FmHA Launching New Assistance Program

The Farmers Home Administration is launching a new program to help local farmers obtain credit from local lenders, according to Neal Sox Johnson, FmHA State Director for Texas. Known as the Interest Assistance Program, it provides strong incentives for commercial lenders to make loans to farmers who otherwise could not qualify.

Under the new program, FmHA will pay up to 4 percentages points of interest for farmers to help them qualify for FmHA guaranteed loans. "If a credit worthy farmer can't cash flow with a guaranteed bank loan at regular interest rates, we can pay part of that interest for him until he can," Johnson said.

The percentage of Interest FmHA will pay depends on the financial condition of the farmer. FmHA will pay only the number of points necessary to help the farmer cash flow with a small reserve.

An FmHA guaranteed loan is made by a bank, PCA, or other lender with an agreement from FmHA that if the loan goes bad, FmHA will compensate the lender for up to 90 percent of its loss. "That guarantee plus the new interest assistance," Johnson said, "should greatly increase availability of farm credit through the private sector."

From the Minister's Desk:

A Passion For Victory is the title of a recently released book about Joe Kerbel, one of the Panhandle's legendary football coaches. The author of this book is Jack "Sleepy" Harris who served for almost twenty years as one of Coach Kerbel's assistant coaches.

In his book, Mr. Harris describes Coach Kerbel as a football genius whose obsession was winning football games. He emphasizes that Coach Kerbel was for twenty years a highly successful high school and college football coach, compiling impressive win/lost records at Cleveland High School in Cleveland, Oklahoma, at Breckenridge High School in Breckenridge, Texas, at Amarillo High School in Amarillo, Texas, and at West Texas State University in Canyon, Texas.

Besides describing Coach Kerbel as a football genius, Mr. Harris also describes him as a demanding perfectionist, saying: "For Joe Kerbel, every opponent should be held scoreless, every season should be all-winning. In his perfect world, there would be nothing but victories, injury-free practices, total dedication on the part of every player, and an endless and unbridled enthusiasm on the part of fans and school officials for what he was attempting to accomplish."

From this description it is obvious that Coach Kerbel did not recognize one of the fundamental characteristics of this world. He did not recognize that it is an imperfect world that is filled with imperfect people, and there are some disciples of Jesus who make

the same mistake.

These disciples strive to be perfect in every aspect of their lives, but they continually fail to meet this self-imposed standard of perfection. For this reason, these disciples are usually angry and bitter people. They are also extremely critical of the imperfections that characterize the lives of other people.

With this demand of perfection upon themselves and upon other people, these disciples fail to recognize an important New Testament truth. The Apostle Paul emphasized this truth in the third chapter of Romans when he quoted from the Old Testament, saying "There is none righteous, not even one..." (Romans 3:10) Since "there is none righteous—" it should be obvious that disciples of Jesus are not expected to be perfect. Rather they are expected to develop a Christ-like character. The New Testament teaches that they are—"to grow up in all aspects into Him, who is the head, even Christ." (Ephesians 3:15)

As disciples of Jesus—"grow up—" into the likeness of Jesus, they will often sin, but they will humbly repent, asking for the forgiveness that God has promised to give them. (1 John 1:8-10) But when disciples of Jesus demand perfection from themselves and other people, they make the same mistake that Coach Kerbel made. They do not recognize that it is an imperfect world that is filled with imperfect people.
