Herd, Finsterwald, Kuehler & Morrison Win Position

Trustee elections were held Saturday, May 5, 1990 in Wheeler, Allison, Briscoe, Kelton and Mobeetie. Wheeler elected

city, school and hospital directors. Allison and Briscoe named only school trustees. Mobeetie chose city and school trustees and Kelton picked a hospital and school representatives.

WHEELER

The three elections in Wheeler were held in the school cafeteria with an excellent turnout in all three elections.

Only one race was contested in the city election. Incumbent Wanda Herd was returned to office with a strong 171 votes over former mayor Louis Stas. Each of the aldermen were seeking re-election unopposed: Place 1, Don E. Rose, 205; Place 4, Bob McCain, 213, and Mark Frankenberg, 202.

The voters in the school board election had three positions to fill and each was a contested race. Write-in Larry Finsterwald defeated Danny Dorman with 278 votes over 77 for Place 1. Wayne Kuehler received 257 over Janet Stevens' 93 for Place 2. In Place 3, incumbent Bill Morrison was given 300 votes with Maggie Marshall receiving 56.

Daryl Snelgrooves was elected to the Parkview Hospital board of directors with 251 votes.

ALLISON

Allison had two positions to fill with no contested races. John Huff and Garland Dukes were elected with 91 and 93 votes respectively.

BRISCOE

Two full 3-year terms were to be filled on the Briscoe board; Michael A. Goad and Dennis Hefley were elected with 76 and 77 votes respectively. In the bid for the two 1-year terms, Larry Nelson and Royce Zybach were elected with 61 and 46 votes respectively; Dwight Tipps received 38 votes and Ray S. Hudson 36.

KELTON

Two trustees in Kelton were on the ballot for the two spaces on the school board. Jerry Ray and Bob Buckingham were elected with 21 votes each.

David Britt was renamed to the board of trustees at Parkview Hospital with 6 votes.

MOBEETIE

Three places on the Mobeetie city council. Three filed for the office; they were elected: Lene Ruth James, 24; Jimmy Selby, 29, and Roy L. Stribling, 29.

Only two were seeking the two places on the school board. Wade Hathaway and Randy McCurly received 69 and 56 votes respectively.

DAVID BRITT SR. NAMED OUTSTANDING AGGIE OF THE PANHANDLE AT MUSTER

The Amarillo A&M Club celebrated Muster, April 21, in a special way. The traditional event, in which Aggies gather together to pay homage to those who have died this past year, was held at Tascosa Country Club in Amarillo, Texas. It was attended by more than 100 people. Guest speaker

for the event was Greg Mattison, defensive line coach for the Aggies.

At the annual Muster, recognition was given to David Britt Sr. of Wheeler, Texas, who was named Outstanding Aggie of the Panhandle. Criteria for selecting the recipient included choosing someone who has gone out of his way to serve the needs of Aggies, and who has contributed to the betterment of the Texas Panhandle and to Texas A&M University; someone who is a loyal and supportive Aggie; and someone who takes great pride in promoting A&M, and the traditions which have made it such a great institution.

Britt, class of 51, is the first recipient of the award. Last year, he was responsible for getting Coach R.C. Slocum to come to Amarillo for coach's night, and was instrumental in increasing the Texas Panhandle membership to the 12th Man Foundation.

While at A&M, Britt was an Agricultural Economics major, and played baseball for the university for three years as a right fielder. Upon graduation, he went into the Army and served in Korea. He married Paula, a graduate of Texas Women's University in Denton, Texas, and headed back to the Britt Ranch in Wheeler. He and his father were partners in the ranch for about 25 years. The ranch -- a cow-calf operation -- still remains in the Britt family, and he and his sons have since become partners.

Britt is proud of the fact that both his sons graduated from A&M, and they both married Aggies. David Jr. graduated in 1977, and Lewis graduated the following year. Britt has four grandsons, and says, "They are going to be Aggies, especially since they are already members of the 12th Man Foundation."

Britt is a lifetime member, and on the board of directors of the A&M Letterman's Association. He was one of the original members of the 12th Man Aggie Club, now known as the 12th Man Foundation, and he has been a member of that board of directors of the 12th Man Foundation. He is also a Diamond Century Club member, and a council member of the TAMU Former Students Association.

From The Minister's Desk:

The history of World War II reveals that the German Third Reich was guilty of terrible atrocities. Many of these atrocities occurred in the concentration camps where thousands of people were tortured and killed.

One of these camps was at Auschwitz, Poland, where it is believed that over two million people were executed and five hundred thousand more were starved to death. But among these acts of human cruelty, there was at least one act of human compassion.

This act of compassion was done by a man who was named Maximilian Koble. Mr. Koble had been arrested by the Gestapo, the Nazi secret police, for a political crime. He had helped Jewish refugees in Poland. And for this "crime" he was imprisoned at Auschwitz.

During this imprisonment, an escape occurred in his barracks. In reprisal, the camp commandant arbitrarily selected ten men to die by starvation. One of these ten men was a man who was named Francizek Gajowniczek. When the camp commandant called his name, Mr. Gajowniczek cried; "Have mercy! I have a wife and children."

Upon hearing this plea, Mr. Koble offered to take Mr. Gajowniczek's place. For an

unknown reason, the commandant allowed the exchange and Mr. Koble was taken to a basement cell with the other condemned men. He survived for about two weeks without food or water, but he was eventually executed when a prison guard gave him an injection of poison.

Mr. Gajowniczek survived his imprisonment at Auschwitz. After the war, he resumed his life, living in Germany with his wife and children. In the back yard of his home he erected a granite monument to the memory of Mr. Koble, recognizing that his life was a gift which had been secured by another person's death.

This story is a microcosm of what Jesus Christ did for us. According to the New Testament we are guilty of sin and were subject to its penalty of death. (Romans 6:23) But Jesus voluntarily took this penalty upon Himself, dying upon a Roman cross for our sins. (1 Peter 2:23)

What should be our response to this act of compassion? Perhaps we should erect a monument to Him, but this monument should not be like the one that Mr. Gajowniczek erected for Mr. Koble. Rather it should be a life that is obediently committed to Jesus Christ.

CRP Grass Seeding Information

CRP producers who are scheduled to plant grass in 1990 should refer to their contract concerning the planting details. The contract includes the species of grass to be planted, the amount of grass seed that will be cost-shared, the number of acres to be seeded, the seeding method to be performed, and other pertinent information.

CRP producers are reminded that the CRP contract is a legitimate contract and that the provisions are to be followed. Any changes made to the contract must be approved by the S.C.S. and A.S.C.S. before any practice is carried out.

The seeding deadline for all species of grass is June 1. If a producer has not made arrangements to get the seeding operation carried out, he should do so now.

The Soil Conservation Service is available to provide information and assistance to all persons regardless of age, sex, race, religion, national origin, or marital status. The office hours are from 7:00 to 4:30 Monday through Friday. Lunch break is from 12:00 to 12:30. If you have any questions, please contact us.
