
He: "Well, Sugar, let's meet in Amarillo.'

Taxpayers' Information Pamphlet Available

Larry Schoenhals, chief appraiser for the Wheeler County Appraisal District, offers area property owners a pamphlet called "Taxpayers' Right, Remedies, Responsibilities" to help them save on their property taxes. Published in both English and Spanish by the State Property Tax Board in Austin, the Pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas operates and offers suggestions for possible tax savings. Schoenhals noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units; counties, cities, school districts, and hospital districts.

Homeowners may qualify for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads, Schoenhals said. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphle lists and explains all lawful exemptions and how to apply for them. For example, productivity appraisal is a type of tax relief available to owners of scrambled eggs, jelly, butter, juice, agricultural land which is very important in this area.


