From The Minister's Desk:

Have you heard about the two Bible students who were arguing about the translation of the Bible that people should study? After several minutes of heated discussion, one of these students said: "If the King James Version was good enough for the Apostle Paul, it is good enough for me."

Since the publication of the King James Version in 1611, many people have had the attitude of this Bible student. These people sincerely believe that the King James Version is "the Bible". For this reason, they seriously question the reliability of other translations of the Bible question the reliability of other translations of the Bible which are available to serious Bible students.

While the King James Version is an extremely reliable translation, it is not, in my opinion, the only reliable translation of the Bible. To identify these other reliable translations, it is necessary to pinpoint two characteristics that a reliable translation should have. These two characteristics are:—

1. **Accuracy.** To be a reliable translation of the Bible, a translation must accurately reproduce the original text. For this reason, a reliable translation must be based upon an accurately reconstructed Greek and Hebrew text. But how can a Bible student know if a translation is based upon an accurately reconstructed Greek and Hebrew text?

In the preface of most translations, there is information about the Greek and Hebrew text that was used by the translators. For example, in the preface of the **New American Standard Version**, the translators described the Greek text that they used by saying: "Consideration was given to the latest available manuscripts with a view to determining the best Greek text. In most instances the twenty-third edition of Nestle's Greek New Testament was followed. These translators then described the Hebrew text that they used by saying: "In the present translation the latest edition of Rudolph Kittel's *Biblia Hebraica* has been employed together with most recent light from lexicography, cognate languages, and the Dead Sea Scrolls."

A reliable translation is an accurate translation, and such a translation is based upon an accurately

reconstructed Greek and Hebrew text.

2. **Literal philosophy.** There are two philosophies that translators can use to translate the Bible. These two philosophies are the literal philosophy and the paraphrase philosophy.

With the paraphrase philosophy, translators simply determine the idea of the text and then translate this idea into contemporary English. But while these translations are extremely readable, they often contain passages that reflect the personal interpretation of the translators.

Perhaps the best example of such a translation is **The Living Bible** which was translated by Mr. Kenneth Taylor. In the preface of this translation, Mr. Taylor candidly admits that his translation was influenced by his personal interpretation of the text, saying:—"Whenever the author's exact words are not translated from the original languages, there is a possibility that the translator, however honest, may be giving the English reader something that the original writer did not mean to say. This is because a paraphrase is guided not only by the translator's skill in simplifying but also by the clarity of his understanding of what the author meant and by his theology."

But translators should not be guided by their theology. Rather they should be guided by their desire to produce a reliable translation of the Bible, reproducing accurately the original text. For this reason, translations that have a literal philosophy are more reliable than those translations that have a paraphrase philosophy.

With the literal philosophy, translators simply try to translate word-for-word from the Greek and Hebrew texts into English. While such translations of the Bible are extremely accurate, most of them are difficult to read. But to be a reliable translation, accuracy must always be given precedence over readability.

The King James Version is not "the Bible". Rather "the Bible" is any translation that has a literal philosophy, rendering accurately the original text into readable and understandable English.

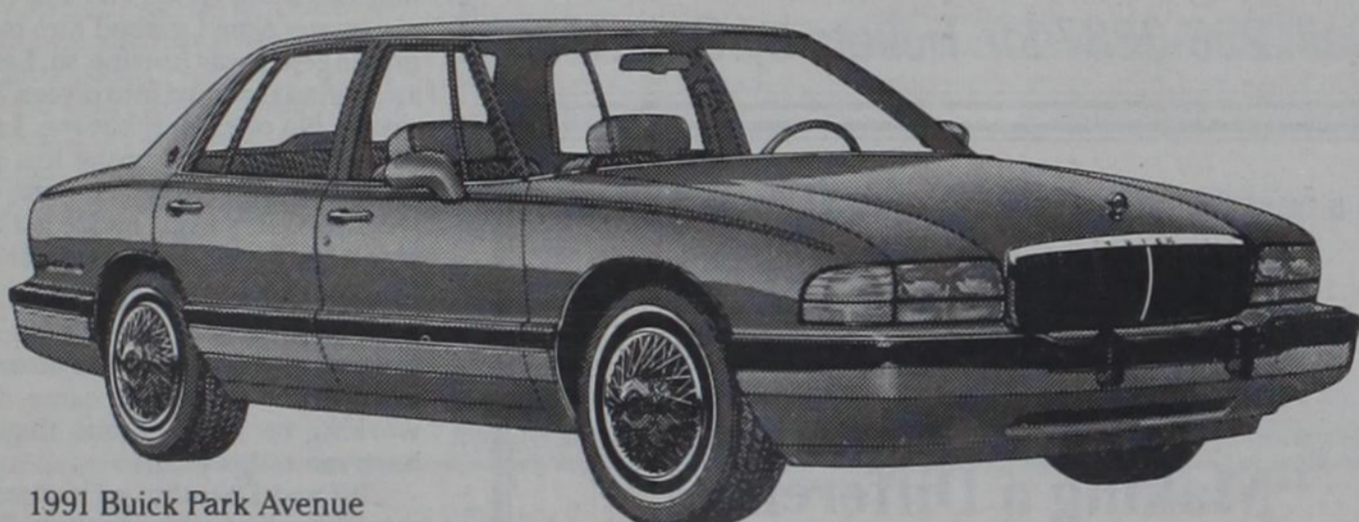
