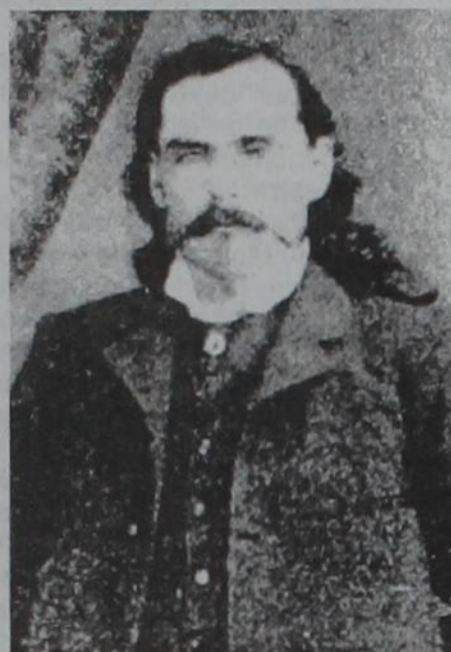
The twenty-second 4th of July celebration will be held this year under the sponsorship of the Wheeler Chamber of Commerce.

Codi Myers Earns Trip To Illinois To Compete In World's Largest Rodeo

Codi Myers, a 11th grade student at Samnorwood High School has earned a position on the Texas high school rodeo team and will be traveling with fellow teammates to Springfield, Ill., from July 22 - 28 to compete at the 59th Annual National High School Finals Rodeo (NHSFR) in the Bareback competition.

Featuring over 1,500 contestants from 40 states, five Canadian Provinces, and Australia, the National High School Finals is the world's largest rodeo. In addition to competing for over \$200,000 in prizes, NHSFR contestants will also be vying for more than \$325,000 in college scholarships and the chance to be named the National High School Rodeo National Champion. To earn this title, contestants must finish in the top twenty after two go-rounds of intense competition before advancing to Saturday night's final championship performance. The NHSFR is scheduled to air Oct. 24 & 31, 2007 on RFD-TV. Please check www.nhsa.com for possible schedule changes and other times when the 2007 NHSFR telecast will air on RFD-TV. Mobeetie Old Jail Site Of Activities

This Saturday the Old West will come to life once more on the grounds of the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum.

This year's Old Town Hoedown promises to be the best yet with reenactments of Billy Dixon and the U.S. Cavalry.

One of the men responsible for taming the panhandle frontier was army scout Billy Dixon. He played a vital part in the Battle of the Adobe Walls and the recover of the German sisters who had been held captive by the Native Americans. He was also among the six men who defeated an estimated 125 Kiowa and Comanche Indians

at the Battle of Buffalo Wallow on September 12th, 1874. This year, on Saturday, June 30, those attending the Old Mobeetie Hoedown will hear the story from reenactor Marc Ferguson who will portray frontier hero Billy Dixon.

Concerned with the late arrival of Lyman's wagon train, loaded with supplies, Col. Nelson Miles sent civilian army scout Billy Dixon, fellow scout Amos Chapman and soldiers Sergeant Z.T. Woodall, Co. I; Peter Rath, Co. A; John Harrington, Co. H.; George W. Smith, Co. M, 6th Cavalry in search of the missing party. The men road hard, traveling at night and seeking cover during the day to avoid the Indians who were on the warpath in the Texas Panhandle. Soon, however, the group found themselves surrounded by Kiowa and Comanche warriors, all on horseback. This occurred on a small rise north of Gageby Creek, near the line separating modern day Hemphill and Wheeler Coun-

Landon Sams Accepted Into SWOSU Pharmacy

Landon Craig Sams of Wheeler, Texas, has been accepted and is enrolled in his first semester in the Southwestern Oklahoma State University College of Pharmacy at Weatherford, OK.

Sams is the son of Dan and Gail Sams of Wheeler, Texas.

Nine students were admitted into the Doctor of Pharmacy program for the 2007 summer semester. The class has an average cumulative grade point average of 3.77 and is composed of five women and four men.

The SWOSU College of Pharmacy admits 84 students each year to its Doctor of Pharmacy program during the fall, spring and summer semesters.

Minimum requirements to make application for admission to the SWOSU College of Pharmacy include the completion of at least 58 semester hours of specified pre-pharmacy courses with a cumulative grade point average of at least 2.50.

The selection process is competitive and is based on a number of factors. These include, but are not limited to, science and mathematics grade average, overall grade average, American College Test (ACT) or Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) scores, Pharmacy College Admission Test (PCAT) scores, motivation, character and communication skills.

Local WTAMU Students Named On Honor Roll

West Texas A&M University has named 900 students to honors lists for the spring 2007 semester. Of that total, 330 were named to the President's List and 652 students were named to the Dean's List.

Students named to the President's List must have a grade point average (GPA) of 4.00 and carry a minimum class load of 12 undergraduate hours.

Those named to the Dean's List must have a GPA between 3.50 and 3.99 and carry a minimum of 12 undergraduate hours.

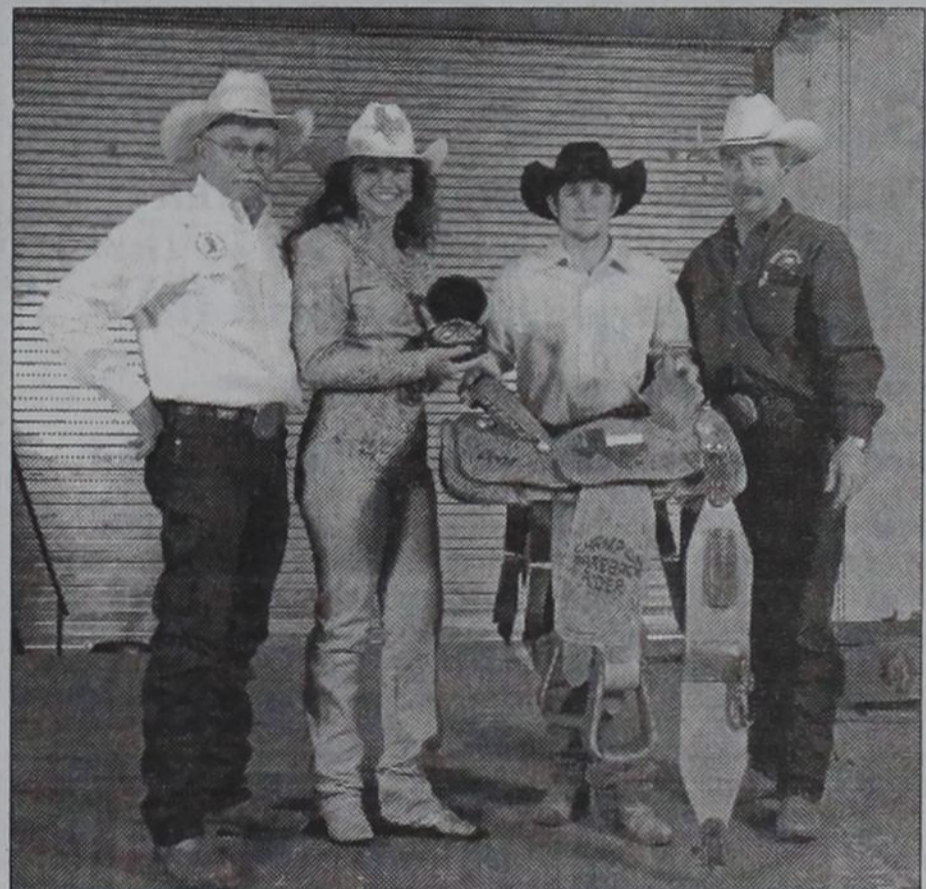

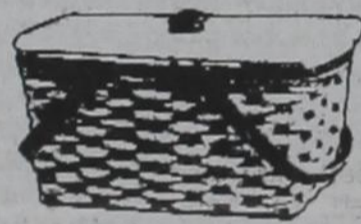

PRMC first in area to implement hospitalist program

Pampa Regional Medical Center, in keeping with a tradition of providing area residents with cutting-edge health care, has in place a hospitalist program, made up of two physicians who specialize in caring only for patients during hospital stays. "Hospitalists have been around since the late 1990s, but they have increased in popularity over the last few years to the point that there is a lot of demand for them currently," said Alan N. King, CEO Pampa Regional Medical Center. "Their usual background is in internal medicine. They do not have an office practice to maintain and their specialty is to focus on the care of hospitalized patients."

King continues, "Primary care physicians can lighten their hospital loads by electing to team up with a hospitalist. The hospitalists also take the unassigned call patients who come through the Emergency Department. Primarily, their patients are medical, but they can also assist by performing consultations or co-managing surgical patients. We are delighted to offer the first such program in the Texas Panhandle."

The hospitalist team at Pampa Regional Medical Center is currently made up of Drs. John Nguyen and James Hall. Dr. Nguyen is trained as an internist and pediatrician. Dr. Hall is an internist. Dr. Nguyen completed a Bachelor of Science in biomedical engineering at Tulane University. He attended medical school and residency at Louisiana State University, New Orleans, Louisiana.

Dr. Hall attended medical school at University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio, Texas and his internship and residency at the University of Texas Health Science Center in Houston, Texas.

During a patient's hospital stay, the hospitalist will be in regular contact with the primary care physician to share information on their hospital stay. Hospitalists can be more available to the patients since they don't have office practices. However, patients also may feel free to speak with their primary care physician at any time during their hospital stay, and once they are discharged from Pampa Regional Medical Center, they return to the care of their physician.

Dr. Robert Julian, a long-time family physician states, "The complexities and demands of care have increased both on the office and hospital side. It is becoming increasingly difficult to manage patients in both aspects of care, which explains why hospitalist physicians are in such high demand. We are pleased to partner with these physicians in an effort to provide our patients an even higher level of quality care."

Fishing isn't a dangerous sport however you should prepare to keep safe and comfortable in the outdoors. It is possible to get caught unexpectedly in bad weather, encounter insects, spend too much time in the sun, or get caught on a fishhook. Kids are adventurous, rambunctious, curious and fun loving. The result is that they naturally love the outdoors, but also have greater exposure to the dangers of the wilderness than the average adult. (Most kids don't have the patience for fishing that many seasoned adult anglers possess. (But with a little planning, preparation and patience on the adult's part, a fishing trip with kids can be safe and fun. Safety must be the number one concern an adult has for children who are learning to fish and to enjoy the outdoors. (It is important to try to foresee the potential dangers and plan for them. (

- SAFETY RULES - FISHING**
1. Fish with a buddy and carry a small first aid/survival kit for emergencies.
 2. Be cautious when you cast.
 3. Look behind you and to the side for trees, bushes, and other anglers. Make sure the hook is not caught on anything or that the line is not tangled.
 4. If only the point of the hook punctures the skin, the hook easily can be removed.
 5. If the barb of the hook is poking out through the skin, clip off the barb and you can slide the rest of the hook out.
 6. If the hook is deeply embedded, it is best to have a doctor or nurse remove it.
 7. Wear proper clothing for outside activity.
 8. Watch your step on riverbanks - tufts of grass may give way or conceal deep holes.
 9. If you are wading in-stream, step carefully - rocks covered with algae are slippery.
 10. Don't underestimate a river current.
 11. Carry a walking stick and cross where the current is slowest, angling toward the opposite bank as you walk upstream.
 12. If you fall in, float with the current - don't try to fight it! Keep your feet forward and up and try to work your way to the nearest bank.
 13. Wear a personal floatation device (life jacket) if you are in a boat or canoe.
 14. Know your boat's limitations and keep it in good repair.
 15. On the water, watch for dams, logs and rocks
 16. If you must move around in the boat, stay low and in the center. Don't stand up.
 17. If the boat capsizes, climb onto the boat and make noise to attract attention.
 18. Stay with your boat - don't attempt to swim in if the shore is some distance.
 19. Report any accidents to the instructor immediately.
 20. Return all equipment to the designated area.

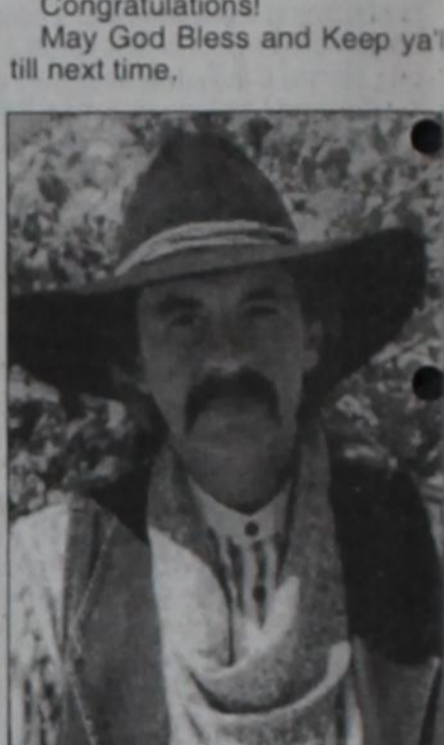

ties. A prairie fire had removed a potential shelters from the area and the horses, exhausted from the night's ride, made a mounted conflict impossible. The men finally sought shelter in a buffalo wallow (a shallow 10 foot area hollowed out by bison pawing around and rolling in the mud) to escape the summer heat. To hear the amazing story of how these men, with 25-1 odds in the Indian's favor, survived this ordeal, make your way to the Old Town Hoedown in Old Mobeetie on June 30th.

Marc Ferguson, who will portray Dixon, has won many local and national awards for his living history portrayals of Billy Dixon and Doc Holiday. He is a member of the Reenactment Guild of America, the American Frontier Guild of America, the Kansas Alliance of Professional Historic Performers and the Kansas Cowboy Society. A former head of historical interpretations at Boot Hill Museum in Dodge City, Ferguson is the curator for the Dalton Gap Museum in Meade, Kansas.

Another highlight of the afternoon will be the mounted cavalry performance. Over a dozen men from the Frontier Regiment of the High Plains will set up their tents on the museum grounds. Promoting the historical significance of the Red River War in the Panhandle region is an important part of the Regiment's goals. This is done through historical reenactments such as horseback maneuvers commemorations, and living history displays. The cavalry will be led by Colonel Jimmy Northcutt of Miami, Texas. This group, which includes a buffalo soldier, is focused on keeping the history of the Red River Wars alive, including Fort Elliott which was located just outside of Mobeetie. This promises to be an amazing event you will not want to miss.

The celebration doesn't stop there. Numerous living history exhibits, including metal smithing, gun smithing and display of guns for the late 1800's, a quilting exhibit, woodworking, a working trading post will fill the museum grounds. The little cowpoke can enjoy a real arrowhead hunt and authentic frontier games including corn cob darts, horseshoes and trundling hoop and roll. Period music will be provided by the Fort Elliott Choir and great items, including antiques, will be offered for your bidding at the silent auction.

This year's chuckwagon supper will feature fajitas, beans and all the trimmings. Two lines serving lines will be in place so visitors can move swiftly through the line. The meal is scheduled for 6 p.m. The Fort Elliott Cheerleaders will be on hand, decked out as saloon girls to serve cold drinks to the guests. This is one of the annual fundraisers for the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum and admission prices are: \$12 for adults; \$6 for 12 and under; and 4 and under free. This includes ALL the great entertainment, a fine meal and tons of old west fun. Fundraisers enable the Old Mobeetie Texas Association to preserve Wheeler County's past for current and future generations.

This event will take place on Saturday, June 30th beginning at 4 p.m. on the grounds of the Old Mobeetie Jail Museum located 10 miles west of Wheeler on Hwy. 152 or 30 miles east of Pampa on Hwy. 152.
