Mobeetie Native Plan To Go To Russia

The First Baptist Church of Gail, Texas, will be sending their Pastor to Russia to spread the Word of God.

The First Baptist Church has been offered the opportunity to be represented in direct missions in the Soviet Union.

The Church is actively involved in missions around the world. They help support over three-thousand missionaries in almost every country of the world. The Church also helps in the support of Mount Carmel Baptist Church in St. Kitts, West Indies. The Church is considerably interested in carrying the Gospel of Jesus Christ throughout the world.

The First Baptist Church has now been offered the opportunity to be directly involved in sharing the Gospel to the world. The First Baptist Church will send their Pastor, Richard Laverty, to the Soviet Union to distribute Bibles.

Bro. Richard and the other men will be given baggages in New York that they will use to pick up the Bibles in Helsinki, Finland.

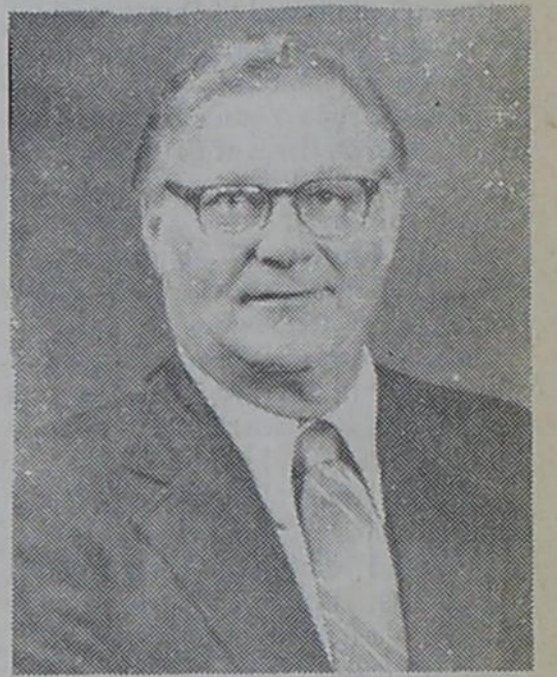
Each person will carry one-hundred Bibles into the Soviet Union to distribute. The Bibles will be distributed in Moscow, Leningrad and Kiev.

Wheeler Business To Render Property

Larry Schoenhals, Chief Appraiser for the Wheeler County Appraisal District, today reminded business owners that they must file property rendition forms with the local appraisal district office by April 2, 1990. Property owners may receive a 30-day extension, but must file a written request with the appraisal district by April 2, 1990. "The law requires certain property owners to file renditions every year," noted Schoenhals. Anyone who owns or manages income-producing personal property on January 1 must file a rendition statement with the local appraisal district. "Businesses, for instance, must report their inventories, furniture and fixtures, machinery and equipment, and other tangible business property on a rendition. It is to their benefit to do so because chief appraisers use the rendition report to establish the property's fair taxable value," Schoenhals further explained. "When business personal property isn't re-rendered, I am forced to estimate the value without the owner's input." While only business personal property must be rendered, anyone may voluntarily file a rendition with the appraisal district. Texas law does not require a property owner to render a home or other real property, but Schoenhals pointed out that all tax-

payers who do render are in a better position to exercise their rights as taxpayers. If a property is appraised by more than one appraisal district, the property owner should file a rendition in each appraisal district office. Property owners with buildings damaged by a storm or fire may also file a special report of decreased value. The deadline for filing this report for 1990 is also April 2. Rendition and report of decreased value forms are available at local appraisal district offices. The law

requires that the property owner provide all information requested on the forms. Noted Schoenhals, "It is a criminal violation to make false statements on renditions and reports of decreased value." Rendition forms and decreased value reports are confidential and not open to public inspection. For more information, contact the Wheeler Appraisal District office at (806) 826-5900.

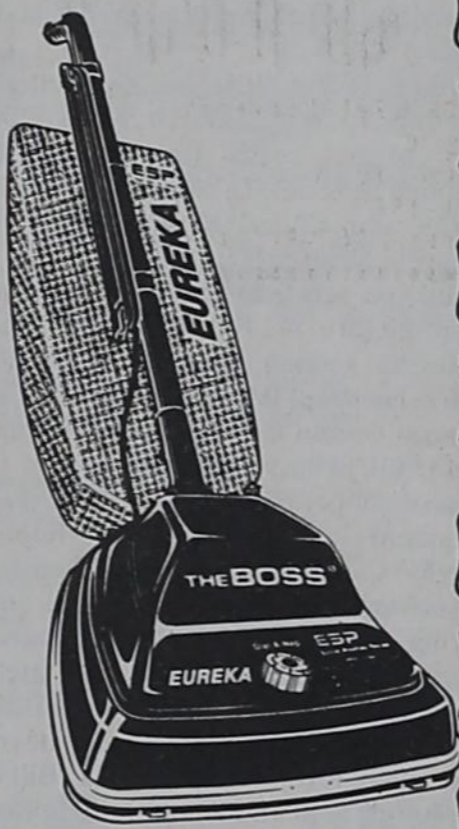

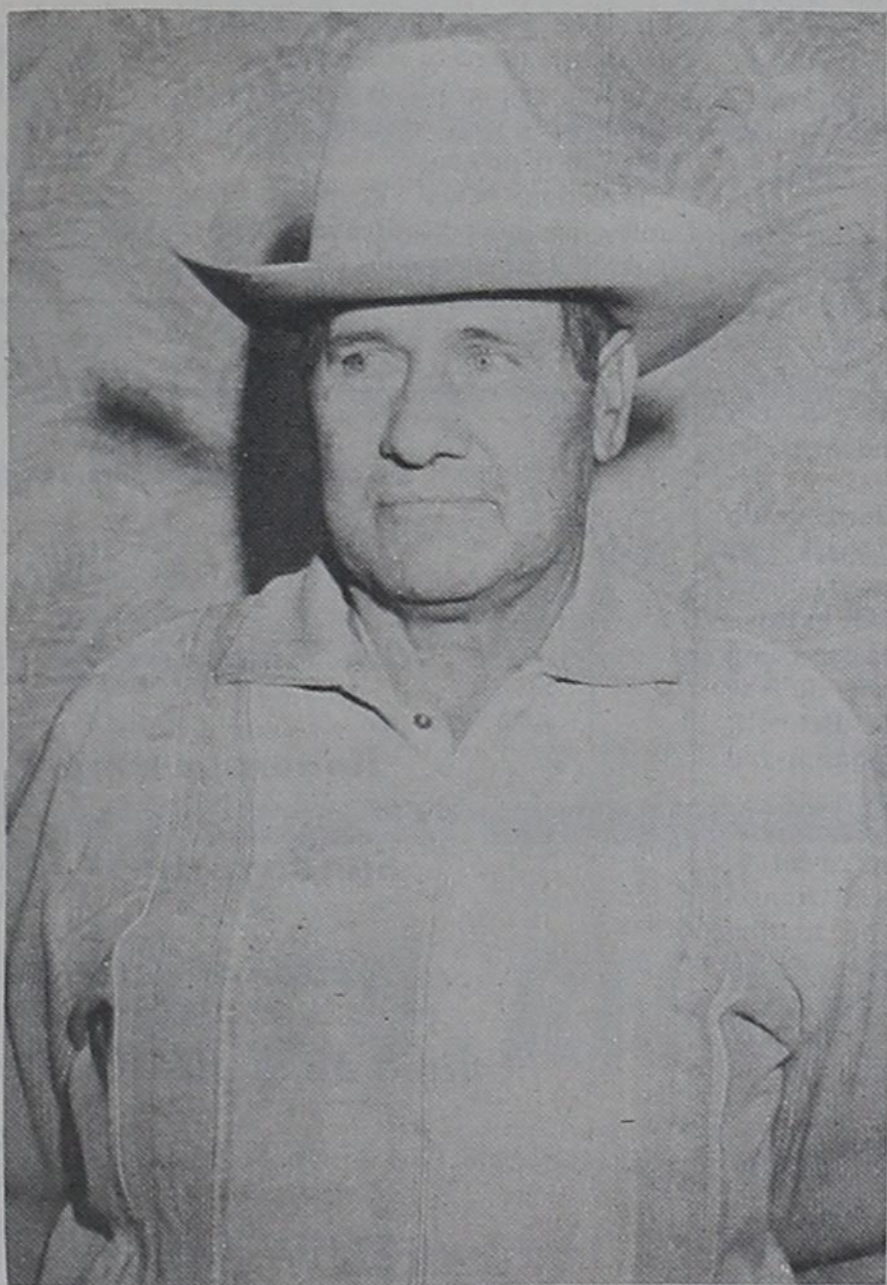

NOTICE OF TARIFF CHANGE TO CENTRANET® SERVICE

GTE Southwest Incorporated gives notice of its proposed tariff changes to CentraNet® service, which is a Central Office-based service that provides PBX-type features to multi-line business customers and is currently being offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

The Public Utility Commission of Texas approved a generic tariff for CentraNet® service up to 100 lines in Docket No. 7652. The proposed tariff revision would establish specific rates for CentraNet® service involving 101 to 400 lines. Other proposed revisions involve the rate applicable to changes, additions, or deletions to the data bases and a new rate is proposed for additional trunks.

The names of the three CentraNet® packages have changed from Standard, Premium, and Deluxe to CentraNet® 1000, CentraNet® 2000, and CentraNet® 3000, respectively. Direct Call Pickup has been added to the three CentraNet® packages while Multiple Call Park and Shared Speed Call 30 have been added to CentraNet® 2000, and Speed Call 30 and Call Forward Busy/No Answer Split have been added to CentraNet® 3000. Flexible Night Answer and Automatic Route Selection also have been added as new optional features.

The proposed changes and new service offerings have been assigned Docket No. 9251, and pursuant to Section 43(d) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act will become effective June 23, 1990. Rates for service will be applicable to customers who subscribe to the service as well as existing customers. Therefore, there will be no effect on any other rates of the company. The company's gross annual revenues will increase by approximately \$399,600, or less than one percent annually.

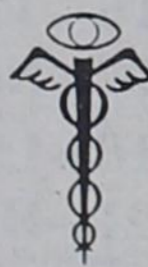

From The Minister's Desk:
One of the greatest players in the history of baseball was Ted Williams. He joined the Boston Red Sox team in 1939 and soon became one of the game's greatest players.
While Ted Williams excelled in every aspect of the game, he especially excelled as a batter. For example, in the 1941 season he has a batting average of 406, becoming one of the few baseball players to have a batting average of more than 400.
Yet Ted Williams never batted a 1000. And no baseball player ever will.
A similar circumstance exists in Christianity. With the exception of Jesus Christ, no one has ever lived the perfect Christian life. And no one ever will! The New Testament says: "If we say that we have not sinned, we make Him a liar, and His word is not in us." (1 John 1:10) A baseball player cannot have a batting average of 1000 and a Christian cannot live the perfect Christian life.
But there are some Christians who try. These Christians have a faith of perfection which will not allow any imperfection in their lives or in the lives of other Christians. Since such perfection is an impossibility, these Christians are generally unhappy and frustrated.
These Christians must recognize that there is no Biblical text that commands a faith of perfection. While it is true that Matthew 5:48 says: "...You are to be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect", the Greek word for "perfect" is teleios and it means "Of full stature, of full age, of full growth, or full development." This text does not teach Christians should have a sinless faith, but it teaches that Christians should have a mature faith.
This mature faith can only be achieved by a growth that is often characterized by mistakes, errors, and sins. As long as Christians live in the flesh there will always be a difference between the "is" and "should be" of their lives. While hypocrisy is wrong, a faith of perfection is also wrong because baseball players and Christians cannot bat a 1000.

Taxpayers' Information Pamphlet Available

Larry Schoenhals, chief appraiser for the Wheeler County Appraisal District, offers area property owners a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Right, Remedies, Responsibilities" to help them save on their property taxes. Published in both English and Spanish by the State Property Tax Board in Austin, the Pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and offers suggestions for possible tax savings. Schoenhals noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units; counties, cities, school districts, and hospital districts. Homeowners may qualify for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads, Schoenhals said. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphlet lists and explains all lawful exemptions and how to apply for them. For example, productivity appraisal is a type of tax relief available to owners of agricultural land which is very important in this area.

"While appraisal district personnel can offer more information about special land appraisal, tax renditions, and exemptions," Schoenhals said, "the information is given detailed coverage in the 'Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities' pamphlet."

"I urge all property owners in the Wheeler Appraisal District to read the pamphlet and avail themselves of all possible property tax relief," Schoenhals said. The pamphlets have been distributed to all local tax collectors' offices (county, school and city) and are now available there as well as at the Appraisal office.
