The Wheeler Mustangettes closed the season Monday night at the end of their game with Nazareth. The 90-58 final score in the sub-regional playoffs doused Wheeler's hopes of two state titles in the same school year.

Wheeler never came closer than 14 points it trailed at halftime. Nothing seemed to work right for a team which had witnessed so much success throughout the year.

DeAnn Collins (17 points), DeeDee Dorman (11) and Marcy Smith (12) combined for 40 of Wheeler 58 points. The Mustangettes were held to just 33 percent shooting from the field (16-of-55), but they did manage to hit 26-of-32 from the line (81 percent) in the foul dominated contest.

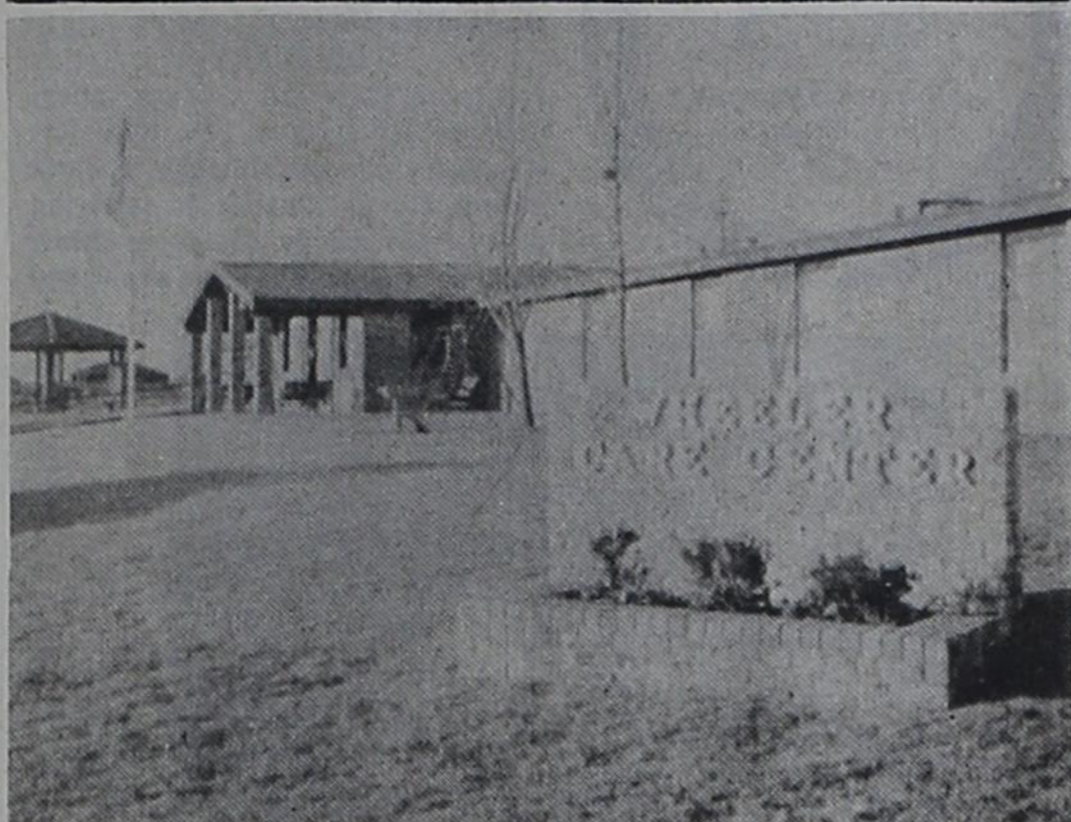

## WHEELERCARECENTER OBSERVES 5th

Wheeler Care Center will hold Open House Sunday afternoon, February 29, 1988, in honor of their Fifth Anniversary. A program will be offered at 2:00 P.M. with the Open House through 4:30 P.M. The public is invited to attend.

Wheeler Care Center opened for business and admitted the first patients on January 3, 1983. From its beginning as a fledgling nursing home with 4 patients admitted on the first day, it has now reached an average occupancy of 78 to 82 patients with 7 or 8 having private rooms, thus keeping the occupancy at near maximum.

The facility started out with about 12 employees and has grown over the five years to the point that it now employs 79 individuals with 70 of these being full time employees.

The Care Center does not actually produce revenue in the community as those who require nursing care would need the care if there were no nursing home here. What the Care Center does is keep the money working in Wheeler County, while providing a local place for our senior population, who are in need of 24 hour nursing care.

The monthly payroll averages \$40,000.00 and the home buys some of its supplies locally and pays property

taxes of nearly \$11,000.00 as well as sales taxes on the supplies purchased. The monthly expenditure for local utilities averaged \$2,500.0 per month in 1987.

Since the opening in 1983 with 62 beds licensed for nursing care and 28 licensed as personal care, the facility has admitted 240 patients of which 81 are still residents of the nursing home. It became evident that the demand for nursing care was reaching a point that 62 beds would not be enough, so in 1984 the Personal Care wing was changed to nursing care, giving WCC 90 beds licensed for intermediate nursing care.

A large portion of the residents hail from Shamrock, Wheeler and other communities in the county, but the reputation has reached out over the Panhandle and residents have come from Pampa, Borger, Canadian and other towns in the Texas Panhandle and western Oklahoma.

Wheeler Care Center has licensed nurses in charge of each shift 24 hours a day and 7 days a week, provides

### Wheeler Stabbing Victim Returns Home

Robert Wood received multiple stab wounds at his residence early Monday morning. He was taken to Parkview Hospital and later transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where he underwent surgery.

At approximately 12:15 a.m. on February 15, 1988, a man entered the sheriff's office and said he had just stabbed a man at Seventh and Sweetwater in Wheeler. Officers were dispatched and found Wood in a pool of blood.

The ambulance was dispatched. Wood had five wounds to the back and one in the abdomen. Wood, 37, was taken to Parkview Hospital for emergency treatment and transferred to Amarillo. He underwent surgery and is reported to be in stable condition.

Sheriff Lonnie Miller reported charges against Juan Perez, 25, of Wheeler are pending.

Wood has been released from Northwest Texas Hospital.
