Filing ended for places on the city councils, school boards and hospital boards last Wednesday. There are very few contested races over the area. The election will be Saturday, May 5.

CITY OF WHEELER
The city of Wheeler has three places on the council and a mayor to elect. The only opposition in this election is for mayor. Mayor Wanda Herd is seeking re-election; she is being challenged by former mayor Louis Stas.

For the council, Don Rose is seeking re-election to place 2, Bob McCain seeks another term on place 4 and Mark Frankenberg will seek place 5. Frankenberg was appointed to fill an unexpired term; this will be for a one-year term.

WHEELER I.S.D.
The Wheeler I.S.D. board of trustees will fill three places in the May 5 election; two of the

Feedlot & Ranch Horse Seminar To Be Held

Area horsemen are invited to a Feedlot and Ranch Horse Seminar Tuesday, April 10 in the Wheeler County Show Barn at Wheeler. The meeting is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Agriculture Committees in Gray and Wheeler Counties.

While the seminar is being targeted to those using horses in the feedlots and on ranches, everyone interested in horses is invited to attend.

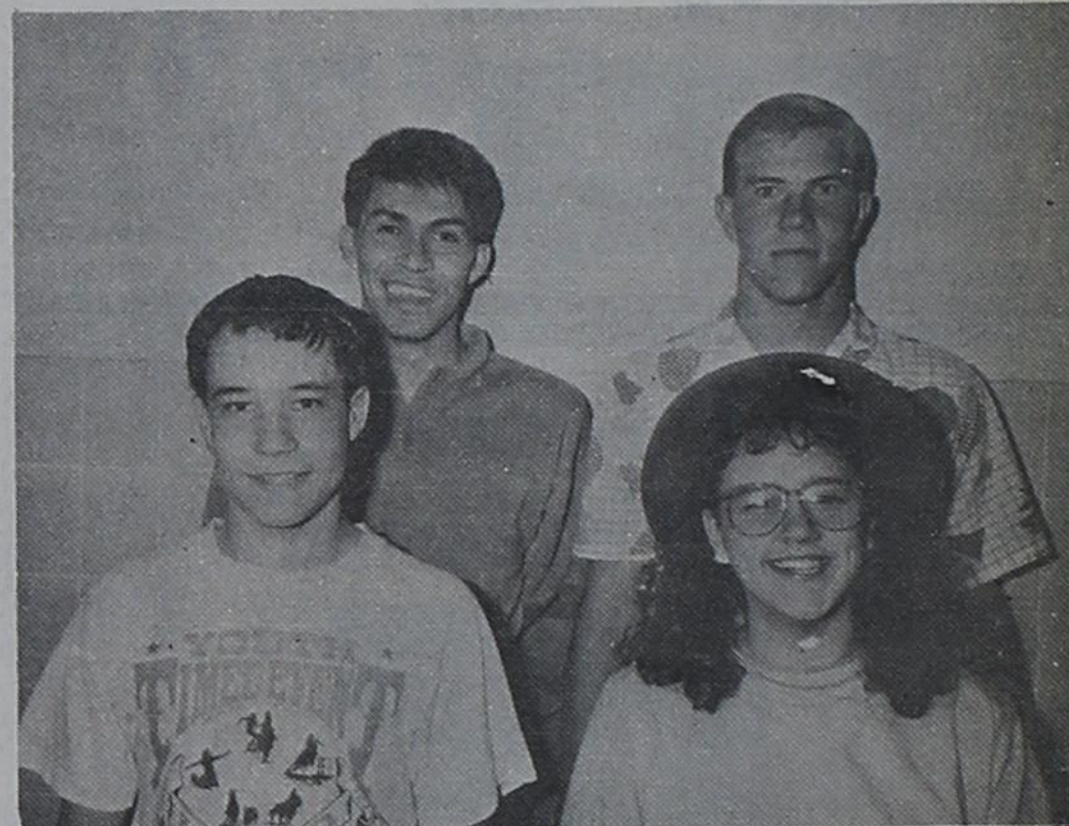
The clinic will be conducted by Dr. Doug Householder and Dr. Pete Gibbs, Extension Horse Specialists, from College Station.

Activities will begin at 2:00 p.m. with a session on feeding, health and conditioning. Beginning at 4:00 p.m., feedlot cowboys will ride with Dr. Householder and Dr. Gibbs serving as instructors. They will teach maneuvers (such as rollbacks, circles, spins, backs and lead changes), training techniques and basic horsemanship. Also, they will use on-board heart rate monitors to check the stress put on the horse by various maneuvers and to evaluate the horse's condition.

There will be a dinner break from 6:00 - 7:00 p.m. and then the riding session will continue. Tentative plans are to have a free dinner for seminar participants.

The program is planned to enable participants to (1) learn more about horse management, training and use and take more pride in their horses; (2) minimize horse lameness, sickness and downtime; and, (3) increase economic savings. Feedlot and ranch owners will profit as cattle are worked with more skill and expertise, resulting in less stress to the cattle and higher profit returns.

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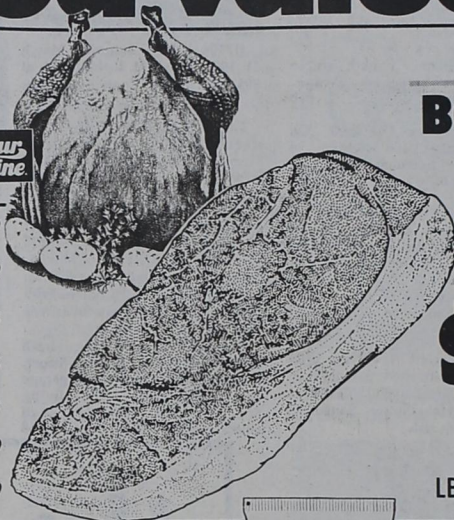

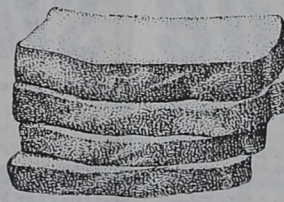

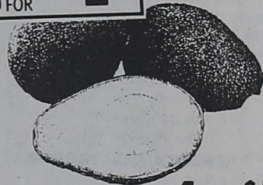

Farm Credit Bank Lowers Interest Rates

The Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) today announced a decrease in its variable interest rates for long-term agricultural, rural housing and farm-related business loans effective May 1, 1990.

The announcement was made to nearly 600 stockholders attending the annual meeting in Austin of the bank's 50 Federal Land Bank Associations (FLBAs).

"This reduction of 30 basis points in all variable agricultural loan rates will save our borrowers approximately \$6 million annually," FCBT Chief Executive Officer Donald R. Rogge said. The variable rate on agricultural loans in Texas will decrease from 10.25 percent to 9.95 percent on May 1. The rate on rural housing loans and

farm-related business loans will also be reduced from 10.50 percent to 9.95 percent on that date.

"We hope the reduction in the interest rates will help our farmers and ranchers and strengthen the agricultural economy throughout the Texas District," Rogge said.

Stockholders at the meeting were told the bank closed 13.6 percent more long-term loans in 1989 than in the previous year. New long-term loan volume increased by 24 percent over 1988.

The decision to lower the variable rates was made earlier this week by the six farmers and ranchers who serve on the board of directors of the Texas Farm Credit Bank. They include Chairman Robert Vanwinkle, Sulphur Springs; Vice Chairman Billy Chesnut, Dalhart; Don Blasingame, Tyler; Jimmy McCarthy, Rio Hondo; B.L. Smith, Paducah; and Clarence Smith, Cleveland, Miss.

The Texas Farm Credit District recorded net income of \$28.4 million in 1989. With \$3.7 billion in loans outstanding to nearly 60,000 farmers and ranchers in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, the bank is the largest agricultural lender in the four-state region.

Battlefields for the Great American Food Fight Against Cancer include homes, restaurants, supermarkets, worksites, hospitals, schools, and military installations. People can also continue the fight by giving to the American Cancer Society's annual fundraising drive, the Community Crusade.

With the entire community's help, we can make these two campaigns winners.

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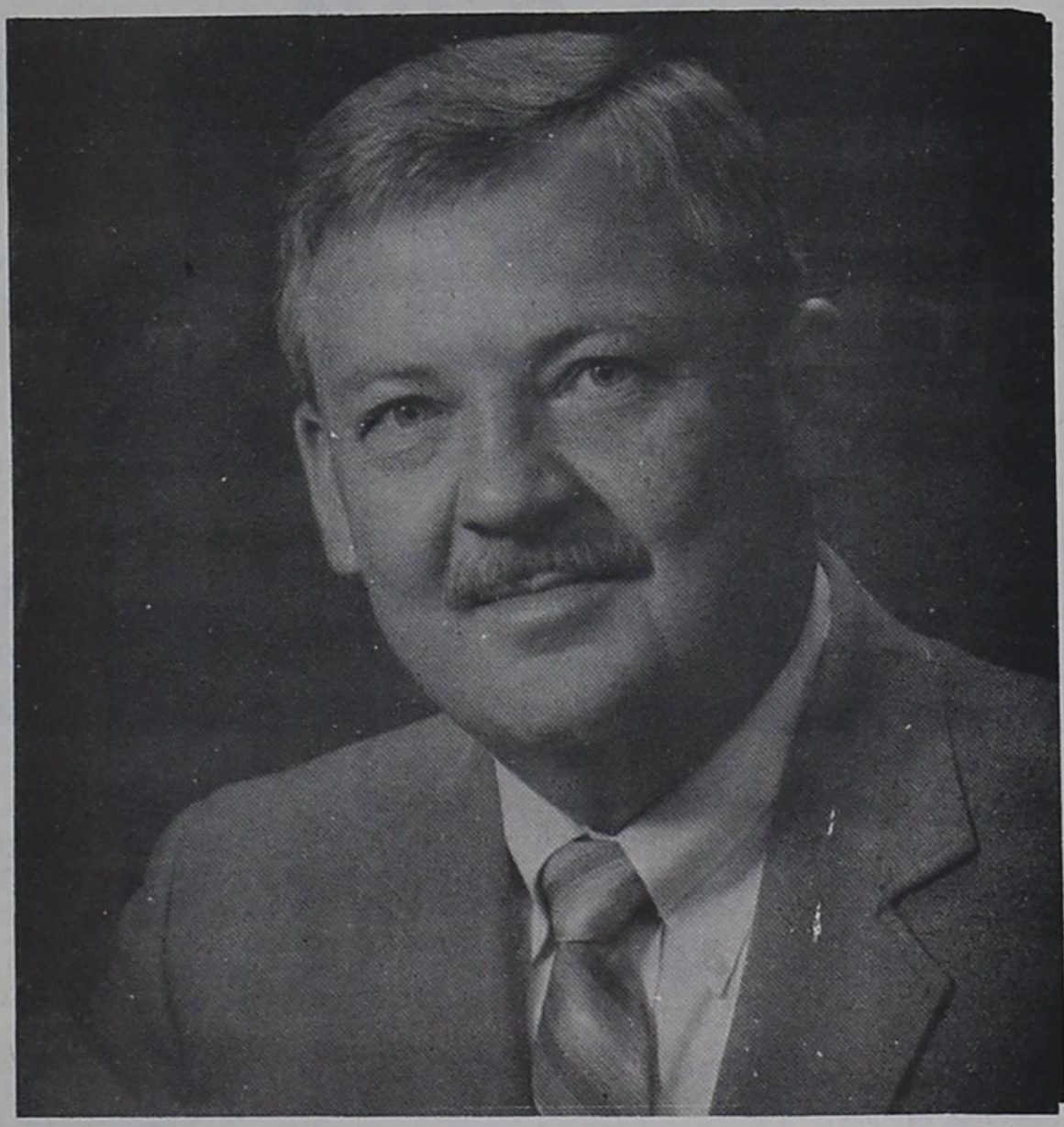

From the Minister's Desk:
There is a proverb of unknown origin that asks an interesting question. This question is "Consistency, where art thy jewelry?"
Consistency! There is no more important quality of life. But there is none that is more difficult to achieve. Perhaps the proverb should read: "Consistency, thou art a problem."
The problem of consistency is obvious in several of the important issues of life. For example, a woman was recently convicted of "pre-natal child abuse" because she was using cocaine during her pregnancy. But the same judicial system which convicted her of "pre-natal child abuse" would have allowed her to abort the child. She could not legally hurt the child, but she could legally abort the child.
In my opinion, there is no greater abuse of a child than abortion. I realize that abortion is a complex issue. And I would probably agree that there can be some justifiable reasons for an abortion. Perhaps a choice has to be made between the life of the mother and the life of the unborn child. But I also believe that abortion is a sin when it is done by women who simply want to terminate a pregnancy.
To justify this sin, some people will say: "A woman has the right to control her own body." True! But an unborn child is not the woman's body! At least this was the finding of a recent study that was done by 200 physicians for the American College of Obstetrics and Gynecology. These physicians concluded that modern science has established that the unborn is a living being and not merely fetal tissue. In the report on their study these statements are made: "When the sperm and egg unite, conception has occurred, producing a complex, living organism. From seven to nine days after conception, this organism fastens itself to the uterus and in three weeks has rapidly developed in a recognizable human form that has human functions. "It was the apparent conclusion of these physicians that the unborn is a separate and distinct human being who lives in the woman's body until birth.
I believe that this conclusion would be supported by another physician. This physician is Luke, who wrote one of the New Testament accounts about the life of Jesus. In his account Luke recorded the angelic announcement of the birth of Jesus, saying: "...There were some shepherds staying out in the fields, and keeping watch over their flocks by night. And an angel of the Lord suddenly stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them; and they were terribly frightened. And the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for behold, I bring you good news of a great joy which shall be for all the people; for today in the city of David there has been born for you a Savior, who is Christ the Lord. And this will be a sign for you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths, and lying in a manger." (Luke 2:8-12)
Notice that the last part of verse 12 says: "...You will find a baby wrapped in cloths, and lying in a manger." The Greek word for baby is **brephos** which means "a breathing, nursing infant." But Luke, the physician, also used this word to refer to a baby who had not been born. For example, when he described a meeting between Mary, the mother of Jesus, and her relative, Elizabeth, who was pregnant with John the Baptist he wrote: "...At this time Mary arose and went with haste to the hill country, to a city of Judah, and entered the house of Zacharias and greeted Elizabeth. And it came about that when Elizabeth heard Mary's greetings, the baby leaped in her womb..." (Luke 1:39-41)
In the last part of verse 41, Luke used the word baby to refer to a baby that had not been born. This physician apparently believed that the baby in the womb of Elizabeth was a living human being and not merely fetal tissue that could be frivolously aborted.
I hope that this nation's judicial system will eventually come to the same conclusion and it will consistently protect children from abuse.

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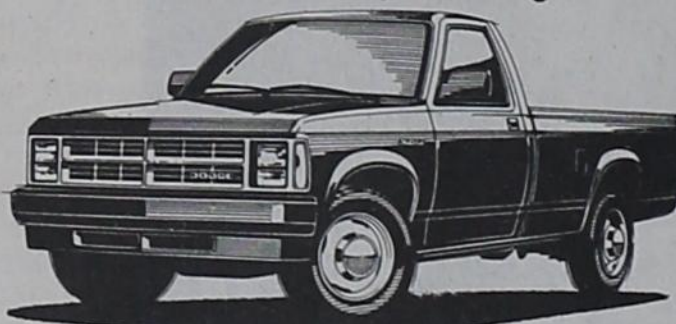
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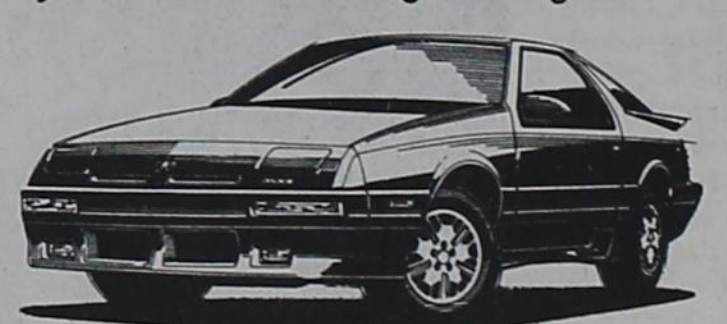

Income Tax Withholding

Starting in January 1990, employers are required to withhold income tax from their employees, regardless of the number of employees. Prior to 1990, agricultural producers with 10 or less employees did not have to withhold federal income taxes out of the employee's paychecks. All employers, including farmers, were required to withhold Social Security contributions. As a result, income taxes were not withheld from many workers' pay under the old rules. This change will require employees to complete a W-4 form, "Employee's Withholding Allowance Certificate". Next January, employees should receive a W-2 form, "Wage and Tax Statement 1990", from their employer showing the amount of income tax withheld.

The amounts withheld are paid to the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) through an authorized bank by employers on a periodic schedule. Employees will have to use the W-2

reduced paychecks starting in January 1990. As an example, a single worker receiving \$3.50 per hour in wages would be entitled to \$140 for a 40 hour weekly salary. With one exemption listed on his W-4, his employer will be required to withhold \$12 in income taxes. The employee would be entitled to receive the remaining \$128.

While this method of determining withholding amounts is typical and common, IRS allows several other methods. Concerned employees should check with their employers as to the method used to determine their income tax withholding.

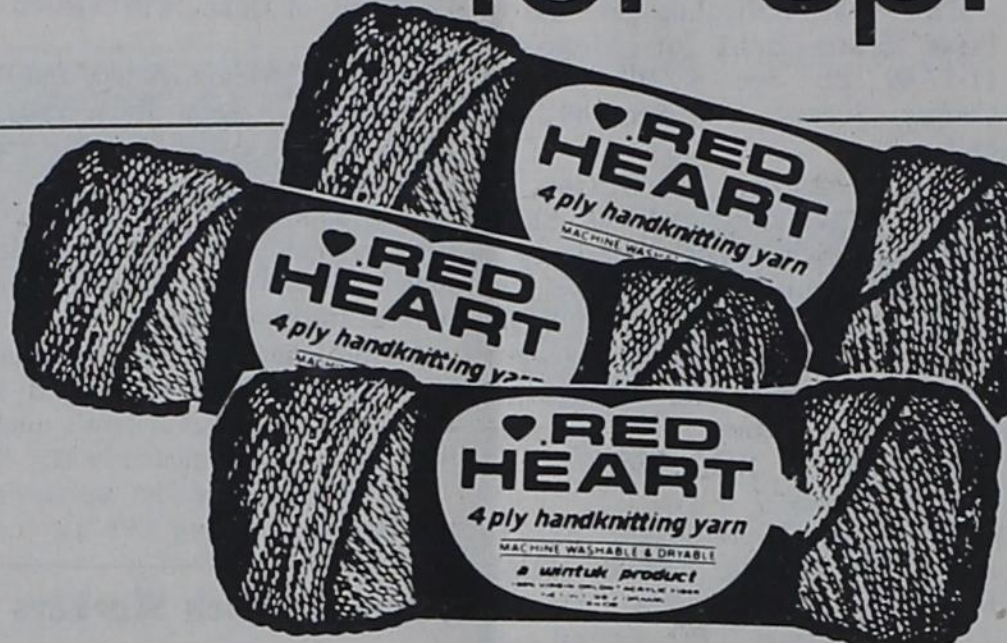

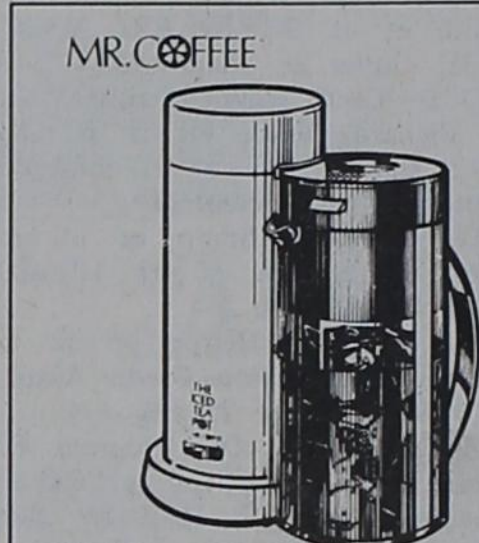

NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

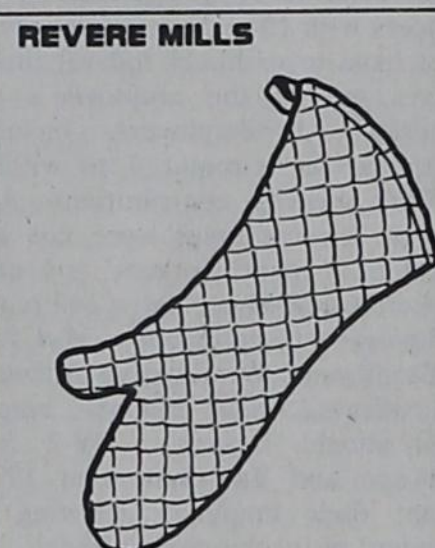
The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.
