Saturday, May 5 Is Election Day

Wheeler county voters will go to the polls Saturday, May 5, to elect mayors, city aldermen, school board members and members to the hospital board. Wheeler will have all three elections in the cafeteria of the school. Other area schools each hold their elections in their respective facilities. The city election at Mobeetie will be held at city hall. Kelton voters in the Parkview Hospital election will cast their ballots at the Kelton Gin.

The polls will open at 7:00 A.M. and close at 7:00 P.M.

CITY OF WHEELER

The City of Wheeler has three places on the council and a mayor to elect. The only opposition in this election is for mayor. Mayor Wanda Herd is seeking re-election; she is being challenged by former mayor Louis Stas.

For the council, Don Rose is seeking re-election to place 2, Bob McCain seeks another term on place 4 and Mark Frankenberg will seek place 5. Frankenberg was appointed to fill an unexpired term; this will be for a one-year term.

WHEELER I.S.D.

A write-in campaign has been staged for the only uncontested race in the Wheeler I.S.D. trustee election. Larry Finsterwald filed with the school secretary to conduct the write-in race with Danny Dorman for place 1 on the board. Janet Stevens and Wayne Kuehler each have their names on the ballot for place 2. Incumbent Bill Morrison and Maggie Marshall are on the ballot for place 3.

PARKVIEW HOSPITAL

Two seats are to be filled on the North Wheeler County Hospital District board. Daryl Snelgroves, Wheeler's representative, and David Britt, Kelton's representative, have each filed for re-election to their respective places. They have no opposition.

ALLISON I.S.D.

Allison school has two openings on their board of trustees. Terry Grayson, incumbent, John Huff and Garland Dukes each have their names on the ballot.

BRISCOE I.S.D.

The board of trustees for Briscoe school has four vacancies to be filled in the May 5 election. Michael A. Goad and Dennis Hefley are each seeking the two full 3-year terms. Four individuals have filed for the two 1-year unexpired terms; they are Dwight Tipps, Ray S. Hudson, Royce Zybach and Larry Nelson.

CITY OF MOBEETIE

Each of the individuals holding office on the Mobeetie city council have filed for re-election. Lene Ruth James, Roy Stribling and Jimmy Selby have placed their names on the ballot.

this past weekend to earn a gold medal and the right to represent her school in the 1990 State Track Meet May 11-12. Track coach, Jan Newland presented the award.

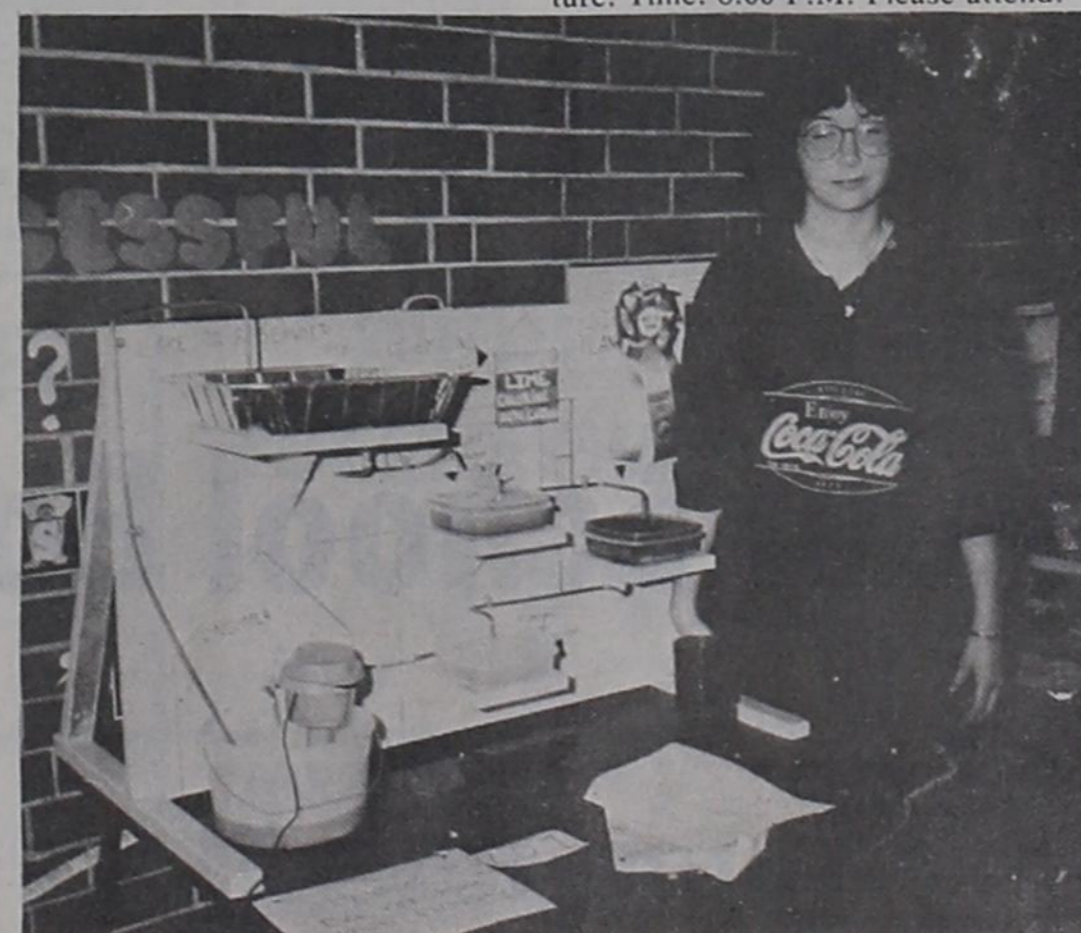

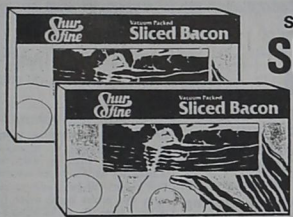

Farm Credit Adm. Merger Planned

The Farm Credit Administration (FCA) has instructed the Farm Credit Bank of Texas (FCBT) and the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Jackson (FICBJ) to submit a merger plan to the regulator no later than June 15, 1990. If approved, the merger will take place no later than August 2, 1990.

The FCA instructions follow a district court ruling in February reaffirming FCA's right to mandate a merger of the two banks, and upholding the validity of the Texas bank's long-term charter for Alabama, Louisiana and Mississippi.

The FCBT purchased approximately 16,000 loans for the Federal Land Bank of Jackson in Receivership in February 1989 and received the charter to provide long-term agricultural credit in the three states formerly served by the Jackson bank.

Shortly thereafter, FCA notified the Texas bank and FICBJ that they were to merge by August 10, 1989, under provisions of Section 410 of the 1987 Agricultural Credit Act. Prior to the mandated merger date, the FICBJ, First South Production Credit Association and Farm Credit Bank of Wichita filed suit challenging the regulator's merger mandate and decision to grant Texas the long-term lending authority in the three states.

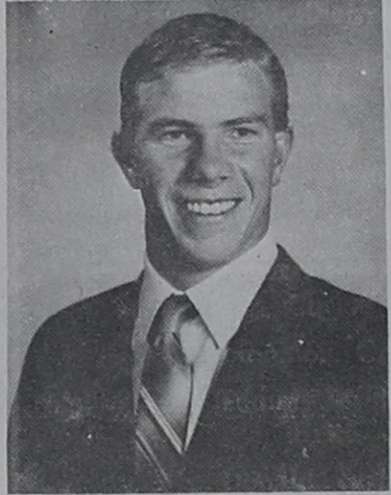
