it emphasized.  
This idealism was illustrated by the play's main character, Don Quixote who sought to correct the world's unrightable wrongs. This idealistic dream was clearly stated in a song that Don Quixote sang in the play.  
He sang:--  
"To dream the impossible dream.  
To fight the unbeatable foe,  
To bear with unbearable sorrow,  
To run where the brave dare not go,  
To right the unrightable wrong,  
To love pure and chaste from afar,  
To try when your arms are too weary,  
To reach the unreachable star.  
This is my quest.  
To follow that star,  
No matter how hopeless,  
No matter how far;  
To fight for the right,  
Without question or pause,  
To be willing to march into hell  
For a heavenly cause!  
And I know,  
If I'll only be true to this glorious quest,  
That my heart will lie peaceful and calm,  
When I'm laid to my rest,  
And the world will be better for  
this;  
That one man,  
Scorned and covered with scars,  
Still strove with his last ounce of courage  
To reach the unreachable star."
