And, Ed was called on for his carpenter, lifting and wiring skills. He and I went after the new 'old machine' Thursday evening. Thanks, Ed.




Spaces will be made available for area residents who wish to bring their items into Wheeler for this event.

NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet(R) service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet(R) packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet(R) 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to Centra Net® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

The proposed rates are on file with the Public Utility Commission of Texas, and are available for public inspection at the offices of GTE Southwest Incorporated. Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission. The deadline to intervene in this docket is 3:00 p.m., April 9, 1990.

From The Minister's Desk: Franklin D. Roosevelt, the thirty-second President of the United States, was the son of a prominent family who lived in Hyde Park, New York. He attended the finest schools in New York and became highly sophisticated man.

After a fine political career, he was elected president of the United States in March of 1933. He served as President until his death in April of 1945. He was the first man to ever be elected to more than two Presidential terms.

During the news briefing in one of his four terms as President, his aide was asked by a newspaper reporter what the name of the President's favorite song was. The irritated harrassed thoughtlessly replied: "Home on the Range', I think." But "Home on the Range" was not the favorite song of the sophisticated President. Yet it was reported by newspaper reporters throughout the nation that it was.

And as a result when President Roosevelt would make

public appearance during his Presidency, the orchestra would often play his "favorite song", "Home on the Range". President Roosevelt would enthusiastically thump his cane on the floor and laughed, enjoying a conception that was falsely believed about him.

This little historical story can be used to illustrate an obligation that disciples of Jesus have. Since Jesus said: "--You shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free--", His disciples seek to

learn and to practice truth. For this reason, it is imperative that they are able to distinguish between the truth that Jesus taught and the traditions that men have taught.

To make this distinction, it is necessary that the disciples of Jesus expositionally study the Bible not impositionally. When they espositionally study, the disciples of Jesus strive to learn what the Bible truly says. They do not study to reaffirm their preconceived belief and prejudices. They study to learn truth.

In such a study there are two guidelines that disciples of Jesus should follow. These two guidelines are---

1. Several good translations of the Bible should be studied before a commentary is studied. A commentary is a good and useful resource in Bible study, but is should always be a secondary resource. When a commentary is the primary resource in Bible study, preconceived ideas can be easily developed which will distort truth.

2. The Bible should be contextually studied. When it is not contextually studied, Biblical texts will become pretexts, teaching almost anything imaginable.

Like newspaper reporters, disciples of Jesus should seek to learn truth. Then they can "--contend earnestly for the faith which was once for all delivered to the saints", rejecting the traditions that are taught by men.
