> The Wheeler Mustangs ran their record to 6 and 0 and picked up their first district win as they spoiled Gruver's homecoming 48-0 last Friday night. The Mustang defense was domi-

The 1991 Homecoming game was nating, holding Gruver to 5 yards total offense for the game.

> Wheeler posted its fourth shut-out of the season and the "Black Death" defense hasn't allowed a score in the last 21 guarters of football.

On offense, the Mustangs rolled up 357 yards and 22 first downs as Wheeler ripped Gruver for 48 points.

Early in the game, Gruver came out in a different defense than they had shown all year, to shut the Mustangs down on their first possession.

Head Coach Ronnie Karcher changed the Mustang offensive blocking scheme and Gruver was never able to control the Mustangs again.

On the Mustangs second posses-sion, QB Jason Beers found end Brandon Chick for a 36 yard pass to the Greyhounds 10 yard line.

Two plays later Junior Mark Marshall sprinted 10 yards for the T.D. Ike Finsterwald added the extra point and the Mustangs were on top 7-0.

Gruver took over after the kickoff and quickly connected on their only big gainer of the night, a 38 yard pass play to the Wheeler 36 yard line.

The Mustang defense stiffened as Isidro Salas dropped a Greyhound runner for -6 yards, and Genaro Meraz sacked Gruver QB Matthew Hoel for another -6 yards.

Gruver was forced to punt, but the ball hit one of the Greyhounds at the line of scrimmage and Wheeler took over at the Gruver 48.

Behind some big holes provided by the Mustang offensive line, Wheeler took the ball down to the Gruver 29 yard line in 4 plays.

Senior Fullback Mack Marshall hit the hole on an inside trap play and rambled 29 yards for the touchdown. Ike Finsterwald 's kick was true. Wheeler 14, Gruver 0.

Brandon Chick and Jason Beers combined to break up Greyhound pass plays and Genaro Meraz stuffed a Greyhound runner for a loss to force Gruver's next punt.

Wheeler took over at its own 44 yard line. on the first play from scrimmage, Junior Mark Marshall ran off right tackle, cutting behind a Jimmy Winter block, and went all the way, 56

Wheeler mixed it up, with runs by Mark Marshall, Nathan Willeford and Joe Dan Ledbetter on a 7 play 56 yard scoring drive. Fullback Mack Marshall plowed in from 4 yards out for the TD Finsterwald's kick was good. Wheeler 27, Gruver 0. Gruver took over again. Local Crime Stoppers Proposed

Wheeler County Sheriff Jimmy Adams and Shamrock Police Chief Art Taylor are jointly working to establish a Wheeler County Crime Stoppers Association.

According to Adams, the effort is being made to cover the entire county including those persons living in rural areas.

When a criminal case is not solved within a reasonable length of time the leads diminish, the trail becomes cold, evidence becomes unattainable, and the crime becomes increasingly more difficult to solve. For these reasons most police department files contain many unsolved cases. When this occurs a method is needed that will reawaken public interest in the case and also could lead to the solution of the crime

The Crime Stoppers program provides a method of overcoming these limitations by involving the citizens in the solution of felony crimes. Through the Crime Stoppers program, citizens who have knowledge of a specific crime are encouraged, either for civic or monetary reasons, to come forward to the police with this information. The program allows any citizen coming forward with information to remain All A's and B's; Stacey Guenther completely anonymous, if they so desire. In this way information relayed will be utilized. There are approximatley 192 local Crime Stoppers programs operating in the State of Texas, and county wide programs are being developed in areas where no single agency has sufficient manpower and finances to support the program. Local Crime Stoppers programs are established as non profit corporations by applying for a charter under Texas law. Such status enables contributions made to the program eligible for treatment as charitable contributions by their donors on their federal income tax returns. A police officer is designated by the

participating law enforcement agency to the local Crime Stoppers program as the police coordinator. He is responsible for overseeing the day to day operation of the program and also serves as a liaison between the Board of Directors and the news media.

A civilian Board of Directors, composed of 15 to 25 members broadly representative of the community, oversees the general operation of the program and administers the fund received through public contributions. The Board may perform all or part of the following duties: set the policies which create and control the program, raise funds to pay rewards and cover administrative costs, determine the amount and method of reward payments, oversee the administrative work of the police coordinator and act as the trustee of the funds contributed by citizens, businesses, and serving groups. One of the members, generally the treasurer, is designated to make payments to informers.

As the majority of information received by the program is viatelephone, most Crime Stopper programs obtain an easy to remember phone number. Each caller is assigned a code number and this number is used in all subsequent transactions with the informant. Absolutely no pressure is placed on the informant to reveal his identity, as one of the key elements to the program is anonymity. This information is then relayed both by telephone and in writing by Crime Stoppers personnel to the investigating unit handling the case. If the information leads to the arrest and indictment of an offender, the informant is eligible for a reward. The Board of Directors determines the exact amount of the reward to be paid based on the police coordinator's recommendations, the type of case, the value of the information, the amount of property recovered, and the number of cases solved as a result of the information.

Area Grain Sorghum Harvest Underway

Nearly 8,000 acres of grain sorghum are enrolled in the farm program in Wheeler County for 1991. Several hundred additional sorghum acres are planted on non participating farms or on FLEX acres which are not eligible for price support. The farm program is administered by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Wheeler County farmers have received \$58,097 in advanced deficiency payments from ASCS. The final payments will be made in April of 1991.

ASCS has announced that the set aside requirement for the 1992 program will be 5% of the sorghum base. An additional 15% of the base must be devoted to FLEX acres that can be planted to sorghum but will not receive price support payments. Participation in the farm program is voluntary.
