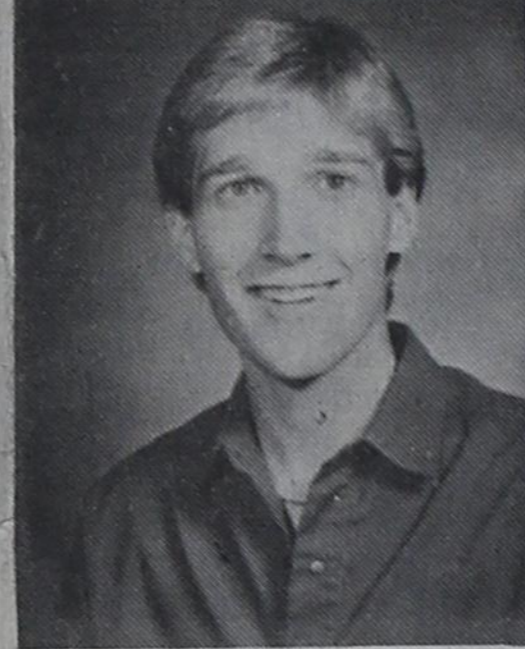

Appeals Court Says Laws Violated

[EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was taken from the Friday, Feb. 9, 1990 *Amarillo Daily News*].

A federal appeals court has upheld a 1987 ruling that the American Medical Association violated antitrust laws by trying to destroy the profession of chiropractic, attorneys in the case said Thursday.

The 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on Wednesday affirmed the finding of U.S. District Judge Susan Getzendanner, who permanently barred the nation's largest organization of physicians from boycotting chiropractors, who treat patients with physical manipulation focused on the spine.

"The experience of the AMA in this case should now put other medical associations, and hospitals dominated by them, on notice that chiropractics will fight for the rights of their patients," attorney George McAndrews, who represented the chiropractors, said in a statement.

Those rights include "fair treatment by tax-supported institutions, hospitals, insurance plans, HMOs and other groups that have burdened those patients with anticompetitive barriers," McAndrews said. HMOs are health maintenance organizations.

"The journey of the chiropractic profession to full participation in the effort to improve the nation's health, long impeded by the unlawful AMA activities, should now be resumed," he said.

The AMA has yet to decide if it will appeal, said association attorney Kirk Johnson.

"Although the AMA disagrees with the Court of Appeals' decision, the ruling should have no material impact on physicians or patients," he said in a prepared statement.

The plaintiffs alleged AMA policy had prevented doctors from referring patients to chiropractors or taking referrals from them. The doctors were accused of preventing chiropractics from treating patients at hospitals controlled by medical doctors.

Corn Valley vs. Wheeler

"The year was 1917 and we had kept our secret well. On Friday Corn Valley would play Wheeler in a game of football, our first."

"We had been forbidden by Prof. Evans, our Principal, who was also an interant Methodist preacher, to play any matched games, to match a game was a sin, forbidden also we had been to call the Professor Proff, a fact for which our hides had received a good tanning, the ones who were caught that is. Sis do you remember that game?"

"What game is that Raymond?"
"Ah, you mean you don't remember? You must have been pretty young then, I guess you wouldn't maybe, you were not in school yet. I was, I should have been, of course we didn't go until we were seven and, uh, my birthday comes in December, maybe I

wasn't there."

"Well, we had matched this game

with Wheeler, and nobody knew anything about it, we'd sworn everybody to absolute secrecy. We'd been practicing quite a lot during room and recess and before school took up in the

morning." "Why Raymond you mean you played in the game?" "Yes I did, I did play in that one game. I was a big ole boy for my seventeen years, you remember, the kids used to call me "Fats?" "Hm, yes I was big boned too and my toes stuck out, but I could run, I could run pretty fast for my size. Polly come'er. Do you remember a football game that Corn Valley played with Wheeler when we were kids?"

Polly, nickname, was our brother, fifth down the line, who was visiting from California. Raymond from New Jersey, all at my house because Mama was sick. Polly's eyes blinked for moments as he sat over his steaming cup of coffee, thinking.

"Why yes, I remember that game, I was too little to play, but I was there; I

watched that game. I can tell you who your coach was too, Claude Bachelier, a man named Claude Bachelier. I think his home was in Shamrock, or had been, and he'd gone to school at Wheeler. He lived with the Kelley's out there on Sweetwater Creek, and you know, for some reason I think he had gotten mad at Wheeler and he came out there and went to school with us at Corn Valley, and he taught us how to play football."

"Yes, you're right and that youngest boy of the Kelley's, Clayton Kelley, went to school at Corn Valley after that, and I think he played in that game too."

"Well, we'd matched this game see, and we'd kept it a secret, to play after school on Friday -- after school

let out -- in Dr. Redding's pasture." Ole Doc Redding, hmm. "Yes and we played too, just inside the fence that was beyond the boy's Privy. You know the school house was in one corner of his pasture. He must have donated the land for that school. Well, anyway, Friday finally came and as we went out into the schoolyard, here came Wheeler in their Model T's, with the top down, three carloads of em. Well, they got out and they had on uniforms, and they had a football which they began to throw back and forth to each other. Our ball has been an old football cover stuffed with rags. We didn't even know how to kick the ball much less throw it, and for sure we didn't have any uniforms. We all had on overalls, you know the kind with the bib in front, and a rainbow color of shirts, mostly made by our mothers."

"Now about this time Prof. Evans has caught on and he comes out and he says, Now Boys, he says to us, you can't play this game, you know that I have forbidden any matched games with other schools. But on listening to our side of it, that we have matched the game for after school hours, and that we were going to play in Redding's pasture and not on the school grounds, the Professor had to give in. We look up and towards the field that we have so carefully marked off the night before with lime and what to do we see?"

"The pasture is absolutely lined around with people, everybody in the community and half of Wheeler is there. Vehicles of every sort; wagons and horses and family hacks, and so many buggies they formed a huge mushroom all were there standing on the sideline to cheer us on. And Papa was there, and Henry Gordon and Mr. Crane and the Meeks and J.C. Moore and Mr. Ashley and Mrs. Red-all were there."

"Tell us about the game, Raymond, who all played in it?"

"I believe I can remember, there were six men on each side. Our line up was Pierman Martin, Shelby Pettit, Archie Gordon, Oren Horn, Ray Meek and me, Raymond Myers. I think we also had Clayton Kelley, Bert Meeks and Olney Turlington to fall back on. Now on the Wheeler side I know there was Sot Wofford and maybe Bronsen Green and Fred Farmer, but I can't exactly remember the names of the other players. They knew more about the games than we did. Our coach had taught each one of us just one position and that's about all we knew about playing football."

"Well, one man from each side walked out to the center of the field, and since nobody had a coin, we odd manned it out to see who would get first down. Wheeler won and we had to kick to them."

"Well it seemed like we played for hours before we ever got the ball, and after we did get it, we were so scared we didn't know what to do, so it wasn't too long before we had to give it back to Wheeler. The game was going along pretty good and neither team had scored against the other. Back and forth we went across the golden pasture, kicking in the faces of our opponents to make them fall. Only dimly did we hear the cacophonous roar of the spectators as they swayed from side to side in an awkward stance, trying to see our every move. Both teams had nearly a miss many times but no touchdowns. Once Sot Wofford got the ball and knocked over both Orin Horn and Shelby Pettit, and was making for our goal line. It looked like the mendacious fool was going to make it when all of a sudden I saw a path as clear as the Milky Way. I ran and tackled just in time. He picked himself up off the ground and wiped the slime and sweat from his eyes and we started over."

"After a few minutes we called time out and the coach moved me from center to the backfield because of my size. He told me to get that ball and run like crazy. Well, I got the ball and I was scared to death. I was really running down the sideline when I tripped over an old dried cow chip and fell, and I lost the ball and Wheeler got it back. The people on the sidelines were disappointed that I lost the ball but they were not nearly as disappointed as I was because that cow chip wasn't as dried as I thought it was."

"It was getting very near the end of the game: Wheeler had the ball and threw a pass, how those awkward kids could throw. It sailed through the air and came down right into the hands of Ray Meeks who started down the sidelines with all his long legged might, with all Wheeler and Corn Valley after him. Bronson Green caught his overall strap and broke it loose. When he went over the goal line, he was holding his pants up with one hand and the gall in the other. It was a jewel, a pure Opal."

"After the shouting had died down and we all shook hands, Wheeler asked us to return the favor the following Friday on their field."

Jody Powledge Wins \$800 Calf Certificate

When the flag dropped at the Feb. 24, 1990 matinee performance of the 1990 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the scramble was on, as 4-H students and 14 unruly calves covered the 2.75 acre AstroDome arena with excitement.

Jody Powledge from Briscoe, TX. won an \$800 calf certificate by catching, haltering and maneuvering one of the elusive calves into a winner's circle. The certificate, sponsored by Betty Koesner and children will enable the youngster to purchase a registered beef or dairy heifer.

During the next year, Jody will raise the calf under the supervision of his county extension agent or agriculture science teacher. He will send monthly progress reports to the calf certificate sponsor and to the Show. Also required are accurate monetary records, a journal including photographs and a 500-word essay covering the year's experiences.

The culmination of the year-long project will be when Jody returns to Houston to show the heifer at a special competition during the 1991 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

"Those students fortunate enough to receive one of these certificates should seize the opportunity and make the most of it," said John Smallwood, chairman of the all-volunteer Calf Scramble Committee. "Maximum effort is required -- effort that just starts in the Rodeo arena," he added.

The calf scramble awards 302 calf certificates each year. Since the first scramble was held in 1942, more than 11,000 calves have been purchased at a price of more than \$2 million.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, which runs through March 4, is the largest of its kind in the world. The Show includes a rodeo, top-notch entertainment, the world's largest livestock show and a world-famous horse show.

Net proceeds from the Show fund scholarships for more than 1,000 students in Texas colleges and universities. Money also is provided for agricultural research projects at the college level.

Chunky Mexican Beef Soup

| 2 lbs. chuck pot roast, trimmed of fat and cut into 1" chunks | - salt, to taste |
| 2 large onions, cut in 8 pieces each | 1/2 tsp. pepper |
| 1 tsp. garlic powder | 1 bunch cilantro, washed well and coarsely chopped (2 cups, loosely packed), divide in half |
| 2 tsp. ground cumin | 3 carrots, peeled and cut in 1" chunks |
| 2 tsp. olive oil | 9 red potatoes, scrubbed and halved |
| 4 cups good, strong beef stock, preferably homemade* | 4 ears corn, cut in fourths |
| 4 cups water | 2 medium zucchini, cut in 1" pieces |
| 4 large garlic cloves, minced | - flour tortillas |

Brown meat with onions, garlic powder and cumin, in oil. Add stock, water, garlic, salt, pepper and half the chopped cilantro. Bring to a boil, cover pot, reduce heat and simmer 30 minutes. Add carrots, corn and potatoes; continue simmering until tender, about 15-20 minutes. Add zucchini and return to a boil; simmer 5-10 minutes. Zucchini should remain crisp-tender. Add remaining chopped cilantro just before removing from heat. Ladle soup into large, shallow bowls, garnish with cilantro sprigs and serve with flour tortillas.

Notes: To further reduce fat, prepare soup up to the point of adding zucchini, corn and cilantro and refrigerate overnight; remove any fat that rises to the surface. Bring soup to boil and proceed with recipe.

May also be prepared in an electric slow cooker. Combine ingredients and cook on high about 6 hours (or 8-10 hours on low).

*If using canned beef stock, increase stock to 6 cups and decrease water to 2 cups; less salt will be needed.
