

Wheeler Track Teams Win District Mustangs Win Eighth District Title

The Wheeler Mustangs claimed their 8th consecutive District Track title this past Saturday at Miami. The Mustangs gathered 233 points to out-distance the second place Booker Kiowas total of 121.

The tracksters came ready to compete, despite the windy conditions.

The field events provided a nice cushion going into the running finals, with Wheeler holding a commanding 114 to 46 lead.

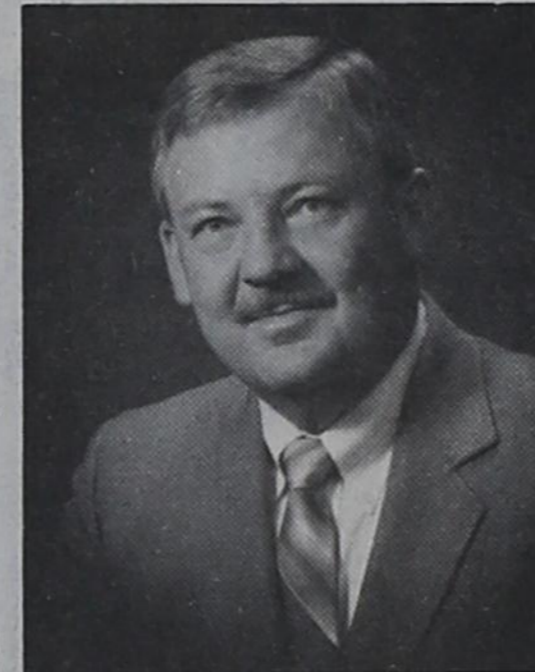

PURYEAR WINS COM., Pct. 2, RACE

Tom Puryear was elected County Commissioner, Pct. 2, in the Democratic Run-off Primary Tuesday, April 10. Puryear received 228 votes; his opponent, incumbent Bill Atherton received 210 votes.

This was the second attempt by Puryear to win the office. Four names were on the ballot in the March 13 Democratic

Primary. Puryear came in second with 107 votes; Atherton received 194. The four candidates votes totaled 461 in the primary.

Puryear's name will again appear on the ballot in November but there is not a Republican candidate for the office.

Bill Atherton has served -- terms as commissioner; he first took the oath of office in 19--.

The Mobeetie Gym will be the site for Bob Crosby's Donkey Basketball on Thursday, April 19, 1990. Two games will be played,

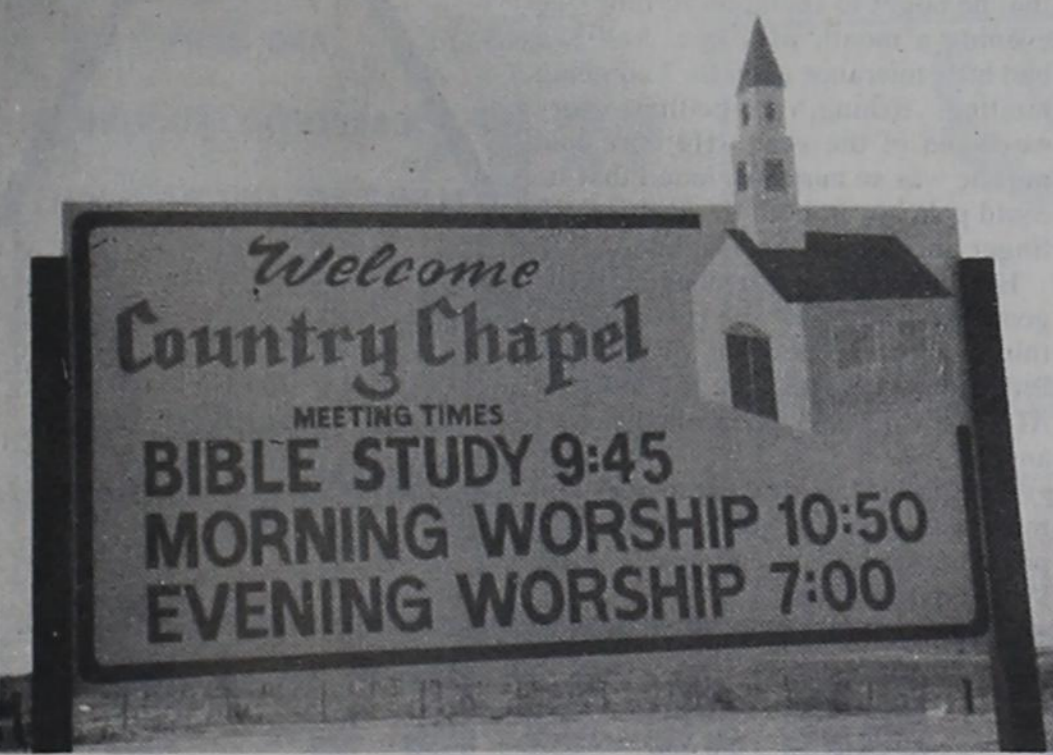

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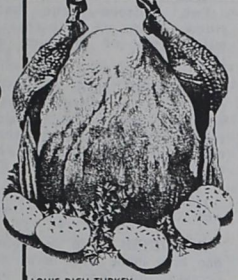

From The Minister's Desk:

In the 1970's there was a popular song that was entitled, "What The World Needs Now". It contained lyrics that said:-

"What the world needs now is love, sweet love, No-not just for some but for everyone;

Lord, we don't need another mountain,

There are mountains and hillsides enough to climb, Enough to last 'till the end of time.

What the world needs now is love, sweet love; No-not just for some, but for everyone

It's the only thing that there's just too little of."

I agree! "The world needs love, but what exactly is this love that the world needs? In my opinion the world needs the quality of love that the Greek language calls **agape**.

In the English language, there is only one word for love and this word is used to describe various feeling and emotions. But the Greek language, the language in which the new Testament was written, is a more exact language than is the English language. For example, while the English language has only one word for love, the Greek language has four words. One of these words is **agape**.

This love is defined as "an earnest and anxious desire for,

and an active and beneficent interest in, the well-being of other people." Notice that **agape** is active not passive. It is not merely a good feeling. Rather **agape** is a demonstrative love that actively seeks the well-being of other people.

In my opinion, this is the quality of love that the world needs. For example, it is the quality of love that a small boy recently needed when he wandered away from his parents and fell into a motel swimming pool. As the boy frantically cried for help, a man, who was sunbathing at the pool, watched indifferently as the small boy finally sank and drown. The young boy's parents were so upset by the man's extreme indifference that they filed a lawsuit against him. But the court reluctantly ruled that the man had no legal responsibility to save the boy.

You and I apparently have the legal right to be indifferent to the world and its needs. We are not obligated to respond. But while our indifference may not be illegal, it is not love.

The song is correct. The world does need love, but it needs real love. The world needs **agape**.

CPR Producers Scheduled To Plant Grass

CRP producers who are scheduled to plant grass this coming spring and also schedule for re-application this coming spring need to start. The seeding date for planting Lovegrass is April 1 thru June 1. The seeding date for planting Plainsbluestem is March 1 thru June 1.

There are two methods a producer may consider when killing his dead litter crop. The producer may chemically kill or mechanically kill his dead litter crop.

Mow or clip small grain when it reaches the soft dough stage. Do not allow the seed to mature. Leave as much stubble height as possible but at least 8 inches. Herbicides may be applied to kill small grain when the plants are in boot stage. Do not allow small grain to mature past the soft dough stage. The desired grass species may be planted into the small grain either prior to or after small grain is killed. If small grain is chemically killed, the herbicide must be applied before the seeded species germinates.

In the last two years we have found out that spraying your dead litter crop has been the most effective way to kill dead litter and controlling weeds. The explanation is this, you can mix a weedkiller herbicide with the herbicide that is used to kill your deadlitter. Before mixing your chemical, check with your local Soil Conservation Service and chemical dealers.

Your local Soil Conservation is looking forward to working with the community and landowners.

Tax Defferal For Elderly Homeowners

Texans aged 65 or older can postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homesteads by taking advantage of a tax option called over - 65 deferral. The elderly homeowner simply signs a deferral affidavit at their local County Appraisal District office.

This special form of tax relief can also halt a lawsuit already filed to collect delinquent property taxes of an older Texan's homestead, according to Larry M. Schoenhals, chief appraiser of the Wheeler County appraisal District. To stop a delinquent tax suit, Schoenhals said, the over - 65 homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending.

"This law means that, if the proper affidavit is on file, an older homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Schoenhals said.

Once a homeowner files an over - 65 tax deferral affidavit with the appraisal district, no taxing unit can initiate or pursue a suit for delinquent taxes as long as that person owns and lives in that homestead.

Schoenhals stressed, though, that tax deferral for the elderly only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the homestead; it does not cancel them. During the deferral period, taxes and delinquent interest continue to add up, he said. "When the elderly taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, those accrued amounts become due. Taxing units can then sue to collect all the deferred tax and interest."

While a penalty may not be imposed on the delinquent taxes during the deferral period, the filing of the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties which were already due. Also, an additional penalty associated with referring the account to a delinquent tax attorney may be charged if taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends.

Forms for filing a tax deferral affidavit are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Schoenhals said. For more information, taxpayers may contact the Wheeler County Appraisal District, Box 1200, Wheeler, 826-5900.

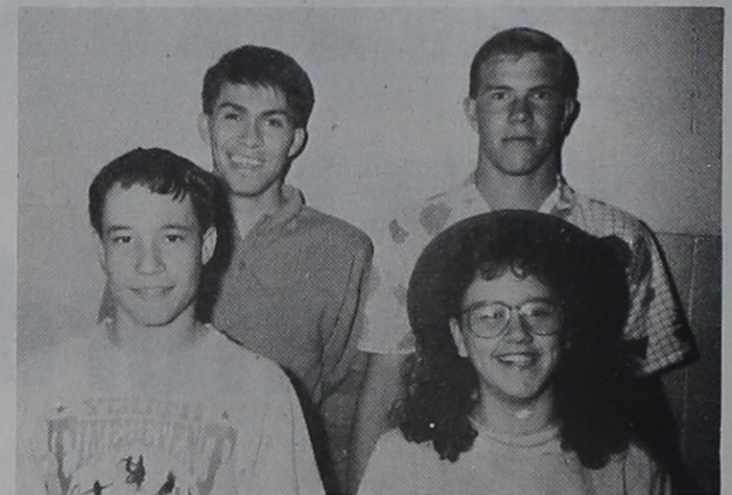
