Monty Markham Wins Allison Geog. Bee

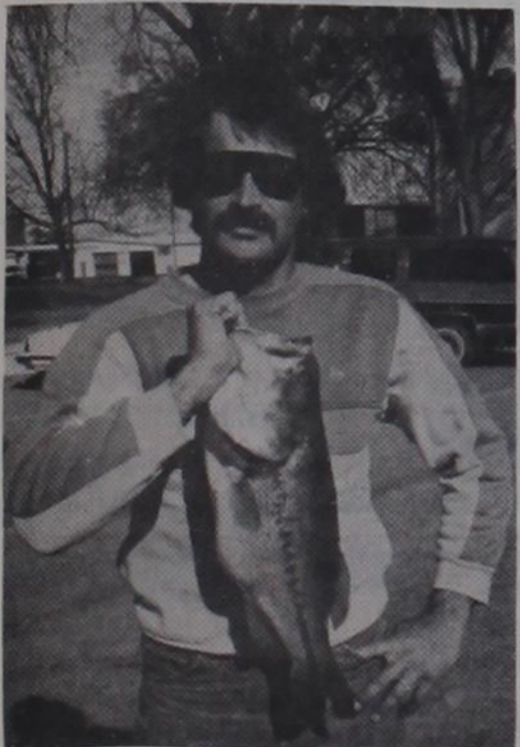
Monty Markham, an eighth grade student at Allison, won the school's geography bee this week. The school-level bee, at which students answered oral questions on geography, was the first round in the third annual National Geographic WORLD, the Society's magazine for children, Amtrak, and KUDOS Snack.

The bee was kicked off the week of January 28 in thousands of schools around the United States, District of Columbia, and five U.S. territories. Monty and the other school winners will now take a written test. Up to 100 of the top scorers in each state will be eligible to compete in their state bee April 5.

The state champions will compete in Washington, D.C. in the National Geographic Bee finals on May 22 & 23, with the three top-ranking winners receiving scholarships of \$25,000, \$15,000, and \$10,000. The National Geographic Society with its co-sponsors will provide all-expenses-paid trips for the state champions and their teacher escorts for this final competition.

Alex Trebek, host of "Jeopardy!" will moderate the national finals.

The National Geographic Society developed the National Geography Bee in response to a growing concern about the lack of geographic knowledge among young people in the United States. A 10-country Gallup Survey conducted for the Society in 1988 and 1989 found that people in the U.S. ages 18-24, the youngest group surveyed, knew less about geography than young people in any of the other countries.

Lions Club To Have Dr. Kit Show Mon.

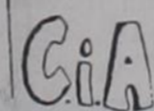

Hardcastle Enters Houston Scramble

Marcus Hardcastle, a 15 year-old FFA member from Wheeler, will compete in the 1991 Houston Rodeo calf scramble on Feb. 23 in the Astrodome.

The calf scramble is an exciting part of Houston rodeo action, featuring Charley Pride as part of that evening performance. Marcus, son of Gary and Becky Hardcastle, will compete for one of 252 calves to be awarded at the 1991 Show.

Additionally, as many as two youngsters from each of the 18 rodeo performances will be awarded "hard luck" certificates for their hearty efforts in attempting to catch a calf, resulting in 36 more certificates actually given.

An entertaining event whose net proceeds provide educational contributions to Texas students, the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo ranks as the nation's largest donor of agricultural scholarships. Currently, more than 1,000 students are on Show-sponsored scholarships. The Show's educational commitment for the 1990-91 school year exceeds \$2 million.

Equally important is the Show's commitment to youngsters competing at the event itself. The calf scramble is one of the Show's major programs benefiting youth, requiring a yearlong commitment from the winner to the animal project.

Beginning with athletic competition in the Astrodome, the program ends 12 months later with top-notch competition in the Astrodome showing.

The actual calf scramble event involves 14 vigorous calves. Each youngster is committed to capturing a calf, haltering and bringing it to the finish line—but only the successful ones receive \$800 calf purchase certificates.

The certificate, donated by a generous sponsoring firm or individual, is used to purchase a purebred registered beef or dairy heifer. This year, several companies have strengthened their commitment to the calf scramble program by sponsoring a calf for each of the 18 rodeo performances.

From The Minister's Desk:

Have you ever heard of Edward Everett?

On November 19, 1990, in Gettysburg, Pennsylvania, a cemetery was dedicated to the Union and Confederate soldiers who were killed during the Civil War battle that was fought at Gettysburg. Mr. Everett was the featured speaker at this dedication, but he was not the only speaker.

After Mr. Everett recited from memory an eloquent speech that lasted more than two hours, President Abraham Lincoln spoke, delivering a short, but impressive speech. In this speech, the President made a statement that said: "The world will note, nor long remember what we say here—" But the President Lincoln was wrong! The world has remembered the words that he spoke at Gettysburg. His speech has become known as *The Gettysburg Address* and is hailed by historians as one of the greatest speeches that has ever been made.

And one of the first people who recognized the greatest of the President's speeches was Edward Everett. Following the dedication of the cemetery at Gettysburg, he wrote a letter to the President and said: "I should be glad to flatter myself that I came as near to the central idea of the occasion, in two hours as you did in two minutes." From this statement, it can be concluded that Mr. Everett was a man who was very perceptive. And according to Civil War historians, he demonstrated this perceptiveness throughout his career as an American statesman.

For example, a Civil War historian has reported that he gave some very simple advice when he advised a friend who had been slandered by a newspaper. His advice was: "Do nothing! Half of the people who bought the newspaper never saw the article. Half of those who saw it, did not read it. Half of those who read it, did not understand it. Half of those who understood it, did not

believe it. And half of those who believed it are of no account anyway."

Since Jesus Christ was also a very perceptive man, I think that He would have agreed with Mr. Everett's advice. In the *Sermon on the Mount*, He described the attitude that His disciples should have when they are mistreated. He said: "Blessed are you when men cast insults at you, and persecute you, and say all kinds of evil against you falsely, on account of Me." (Matthew 5:11)

With this description, Jesus emphasized two important truths. These truths are:—

1. Disciples of Jesus can expect to be mistreated. Notice that Jesus did not say:—"If men cast insults at you, and persecute you, and say all kinds of evil against you falsely on account of me." Rather He said:—"When—" It is inevitable that disciples of Jesus will be mistreated.

2. Disciples of Jesus should be careful about their response when they are mistreated. Jesus did not advise His disciples that they should vigorously respond to people who mistreat them. Perhaps disciples of Jesus should imitate the response that Jesus made when He was mistreated. This response is clearly described in I Peter 2:23 which says:—"While being reviled, He did not revile in return; while suffering, He uttered no threats, but kept entrusting Himself to Him who judges righteously—" Like their Lord, disciples of Jesus do not mistreat people who mistreat them.

If you are a disciple of Jesus, you should be prepared. It is inevitable that you will be mistreated. But two very perceptive men, Edward Everett and Jesus Christ, would probably suggest that your response should be "No response", entrusting yourself "—to Him who judges righteously."

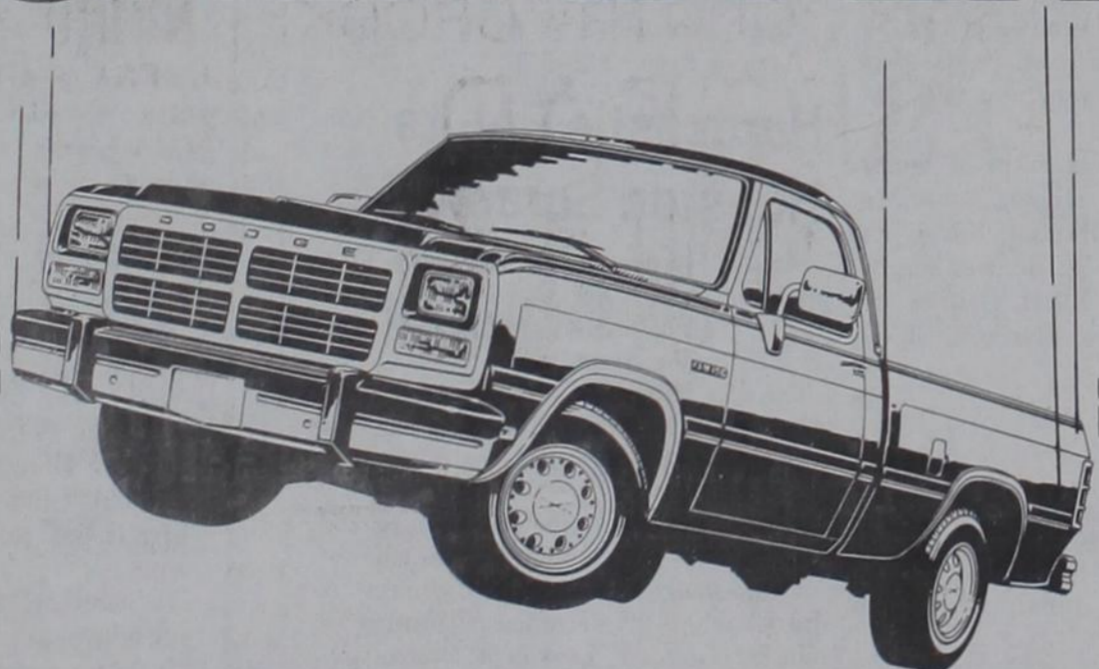

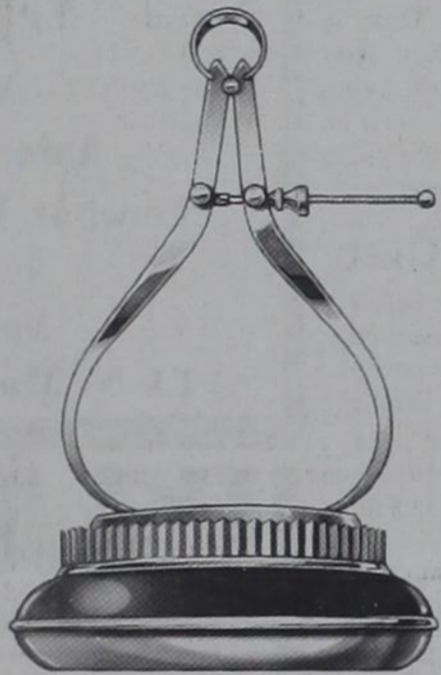
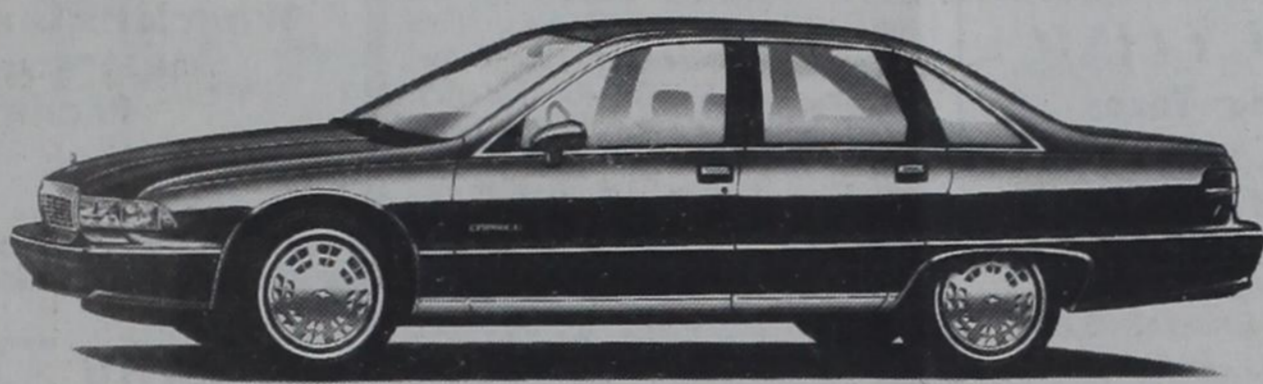
