By properly placing two horizontal lines -- above the I and at the bottom of the F --the sign then read: "Motel"

This sign reminded me of a great truth. It reminded me that human perception can be imperfect. And this imperfection can be seen in several aspects of life. For example---

We often imperfectly perceive other people. Our perception of other people is usually two dimensional. We perceive people as they are and as they could have been. We do not perceive people as they could be. And when we perceive people as they are, we judge them. When we perceive people as they could have been, we sympathetically understand them. But when we perceive people as they could be, we love them.

This is the perception that God had of us. Romans 5:8 says: "--God demonstrates His own love toward us, in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." God saw us as sinners, but He loved us, believing that by an obedient faith in His crucified Son we could be His children. The Apostle Paul wrote: "--When the fullness of time came, God sent forth His Son, born of a woman, born under the Law, in order that we might receive the adoption as sons. And because you are sons, God has sent forth the Spirit of His Son into hearts, crying Abba! Father! Therefore you are no longer a slave, but a son; and if a son, then a heir

It is not a sin to be materially prosperous, but it is a sin to achieve such prospersity at the expense of spiritual principles and physical health. The Apostle Paul clearly emphasized the real issues of life when he wrote: "--Godliness actually is a means of great gain, when accompained by contentment. For we have brought nothing into the world, so we cannot take anything out of it either. And if we have food and covering with these we shall be content. But those who want to get rich fall into temptation and a snare and many foolish and harmful desires which plunge men into ruin and destruction." (I Timothy 6:6-9)

We are extremely foolish when our perception of the real issues of life and other people is imperfect. We are like a tired and sleepy man who is taking a long and difficult trip. As he drives, he seeks a place of rest. He finally sees a sign that says, "MOIFL", but he does not perceive that the letters have been incorrectly placed. 



During the six-week period, methods for the development of mutual respect, cooperation and selfesteem of all members of the family group are offered and practiced. It's as easy as Show and Tell because of the evolving video segments and simple question-and-answer handbook. The support group of peers provides an ideal environment for discussion.

Dr. Poplin stresses that Active Parenting is not psychotherapy but rather a review of basics that every parent already knows. There is no dwelling on who did what and why, but rather a positive move-ahead promise that it's never too late to evolve change.



# When Justice Fails

#### **Dear Editor:**

(Jan. 18, 90) Oklahoman is but another example of the demoralizing effect of failed justice upon ordinary citizens. The story of a Hinton man charged by the FBI in Maryland with the kidnapping of his 5-year-old son must certainly tug the heart-strings of every parent or grandparent...not to mention the effect of this sad and youngster himself.

The story relates how the boy's 28-year-old father, after many fruitless attempts to have his day in court, concerning the boy's health and welfare, is thwarted in these attempts by a ruling from the State Supreme Court (two days before the trial) which prevented a jury trial of his complaint of neglect by the mother, and granting (without trial) to the out-ofstate mother. The Oklahoma Supreme Court justified its verdict upon a technicality, a state law which requires that a juvenile can be held in temporary state custody no more than 90 days before such a trial. Another curious circumstance was that the mother, who lives in Maryland, had been represented by a Maryland Deputy State Attorney, acting as a private attorney in custody hearings in that state. Did the Oklahoma Supreme Court consider this obvious miscarriage of justice in the determination of
