HUGE GAS BILLS SHOCK RESIDENCES OF WHEELER

Wheeler residents were shocked when they received their gas bills for the past month. Most were tripled or more. Most were tripled—one business received a bill for \$1,000.

Charles Moorehead, a representative of Wheeler Gas, Inc., met with Kiwanis and explained the jump in price. Wheeler has just experienced an extremely cold month. The gas well which has provided gas for Wheeler for the past 20 years could not supply the demand and the company had to go elsewhere for gas. The fuel adjustment is the difference between the gas the well supplied and the additional gas that had to be

purchased. Wheeler Gas, Inc., is an interstate business. Wheeler and Reydon are each provided gas by the Wheeler system. Being an interstate business limits the outlets for Wheeler Gas to purchase additional gas. The company is presently in the process of trying to divest the company of the Reydon system; this would make them an intrastate company, opening up more markets for the purchase of gas.

Jim Montgomery told the group of Kiwanians that had the company still been owned by 'The Wileys' the gas bills would have been the same.

Dunn To Coordinate St. Jude's Bike-A-Thon

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital has announced that Mrs. Temi Dunn will coordinate the Wheeler "Wheels for Life" Bike-A-Thon. The date of 4-20-91 has been selected for the ride. Founded by Danny Thomas in 1962, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is the largest childhood cancer research-treatment-education center in America. Although located in Memphis, TN, the hospital has a local impact because area doctors and procedures can use treatments and procedures developed in St. Jude. St. Jude Hospital is non-sectarian, interracial and provides medical care for over 3,500 active

patients. Currently, over \$192,000 is needed each day to keep the doors open. These funds come primarily from public contributions.

This year's Bike-A-Thon is dedicated to Brooke Simon. Five-year-old Brooke, from Delcambre, Louisiana, developed Wilms Tumor in November, 1988. Following the removal of her left kidney, she has undergone radiation and chemotherapy. Though her prognosis is good, her fight still continues.

We are grateful for the concern that Mrs. Dunn has for our work and we hope the citizens of Wheeler will support the Bike-A-Thon to help provide the funds that are needed to preserve the world's greatest asset... "Our Children".

From The Minister's Desk:

After several months of anxiety and tension, a war has begun in the Middle East. The military forces of twenty-eight nations have launched the awesome firepower of Operation Desert Storm, enforcing a United Nations resolution. This resolution demands that Saddam Hussein and the Iraqi army withdraw from Kuwait. But there are many people who believe that this war is more than the enforcement of a resolution by the United Nations. These people sincerely believe that this war is the fulfillment of a Biblical prophecy that is recorded in the sixteenth chapter of Revelation. This text reads: "...I saw, issuing from the mouth of the dragon and from the mouth of the beast and from the mouth of the false prophet, three foul spirits like frogs; for they are demonic spirits, performing signs, who go abroad to the kings of the whole world, to assemble them for battle on the great day of God the Almighty. (Lo, I am coming like a thief! Blessed is he who is awake, keeping his garments that he may not go naked and be seen exposed!) And they assembled them at the place which is called in Hebrew Armageddon." (Revelation 16: 13-16)

The popular interpretation of this text is that it is a prophecy about a Middle East conflict that will cause a great world war which will be the Battle of Armageddon. And this great world war will lead to the second coming of Jesus, the establishment of His kingdom on earth, and His reign from Jerusalem for thousand years. In my opinion, this interpretation is totally incorrect! And I think that some observations can be made which show that it is incorrect. These observations are:--

1. The book of Revelation is a book that must be interpreted in its historical background. This historical background is pinpointed in the first verse of the first chapter which says: "...The revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave him to show to his servants what must soon take place..." (Revelation 1:1) Notice that this text says that it will reveal "...what must soon take place..." The Greek word for soon means "immediate fulfillment." And it is the same word that is used in II Timothy 4:9 where the Apostle Paul wrote to Timothy and said: "Do your best to come to me soon." With the use of the word soon, the Apostle Paul obviously did not expect Timothy to come in the next two or three thousand years. Rather he expected him to come soon or shortly.

Since one text can often help to interpret another text, it should be clear that II Timothy 4:9 shows that Revelation 1:1 teaches that the book of Revelation would reveal "...what must soon take place..." But what was it that would "...soon take place..."?

To answer this question, it must be remembered that when the book of Revelation was written, first century Christians were in a crisis because of the persecution of the Roman Empire. And the book of Revelation was written to these Christians, assuring them that God would destroy the Roman Empire and that they would share this victory because of their faith in Him.

What comfort and encouragement would it have been to write a letter to these suffering Christians and tell them about some great battle that was going to be fought nineteen or twenty centuries later? Such speculation arises when the book of Revelation is divorced from its historical background.

2. The book of Revelation is a book that must be symbolically interpreted. There are some texts in the book that must be literally interpreted, but the majority of the texts must be symbolically interpreted. And one of these texts is the sixteenth chapter.

While this text does refer to a "...place which is called in Hebrew Armageddon", it does not state that Armageddon is literally a large world war that will begin in the Middle East. And the reason is that Armageddon is a Hebrew word that means "mountain of Megiddo" which is the site of many great victories that the Hebrew nation won. Because of these victories, this word was used to symbolically emphasize that God's people will always be victorious.

In the sixteenth chapter of Revelation, an impressive promise is made to the first century Christians. This promise is that they will be victorious over their archenemy, the mighty Roman Empire.

Please do not misunderstand! The book of Revelation is not a book that has no reverence for twentieth century Christians. Rather it is a very reverent book because its message is the same for Christians of any age. This message is that Christians should obediently trust God, resisting every effort to forsake or to compromise their commitment to Him. Such Christians will show in the eternal reign of God whose love and grace has redeemed them.

The Colorado Forest Service has evergreen trees available for \$35.11 per 30 trees and deciduous trees available for \$24.60 per 50 trees. Some species are in limited supply; for best selection, place your orders as soon as possible. Payment is required at the time of purchase. For additional information, contact the Soil Conservation Service at 826-3565.
