



Filing Deadlines for School & City Offices

On Saturday, May 5, 1990, voters go to the polls to elect city aldermen, school board members and hospital directors in north Wheeler county. Filing for these offices is presently underway. The deadline for filing for a place on the ballot in the school and city elections is Wednesday, March 21.

CITY OF WHEELER
The mayor and three councilmen are to be elected in Wheeler. Mayor Wanda Herd will be completing her second term in office. The terms of councilmen Bob McCain, Don Rose and Mark Frankenberg also expire. Frankenberg was appointed to the council to fill a vacancy.

WHEELER SCHOOL BOARD
Places to be filled on the ISD Board of Trustees are presently held by Jim Wright, Place 1; Betty Hennard, Place 2, and Bill Morrison, Place 3.

Of the three places open on the Wheeler school board, only

Bill Morrison, Place 3, has filed for re-election. Janet Stevens has placed asked for her name to be placed in Place 2 and Place 1 remains open.

PARKVIEW HOSPITAL
Two places on the board of directors are to be filled for North Wheeler County Hospital District. The terms of Wheeler's and Kelton's representatives expire this year and are to be filled by the voters in the May 5 election. Daryl Snelgrooves and David Britt presently hold the offices respectively. Each will be seeking re-election to the office.

ALLISON
The Allison I.S.D. will hold an election May 5, 1989 for the purpose of electing two school Board Trustees for two full three year terms.

Terry Grayson's term has expired, also Keith Boydston's position is vacant due to his resignation January 11th, 1990, his term has also expired at this time.

The election will be held at the Allison School Agricultural Building and the polls will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Applications for voting absentee by mail may be received beginning April 5th and ending on April 30th. Absentee voting by Personal appearance begins April 5th and ends April 30th. The Absentee Election Clerk is Pam Trimble. Absentee voting is held in the Superintendents office. Office hours are 8:10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. also from 4:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.

BRISCOE
The Briscoe Independent School District will hold an election May 5, 1990 for the purpose of electing 4 trustees for the Board of Education. Two of the Trustee positions will be for full three year terms. Two of the Trustee positions will be for an un-expired one year term. Board members whose terms expire are David Zybach and Richard Meadows. The one year un-expired terms are to replace Leonard Powledge, Jr. and Lou Trimble who resigned. Candidates may file for the election up to 4:00 p.m. on March 21, 1990 at the School Administration Office. Absentee voting in person will begin on the 16th day of April, 1990 and continue through the 1st of May 1990, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on each day which is not a Saturday, Sunday or an Official State Holiday. Absentee voting in person will be conducted at the Briscoe School Administration Office. Applications to vote absentee by mail may be mailed to Gay L. Purcell, Box 138, Briscoe, Texas 79011. The polling place at the Briscoe High School on the day of the election will be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

KELTON
Kelton has two places on the Board of Trustees to be filled; they are presently held by Jerry Ray and Bob Buckingham. Kelton's representative on the board of directors at Parkview Hospital is to be elected in the May 5 election. David Britt presently holds the office and has filed for re-election.

MOBEETIE
Voters in Mobeetie have three seats on the school board to fill. The terms of Wade Hathaway and Greg Estes expire, along with the unexpired term of Robert Hogan, Jr.

Voters in the City of Mobeetie will elect three councilmen. Presently serving are Jimmy Selby, Lene Ruth James and Roy L. Stribling.

Forms for filing for the offices may be obtained at the business offices of each of the above schools and city during regular business hours. Filing forms for hospital board may be obtained at the business office of Parkview Hospital.

City-Wide Garage Sale Sat., May 5



Church of Nazarene To Re-Open In Wheeler



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NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

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

Franklin D. Roosevelt, the thirty-second President of the United States, was the son of a prominent family who lived in Hyde Park, New York. He attended the finest schools in New York and became a highly sophisticated man. After a fine political career, he was elected president of the United States in March of 1933. He served as President until his death in April of 1945. He was the first man to ever be elected to more than two Presidential terms. During the news briefing in one of his four terms as President, his aide was asked by a newspaper reporter what the name of the President's favorite song was. The irritated and harassed aide thoughtlessly replied: "Home on the Range, I think." But "Home on the Range" was not the favorite song of the sophisticated President. Yet it was reported by newspaper reporters throughout the nation that it was.

And as a result when President Roosevelt would make a public appearance during his Presidency, the orchestra would often play his "favorite song", "Home on the Range". President Roosevelt would enthusiastically thump his cane on the floor and laughed, enjoying a conception that was falsely believed about him.

This little historical story can be used to illustrate an obligation that disciples of Jesus have. Since Jesus said: "You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free...", His disciples seek to

learn and to practice truth. For this reason, it is imperative that they are able to distinguish between the truth that Jesus taught and the traditions that men have taught.

To make this distinction, it is necessary that the disciples of Jesus expositively study the Bible not impositionally. When they expositively study, the disciples of Jesus strive to learn what the Bible truly says. They do not study to reaffirm their preconceived belief and prejudices. They study to learn truth.

In such a study there are two guidelines that disciples of Jesus should follow. These two guidelines are—

1. Several good translations of the Bible should be studied before a commentary is studied. A commentary is a good and useful resource in Bible study, but is should always be a secondary resource. When a commentary is the primary resource in Bible study, preconceived ideas can be easily developed which will distort truth.

2. The Bible should be contextually studied. When it is not contextually studied, Biblical texts will become pretexts, teaching almost anything imaginable. Like newspaper reporters, disciples of Jesus should seek to learn truth. Then they can "contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered to the saints", rejecting the traditions that are taught by men.




roses! Guests were registered by Tammy Parker, cousin of the bride of Amarillo, TX.

Dusty Walker Wins Calf Scramble

When the flag dropped at the March 3, evening performance of the 1990 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the scramble was on, as 28 FFA students and 14 unruly calves covered the 2.75 acre Astrodome arena with excitement.

Dusty Don Walker from Briscoe, Texas, won an \$800 calf certificate by catching, haltering and maneuvering one of the elusive calves into the winner's circle. The certificate, sponsored by R.C. "Robbie" Robertson, will enable the youngster to purchase a registered beef or dairy heifer.

During the next year, Dusty will raise the calf under the supervision of his county extension agent or agriculture science teacher. He will send monthly progress reports to the calf certificate sponsor and to the Show. Also required are accurate monetary records, a journal including photographs and a 500-word essay covering the year's experiences.

The culmination of the year-long project will be when Dusty returns to Houston to show the heifer at a special competition during the 1991 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

"Those students fortunate enough to receive one of these certificates should seize the opportunity and make the most of it," said John Smallwood, chairman of the all-volunteer Calf Scramble Committee. "Maximum effort is required -- effort that just starts in the Rodeo arena," he added.

The calf scramble program awards 302 calf certificates each year. Since the first scramble was held in 1942, more than 11,000 calves have been purchased at a price of more than \$2 million.

The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, which runs through March 4, is the largest of its kind in the world.

The Show includes a rodeo, top-notch entertainment, the world's largest livestock show and a world-famous horse show.

Net proceeds from the Show fund scholarships for more than 1,000 students in Texas colleges and universities. Money also provided for agricultural research projects at the college level.
