The Wheeler Girls' Golf Team competed at the Phillips Country Club on April 9th for the district championship and finished second behind Booker. As a team the girls shot a 405. Individually Dedra Dorman won second medalist with a score of 93. Dedra and Kristel Pinckard from Booker tied for second, and Dedra won on the second hole of the playoff. Also, Shelly McCasland shot a 96, Mique Snelgrooves had a 103, Shonda Lewallen had a 113, and Sandy Lewallen had a 114. Kristen Smith competed as a medalist and had a 157.

After winning second at district the girls advanced to the regional tournament at the Levelland Country Club. Again the girls finished second behind Booker, which did qualify them to the state tournament. The

The State of Texas requires the following before your child can be enrolled this fall:

1. Birth Certificate—Certified Copy, NOT HOSPITAL COPY.

2. Immunization records verified by a valid clinic or physician.

The Wheeler School requires your child's social security number for accounting and record keeping purposes.

You MUST HAVE these documents in order to enroll your child in the fall. Some of them take time to be processed, so it is a good idea to apply for them immediately.

On the day of visitation please bring just your child's immunization records, so the school nurse can review them. Leave your child's other records at home. Bring all records when you come to enroll your child in the fall.

Mark Marshall Receives Track Award

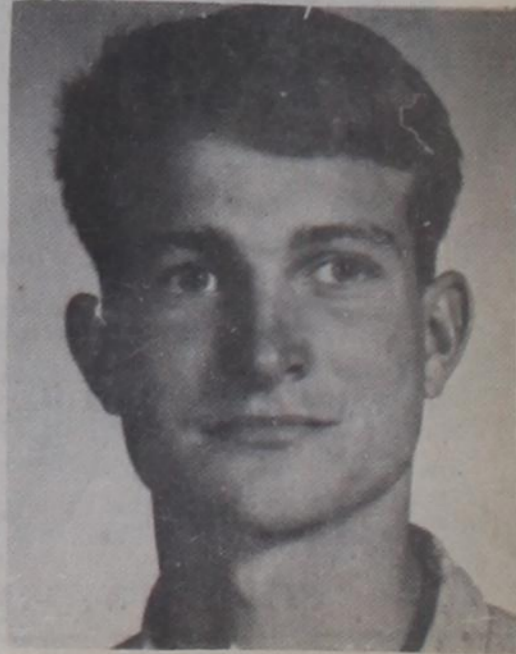

Our kinfolks lived, and still live there, over a hundred years. Mama (my wife) well her father worked on a ranch for the first Governor of New Mexico before he wuz governor.

My great Uncle Jeff, his mother, my great grandmother and all of Uncle Jeff's family moved to Lincoln county N.M. in the 1880's by covered wagon or wagons. They moved across the desert to the Oregon mountains near Las Cruces. There they homesteaded land and later bought land from folks who starved out. They amassed a bunch of land and I mean a lot. One of my cousins told me the sun rose and set rite there on the ranch. Many guests come to the ranch such as President Taft, many well known generals and even that bird, that was one of the governors of N.M. wuz the one that wuz Ben Hur. Pat Garrett came by when he was in the country and even Billy the Kid so you can see they had company. The main reason wuz that Uncle Jeff had a Chinese cook that was the best in the area. His name wuz Chu Lin and he made the best coffee you ever drunk and he could cook all kinds of fine food but everyone enjoyed his coffee.

The country still had Indians of the Apache type. Many raiding Mexicans from across the border and even the elements were tough too. Ranching in those mountains required many cowboys and they too were fond of Chu Lins cookin but teased him about his que that the platted and hung under his little skull cap. These boys had to have fun and loved Chu Lin but had to tease him.

Over the many years at the ranch there were things happening and it became sort of a gathering place for ropings, calf riding and horse racing and naturally Chu Lins cooking sort of made the day complete. He could make tamales better than any Mexican cook and his chili was thought tops. He knew how to make desserts from all the fruits on the ranch and enjoyed it.

Uncle Jeff noticed that Chu Lin was sort of getting a bit restless and he gave him a raise in pay but it didn't help as Uncle thought it would. One day Uncle Jeff found Chu Lin packing his sea bag and he asked him what he was doing and Chu Lin said he was going back to China. He said the cowboys were teasing him about his que continually and he was tired of it. Uncle Jeff finally gathered all the cowboys and threatened to fire them if they didn't apologize for their acts. "Surviving the Recession" Seminar Planned

Economic indicators show the United States economy is officially in a recession. Some sound financial management steps can help you handle the tight money situations usually brought on by recession.

Don't wait for a job layoff, a health emergency, or an impossible mortgage payment to jog you into action. By adopting a few smart money measures, your finances will be easier to manage if your economic situation worsens.

Here are some tips:
*Analyze your financial situation. Calculate the total amount of cash available to you in case of an emergency. Every household needs an emergency fund, preferably equaling three to six months' worth of income. List any amounts you owe and total them so that you can get a picture of your overall debt situation. Track how much you spend for one month and compare to your income. Note what items could be trimmed down if necessary.

*Lower your debts. Pay off a little at a time, and do not continue to charge. As a general rule, monthly payments other than mortgage should total less than 20 percent of take-home pay. If you are feeling over head in regard to debts, consider going to a no-charge credit counseling office for assistance.

*Increase your cash on hand. If your family's emergency fund needs beefing up, try to come up with ways you can add to the total. Make a practice of adding any raises, bonuses, overtime pay, or "extra" money directly to the emergency fund.

The Home Economics Advisory Committee for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will be sponsoring a program "Surviving the Recession" on Monday, May 13, 1991. It will be held at the Wheeler High School Auditorium at 6:30 p.m. Dr. Jerry Mason, a Family Economics professor at Texas Tech University and Specialist for the Extension Service, will be presenting the program. Dr. Mason has taught at Georgia State, Brigham Young and State University of New York. He has written a book journal of publications, and he has made presentations at national conventions. 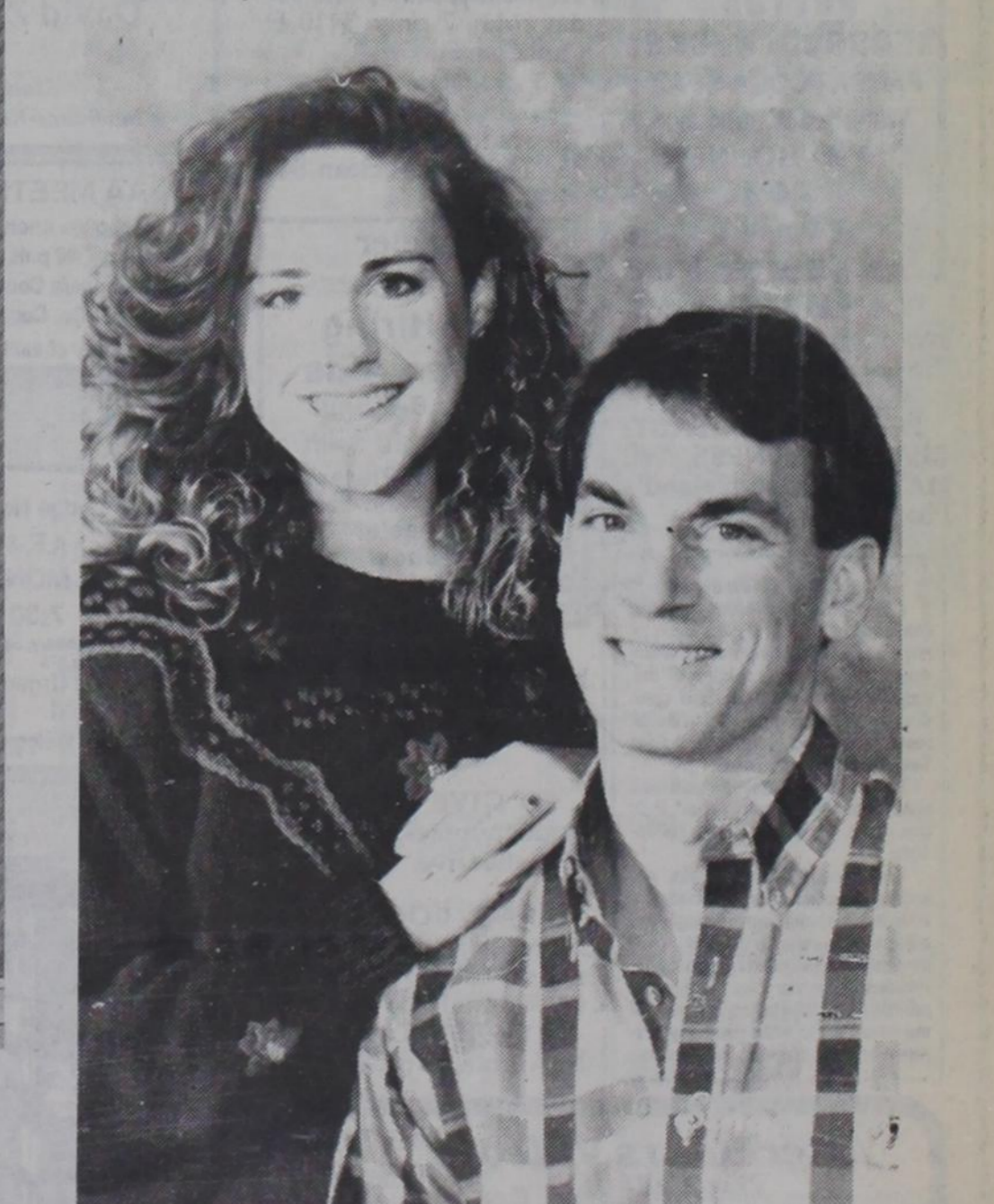


MISTY DAWN SHUGART

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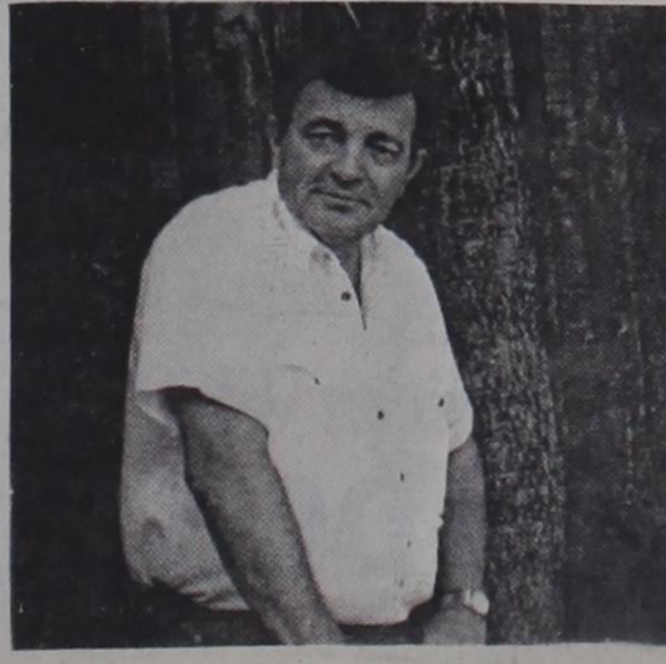

From The Minister's Desk:

If the New Testament was strictly a book of doctrinal instruction, there is, at least, one book that should not be in it. This book is the book of Philemon. This book contains no doctrinal instruction, but it clearly describes the actions of Christianity in the lives of three people—Philemon, Onesimus, and Paul.

Philemon was a wealthy member of the church at Colosse. And like most wealthy men of the first century, Philemon was a slave owner. Onesimus was one of his slaves. He had apparently stolen from Philemon and fled to Rome, trying to lose himself in its crowded streets.

Paul was an apostle who was imprisoned in Rome. He met and converted Onesimus into a disciple of Jesus. Paul then wrote to Philemon, appealing to him to receive Onesimus back, not as a runaway slave, but as a Christian.

This appeal contained several impressive admonitions. For example, The Apostle Paul wrote: "If then you regard me a partner, accept him as you would me. But if he has wronged you in any way, or owes you anything, charge that to my account". (verses 17-18)

Here is a beautiful parallel of what Jesus Christ has done for each of us. All of us have an unpayable debt because we have sinned and fallen. "—short of the glory of God—" (Romans 3:23) And since we are unable to pay the debt of our sins, Jesus assumed the debt.

To provide justification for sins was not an easy or simple problem for God. He had to devise a scheme of justification that was consistent with His nature. God is a just God who will not tolerate sin. And He is a merciful God who does not wish for anyone to perish. (II Peter 3:19) How then can a merciful God save sinful people and still satisfy His justice? It is not unusual to hear people say: "I do not believe that a good God can condemn anyone." But the emphasis of the New Testament is: "How can a just God save anyone?"

This question is answered in the third chapter of Romans. The Apostle Paul wrote: "But now apart from the Law the righteousness of God has been manifested, being witnessed by the Law and the prophets, even the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe; for there is no distinction; for all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God, being justified as a gift by His grace through the redemption which is in Christ Jesus; whom God displayed publicly as a propitiation in His blood through faith. This was to demonstrate His righteousness, because in the forbearance of God He passed over sins previously committed; for the demonstration, I say, of His righteousness at the present time, that He might be just and the Justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus." (Romans 3:21-26)

Notice that the Apostle Paul described Jesus "—as a propitiation—" (verse 25) This word comes from the Greek work, *hilasterion*, which means "an objective provision for pity or mercy". Jesus Christ was God's "—objective provision for pity or mercy". All of us have sinned. The penalty is death. But Jesus Christ took our sins upon Himself, dying in our place. God then accepted the death of Jesus Christ as a payment for the penalty of our sins. And when we accept through an obedient faith this propitiation we "—become the righteousness of God in Him". (II Corinthians 5:20)

It is a common business practice to file paid bills and receipts on a nail. And this is precisely what Jesus Christ has done for each of us. He paid for us a debt that we could not pay. With the record of our deeds, none of us can stand before God. But on the record of Jesus' deeds, all of us, who have an obedient faith in Him, can stand before God.

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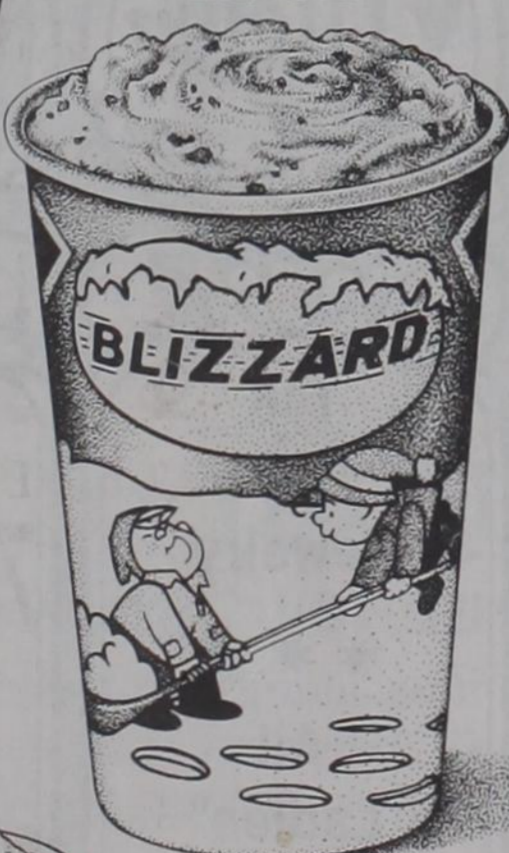
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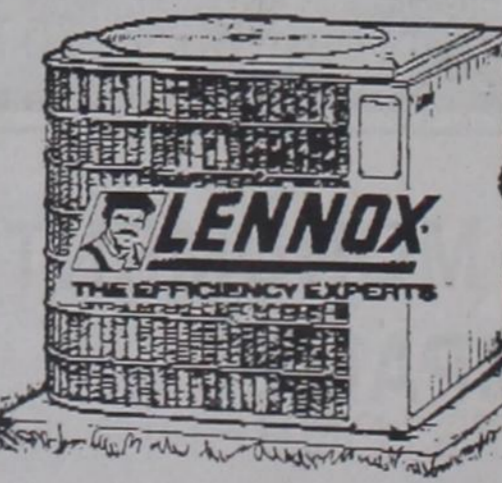

Project Graduation Reasons & Description

Going to high school is a time for growth, decision making and celebration for young people. Unfortunately, many students decide to celebrate by drinking alcohol or using other mind-altering chemicals. Too often, this produces disastrous results.

With help and encouragement, young people can break this "tradition".

Project Celebration was initially developed in Maine, under the title "Project Graduation", as a way to stem the deaths and disabilities associated with drinking, taking drugs and driving. In 1985, 95% of the high schools in Maine hosted successful chemical-free parties.

At the end of the 1983-84 school year, two schools in Texas piloted Project Graduation with great success. At the end of the 1985-86 school year approximately 200 Texas high schools reported that they had hosted successful chemical free celebrations around graduation time. This will be the third year for a successful Chemical Free Graduation Celebration in Wheeler County.

Description of Project Celebration
A statewide Project Celebration campaign spreading through Texas helps youths, parents, schools and communities help themselves. Local planning, organization, promotion and fund raising are necessary to successfully implement this idea. Committees of youths, parents, school personnel and community leaders produce their variations of Project Graduation to tailor ideas to fit their needs.

The primary aim of Project Celebration activities is to reduce the number of young people involved in drug and/or drinking-and-driving accidents. Communities can offer an alternate method of celebrating special occasions. In many communities, a chemical-free party is in stark contrast to a "tradition" of student or parent-sponsored drinking or keg parties. Implementing a local version of Project Celebration will often involve changing many established norms, attitudes and behaviors related to alcohol and other drug use.

A factor in drinking and driving behavior is the lack of accurate information concerning alcohol. Adult and youth drivers have a lack of knowledge in these areas:

Effects of alcohol on teen's driving skills.

Amount of alcohol needed to produce impairment and legal intoxication.

Alcoholic content of various drinks. Time required to oxidize alcohol. Ineffectiveness of popular methods for "Sobering up".

Penalties for drinking and driving offenses.

Nature and effectiveness of chemical tests, and laws relating to their use.

Some parents who sponsor drinking parties for young persons are unaware of their moral and legal responsibilities for the health and safety of their minor guests. Typical excuses parents have offered for serving alcoholic beverages to minors include: "I'd rather have the kids drink here—it's safer."

"It's my kid's turn to have a party

and all her/his friends have had a keg at their parties—it's expected."

"We won't serve hard liquor, just beer."

"All the parents allow it. We don't want our kids to feel different."

"If my kid doesn't drink at home, he'll go somewhere else and do it."

"I'd rather know what's going on."

"High school kids are under a lot of pressure these days. Beer is part of their culture. I want our son/daughter to think of us as friends."

Project Celebration involves establishing a new "tradition" in many communities. Students and adults can learn that it is possible to have a good time at a party without drinking or using drugs. In many Texas communities, the chemical-free party idea has transcended graduation night, and now includes proms, end-of-sport-season parties, and other special activities. John McKay, Director of Texas' War on Drugs, best summarized what is happening in Texas when he said, "The trend is moving away from the tradition of drinking being acceptable. Students who choose not to use (drugs or alcohol) receive support for that decision throughout the year."

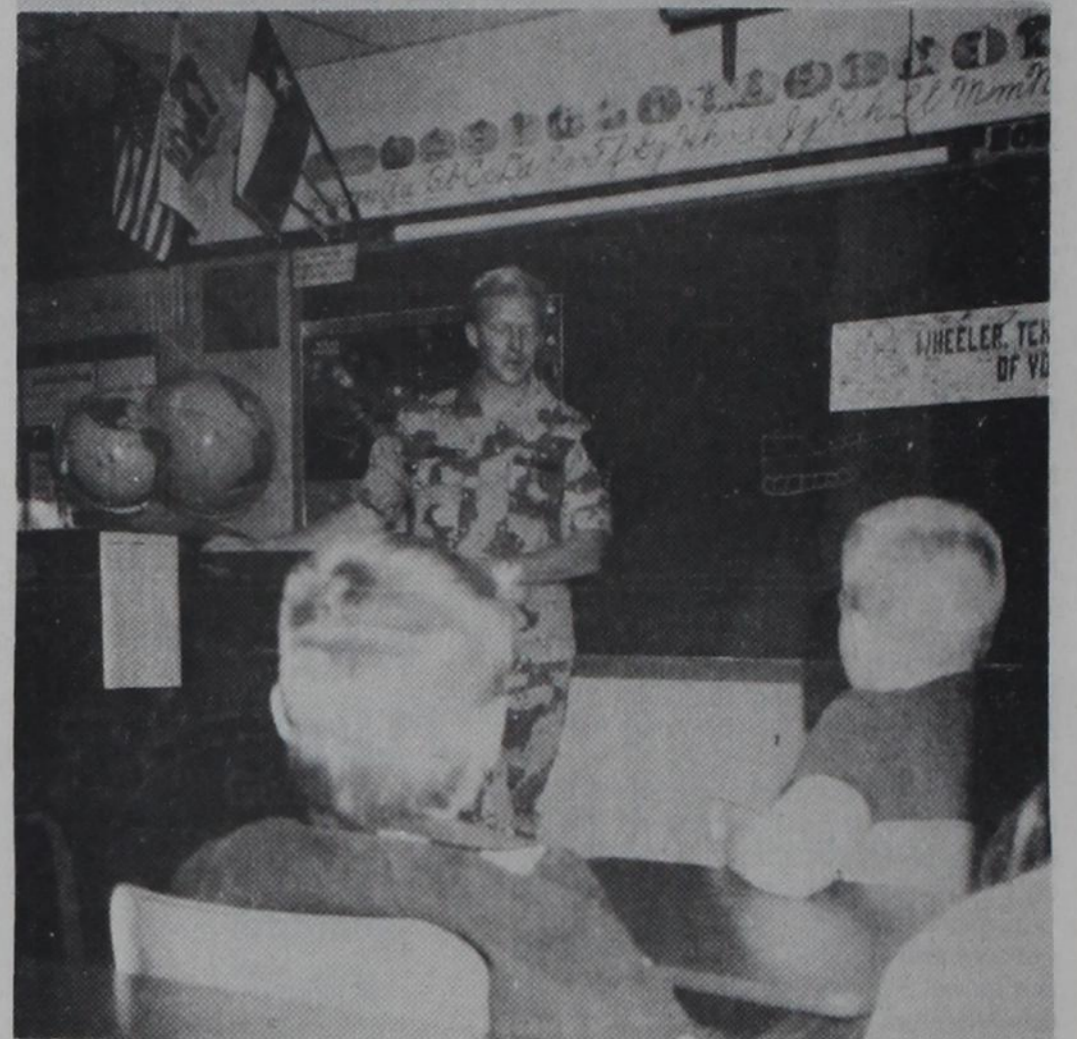

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W.High School Student Schedules

Next year high school students at Wheeler High School are working on their schedules for next year. Each student will select courses they wish to take next year, depending on the type of high school transcript they wish to have. All student shave to have 23 credits to graduate from high school now. It is recommended that a student who has plans to attend college should work toward the advanced high school transcript. For this transcript a student must have 4 units of English, 3 units of math, 2 1/2 units of health, 2 units of P.E., 1 unit of fine arts, 1 unit of computer science, 2 units of a foreign language, and 3 1/2 units of electives. Students working toward the advanced transcript may not take correlated courses. Students who wish to receive a general high school transcript must take 4 units of English, 3 units of math, 2 units of science, 2 1/2 units of social studies, 1/2 unit of economics, 2 units of P.E., 1/2 unit of health, and 8 1/2 units of electives.

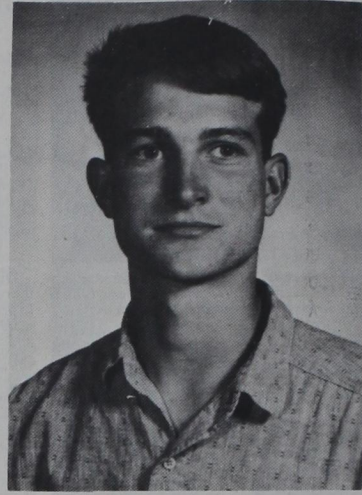
