

Screening For Breast Cancer To Be Offered

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Cancer Council for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination, and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer. The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self

examination every month. 2. Have a physical examination

every year. 3. Have a mammogram according

to the recommendations by age. Age



Postal Service Book Salutes American Veterans

"Mom, I love you and B more than anything in the world," PFC. Wesley Hotto wrote his mother from somewhere in the Gulf. "I am fighting because I willingly joined the Army to defend democracy against all enemies foreign and domestic. Hussein is an enemy of democracy. I must die for his sins." PFC Hotto was the first soldier from Alabama to die in the war.

Hutto's letter is one of 178 letters published Monday — Veteran's Day in Letters From the Sand: The letters of Desert Storm and other wars by the U.S. Postal Service to salute the millions of letters that moved back and forth between America and her soldiers, sailors, marines, coast guardsmen, and airmen serving in the Gulf.

Letters From the Sand is one of the Philatelic books periodically published by the postal service to call attention to American History. In Letters From the Sand, which goes on sale at most post offices November 12, there are reproductions of 51 previously issued







Fire Department Issues Safety Tips

Avert Tragic Losses

The winter months can be harsh. Like many families last winter, a Texas couple worried about staying warm. Both were classified as legally blind, yet they relied on a small gas heater to warm their home. One evening in January, the 66-year-old woman tried to light the heater as she had on many nights. She turned on the gas, then threw lighted matches at the heater as she listened for the distinctive "whoosh" that said the fire had ignited.

Unfortunately, on that evening, the fire flared and caught her clothes on fire. her wheelchair-bound husband couldn't tell what was happening. The woman managed to dial 9-1-1, but then panicked and ran out in the front yard. She died of burns, becoming one of 23 Texans who died in heatingrelated fires during 1990.

From now through February, Texans will try to stay warm by using various types of heating equipment in their homes. Unfortunately, many will discover that improperly used heaters can cause property damage, injuries and even death.

"Each year, the number of reported fire deaths increases during December, January and February," said State Fire Marshall Ernest A. Emerson. "Much of this loss is related to the misuse of heaters, and the unfortunate fact is that many, if not most, of those fires can be prevented."

Statistics on fires are gathered through the Texas Fire Incident Reporting System (TEXFIRS), a standardized reporting program coordinated by the State Fire Marshall's Office through which more than 320 fire departments in Texas report fire incidents. Emerson said that according to TEXFIRS statistics for 1990, the misuse of heating equipment ranked as the third leading cause of residential fires. Atotal of 1,756 fires were caused by heating equipment, resulting in more than \$14 million in property damage. At least 110 persons were injured in these fires.

He described six fatal fires to illustrate the hazards most commonly associated with heating equipment. "In none of these fires were smoke alarms present in the home," he added. "Perhaps some of them could have been saved if a smoke alarm had been there to warn of the fire, especially since about two-thirds of these fires occurred during the night or when someone was sleeping.

Safe Practices With Heaters Can when clothing was left too close to a portable gas heater. The 20-year-old woman tried to escape with an infant girl when they were overcome by the

fire. An infant boy died of asphyxia. *A portable heater is placed too close to combustible items, especially beds and furniture. An infant died when a portable electric heater was placed too close to an upholstered chair. The fire occurred just after noon, but adults in the home were not warned of the fire because there were no smoke detectors. The infant died of asphyxia; his 2-year-old sister also suffered injuries from smoke inhala-

*Clothing catches fire when the person comes too close to the heater. A 30-year-old man who was intoxicated was sleeping too close to a portable electric heater when his clothes contacted the heater. His clothing caught fire, and he died of burns and asphyxia.







What will happen to farm and ranch waste when all of the small local landfills are closed?

What about disposal of used motor oil, chemical cans, tires and batteries from farms and ranches in the area?

What will be done with household wastes from homes outside of town? How do current state and federal regulations on waste disposal affect farmers, ranchers, and rural resi-

According to John Crowell, Coordinator with the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development Area in Pampa, "It is time we address these issues and develop opportunities for farmers and ranchers to dispose of wastes properly and conveniently.

The North Rolling Plains RC&D Council is working with County Extension Agents and the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to address this problem.

A rural waste "Task Force" is being formed in the area to discuss the potential problems and search for possible solutions. The first meeting is scheduled in December.

"People who live in cities and town will have dumpsters to dump their trash in and it will be hauled off for them. But what about the families who live outside of town?" asked Crowell. "In these meetings we will discuss ways to make waste disposal available to our neighbors who live in the country."

Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) is a program of the U.S. Department of Agriculture Soil Conservation Service. For more information on RC&D contact the Soil Conservation Service office in Wheeler.

North Rolling Plains District Expanded

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved expansion of the North Rolling Plains Resource Conservation and Development project area. Ochiltree and Roberts counties will join Lipscomb, Hemphill, Gray, Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth, Briscoe and Hall counties to make up the ten country project area. The expansion was recently announced by Senator Phil Gramm.

Projects undertaken by the RC&D Council include Soil Conservation work, flood prevention, farm and ranch waste disposal, assistance of rural fire departments, rural health, recreation, and economic development. The RC&D program is administered by the Soil Conservation Service.

According to Fred Allison, District Conservationist with the SCS in Wheeler, "Almost any project that will help rural counties and communities can be planned and coordinated through the RC&D Council."

The purpose of the RC&D program is to help rural communities and counties determine needs, plan projects, and find funding for those projects. Funding can come from Federal, State, private foundation, and local sources. Many projects use a combination of funding from several sources. Low interest, long-term loans through TDA, FmHA, and SBA can also be utilized.

The RC&D Council is made up of representatives from each city, county, and Soil and Water Conservation District sponsor in the ten county area. These sponsors develop an "Area Plan" of projects needed in the ten county area. A board of directors, elected each year, decide what projects get

A project "Coordinator" provides assistance to carry out the approved projects in the ten county area. John Crowell currently serves as the area coordinator with an office in Pampa.

FmHA Continues Reviewing Portfolios

The U.S. Department of Agriculture 11-18 (USDA) Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) continues to review its portfolio for possible graduation of bor- 11-19 rowers to private credit as mandated 11-20 by Congress, Neal Sox Johnson, 11-21 FmHA State Director in Temple, announced today.

The FmHA credit programs are administered in a manner that will assure that they do not supplant or 11-19 compete with credit available to farmers, rural families, rural commu- 11-20 nities and cities from other reliable credit sources. The law requires that FmHA borrowers should graduate to other credit on reasonable rates and 11-21 terms when they are able to do so.

FmHA, as the lending arm of the 11-22 U.S. Government, has long been a 11-23 source of credit for farmers, ranchers, 11-24 rural homemakers, and rural areas who have been unable to obtain credit through commercial lenders such as banks, savings, and loans, Production Credit Associations and Federal Land Banks. Farmers Home Administration has attempted to aid those borrowers as a "Lender of Last Resort", Johnson

Nationwide, and on annual basis, FmHA revises its loan portfolio to determine those borrowers who have progressed to the point that they no longer need government assistance to obtain credit. This annual review is currently being conducted by local Farmers Home Administration offices. FmHA borrowers all areas may be contacted to furnish information on FmHA loans to these lenders.

The mission of the Farmers Home Administration loan program is that of "Temporary sources of supervised credit in modest amounts" to those who are unable to obtain credit else-
