Also on Thursday, the school will host an ex-employee "get together". Ex-employees are invited for coffee and doughnuts from 8:00-9:30 A.M. in the cafeteria.

On Thursday night we will have Public Schools Week Open House. Registration will begin at 6:30 P.M. and a program will follow in the auditorium at 7:00. Classroom visitation is scheduled from 7:30 - 8:30. Refreshments will be served in the cafeteria following visitation.

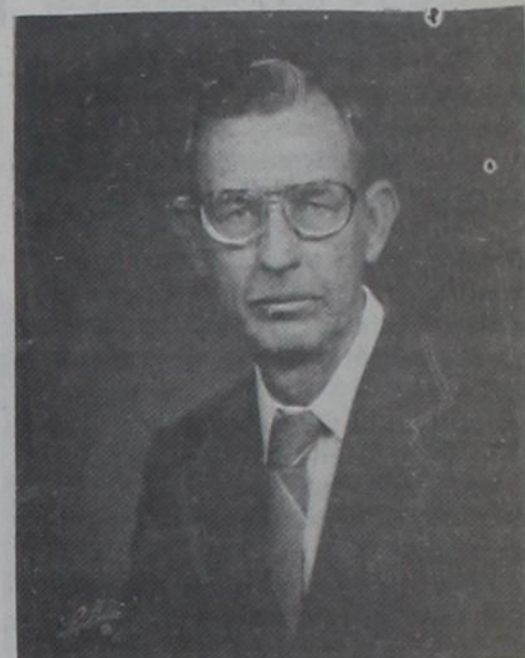

The Lodge is located at 300 S. Main.

Jack Sparlin, Master of the local lodge said an open invitation is extended to anyone interested in learning more about Masonry and what Masons do.

He noted that Fred E. Allen of Mt. Pleasant, Grand Master of the 180,000 member Masonic Grand Lodge of Texas, has defined the intent of the "showcase" open house event as being "to put Masonry on display so anyone interested can see for themselves what Masons do and have a better understanding of what Masonry is all about."

Printed cards will give brief explanations of more significant points of interest about the lodge room, including some of the more prominent symbols utilized in Masonry to teach Masonic philosophy. Ag Lenders Offer Lower Interest

Federal Land Bank Association (FLBA) stockholders with variable rate loans will pay less interest beginning April 1. The new variable interest rate will be 9.75 percent, down from the current 9.95 percent.

This new rate will apply on all variable rate long-term agricultural, rural housing and farm-related business loans, according to Donald R. Rogge, chief executive officer of the Tenth District Farm Credit Bank, which provides loan funds for the local associations.

"This latest reduction continues the downward trend in our interest rates that began last year," Rogge said.

In the past year, the associations' variable interest rate for stockholders' loans in Texas has dropped from 10.25 percent to the 9.75 percent rate effective April 1.

"We are also pleased to report that the bank returned more than \$13.2 million in patronage refunds to associations in Texas in 1990 to help them build financial strength," Rogge said.

The Tenth Farm Credit District is composed of the Farm Credit Bank of Texas, 50 FLBAs in Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and Texas, and 17 Production Credit Associations in New Mexico and Texas. The district has approximately \$3.6 billion in loans outstanding to nearly 60,000 borrowers.

Firefighters Sponsor I.C.S. Training

The Sweetwater Creek Firefighters' Association sponsored an "incident command for Wildfire Suppression" training course on February 15 & 16, 1991 at the fire station in Wheeler, Texas.

The purpose of the incident command system is to improve the safety and efficiency of area firefighting forces in the control of wildfires.

Instructions with the Texas Forest Service (Lufkin, Texas), presenting the twelve hour course were: Bill Terry, Training Coordinator; Mark Stanford, Training Specialist, and Ron Davis, Chief Law Enforcement Agent. Richard Robinson, Contract Trainer, Panhandle, Texas and Ken Daughtry, Wheeler County Fire Marshal, Wheeler, Texas, assisted with the training.

This training course included four hours of lecture on the organization and function of an incident command system and an eight hour workshop which presented two wildfire command scenarios. The command scenarios gave area firefighters an opportunity to practice the communication skills needed when handling large wildfires.

CRP Land Will Need Replanting

By Calvin Devereaux

Grass seeding is on the rise this coming spring, due to freeze damage in December. About 75% of the CRP grasses will need to be replanted this spring. Many of the producers are going back with a native mix. There are some producers, who are considering going back with Weeping Lovegrass. We are leaving the decision up to the producers to what kind of grass to plant. The Soil Conservation Service will provide the technical assistance. The producers who have reported their dead grass to the A.S.C.S. would need to make sure their is a modification made and approved by the A.S.C.S. Committee.

Seeded preparation is a key factor in getting a stand of grass. The alternative for re-establishing grass is as follows: chemical, mechanical, pre-burn or other approved methods. Producers will need to make their mind up on one of the alternatives and then plant their grass. The time is now to plant your CRP grasses!

Weeping lovegrass is adapted to the sandy soils. The seeding rates for lovegrass is 1.5 lbs. pls. Weeping Lovegrass can be planted with or without a covercrop. The seeding date for clean-till lovegrass is 15th of April. The seeding date for planting lovegrass in a covercrop is 15th of March.

Plains Bluestem is adapted to the clayloam soils. The seeding rates for bluestem is 1.8 lbs. pls. Plains bluestem is also planted in a covercrop. The seeding date for planting Plains bluestem is the 1st of December.

Native grasses are adapted to the mixland soils and sandy soils. Native grass would need to be planted in a covercrops. The seeding rates various with each species of grasses. Consult with your local S.C.S. on the native grass mixes.

Deadline to seed grass is June 1! Contact your local S.C.S. office for further information.

"He then explained this answer by saying: "When your feet are so tired you have to shuffle back to the center of the ring, fight one more round. When your arms are so tired that you can hardly lift your hands to come on guard, fight one more round. When your nose is bleeding and your eyes are black and you've so tired you wish your opponent would crack you on the jaw and put you to sleep, fight one more round, remembering that the man who always fights one more round, is never whipped."

Marcus Hardcastle Given Award

Victory was just a grasp away for Marcus Hardcastle, FFA student from Wheeler, Texas during the 2/23 performance of the 1991 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.

In a competition with 27 other eager youths, Marcus Hardcastle came out a winner despite his valiant, yet unsuccessful attempts to catch one of the 14 rambunctious calves. For this effort, the lucky scrambler receives a special "hard luck award" which is given to several scramblers at each rodeo performance for determined perseverance. These winners are chosen by members of the Calf Scramble Committee who watch carefully as the scramblers seek the elusive calves.

The calf certificate entitles Marcus to an \$800 calf purchase certificate sponsored by Sammy Habeeb Investments. This certificate will be used for the purchase of a registered beef or dairy heifer.

The scrambler is required to maintain monthly progress reports, monetary records and a scrapbook detailing the project. His efforts will culminate in 1992 when the heifer will be returned to the Houston Show for a special showing competition with other 1991 scramble winners.

Working along with Marcus on this project will be Terry McCasland his agricultural science teacher agent who will supervise all work with the animal.

John Smallwood, chairman of the all-volunteer Calf Scramble Committee said, "When the opportunity of the scramble presents itself to youth, they should capitalize on it for all that it is worth. This could be the beginning of their future--not only in agriculture, but also in molding their determination."

According to Smallwood 1991 is a special year for the rodeo calf scramble program.

"During one of the mid-schedule performances this year, we will give away our 12,000th calf certificate. This puts the value of our program at well over \$2 million," he said.

The scramble is held during each of the 18 performances of the rodeo which includes professional rodeo action, top-notch performances of the rodeo which includes professional action, top-notch entertainers, chuckwagon races, indoor fireworks and Ben Hur chariot races. In addition, the Houston Show is a charitable organization with all of the proceeds benefiting the youth of Texas in the form of scholarships and research grants.

Parents Are Needed For Exchange Students

American Field Service exchange student program is looking for a hot family for an exchange student this next school year at Wheeler High School.

AFS, the oldest exchange student program, is an international community of students, host families, alumni, and volunteers from more than 40 countries. It was organized in 1947 by ambulance drivers who served in both WWI and WWII and who felt a greater need to strengthen a bond among nations. It began with 52 students, and now nearly 3,000 come to the U.S. annually and many U.S. students and teachers go abroad.

Self-evaluation and home interviews are required of both the host family and visiting student and orientation is conducted. Students are required to be in good health, but AFS carried medical insurance for illness or injuries. The primary expenses are food and family activities. Fifty dollars is deductible per month for income tax purposes.

The progress is open to teachers, also, who want to go abroad or for families who wish to host a foreign teacher for a school year. U.S. students wishing to study abroad must apply by April 1 for the next school year. They can apply for one or two semesters of study or for a summer program. Students must be at least 15 and not yet 19 and must have at least a B minus average or a 2.6 GPA.

Hosting is especially beneficial in opening the eyes of youth to the world beyond their own. It gives us the opportunity to promote world peace and understanding on a one to one basis.

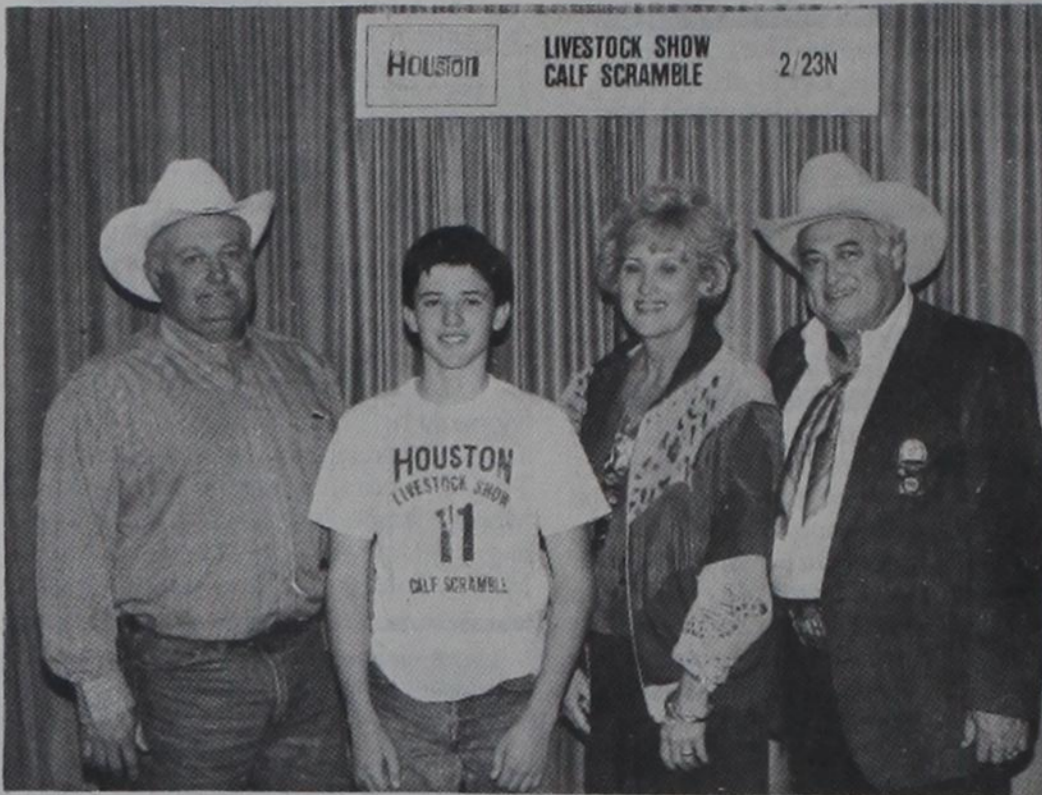

Jason Wood of Elk City is among several talented high school football players scheduled to play in the 1991 K-101 Classic Bowl, which is set for June 1 in Woodward's Boomer Stadium.

The 101 Classic Bowl All-Star football games has quickly become a must-see event for tri-state football fans. This year's game, the third annual, is sponsored by K-101 Classic Bowl Foundation.

Coaches for the West team are Guerry Wright of Laverne, Billy Nichols of Yarbrough and Woody Roof of Weatherford.

Among the 66 players selected are two members of the Associated Press Super Team, six Oklahoma Coaches Association All-State performers and 19 others who earned All-State by class honors.

Elk City's Wood had an outstand-

ing year on the gridiron. Not only did he excel on offense, but he probed he was just as talented on the defensive side of the ball.

He collected 90 tackles for Jim Blevins' Elks, which was the third best on the team. Of those 90 stops, 67 were unassisted. Wood also intercepted five passes and had a fumble recovery.

On offense, he passed for 291 yards and a touchdown; rushed for 120 yards and a score; caught four passes for 81 yards; returned nine punts for 127 yards and a touchdown, and he also returned 23 kicks for an average of 22.8 yards per return.

He was the team's third-leading scorer averaging 2.4 points per game through the 10-game season. Wood was the only player in the top three to play in every Big Elk contest.

Wood will spend a week in Woodward practicing and attending various activities including an awards banquet on Friday night and a downtown parade on Saturday.

enough to get his team the win. The senior scored nine points, but also had five assists and five steals for the Elks.

"We kinda had to," Wood said when asked about playing so hard in overtime. "We had to hit the free throws so we could go on to Area. Everybody thought we were squirrely down the stretch (of the season). But, we beat Clinton pretty good and took care of things."
