Additional Information Fun Run; 7:30 At Track

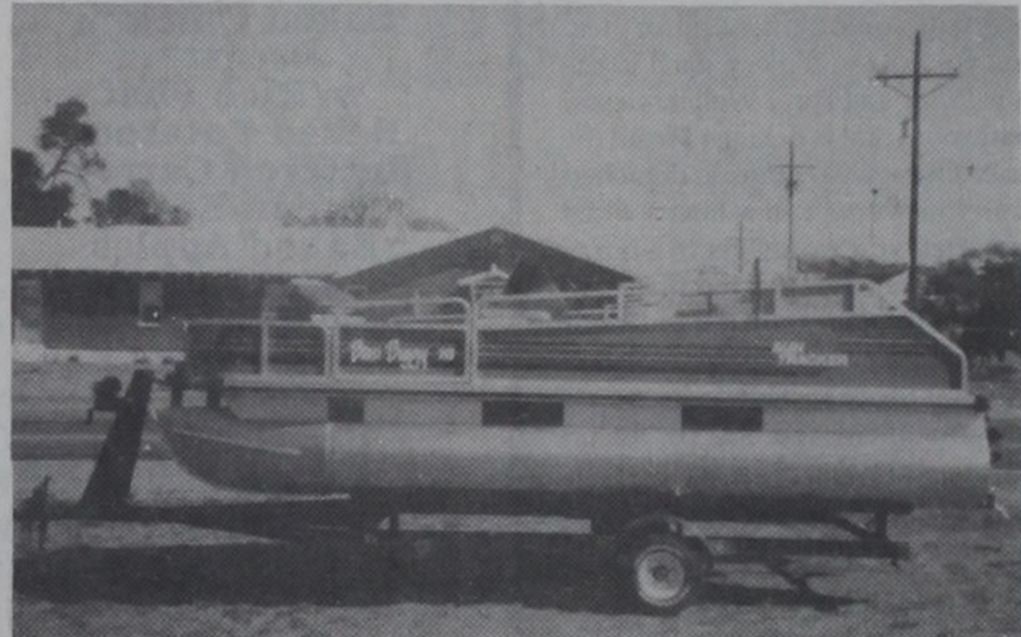

CRP Producers Urged To Control Weeds

Attention to all CRP Producers it's that time of year again to control weeds in your CRP fields. In the past few weeks we have gotten a lot of rain. The rain has been a welcome addition to many of the areas in Wheeler County. There is a draw back for too much rain, for instance is the abundance of weeds that occur in the CRP fields. Weeds will definitely need to be controlled. If a producer refused to control weeds on his CRP grass he could be fined or CRP contract could be terminated.

Weeds has a tremendous effect on a newly seeded grass. Many CRP producers don't take the weed problems serious enough. When a field is heavy infested with a lot of weeds it sap up moisture from the soil in which stress the grass plant and it also shade out sunlight which cut off plant food chain. Weed control should be top priority in getting a stand of grass.

It would be to CRP producer advantage to go ahead and spray weeds. This summer A.S.C.S. will be monitoring weeds very carefully. Producers who are not sure on the status of their weed control will need to get in touch with the A.S.C.S. WEED CONTROL WILL BE ENFORCED!

Editor of The Wheeler Times:
Actually this is a **Public Letter of Concern To All Parents of Teenagers** and to **All Members of the Town Council.**

People, whether you are aware or not, our youth here in town are getting into trouble on a weekly basis. To give you an example, nearly a year ago, Boyd Kennedy was pronounced dead following an accident involving a youth, dragging main. Also, this past Saturday night, June 29, 1991, a youth was hit by a truck on main street by an unlicensed driver. While dragging Main. Also there has been break-ins, vandalism, you name it, and it is happening in our town.

So I am asking in this public letter to all parents and town council members: not to close their eyes on this matter. Please, I am asking you once again not to close your eyes on this matter. But I am asking you as parents for us all to get together and give our Kids something to do. This way we know what our kids are doing.

Please let me explain:
#1. It hasn't been that many years ago when we at least had a theater here in town, where my family and many others enjoyed going to the show. And believe it or not, our youth pretty much stayed out of trouble. Then, what happened? The theater was closed down and it gave the people of Wheeler nothing at all to do.

John Wesley Visits Tulia Meth. Church

(EDITOR'S NOTE: The following article was taken from the The Tulia (Swisher County) Herald.

On Sunday, May 26, the morning worship service at First Methodist Church was interrupted by a loud voice just as Rev. Ernest McLaughlin began his sermon. A peculiarly dressed gentleman in a powdered English wig came down the aisle claiming to be the Rev. John Wesley, founder of Methodism, and represented himself as simply making one of his Methodist "Societies". The dialogue that followed was at the same time humorous, informative and convicting.

"Our Mr. Wesley was in real life Mr. Bill Vance, a retired airline captain from Bedford, Tex.," explained a church spokesperson.

His first appearance as "John Wesley" was the annual meeting of the Metropolitan Board of Missions of Ft. Worth in 1975. Since that time "John Wesley" has appeared in over 400 churches, conferences, and seminars all over the nation to an estimated 100,000 people, including the South Central Jurisdictional Conference in 1976, 1980 and the Pacific-Southwest Conference in 1984. In 1988 he presented "John Wesley" in Central Hall United Methodist Church in Londa, England, as a part of the 250th anniversary celebration of Wesley's Aldersgate Experience.

The flying part of Vance's career began with the US Air Force in 1949. Commissioned as a second lieutenant in 1950, he served on active duty for four years, then transferred to the Ready Reserve. He retired in 1977 with the rank of lieutenant colonel. He joined Frontier Airlines (then Central Airlines) in 1954 and retired in March 1983 as a captain flying both the Boeing 737 and the Douglas DC 9-80.

His wife, Lee, is a diaconal minister in Education in the United Methodist Church and they have four children. In addition to her own duties in the church, she assists her husband.

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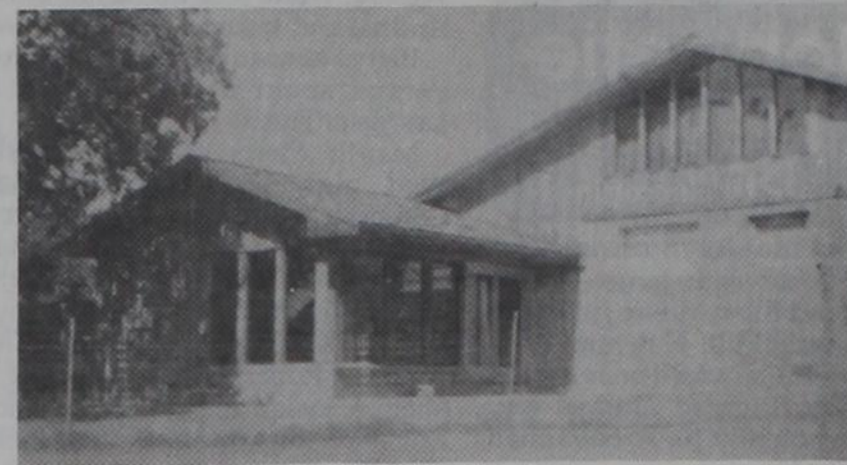

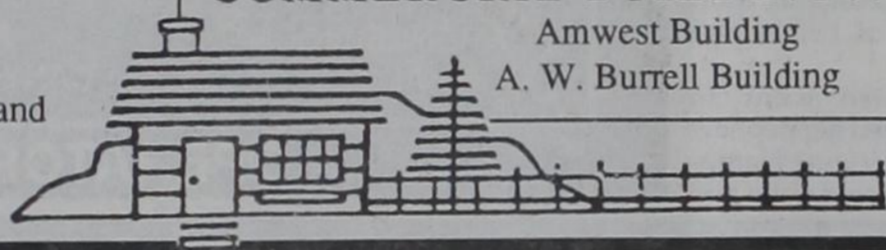

From The Minister's Desk:
In His ministry, Jesus directed His harshest teaching at religious people who were self-righteous. For example, the eighteenth chapter of Luke records a parable that Jesus told which drew a harsh comparison between a self-righteous Pharisee and a sinful tax-gatherer.

This parable reads: "Two men went up into the temple to pray, one a Pharisee, and the other a tax-gatherer. The Pharisee stood and was praying thus to himself, 'God, I thank Thee that I am not like other people: swindlers, unjust adulterers, or even like the tax-gatherer. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes of all that I get. But the tax-gatherer, standing some distance away, was even unwilling to lift up his eyes to heaven, but was beating his breast, saying, God be merciful to me, the sinner! I tell you, this man went down to his house justified rather than the other; for everyone who exalts himself shall be humbled, but he who humbles himself shall be exalted.'" (verses 10-14)

This Pharisee who prayed, "God, I thank Thee that I am not like other people—", was probably a better person than the tax-gatherer. Yet Jesus said that the tax-gatherer "went down to his house justified—" rather the Pharisee. But why? The righteousness of the Pharisee's life was nullified by his self-righteousness.

Notice that Luke reports that Jesus told this parable—"to certain ones who trusted in themselves that they were righteous and viewed others with contempt—" (Luke 18:9) These two characteristics—self-righteousness and contemptuousness—are closely akin because self-righteous people always alienate themselves from other people by their arrogance. Such a person was the Pharisee. But consider the tax-gatherer. He does not boast of a sinless life. He does not thank God that he is better than anyone. He merely confesses his sinfulness and asks for mercy. And Jesus says:—"This man went down to his house justified rather than the other for everyone who exalts himself shall be humbled, but he who humbles himself shall be exalted." (Luke 18-14)

There was a sharp contrast between these two men. The Pharisee, who had had many righteous qualities in his life, was not justified because of his arrogance and pride. But the tax-gatherer was justified because he openly acknowledged his sins. The lesson is obvious. Self-righteousness can destroy the effectiveness of a righteous life and the penitence of a sinful life can secure the forgiveness of God.

It is a lesson that Bible believers should learn. It is possible for them to fill their lives with many righteous deeds, but because of self-righteousness they can be unjustified, regardless of how righteous their lives may be, a truly righteous people will always pray: "God, be merciful to me the sinner."

Now with the long hot Texas summer ahead, how much fluid should be consumed during exercise is a question many consumers ask. Drinking adequate amounts of fluid such as water, fruit juice, or low-fat milk before and during exercise is absolutely crucial to top athletic performance and health. Water's most important function is its role of maintaining normal body temperature and cooling working muscles. Without enough water, the body dehydrates—which can lead to heat exhaustion or heat stroke. Sweating will cause the loss of more fluids that cannot be fully replaced by drinking liquids—so drink enough water frequently.

Kelton Methodist Observe 50 Years

The Kelton Methodist Church celebrated 50 years of ministry to God and the Kelton Community, Sunday, June 9. Over 90 members, former members and visitors attended the last worship service to be held in the church.

Much of the original materials came from an old house in Texola, Oklahoma, that was being torn down. Most of the work was done by the men of the church with some supervision from a carpenter.

On April 6, 1941, the first service was held in the new church by Rev. Palmer. Seventy-sox attended Sunday School that morning in classrooms partitioned off by curtains in each corner of the sanctuary. In the late 40's classes were added on the east and the sanctuary was remodeled in the early 50's. It is the same as it was then except for paneling that was added later. A parsonage was also built about 1953 for the new full-time pastor, Bruce Parks. In the 40's and 50's attendance was approximately 45-50 people each Sunday or more, but by the early 60's a serious decline began as people began leaving the farms. In the late 70's the church pur-
