

JUNIOR LIVESTOCK SHOW BEGINS FRIDAY

Over 230 animals are entered in the 1988 Wheeler County Junior Livestock Show which gets underway on Friday, January 22, when the hogs and lambs are weighed in. Members of Wheeler County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters have been feeding and fitting their animals for several

months in preparation for the show. The market hog show will begin at 1:00 p.m. on Saturday. One hundred thirty-one hogs are entered. Seventy-seven lambs are entered in the market lamb show, which is scheduled for 6:00 p.m., Saturday. Fifteen steers will be weighed and measured between 2:00 and 3:00 p.m., Monday, January 25. The steer show will begin at 5:00 p.m. Monday, and will be followed by the heifer show.

The premium auction will begin at 7:00 p.m. Monday. Floyd Morris, president of the Wheeler County Livestock Show Association which is sponsoring the show, invites everyone to attend the show and auction. He said public support and recognition is very

important to the youth who have invested so much money and effort preparing for the show.

Many local individuals are giving their time to make the show a success. Van Baize and Delbert Thomas will be in charge of the beef cattle show, Don Moore and Mike Williams will serve as superintendent and assistant superintendent of the lamb show, and James Baxter and Larry Elmore will direct the hog division. Floyd Morris will be the general superintendent and Billy Buckingham will be the assistant general superintendent.

Canadian Production Credit Association is furnishing the awards for the lambs and hogs and Wheeler County Farm Bureau will supply the beef cattle awards. Wheeler County feed dealers are sponsoring trophy buckles for the grand champion steers, lamb, and hog. These sponsors include James Baxter - Mooreman Mfg. Co., Robinson Feed & Seed, C&H Supply, Shamrock Co-op Gin, Grayson Grain, Wheeler Co-op, Perryton Equity - County Line Station, and Morris Feed Service.

GRAND JURY INDICTS FOUR

Three Murder Indictments Issued

The Wheeler County Grand Jury met Friday, January 15. Three murder indictments were returned. Named on the indictments were Carolyn Willey, 41, Tammy Dye, 22 and Richard Lee Woodard, 33. The indictments were in connection with the death of Dale Duessler.

The trio is accused of killing Dale Duessler at a trailer home, eight miles east of Wheeler, transporting the body to Roger Mills County, Okla. The body was placed in a car and the auto was set afire.

On December 8, 1987, two hunters found a burned 1974 Chevrolet, containing a charred body at Skipout Lake near Cheyenne, Oklahoma. The body was identified as that of Dale Duessler of Waterloo, Wisconsin. Since the body was discovered on government land, the F.B.I. was a part of the investigation.

Richard Woodard confessed to the murder of his brother-in-law. According to Sheriff Miller, several days after the confession by Woodard, he changed his story and now points the finger to Tammy Dye, Duessler's girlfriend. Woodard is presently being held in Beckham County Jail in Sayre, Okla., where he awaits trial on a forgery charge.

The shotgun that is believed to have been used in the murder is now in the possession of the sheriff. The gun was pawned in Pampa and recovered by sheriff's department.

Wheeler County Sheriff Lonnie Miller believes the murder to have been planned several days before the actual event, making it premeditated murder. Miller believes the three,

Dye, Willey and Woodard planned the murder before the commencement of a "forgery spree" throughout the region. "All three of them planned the murder and the disposal of Duessler's body and twice tried it," Miller said. The conclusion was drawn after statements and confessions were taken from the three suspects.

Woodard was arrested on forgery charges three days after the shooting; murder charges were later filed by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department. Dye and G. J. Woodard, Richard Woodard's wife, were arrested by the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department and held as material witnesses. Mrs. Woodard was released on January 2 on \$1,000 bond.

Duessler with eight other people moved to a mobile home, parked eight miles east of Wheeler along Highway 152, in early December. The eight were Richard Woodard (suspect) and his wife, G. J.; Tammy Dye (Duessler's girlfriend), Carolyn Willey (mother of Tammy and G.J.), Wesley (Woodard's brother) and three small children.

The murder investigation continues.

Sheriff Miller also reports the returning of an indictment against Thomas Harkins of Wheeler for the trafficking of cocaine in Borger; as a result of Miller's investigation, Harkins was sentenced to 5 years in the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville. Harkins remains in Wheeler County Jail on sexual assault of a child charges. He was arraigned on Tuesday, January 17, 1988.


DICK WATERFIELD IS SEEKING RELECTION TO STATE HOUSE

State Rep. Dick Waterfield, R-Canadian, stating that his work in the Legislature is just beginning, filed this week for re-election to the House of Representatives.

"I look forward to serve the people of my district with another term of responsible representation in Austin," Waterfield said. "This means that my open door policy will continue as always, for anyone who has a question or problem. For me, the calls and letters we have received are the most rewarding thing about the office. I encourage people to continue to stay in contact."

In looking ahead to the 71st Legislature, Waterfield expects a continuation of the most debated issue of this session: taxes and state spending.

"What we saw this year on taxes was only the beginning," he said. "We have the select committee on tax equity currently meeting around the state to develop tax reform policy. This could set the stage for a major debate over present taxing structure. On the spending side, the Edgewood

suit, which if it goes against the state, would drastically change our current system of funding public education."

With this in mind, Waterfield believes the dominant theme of the past session, setting spending priorities and generating sufficient revenue, will again be a major point of debate next session. Through all of this, his legislative goals have not changed, he said.

"The priorities of the people of my district remain my priorities in the Legislature," Waterfield said. "When they want a lid placed on taxes and government spending, that's what I fight for."

Waterfield serves on the House committees on Agriculture and Human Services. He was recently appointed to chair the special committee to investigate security interest in farm products.

He was voted the top first-term Republican of the 70th Legislature and was named one of the top conservative legislators by the Young Conservatives of Texas, and the Free Market Coalition.

"I felt like fainting," said 17-year old Zepeda, a junior.

But the pair stepped up and handled the pressure long enough to make good on their field goals.


Zepeda's kick was a 19-yarder with no time on the clock in Wheeler heart-stopping 23-21 win over Bremond for the Texas Class 1A state championship.

For their clutch performances under a mountain of pressure, Zepeda and Booth have been awarded the 1987 Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame Leslie Cazzell Memorial Big Play Award. The two will be honored, along with many others, during the PSHOF ceremonies at 2 p.m. January 24, in Amarillo College's Ordway Auditorium.

On Dec. 20, Wheeler's Zepeda stood set to attempt a 19-yard field goal. The Mustangs trailed 21-20 in their state championship game against Bremond. No time was on the clock.

A Bremond offside penalty the last before had given Wheeler one play chance. Bremond's 6-3, 230-pound all-everything Bo Robinson had burst over right guard and pounced on Lee McCasland's 21-yard field-goal attempt.
