





Congregational Concerns:

On this coming Sunday, March 3rd, the monthly fellowship luncheon will be held in the multi-purpose building at the conclusion of the morning worship service. The members of the Wheeler Volunteer Fire Department, the members of the Wheeler Sheriff's Department, and the members of the Ambulance Service will be the guests of honor at this luncheon.

From The Minister's Desk:

There is a bumper sticker that states an impressive Biblical truth. This bumper sticker says: "Christians are not perfect—just forgiven." But this impressive truth is often misunderstood by many people who are not Christians and it is often misunderstood by many people who are. These people apparently believe that Christians are to be sinlessly perfect.

For this misunderstanding to be corrected, there are at least two observations that must be made. These two observations are:—

1. The New Testament affirms that salvation is by the grace of God not man's attainment. Ephesians 2:8-9 says: "—By grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God; not as a result of works, that no one should boast. There are two key phrases in this text that must be emphasized.

The first phrase is: "—By grace—". Salvation is by the grace of God which is an expression of God's love that is unearned, undeserved, and unpayable. Salvation is not the result of a business transaction between God and man. Rather it is "—the free gift of God—" that man receives. (Romans 6:23)

Then the second phrase is: "—Through faith—". Salvation is by the grace of God which is found in Jesus Christ. And access to this grace is "—through faith—" in Jesus Christ. Such a faith is tangible, expressing itself through obedience and service to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. (James 2:14-26)

Salvation is rooted in the grace of God not the perfection of man.

2. The grace of God is a continuous need in the lives of people who are Christians. Someone has observed

that there are only two types of sinners—lost and saved. Christians are not people who are sinlessly perfect. Rather they are forgiven sinners—forgiven by their obedient faith in Jesus Christ.

For example, consider the Apostle Paul. This man is usually idolized as a "super Christian". But he evaluated himself by saying: "—I was formerly a blasphemer and a persecutor—" and then he said: "It is a trustworthy statement, deserving full acceptance, that Jesus came into the world to save sinners, among whom I am foremost of all." (I Timothy 1:13,15)

Notice the change of tense that the Apostle Paul used. He changed from past to present. He said: "—I was—", but then he said: "—I am—". While the Apostle Paul knew that he had sinned in the past, he also knew that he had sinned in the present. Yet the Apostle Paul believed that these sins had been forgiven by the grace of God. He said: "—I found mercy, in order that in me as the foremost, Jesus Christ might demonstrate His perfect patience, as an example for those who would believe in Him for eternal life." (I Timothy 1:16)

For Christians, the grace of God is not only the purging power for past sins. It is the purging power for present sins. Christians are saved by the grace of God and it is the grace of God that keeps them saved.

The bumper sticker is correct! Christians are not perfect; they are forgiven—by the grace of God.

As thick as they are down there you wouldn't take long for them to clean you out. We don't have any yet. I poured rubbing alcohol on them, then Betti poured boiling water over them. I sure didn't want any around here. They look like little snakes, when I first saw them. Don't think I ever saw an Army worm. I thought a web worm, they look tough and dark.

Will take something to get rid of them.
Hoyle called last night at 10, she said wish I could see her east porch, there was worms galor and crawling all over the wall.

Now they could clean a patch of wheat or a patch of anything, they are in their grass thick. They are at Elmore's, she said Irene said they were in their wheat, not at the house so far. I heard Perry Helton telling once he had something in his wheat green bug or worms. He tried to get his close neighbors to go with him to close some lady bugs, they would not. Forgot how many he ordered 100 or 1000 more. He turned them out on one side of his wheat, they went through that wheat cleaned it, went on into the neighbors wheat cleaned them out, need something and quick at J.O. and Hoyle's.

We have had grasshoppers. We put out poison bran. One year we had shiny worms pretty thick, they were wooly like with stretch in this wooly hide. The worm that eats our plum blooms looks a lot like this worm. But little lighter in color. Mr. King I think it was said they were army worms. He told Hoyle what would kill them, she cannot stand so many sprays that would kill them.

For Holy and high is our calling, and weak is our faith for the task. But he has the strength we are seeking

and he will gladly share if we ask so lean on his shoulder, dear children new faith and assurance you'll gain. To help you through all of life's trials and comfort through the growing pains..... Glenda Fulton Davis

Saturday morning, wind blowing, sun is out, but that wind is like it is off snow.

Talked to Addie Swift her eye that she had surgery on is doing pretty good, Addie went with Cathy to Wheeler Friday to a garage sale..

Addie went to a ball game at Pampa, Briscoe and Shamrock played bidistrict, I think Shamrock won. She went with Clyde Jr, and Mary Jane, Susie Luttrell went with them.

Tuesday Rosalie visited Mary Hudson, Mae Welch visited Mary Tuesday. Mae fixed the light on Mary's machine.

Mae and Mary went to Wheeler Friday they visited Mattie at the Care Center. Mary was fixing dinner.

Talked to Travis and Rosalie was up town, they did not have news, they were doing ok.

We have a big white and black dog walking around in our yard like he owns it.

Scotty and Susie just came 3 p.m. Saturday.

Jane and Betti shopped in Wheeler Sat. afternoon. Betti said it was a bigger town than she thought it was this was second time Betti had been there, I pester my helpers, I say did you see anyone you know. It would be something to go to a town where I never knew anyone.

Juanell, Christine and Kathy went to see Martha at Bristo, Okla for the weekend.

This cool windy weather maybe it has those army worms hid out. We showed the worms Hoyle brought up here in the jar to Weldon, he said they were army worms, you need to fer-

tilize your yard pour it around your house and out ways, they wont cross fertilizer. I heard Arthur Godfrey say he went to Africa, someone told him take some factory made fertilizer with him or the army ants would eat you up and all your food. So Arthur poured a trail around his camp. Here the army ants came they got to the trail of fertilizer they did not cross, they left.

Don't know if the fertilizer kills them or not. Mr. King at Wheeler told Hoyle what would kill them. Hoyle can't stand this spray. She will have to leave home, someone come help them.

Those army worms out by themselves when you touch them they roll up in a ball, like a cut worm, they look a lot like a cut worm.

There are two local members of the Plemons Shelby Camp. Myself and Thomas Daughtry. Thomas Daughtry is our only true one of the Confederacy. His father was a Confederate Soldier. My great grandfather was a Confederate Soldier. Would you mention our Camp. We meet the last Sunday of each month, usually at 2:30 P.M. at the Central Library in Amarillo. Jim Jordan, 1904 Rogers, Amarillo, TX 79106 is our Commander. You may print part or all of the article as you see fit.

JACK FINSTERWALD

In the June issue of "Texas Highways" we found a most interesting article concerning our area, excerpts from which we quote. "Abraham Finsterwald was a soldier at Fort Elliot, near Mobeetie, Texas, when it was established shortly after the War Between the States, somewhere around 1875. After completing his service at the Fort, he decided to stay in the country, so he established a ranch, which has been a family operation for over one hundred years." His wife was named Sophie they had 3 sons and 4 daughters.

Abraham's oldest son was William Abraham Finsterwald, who was also involved in ranching in the area. We have been very fortunate in securing the following information from his son, Jack Finsterwald, a member of our camp.

"My father was William Abraham Finsterwald. His father was Abraham Finsterwald who emigrated from Switzerland in 1882. Katie married my father's brother, which makes Larry my cousin. My father and his two brothers are dead, but three of their four sisters are still living.

William Abraham joined the US Army in 1883, enlisting for five years and serving at Ft. Elliott. When his enlistment was up in 1883, he decided to stay in Wheeler County. He settled on, and later purchased section 62, which was on a branch of Sweetwater Creek, east of Mobeetie, Texas.

His neighbor to the west was Nicholas Schnell. Abraham married Nicholas' daughter in 1889. Abraham's neighbor to the east was Emanuel Dubbs, who was the first county judge of Wheeler County. Emanuel Dubbs performed the marriage ceremony in the Schnell dugout, which was located near my present home. Abraham was a County Commissioner in Wheeler County, in 1898 when a tornado nearly destroyed Mobeetie. The old jail, which is now a museum, was one of the few buildings not destroyed. It's roof was damaged, and Abraham, who was a carpenter, repaired the roof. In the 1930s Abraham was the President of the First State Bank of Mobeetie.

My mother is Mary Cook Finsterwald. She was born in Indian Territory in 1906. She now lives in Wheeler Texas. Mary's father was Jabez F Cook, also born in Henry Georgia. His father was Elijah S. Cook, also born in Henry County Georgia. Elijah at the age of 14 served in the Civil War for the South. All six of his brothers fought for the Confederacy. Columbus died of wounds, William died of smallpox while a prisoner of war and Jabez died of wounds. My grandfather was named after his uncle, who had died of wounds during the war. The only photo I have of my great-grandfather, shows him wearing the "Cross of Honor."

(We are indebted to Jack Finsterwald of Mobeetie, Texas for this very interesting article. Jack is a long standing member of our Camp. He has informed me that he is terminally ill with cancer and has only a short life expectancy. We will remember Jack in our prayers and hope he gets along good. Jack is a rancher and director of First State Bank of Mobeetie)

Two applications per season are allowed at the rate of 0.075 to 0.1 pounds of active ingredient per acre.

Melinda and Tim Whorton were in Dumas on the weekend to celebrate Tim's mother's birthday.




