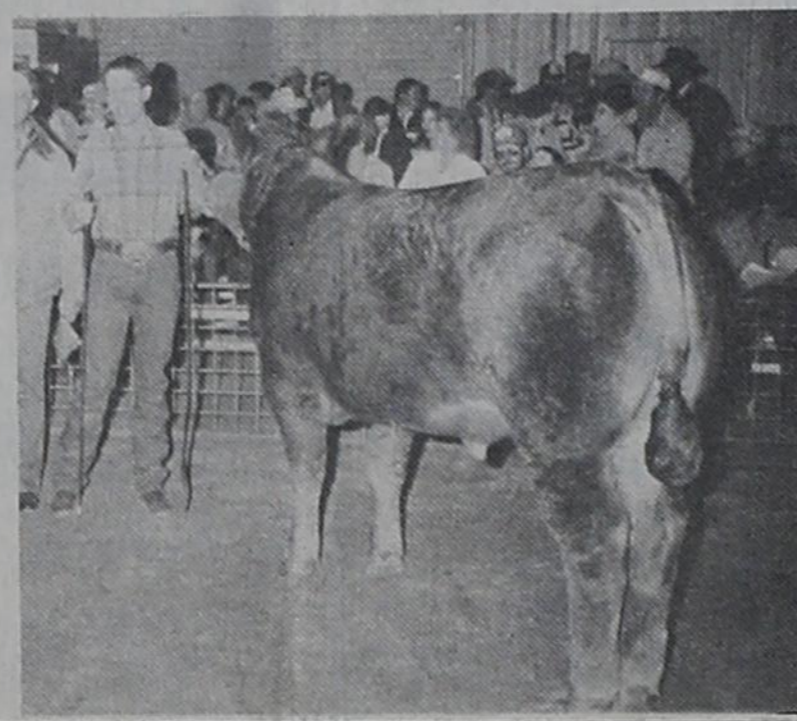

Scheduled Feb. 11**

In order to "Spread the word" regarding the disease AIDS, the Texas Department of Health, Public Health Region 2 headquartered in Lubbock is mounting an educational campaign about Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS). Regional Health officers have been presenting seminars in 34 of the 40 counties in Public Health Region 2 as well as in Ft. Worth to the Annual Convention of Texas Extension Homemakers Association.

The seminar will be presented by E.A. Isaacson, M.D., MPH, Regional Director of Public Health Region 2 and Tommy Snell, M.S.H.P., Health Program Specialist for Public Health Region 2. The seminar will be very informative and present prevention and reduction principles. A slide presentation along with a video—"AIDS - What Everyone Needs To Know" will be utilized to educate and destroy myths. The seminar lasts for about one hour and fifteen minutes.
