rousing start last Friday night as they routed the Sunray Bobcats 40-0 in Sunray.

So dominating were the Mustangs on defense, they only had to drive 58 yards on their longest TD drive. Two fumble recoveries set up a couple of Mustang touchdowns and a Bobcat pass was intercepted by Matt Smith and returned for a 25 yard touchdown. Two bad snaps on attempted punts by Sunray were instrumental in putting the Mustangs in scoring territory on two more occasions.

Wheeler gained some revenge against the District 1-1A champion of last year who knocked the Mustangs into second place behind the Bobcats.

The Mustangs got only one six

pointer in the first quarter and it came at 6:48 of the quarter when a bad snap to punter Johnny Davis resulted in the Mustangs blocking the kick and taking the ball at the Bobcat 22. Mack Marshall started the scoring

drive with a 9 yard burst at left tackle and capped the six play drive with a 1 yard scoring punch up the middle. Alamo Altamirano booted his first of

four consecutive extra points before missing on the Mustangs final two touchdowns.

The Bobcats offense just couldn't get anything going against the swarming white shirted Mustangs. Sunray, for the game, could only garner 5 first downs and 45 total yards with their rushing yardage ending up in a

minus 1 yard and that is pretty good defense!

Wheeler scored their second TD of the game as pounded 43 yards, all on the ground, after recovering a fumbled punt at the Sunray 43. Seventeen of the yards gained on the drive were made by junior running back

SAYRE EAGLES ARE FOE IN MUSTANGS HOME DEBUT

Fresh from an impressive 40-0 victory over Sunray last week, the Wheeler Mustangs take to the turf of Nicholson Field Friday night in their home opener against the Sayre Eagles.

It has been a number of years since the Mustangs have taken on a team from Oklahoma in a regular season game. The Mangum Tigers used to be an annual opponent and with realignment of Texas football, it became a necessity for the Mustangs to look across the state line for an opponent.

The Eagles are winless on the year, having lost to Thomas and Shattuck, while the Mustangs have a victory in

their lone contest of the young season. "We got to scout Sayre last week in their loss to Shattuck and having just seen them the one time hampers our preparations somewhat," head Coach Ronnie Karcher said this week. "We feel like that Sayre is a better team than Sunray and there is nothing an Oklahoma team would rather do than beat a neighbor from Texas."

Space Needed For New Allison Post Office

The U.S. Postal Service is seeking suitable space upon which to build and lease a new Main Post Office building in Allison, TX. Postmaster Vance Boydston, said here.

The preferred area for space consideration is bounded on the North, South, East and West by 1/4 mile from existing Main Post Office. All utilities and access to a two-lane paved public street must be available.

Space size needed is approximately 13,000 square feet of land.

Property owners are asked to submit their space offerings no later than September 13, 1990, to: Mr. Bob Tipton, Real Estate Specialist, United States Postal Service, 4811 Louisville Avenue, Lubbock, TX. 79402-9311.

After a suitable space has been located, the Postal Service will call for construction offers for a building that will be built with private funds and leased to the Postal Service for a long term period.

The new building will have 725 square feet of interior space.

From The Minister's Desk:

In the eighth chapter of the book of Acts, there is recorded an account of man's conversion to Christianity. (Acts 8:26-40) This man was "...an Ethiopian eunuch, a court official of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians..." (verse 27)

This man's conversion occurred as he was returning to Ethiopia from Jerusalem where he had gone "...to worship..." (verse 27) As "...he was returning and sitting in his chariot, and was reading the prophet Isaiah..." this man was approached by Philip, the evangelist, who ask: "Do you understand what you are reading?" (verse 30)

This question is still pertinent. A national news magazine recently reported that the Bible is annually listed among the ten top selling books in the world. But while the Bible is a best selling book, it is also apparent that it is a book that is largely misunderstood.

While several reasons could be suggested for this misunderstanding, I think that the most logical would be the failure of its readers to apply some principles of Biblical interpretation. Please allow me to call your attention to at least three principles of Biblical interpretation which can help you and I to properly understand the Bible. These principles are:—

1. Always study the context. Someone has said that a biblical text apart from its context is a Biblical pretext. The Bible may be made to teach almost anything imaginable by taking a text from its context.

2. Recognize the difference between the Old Covenant and the New Covenant. You and I live under the New Covenant which is revealed in the New Testament. The Old Covenant, which is revealed in the Old Testament, was nullified by the death of Jesus.

Hebrews 10:9-10 states: "He (Jesus) takes away the first (Covenant) in order to establish the second. By this will we have been sanctified through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ once for all."

To properly understand the Bible, it is necessary to recognize the difference between the Old Covenant and the New Testament because it is the New Covenant which you and I must obey.

3. Recognize the difference between a specific command and a general command. A specific is one which specifies that a certain action is to be taken and it specifies how it is to be done. But a general command is one that does not specify what is to be done or how it is to be done. What God specifically commands must be done without addition, subtraction, or substitution. But what God does not specifically command can be done in the most expedient manner.

These three principles of Biblical interpretation will allow us to properly understand the Bible. When we use these principles in our study of the Bible, we can emphatically say, "Yes", if we are ask: "Do you understand what you are reading?"

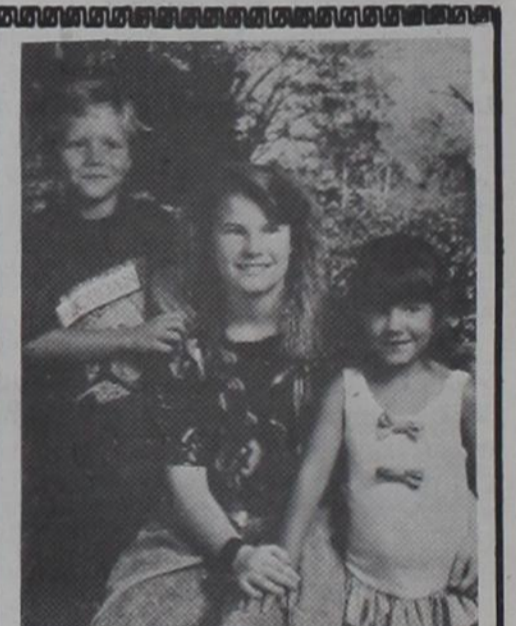

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2, Sixth Called Session, 71st Legislature, proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Senate, at any special session, does not take final action to confirm or reject an appointee of the Governor made during a recess of the Senate, the appointee is entitled to continue in office until the Senate rejects the appointee at a subsequent session or until the Governor appoints another person to fill the vacancy, but such a nominee whom the Senate does not act to confirm or reject at a subsequent regular session is considered to be rejected when the session ends.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to clarify the authority of the senate to consider certain nominees to state and district offices and to provide for filling vacancies in those offices."

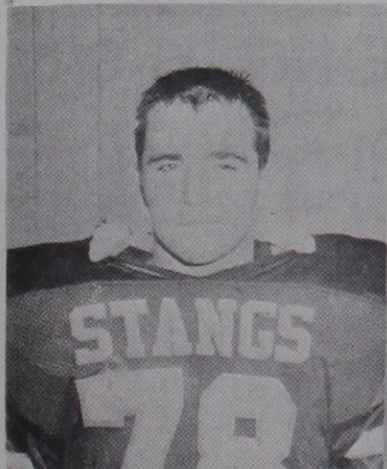

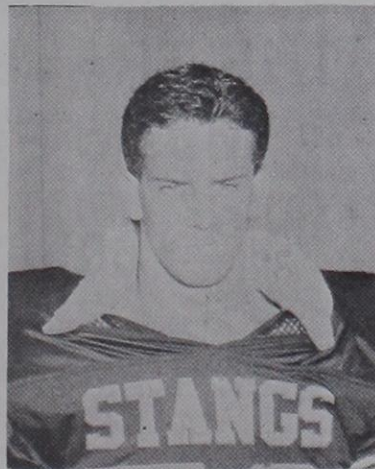

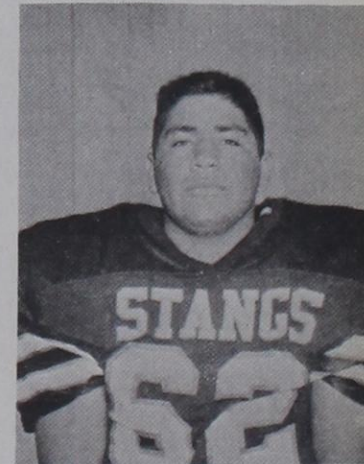
