The Wheeler Mustangs won their second district game last Friday night with an 18-6 victory over the visiting Mustangs of Claude.

The homecoming fans viewed a rather lackluster performance by the home team only by focusing on the scoreboard. The defensive unit of the Stangs allowed a total of only 97 yards for the evening, while the offensive team had one of their most productive games in yardage gained with a total of 381 yards.

Leading rushers for the Mustangs were Mack Marshall with 167 yards on 26 carries and Mark Marshall with 17

Crucial 1-A Encounter

MUSTANGS TRAVEL TO BOOKER

The Wheeler Mustangs journey to Booker Friday night to take on the Kiowa in a crucial District 1-A encounter. Booker and Wheeler are currently tied for the district lead with identical 2-0 records. Booker stands 5-2 on the year and is coming off a very impressive 34-13 victory over the

Shamrock Irish last week. The Mustangs are 6-1 with their latest victory being an 18-6 win over Claude.

The Kiowas are led by (QB) Chad Phillips, (FB) Brady Miller, and (RB) Rafael Tudon. Tudon, a 175 pound junior earned all-district recognition last year, running for 834 yards. The

Kiowas work out of the Power I and Tandem I on offense and employ the 5-2 on defense.

The Mustangs continue to rack up big numbers on offense, but mistakes such as fumbles, penalties, and other inopportune mistakes plagued the Mustangs against Claude and turned what could have been a rout into a nailbiter right till the end. "We must learn how to finish a drive, land the knockout punch, and score points" according to Coach Karcher. The Mustangs were led Friday night by the hard charging Mack Marshall and the relentless blocking of Matt Smith, Ronnie Hungate, Arthur Altamarino, Travis Cook, Isidro Salas, and Brandon Childress along with split back Ike Finsterwald. The Mustang defense has played extremely well for the most part this season and another great effort is needed against Booker if they hope to win the district crown that has eluded them the past two years. The Kiowas are known for playing extra-tough at home and have gained valuable confidence the past two weeks by defeating Claude and Shamrock. An extra large throng of Mustang supporters in Booker could do nothing but help the Black Attack put down another serious Indian uprising.

From The Minister's Desk:

There is a proverbial statement that says: "Life is what you make it." I have always appreciated this statement because it emphasizes the importance of intention. And when intention is clearly understood, some "thorny" issues can be resolved.

For example, one of these issues is the observation of Halloween. There are some people who will not allow their children to participate in the observation of Halloween, believing that their participation links them to Satanism and demonism. But is it really the intention of the "ghosts" and "goblins" that roam the streets on Halloween night to be followers of Satan or worshippers of demons?

It is true that Halloween probably originated from a festival that was annually held by the Celts, a people who lived in central Europe almost two thousand years ago. This festival was held to honor Samhain, the Celtic lord of the dead. The Celts believed that Samhain allowed the spirits of the dead to return to their homes during this festival. And for this reason, the Celts would prepare "treats" for

these spirits, hoping to avoid the "tricks" that these spirits could do to them.

While Halloween may have originated from this festival, its purpose is no longer the same. It is not the intention of children when they participate in the observation of Halloween to honor Samhain. And it is certainly not their intention to be followers of Satan or worshippers of demons. To most children, Halloween is basically a costume party and it is their intention simply to dress up in silly costumes, to go the homes of their neighbors, and to receive treats. Because these children dress up like witches, ghosts and spooks, it is not their intention to be witches, ghosts and spooks. Their intention is to enjoy an evening of fun and foolishness.

I recognize that Satanism and demonism have become serious social problems. But I also recognize that it takes more than a certain night or a

costume to become followers of Satan or worshippers of demons. It takes intention! Halloween is like life. It is what you make it!

The Wheeler Colts with a balanced offense and strong defense defeated the Claude Colts for the second time by a score of 20-6.

The Colts started slowly in the first quarter. After Claude blocked a punt on Wheeler's 20 yard line the Colts defense held Claude and took over on their own fifteen yard line. 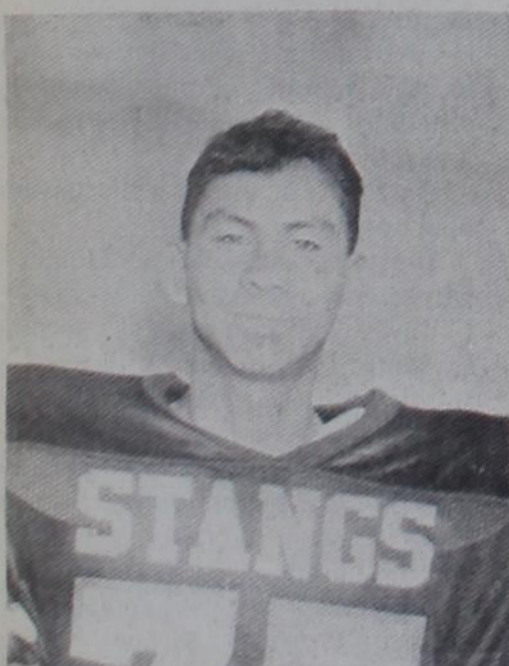
