The Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department was called out for storm watch Tuesday evening at 6:04; they were again paged at 6:30. The first warning to take shelter was sounded at 7:15. The volunteers were again needed to watch the clouds at 11:35 A.M. and the siren was sounded at 12:00.

Thursday Review Club and others will make their drive Thursday, April 26th, weather permitting.

A cloud at McLean late in the afternoon Tuesday caused concern for Wheeler. Mobeetie, Briscoe and later Allison and Kelton were alerted. As the clouds approached Wheeler the direction of movement continuously changed and low hanging clouds were of enough concern to sound the alarm in Wheeler. Briscoe was then advised to take shelter. The amount of rain and hail varied greatly, as did the size of the hail received. The cloud passed over Wheeler with the northwest corner apparently receiving the worst part of the storm.

After the cloud passed around 8:00 P.M. Wheeler was under a false sense of security. Activity returned to normal.

A cause for concern again arose as the south half of the county was reported to be under a storm watch. A funnel was spotted on the ground at Turkey; followed by the report of the truck stop at Pagan road being hit. The sirens were sounded for

Shamrock to take shelter and Wheeler firemen were called out again at 11:35 A.M. The sirens were sounded in Wheeler almost instantly with Kelton, Mobeetie and Briscoe again being advised to take shelter.

The electrical power failed in Wheeler at 1:00 A.M.; service was returned in Wheeler around 2:00 A.M.

The immediate danger passed as funnels reportedly danced all over the area for a period of about 2 1/2 hours. The volunteer firemen were sent home about 3:00 A.M. The county remained under a tornado watch through the night and into the morning—10:00 A.M.

A grass fire was reported at Sweetwater as the clouds passed over that area. Sweetwater requested help from Allison at 12:53. Additional help was requested at 1:02 A.M. The local firemen went to the aid of their neighbors, leaving a skeleton crew to watch the clouds. Shamrock Fire Department sent a truck over to help with the watch while the fire was being extinguished.

At 3:00 A.M. the immediate danger passed and the volunteer firemen were allowed to return home for a much deserved rest. The county remained under a tornado watch until 10:00 A.M.

Sheriff Adams was out storm

watching Wednesday morning when the funnel touched down at T&M Truck Stop west of Shamrock. His first indication something was wrong was when debris started blowing past. He was apparently under the cloud. The rear window and two side windows on the passenger side were sucked and/or knocked out. The interior of the car is filled with bits of glass and grass. The headliner has a hole punched in it. Damage to the center post on the right side of the car indicates something struck it with great force. Jimmy has a story to tell. He commented this was the first time he had gone 100 miles per hour without his foot on the gas pedal; he felt at any time the car was going to roll. Jimmy had managed to find a straw hat that fit last Thursday and made the purchase; the new hat was on the back shelf and went out the window.

A vacant house belonging to Jim Martin had the roof taken off and contents scattered over the area. The house is located at the curve west of Wheeler on the Magic City road. A barn was also destroyed in the area and high lines were down.

At 7:54 A.M. the Briscoe Fire Department was called out with the sighting of a funnel 3 miles west of Briscoe. The Allison Fire Department was called out about 10 minutes later with the report of a cloud west of Gageby store.

brothers can count on the return of the seasons. My words are like the stars - they do not set.

How can you buy or sell the sky - the warmth of the land? The idea is strange to us. Yet we do not own the freshness of the air or the sparkle of the water. How can you buy them from us? We will decide in our time. Every part of this earth is sacred to my people. Every shining pine needle, every sandy shore, every mist in the dark woods, every clearing and humming insect is holy in the memory and experience of my people.

We know that the white man does not understand our ways. One portion of the land is the same to him as the next, for he is a stranger who comes in the night and takes from the land whatever he needs. The earth is not his brother, but his enemy, and when he has conquered it, he moves on. He leaves his father's graves behind and he does not care. He kidnaps the earth from his children. He does not care. His father's graves and his children's birthright are forgotten. His appetite will devour the earth and leave behind only a desert. The sight of your cities pains the eyes of the redman. But perhaps it is because the redman is a savage and does not understand...

There is no quiet place in the white man's cities. No place to hear the leaves of spring or the rustle of insect's wings. But perhaps because I am a savage and do not understand the clatter only seems to insult the ears. And what is there to life if a man cannot hear the lovely cry of a whippoorwill or the arguments of the frogs around a pond at night? The Indian prefers the soft sound of the wind darting over the face of the pond, and the smell of the wind itself cleansed by a mid-day rain, or scented with a pinon pine. The air is precious to the redman. For all things share the same breath - the beasts, the trees, the man. The white man does not seem to notice the air he breathes. Like a man dying for many days, he is numb to the stench.

If I decide to accept, I will make one condition. The white man must treat the beasts of this land as his brothers. I am a savage and I do not understand any other way. I have seen a thousand rotting buffalos on the prairies, left by the white man who shot them from a passing train. I am a savage and I do not understand how the smoking iron horse can be more important than the buffalo that we kill only to saty alive. What is man without the beasts? If all the beasts were gone, men would die from great loneliness of spirit, for whatever happens to the beast also, happens to man. All things are connected. Whatever befalls the earth befalls the sons of the earth.

Our children have seen their fathers humbled in defeat. Our warriors have felt shame. And after defeat, they turn their days in idleness and contaminate their bodies with sweet food and strong drink. It matters little where we pass the rest of our days - they are not many. A few more hours, a few more winters, and none of the children of the great tribes that once lived on this earth, or that roamed in small bands in the woods, will be left to mourn the graves of a people once as powerful and hopeful as yours.

One thing we know which the white man may one day discover. Our God is the same God. You may think now that you own him as you wish to own our land. But you cannot. He is the God of man. And his compassion is equal for the redman and the white. This earth is precious to him. And to harm the earth is to heap contempt on its creator. The whites, too, shall pass - perhaps sooner than other tribes. Continue to contaminate your bed, and you will one night suffocate in your own waste. When the buffalo are all slaughtered, the wild horses all tamed, the secret corners of the forest heavy with the scent of many men, and the view of the ripe hills blotted by talking wires, where is the thicket? Gone. Where is the eagle? Gone. And what is it to say goodbye to the swift and the hunt, the end of living and the beginning of survival.

We might understand if we knew what it was that the white man dreams, what hopes he describes to his children on long winter nights, what visions he burns into their minds, so that they will wish for tomorrow. But we are savages. The white man's dreams are hidden from us. And because they are hidden, we will go our own way. If we agree, it will be to secure your reservation you have promised. There perhaps we may live out our brief days as we wish.

When the last redman have vanished from the earth, and the memory is only the shadow of a cloud moving across the prairie, these shores and forest will still hold the spirits of my people, for they love this earth as the newborn loves its mother's heartbeat. If we sell you our land, love it as we've loved it. Care for it, as we've cared for it. Hold in your mind the memory of the land, as it is when you take it and with all your strength, with all your might, and with all your heart - preserve it for your children, and love it as God loves us all. One thing we know - our God is the same God. This earth is precious to him. Even the white man cannot be exempt from the common destiny.

From The Minister's Desk:

In 1909 an artist, John T. McCutcheon, drew a picture to celebrate the one-hundredth anniversary of the birth of Abraham Lincoln. The picture showed a Kentucky landscape that was covered with snow. And standing in the snow were two frontiersmen who were discussing current events.

One of these frontiersmen asked: "Has anything new happened?" The other frontiersmen replied: "Nothing much. Oh, I hear there's a new baby over at Tom Lincoln's. Nothing important ever happens around here." With this picture, Mr. McCutcheon emphasized one of history's greatest truths. This truth is that one person has often had a powerful influence upon the world. History is filled with illustrations of such people. For example, when the English language reached its zenith in the sixteenth century it was the result of the gifted pen of one person, William Shakespeare. The link between bacteria and infectious disease was discovered by a crippled French chemist, Louis Pasteur. The theory of relativity was born in the brilliant brain of a German scientist, Albert Einstein. And when God decided to reveal Himself to

the world, he sent a person, Jesus Christ.

As these illustrations clearly show, it is impossible to overestimate the influence of one person. Yet it would seem that the twentieth century has forgotten about this influence. For the last several years, it has been popular to talk about a revival of decency, purity, and morality in this nation. But who will lead this revival? Too many of us excuse ourselves by saying: "I can't do anything about it. I'm just one. My influence is insignificant."

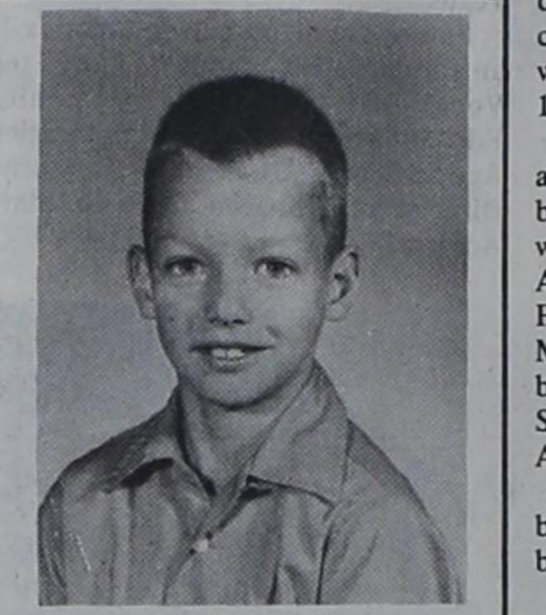
If there is one person that should not have this attitude, it is a disciple of Jesus. The description that Jesus gave of His disciple is: "You are the light of the world..." (Matthew 5:14) Notice that Jesus used a verb of the simple present tense in this description. He said: "You are..." He did not say: "You should be the light of the world."

A disciple of Jesus is a person that gives light to a darkened world. The attitude of a disciple of Jesus is: "I can do something. I'm just one. My influence is significant."
