MUSTANG TO OPEN 1990 GRID CAMPAIGN FRIDAY AT SUNRAY

Winners of District 1-1A in 1989, the Sunray Bobcats have moved up a notch in classification and they play hosts to the Wheeler Mustangs on the high plains Friday night at 8 p.m.

Losing to Sunray last year put the Mustangs in the runnerup spot in the playoffs where the Mustangs advanced to the quarterfinals before losing to Sudan and even though this week's game is a non district affair, the Mustangs would like nothing better than to knock the Bobcats off and get

their season off on a winning note.

Hopes are high in Mustang country that the Mustangs will have what it takes to come out on top of the heap in a now tougher district race. Old foes, the Shamrock Irish and Memphis Cyclones have dropped to Class A and will certainly have to be reckoned with as most pre-season predictions have the Mustangs picked to win the district but with the Irish and Cyclones right behind.

Before the Mustangs can get to thinking about the hot district chase, they have tough competition coming in their non district games with the first order of business coming up Friday night.

Having no scrimmages under their belts, the Bobcats opened the season last week against Texhoma and fell by a 12-0 score. Losing heavily to graduation, the Bobcats return only 3 starters both on offense and defense.

The Bobcats will still run their offense from a basic spread formation

with Cody Chisum, son of head coach Danny Chisum, directing the offense from the quarterback slot. "Sunray still likes to put the ball in the air although they didn't have much success against Texhoma," head Mustang mentor Ronnie Karcher said this week after seeing the Bobcats play last week. On defense, the Bobcats use the 27 defense which they have been in the last few years.

Wheeler is still basically a young team with only six seniors dotting the squad and the Mustangs coaching staff is cautiously optimistic that the experience gained last year will be in the Mustangs favor.

The Mustangs strength will lie once more in their defense and the running game. "We should get better on defense as we have moved some of the kids around to new positions and it will take some game conditions to get their learning over," Karcher said. He added, "One thing for sure, we have got to get our passing game in a lot better shape or folks will stack their defense to stop the run. You have to keep people honest no matter what class of football you play."

Outside of Joe Dan Ledbetter, who is still hampered by a pre-season ankle sprain, the Mustangs are in good shape injury wise for the season opener after two scrimmages against Spearman and Clarendon.

Snapping back from adversity such as defeat is the mark of a championship team and this 1990 football season probably hinges on just how badly the Mustangs want to be winners. Time will only tell and the clock starts ticking Friday night.

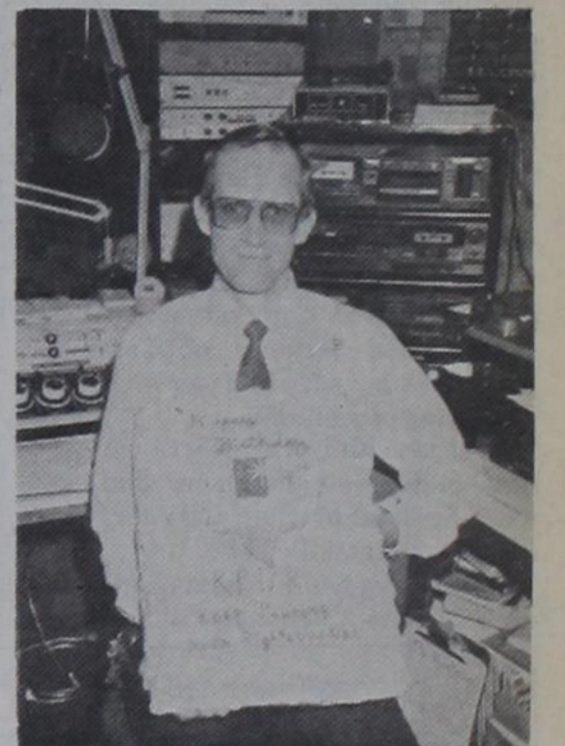

From The Minister's Desk:
Because of the recent invasion of Kuwait by Saddam Hussein and his Iraqi armies, the United States is now confronted with another crisis in the Middle East. This crisis is producing several of the same concerns that have been produced by other crises in the Middle East. For example, there is the threat of war. There are higher prices for oil which have caused the price of gasoline to sharply rise. There are American citizens who have been taken as hostages. And there is religious speculation that this crisis will lead to the Biblical event of Armageddon, a decisive battle that will supposedly be fought before the end of the world.
The perfect illustration of this speculation is a religious advertisement that was in a recent issue of the "Amarillo Globe News". According to this advertisement, a preacher, who serves a large church in Amarillo, was planning to teach a lesson in a Bible class that would be entitled, "Crisis in Middle East: Iraq In Light of Bible Prophecy". This advertisement also listed four questions that this preacher would answer in this lesson. These questions were: "Does The Bible Predict Iraq Will Be The Gateway To Armageddon?", "According To Scripture What Does The Future Hold For Iraq?", "According To Scripture What Is The Future Of America?" and "What roll Will U.S. Play In Armageddon?"
Such speculation is not uncommon. In recent years there have been several Middle East crises and with each one of these crises there has been renewed speculation that it would lead to Armageddon. And this speculation has been fueled by a misunderstanding of several Biblical texts. One of these texts is Ezekiel 38 and 39 which is supposedly a description of a Middle East crisis which will lead to Armageddon.
But a careful reading of this text reveals some important facts. These facts are: (1) These armies would consist of horses and horsemen, (Ezekiel 38:4,15) (2) The soldiers of these armies would yield swords. (Ezekiel 38:4) (3) The predominant weapons would be wooden and these weapons would be used as fuel for seven years. (Ezekiel 39:9-10) It should be obvious from these facts that this text is not a prophecy about some crisis in the Middle East. Rather it is a description of the return of Israel from Babylonian captivity. (Ezekiel 39:9-10)
The current Middle East is not the fulfillment of a Biblical prophecy about an event that will lead to Armageddon. Rather it is simply a condition that Jesus said would exist whenever the end of the world came. (Matthew 24:6)
Epilogue
A careful study of the New Testament reveals that Armageddon is mentioned in only one text—Revelation 16:16. And this text is not describing some world war that will lead to the return of Jesus. Rather it is describing the final overthrow of the Roman Empire which occurred in the first century. To properly understand Armageddon, it is imperative that it be studied in its historical setting.
