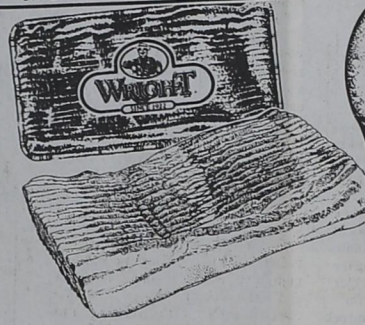

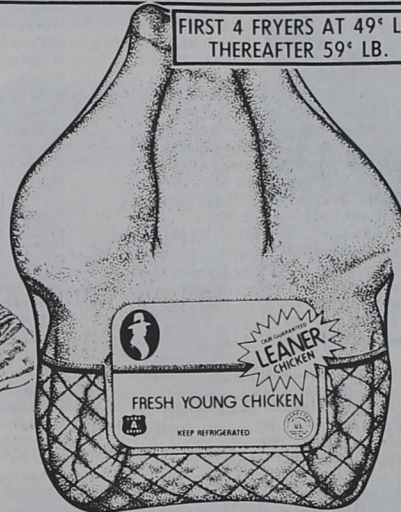

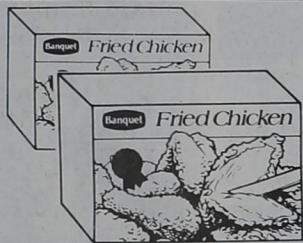

Critical Issues To Be Discussed

As many as 66 leading citizens of Wheeler County will gather April 24, 1990 to help identify critical issues facing the county over the next four years.

The purpose of the meeting, one of many being conducted in counties around the state this spring, is to assist in the development of educational programs by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service that are responsive to local needs.

"Local people usually have the best ideas on how to solve local problems," said Joe Don King, County Extension Agent. "The Extension Service wants to tap into that collective wisdom and structure its programs in ways that make them relevant and effective."

More than 10,000 people are expected to participate in this grassroots planning effort in Extension Service-sponsored county meetings throughout Texas.

In Wheeler County, the meeting is scheduled for April 24, 1990 in the Wheeler School Cafeteria at 7:00 p.m. This citizens' study group, chaired by Van Baize, Wheeler, was organized earlier in the year by the executive board of the county's Extension Program Council.

To begin the meeting, the study group will hear status reports on the economic, environmental and social conditions in the county. The group will then divide into task forces to identify the most critical issues facing the county in the broad fields of agriculture and natural resources, community development, youth, and home economics.

Afterwards, the study group will reconvene, hear task force reports, and discuss how these issues impact the county's economy, environment, and social welfare.

In 1986, the task force on agriculture identified agricultural profitability as the most important issue facing the county's producer. During the past four years, the Agriculture Committee has planned programs to help maximize agriculture income based on the information compiled by the task force.

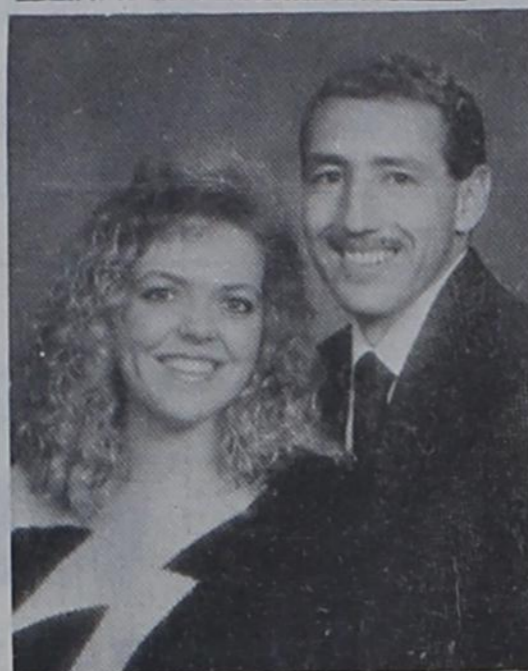
Beef cattle meetings have covered areas including cows and stocker health and nutrition, reproduction, stocker budgets, parasite control, and marketing. Other meetings have stressed pasture management, including fertility programs and grass selection. Result demonstrations have shown that forage production can be increased an average of 300% by controlling goldaster. There have also been meetings on cultural practices of wheat, cotton, and grain sorghum. More than 400 producers have been reached by educational meetings, tours, demonstrations, and newsletters.

The work of the study group is one of the first major steps in an intensive effort for determining Extension Service programs of 1991-94. Each county long-range Extension program, developed by October, will be considered in the development of the Extension Service's statewide program plan.

Property Tax Exemptions For Disabled Veterans

Veterans with a service-connected disability can receive property tax relief in 1990 by filling out a simple exemption form at the Local County Appraisal District office, Chief Appraiser Larry M. Schoenhals said.

The amount of exemption is based on the veteran's percentage of service-connected disability and can range from \$1,500 to \$3,000. Schoenhals explained who is eligible for the application:

- *a disabled veteran;
- *a surviving spouse of a deceased disabled veteran, as long as the spouse remains unmarried;
- *a surviving minor child of a deceased disabled veteran, if the veteran's spouse does not survive the veteran and if the child is both under 18 and unmarried;
- *a surviving spouse of a person killed while on active duty, whether the spouse is remarried or not at application time;
- *a surviving minor child of a person who was killed on active duty, if the child is both under 18 and unmarried.

"Any eligible person who has not received this exemption before must apply April 30, Schoenhals said.

"But, if you received the exemption in 1989, you do not need to reapply in 1990.

An applicant can claim the exemption on only one piece of property, such as a home or any other property the applicant owned on January 1. The applicant must be a Texas resident in order to qualify and must file the exemption application at the appraisal district office by April 30.

An applicant may be required to provide proof of the service-connected disability, such as documentation from the Veterans Administration or the branch of the armed services in which the veteran served. Depending on the applicant, proof of marriage, death, or age may also be required.

Greenbelt Annual Meeting Fri., April 27

The 51st annual meeting of the members of Greenbelt Electric Cooperative will be held Friday, April 27, in the Bura Handley Community Center in Wellington. The meeting will get under way at 1:30 p.m. with registration of members and guests.

The agenda for the meeting includes election of two directors, business centering on the financial standing of the Cooperative, and drawing of members' names for attendance prizes.

This year members will elect directors from Districts #1 and #4 to serve a three-year term. District #1 is composed of all of Wheeler County east of U.S. Highway 83. District #4 is composed of all of Collingsworth County south of the Salt Fork River, including Childress County.

In early April, each member will receive by mail a notice of the meeting along with the Co-Op's annual report. Everyone is encouraged to look over the report before the meeting since the financial statements in the report will be reviewed during the business session. Directors, management, and employees of GEC will be at the meeting to answer any questions that members may have concerning the Cooperative.

The annual membership meeting dates back to the very beginning of Greenbelt Electric Cooperative. The founding directors, back in 1938, felt the members should have a specific opportunity each year to learn more about their organization and to participate in a forum in which they could receive answers to any questions concerning the Cooperative. The directors felt the annual meeting was so important to the success of the Cooperative that the bylaws of the Cooperative were written to provide for such a meeting.

Greenbelt Electric Cooperative was established as a non-profit organization with its goal to bring electricity to the rural communities which were lighted by kerosene lamps and heated by wood, and places where water was pumped by hand.

Before the Cooperative was established, the existing power companies refused to serve the rural areas because they felt the expense involved in building electric lines would outweigh the return they would receive in electricity sales.

Greenbelt Electric was created when concerned rural people of the area realized that if they were ever to have electric service they would have to provide it themselves.

Today, as when it was founded, Greenbelt observes basic cooperative principles in its operation: *Each member, no matter the amount of electricity purchased, is entitled to one vote. *Nonprofit operation with affordable electric service to members is the primary objective of the Cooperative. All members are encouraged to mark their calendars today to be at this year's annual meeting April 27. Without members' involvement and concern, Greenbelt Electric cannot continue serving as it has since 1938.

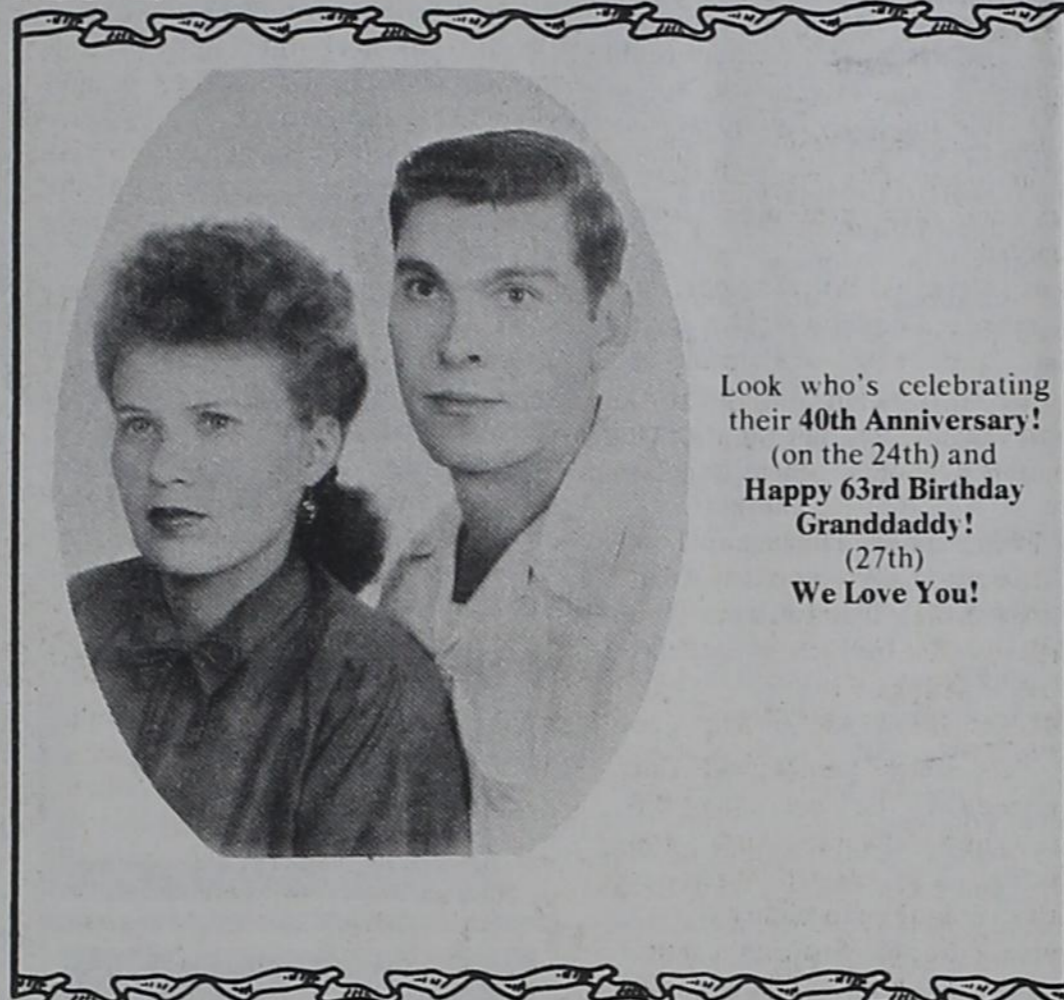

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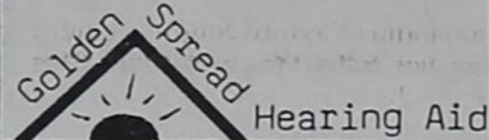

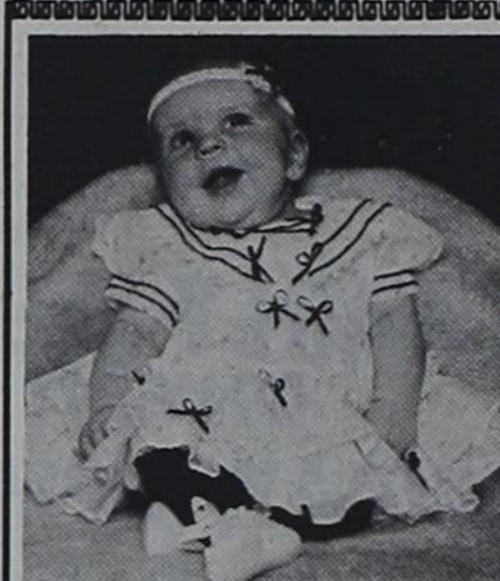
