The most common evidence of financial responsibility is a liability insurance card which is issued by the liability insurance company to the policy holder. Other types of acceptable proof of current insurance include insurance policies, self-insurance or pool coverage documents, binders, and certificates of self-insurance, bond, etc.

The original or a photocopy of the evidence of financial responsibility satisfies the requirement of proof at the time of registration. All original documentation will be returned to the registrant.

NOTE: Proof of financial responsibility is required regardless of whether registration is accomplished in person or by mail.

Proof of financial responsibility is also required to secure and renew driver's license and vehicle inspection.

FINANCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Texas has mandatory automobile liability insurance and has a financial responsibility law that requires a vehicle owner, when involved in an accident in which personal injury, death, or property damage of \$1,000.00 or more occurs, to show proof of his ability to respond to liability for damages when there is a reasonable probability of a judgment in the following amounts:

- (\$20,000.00 because of bodily injury to or death of one person in any one accident,
- (\$40,000.00 because of bodily injury to or death of two or more persons in any one accident, subject to limit of \$20,000.00 for one person, and
- (\$15,000.00 because of injury to or destruction of property of others in any one accident.

New Insurance Law AFFECTING MOTOR VEHICLE REGISTRATION

New Law affecting motor vehicle registration. Effective SEPTEMBER 1, 1991 state law requires current proof of financial responsibility in the minimum amounts indicated on the reverse side at the time motor vehicle registration is:

- Initially issued, — Renewed, and — Transferred.

The original or a photocopy of the evidence of financial responsibility satisfies the requirement of proof at the time of registration. All original documentation will be returned to the registrant.

NOTE: Proof of financial responsibility is required regardless of whether registration is accomplished in person or by mail.

Proof of financial responsibility is also required to secure and renew driver's license and vehicle inspection.

- (\$20,000.00 because of bodily injury to or death of one person in any one accident,
- (\$40,000.00 because of bodily injury to or death of two or more persons in any one accident, subject to limit of \$20,000.00 for one person, and
- (\$15,000.00 because of injury to or destruction of property of others in any one accident.

Weight Loss Surprises Researchers

WASHINGTON -- A nutrition organization was hopeful that a nutritionally complete "hi-tech" food tablet would help erase world hunger problems, until a study revealed that one of the ingredients could cause significant weight loss.

Although other studies and scientists may not agree, researchers in Europe found that the ingredient, a natural plant colloid, actually caused people to lose weight, even though specifically instructed not to alter normal eating patterns, according to one study published in the prestigious *British Journal of Nutrition*. Researchers in an earlier study had speculated that the weight loss was due to a decrease in the intestinal absorption of calories.

While the project of National Dietary Research, aptly named Food Source One, would not be used to successfully fulfill its original goal, the formula which has since been improved with other natural colloids has been a windfall for some overweight people. A Daytona Beach, Florida woman fighting a weight battle for 12 years used the product on the recommendation of her physician and lost 30 pounds. She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

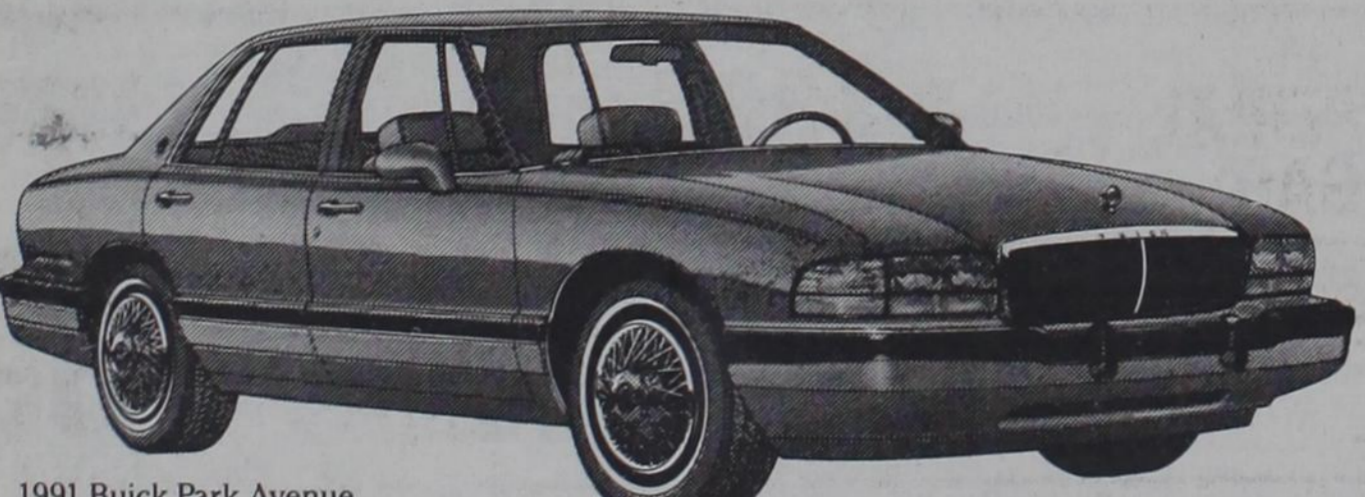

In the sixteenth century, a religious revival that swept across Europe became known as the Reformation Movement. This religious revival was a reaction to some of the religious practices that characterized the sixteenth century world.

While there were several people who encouraged this religious revival, one of the most influential was Martin Luther. On October 31, 1517, he nailed a list of ninety-five statements on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenburg, Germany which openly challenged some of the practices of the sixteenth century church.
One of the practices that Martin Luther challenged was the selling of indulgences. According to this practice, people who made a financial donation to the church were given an indulgence which was a written guarantee that their sins had been forgiven. Martin Luther believed that this practice was Heresy and was he bitterly opposed to it.
I wonder what his reaction would be to the "Health and Wealth" Gospel that some televangelists are now teaching? These televangelists teach that God wants Christians to be healthy and wealthy, emphasizing that these blessings can only be acquired by faith. And these televangelists then suggest that the most appropriate expression of this faith would be to "plant a financial seed" in their ministry.

Martin Luther's reaction to this "health and wealth", gospel, I can be absolutely certain about mine. I believe that it is self-serving thievery which trivializes the greatest truth in the New Testament. This truth is that God sacrificially offered His only begotten Son to provide people with the forgiveness of sin, not with bulging bank accounts and healthy bodies.
This truth is plainly taught in several New Testament texts. For example, Romans 3:23-26 says: "All have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, being justified as a gift by His grace through the redemption which is in Christ Jesus whom God displayed publicly as a propitiation in His blood through faith. This was to demonstrate His righteousness, because in the forbearance of God He passed over the sins previously committed; for the demonstration, I say, of His righteousness at the present time, that He might be just and the justifier of the one who has faith in Jesus."

Notice that this text refers to this forgiveness of sin "—as a gift—". In the sixteenth century, this gift was obscured by the selling of indulgences. And in the twentieth century it has been obscured by the "health and wealth" gospel which is taught by some televangelists, who want to fill their own pockets.

NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$ 15,209 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$ 4,907 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.72/\$100 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Kelton Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of \$.4898/\$100 that will provide \$ 7,636 per student in state and local revenues.
