

Run-Off Election Tuesday; Comm. Race To Be Decided

Tuesday, April 10, 1990, is the date of the Primary Run-Off Elections across the state. Wheeler County Democrats in Precinct 2 will elect their commissioner. The Democrats have several decisions to make at the polls, while the republicans only have two boxes to mark.

The Democratic primary election narrowed the field of candidates seeking the office of county commissioner, pct. 2, from four to two. Incumbent Bill Atherton is being challenged by Tommy Puryear.

VOTING PLACES

The Democrats will cast their ballots at the same locations as in the primary. Anyone who voted in the Democratic primary in March is eligible to vote. Also, any registered voter who did not vote in the primary may vote.

The Republicans have combined boxes for the run-off primary. Mobeetie, Pct. 1 and Briscoe, Pct. 10, will vote in the old gym at Wheeler High School with Wheeler, Pct. 2, Allison, 4, will vote at the Justice of the Peace office in the Wheeler County courthouse with Wheeler (Stanley), Pct. 3, Twitty, Pct. 7 will vote with Shamrock E., Pct. 9, at the Pioneer West Museum in Shamrock, Lela, Pct. 6 and Shamrock W., Pct. 8, will vote at the Ambulance Barn in Shamrock.

Remember, if you voted in the Democrat or Republican Primaries, you must vote in the respective primaries. You cannot change parties in the run-off. However, if you are a registered voter, who did not vote in the primary and wish to vote in the run-off election, you can.

The Food Fight brochure contains recommendations that could reduce a person's risks for certain cancers. The American Cancer Society wants people to choose foods rich in vitamins A and C, low in fat, and high in fiber, as well as cruciferous vegetables.

Maurita Stribling will serve as general and chairperson of Wheeler and the surrounding communities Crusade. She looks forward to leading the campaign to encourage people to choose a strong arsenal of foods for lowering cancer risk.

"Research reports have strongly suggested that certain foods, perhaps through their chemical content or the reactions they create during the digestive process, might affect a person's chances of getting cancer," Maurita says. "For example, high-fiber diets are recommended to help avoid colorectal cancer, and vitamin A might reduce the risk of getting cancers of the lung, larynx, and esophagus."

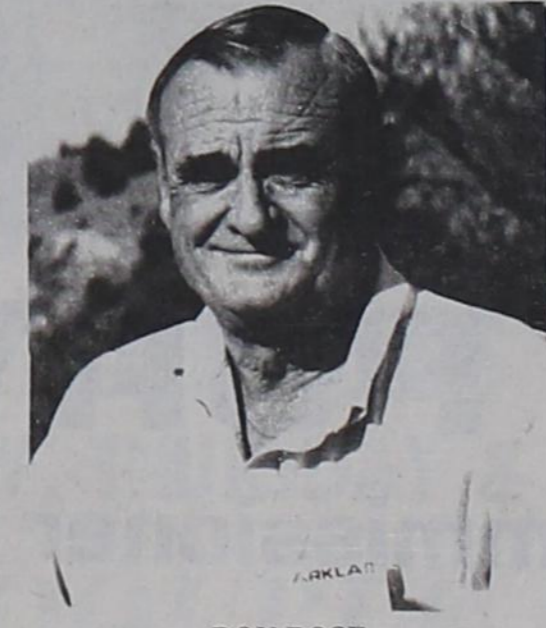
Don Rose Honored At Retirement Party

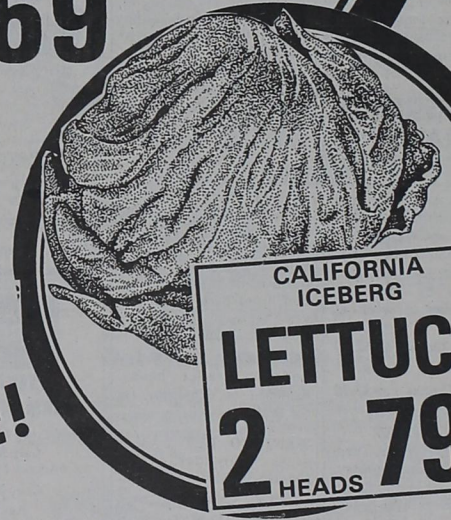

From The Minister's Desk:
On August 9, 1974, the national nightmare of Watergate ended with the resignation of President Nixon. Following the resignation of President Nixon there were a number of books that were written by former members of the Nixon Administration who claimed to know the true story of Watergate.
Yet none of these people in their books, including President Nixon, acknowledged that they made a mistake. They said that they were misled, misrepresented, or misunderstood. But none of them said: "I made a mistake."
Some of their explanations about certain activities of the Nixon Administration are almost humorous. For example, H.R. Haldeman in his book, **The Ends of Power**, attempted to explain the "very frank, uninhibited, often highly embarrassing, and unadmirable, conversation with President--" He rationalized that the associates of the President would have been more careful with their words if they had realized that these words were being recorded and that these words would be openly broadcast.
Perhaps Mr. Haldeman's observations can remind the disciples of Jesus of two important Biblical truths. These truths are:
1. Words can be destructive. This truth is clearly taught in the third chapter of James where the tongue is compared to a fire. This text says: "The tongue is a small part of the body and yet it boasts of great things. Behold,

how great a forest is set aflame by such a small fire! And the tongue is a fire, the very world of iniquity; the tongue is set among our members, as that which defiles the entire body, sets on fire the course of our life--" (James 3:5-6) Disciples of Jesus should be careful with their words because words can be destructive.
2. Words will be a basis for the final judgment. Jesus said: "Every careless word that men shall speak, they shall render account for it in the day of judgment. For by your words you shall be justified, and by your words you shall be condemned." (Matthew 12: 36-37) Disciples of Jesus will be careful with their words because words will be a basis for the final judgement.
Because of these warnings, disciples of Jesus will carefully consider these words, asking several important questions. These questions are:
Are these words really necessary?
What is there purpose?
Will these words help or hurt?
Are these words absolutely truthful?
Am I willing to admit that I said it?
With these questions, disciples of Jesus will not make the mistake that several of President Nixon's associates made during his administration. Then their words will not bring shame to their God or to their Nation.
