Nellie Lackey and several of her family members enjoyed a visit in the lobby Monday afternoon.


I wonder if it pays to go on vacation. The paper work is still where you left it when you return. Well I guess maybe you can just look at it in a different light. That helps!

A SUMMARY OF THE APPRAISAL DISTRICT BUDGET FOLLOWS:

The total amount of the proposed budget is \$190,037.

The actual amount of increase is \$16,115 (NOTE: \$6,600 of this actual increase represents monies previous billed to taxing entities for statements and tax roll materials, therefore the real amount of increase is \$9,515 over the current year's budget). The difference between 1991 budget and 1992 budget is due to increases in postage, supplies and salaries.

The number of employees compensated under the proposed budget will be 4 (full-time equivalent).

The number of employees compensated under the current budget is 4 (full-time equivalent).

The ten year average budget for the district is \$189,523. The proposed 1992 budget is less than one third of one percent increase above the ten year average.

The appraisal district is supported solely by payments from the local taxing units served by the appraisal district. These are: Wheeler County, North Hospital District, South Hospital District, City of Shamrock, City of Wheeler, City of Mobeetie, Shamrock ISD Wheeler ISD, Mobeetie ISD, Briscoe ISD, Kelton ISD, and Lela ISD. The appraisal district is responsible for appraisal of all of Wheeler County, plus 138 square miles located in three (3) adjacent counties (due to school district boundaries).

If approved by the appraisal district board of directors at the public hearing, the proposed budget will take effect automatically unless disapproved by a majority of the governing bodies of the county, school districts, and cities served by the appraisal district.


