MUSTANG ADVANCE TO REGIONAL 50-0

The Motley County Matadors got their "you know what's" kicked as the 11-1 Wheeler Mustangs rolled in to the regional round of the playoffs with a

50-0 win, last Friday night in Canyon.

The Mustang offense was almost unstoppable as Wheeler rolled up 465 yards of total offense and 50 points, but the Wheeler defense was every bit as much fun to watch as the Mustangs knocked the daylight out of the Matadors and posted their 6th shut-out of the season.

With the win Wheeler is one of 16 teams remaining in the class A state play-offs and will advance to Regional where the Mustangs will face the Rankin Red Devils Friday night at 7:30 on Lowry field in Lubbock.

After last Friday's game, Motley County players must have felt like they had been in a car wreck, because Wheeler hit them with everything that they had, not even allowing Motley Co. a first down until midway through the 3rd quarter.

It didn't take long for the Mustangs offense to start churning out touchdowns either as Wheeler opened up with an 11 play 61 yard scoring drive on its first possession.

Mack Marshall, Mark Marshall and Nathan Willeford each picked up good yardage as the Mustang offensive line cut down the Matadors to give Wheeler a first and goal at the 2 yd line.

Big Ike Finsterwald powered his way in for the Mustang T.D. and also kicked the PAT. Wheeler led 7-0 and was on their way to a rout.

The defense took over as Isidro Salas, Joe Dan Ledbetter and Mark Marshall led the Mustangs and stopped the Matadors cold on the Matadors next two possessions.

With 1st and 10 from our own 41 yard line Nathan Willeford cut behind a Beryl Brister Block and romped 59 yards for a Wheeler T.D. Sure-footed Ike Finsterwald kicked the PAT. Wheeler 14 - M.C. 0.

This time Brandon Chick, Jason Beers and Chad Harrison led the defensive charge and stuffed the Matadors on three straight plays.

Again the Mustangs were stopped by a fumble at the Motley Co. 19 yard line and the Mustang defense came on

to shut the Matadors down.

Joe Dan Ledbetter batted down a Motley County pass on 3rd down to force a punt.

Jason Beers broke things loose with a 32 yard run. Mack Marshall added 12 more and Chad Dunnam picked up 6 to set up a 21 yd. T.D. run by Willeford. Beers took it in for the two point conversion. Wheeler led 22-0.

Things only got worse for Motley County, as Jason Beers picked off a Matador pass to give the Mustangs field position at the M.C. 21 yard line.

Junior Mark Marshall took off around left end for 21 yards and the T.D. Finsterwald's kick was good. Wheeler 29-0.

Meraz, Salas, Ledbetter and Mack Marshall led a swarming Mustang defense to stop Motley County to set up the longest run of the night for the Mustangs.

On second down from our own 43 yd line Mark Marshall cut and dodged his way 57 yards for a Wheeler T.D. Ike's kick was good for the 36-0 Mustang

lead.

Defensive back Jason Beers put a vicious hit on running back Robert Osborne and the Mustang defense forced the Matadors to give it up again.

Five plays and 48 yards later, Ike Finsterwald lined up at tailback again and hammered it home for an 8 yd. T.D. Finsterwald added the PAT. Wheeler 43—Motley Co. 0.

Finsterwald set up the next Mustang score when he forced a Matador fumble at their own 20 yard line.

On second down and four from the 14 yard line sophomore running back Jason Hink fought his way in for the 14 yard T.D. to end the scoring. Wheeler 50—Motley County 0.

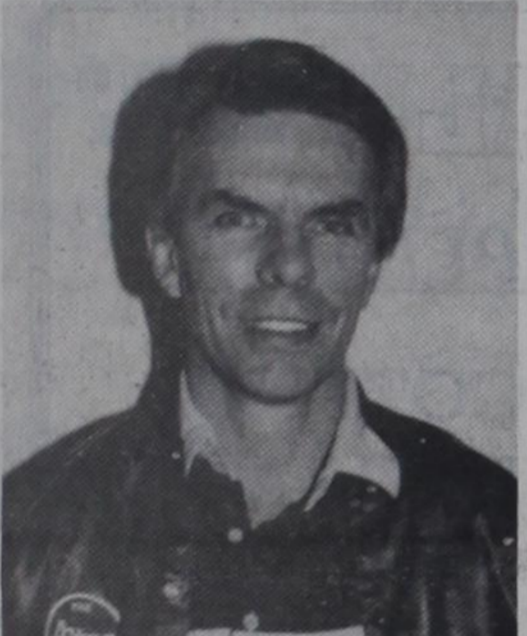

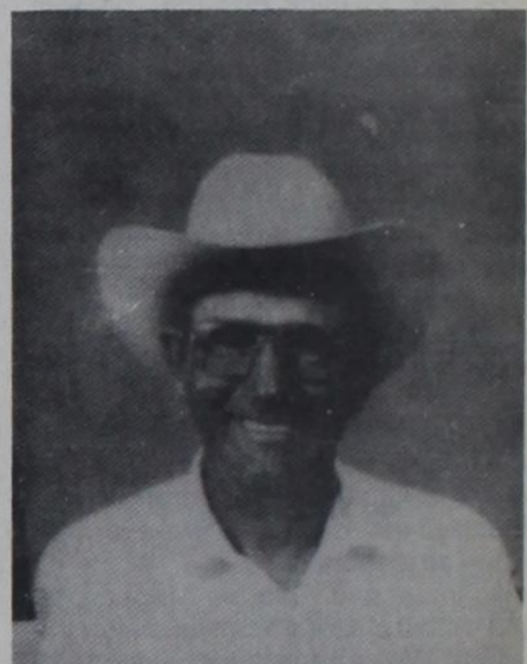

Screening For Breast Cancer To Be Offered

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age.

A clinic will be held in Wheeler on Friday, December 6, 1991, from 10:00 A.M. to 2:30 P.M. at the Parkview Hospital. Exams are done by appointment only. Tears come into my eyes every time I see pictures of that destruction of Pearl Harbor. Many tears were shed about 30 years ago when I sailed across the bay from Honolulu to Pearl Harbor. Across the way was a sea of white crosses, showing the graves of others killed in the blast. Ahead, was a long white Memorial Building floating just above the water where the names of every serviceman who was lost, was printed on the walls. What was it, nearly 3000? Of all the beauty that the Islands has — Pearl Harbor gives a sad portrayal. How do we stand on retribution now? Wouldn't it be nice to think that the present generation, and generations to come (in all nations) could avoid such atrocious incidents?

Postal Service Book Salutes American Veterans

"Mom, I love you and B more than anything in the world," PFC. Wesley Hutto wrote his mother from somewhere in the Gulf. "I am fighting because I willingly joined the Army to defend democracy against all enemies foreign and domestic. Hussein is an enemy of democracy. I must die for his sins." PFC Hutto was the first soldier from Alabama to die in the war.

Hutto's letter is one of 178 letters published Monday—Veteran's Day—in *Letters From the Sand*. The letters of Desert Storm and other wars by the U.S. Postal Service to salute the millions of letters that moved back and forth between America and her soldiers, sailors, marines, coast guardsmen, and airmen serving in the Gulf.

Letters From the Sand is one of the Philatelic books periodically published by the postal service to call attention to American History. In *Letters From the Sand*, which goes on sale at most post offices November 12, there are reproductions of 51 previously issued

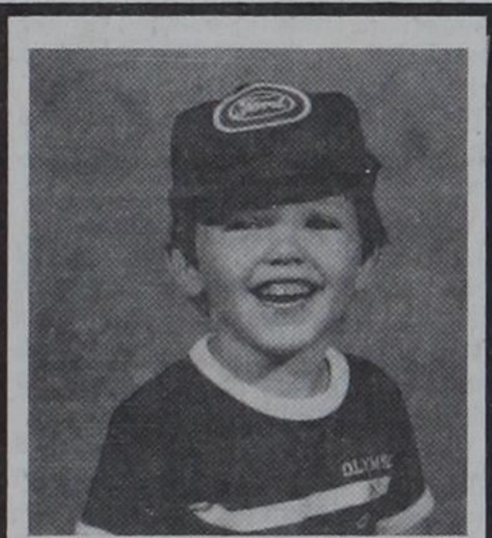
The published letters from Desert Storm and Desert Shield, came as the result of more than 3,000 letters which the postal service receive this spring from family members and armed forces men and women from around the world.

According to Lester "These books would make great Christmas gifts because they not only share a message of patriotism, they also teach history."

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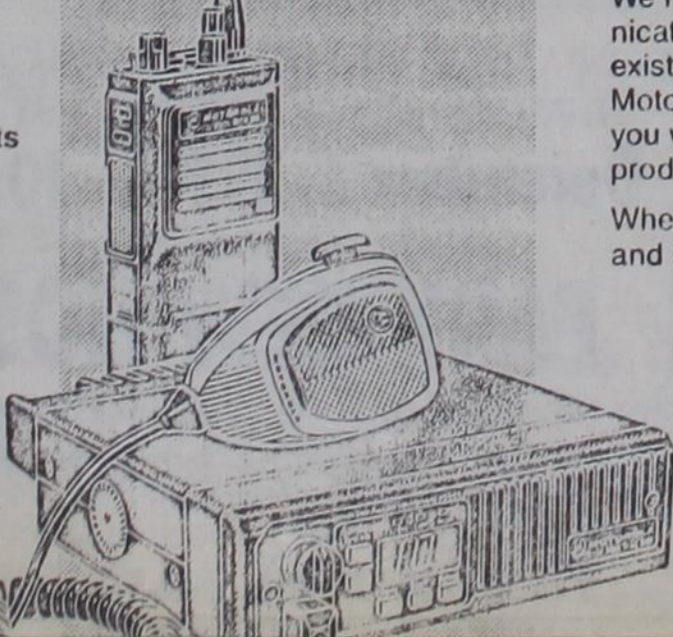

Disposal of Farm & Ranch Waste to be Addressed

What will happen to farm and ranch waste when all of the small local landfills are closed?

What about disposal of used motor oil, chemical cans, tires and batteries from farms and ranches in the area?

What will be done with household wastes from homes outside of town? How do current state and federal regulations on waste disposal affect farmers, ranchers, and rural residents?

According to John Crowell, Coordinator with the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development Area in Pampa, "It is time we address these issues and develop opportunities for farmers and ranchers to dispose of wastes properly and conveniently."

The North Rolling Plains RC&D Council is working with County Extension Agents and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to address this problem.

A rural waste "Task Force" is being formed in the area to discuss the potential problems and search for possible solutions. The first meeting is scheduled in December.

"People who live in cities and town will have dumpsters to dump their trash in and it will be hauled off for them. But what about the families who live outside of town?" asked Crowell. "In these meetings we will discuss ways to make waste disposal available to our neighbors who live in the country."

Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) is a program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service. For more information on RC&D contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Wheeler.

North Rolling Plains District Expanded

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved expansion of the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development project area. Ochiltree and Roberts counties will join Lipscomb, Hemphill, Gray, Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth, Briscoe and Hall counties to make up the ten country project area. The expansion was recently announced by Senator Phil Gramm.

Projects undertaken by the RC&D Council include Soil Conservation work, flood prevention, farm and ranch waste disposal, assistance of rural fire departments, rural health, recreation, and economic development. The RC&D program is administered by the Soil Conservation Service.

According to Fred Allison, District Conservationist with the SCS in Wheeler, "Almost any project that will help rural counties and communities can be planned and coordinated through the RC&D Council."

The purpose of the RC&D program is to help rural communities and counties determine needs, plan projects, and find funding for those projects. Funding can come from Federal, State, private foundation, and local sources. Many projects use a combination of funding from several sources. Low interest, long-term loans through TDA, FmHA, and SBA can also be utilized.

The RC&D Council is made up of representatives from each city, county, and Soil and Water Conservation District sponsor in the ten county area. These sponsors develop an "Area Plan" of projects needed in the ten county area. A board of directors, elected each year, decide what projects get priority.

A project "Coordinator" provides assistance to carry out the approved projects in the ten county area. John Crowell currently serves as the Area Coordinator with an office in Pampa.

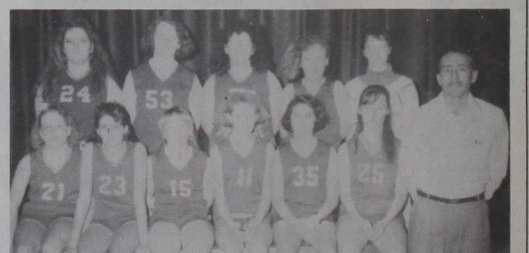
