





As a young minister I served for several sessions as a Bible teacher at a summer youth camp which was located near San Antonio. And during one of these sessions a young girl made a statement that literally changed the nature of my ministry. Her statement

was: "I have committed some terrible sins. I am sure that I have committed the unpardonable sin. I am sure that God can never forgive me."

Like most young ministers, my teaching and preaching had emphasized two New Testament truths. The two truths were the reality of sin and the seriousness of sin. But this girl's statement caused me to do some serious study of the New Testament, asking: "While the New Testament teaches the reality of sin and the seriousness of sin, does it teach that sin can become unpardonable?"

From this study of the New Testament I learned three important truths. These truths

1. The New Testament teaches that people are saved by the grace of God. Ephesians 2:8-9 says: "--By grace you have been saved through faith and that not of vourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, that no one should boast." As this text clearly shows, people are saved by the grace of God not by their attainment.

2. The New Testament teaches that there is a limit to the grace of God. Matthew 12:31-32 records that Jesus said: "--I say to you, any sin and blasphemy shall be forgiven men, but blasphemy against the Spirit shall not be forgiven. And whoever shall speak a word against the Son of Man, it shall be forgiven him; but whoever shall speak

I will always be indebted to a little girl who attended a summer camp session where I was a Bible teacher. Because of some statements about the sins of her life, I restudied what the new Testament teaches about sin. And this study changed the nature of my ministry. I still teach the reality of sin and the seriousness of sin. But I also teach that sin-any sin-can be forgiven by the grace of God if people are willing to repent and accept God's grace.



My husband and I feel that an article needs to be printed in your paper in honor of a heroic deed ministered by one of your good citizens and my dear friend.

We were camped at Lake Proctor

with lots of other campers on the morning of April 25, 1990. It had been raining off and on for about a week. However on the nite of the 24th we had been taken to the tornado shelters by the gate keepers at the park in which we were staying, they (gate keepers) told us that we would be O.K. on our campsites for the night, but around 4:00 a.m. on the 25th we were awakened by other campers that water was rising fast and we needed to get out. We immediately hooked up to our trailer, leaving lots of personnal stuff behind, and only by having a diesel truck was we able to get out wading water chest deep. Our brother-in-law (Roy Thompson) from Amarillo was unable to get his motorhome out as was lots of other units. Lots of people were trapped with rising water in an even lower part of the park. After your good citizen Hiram Whitener of Box 596, Wheeler, Texas 79096 got his things secured, he put his boat back into the water and took all the life preservers that could be located down to these people that were already on top of their motorhomes and trailers trying to stay alive until help came, Hiram with the help of another young man began bringing as many as he could at a time to safety. This was being done while we were waiting on the Army Corps of Engineers (the agency that created the lake) to get help of any kind. There was never any warning from the Crops of Engineers, or any other law enforcement officers. We were taken to the Comanche High School, where the Comanche people were fantastic, they opened their arms and hearts to us, having coffee, food, blankets and dry clothes for everyone that had nothing left except what was on their backs. Some was lucky to have not lost anything, but others lost everything but their lives Thanks to Hiram Whitener.
