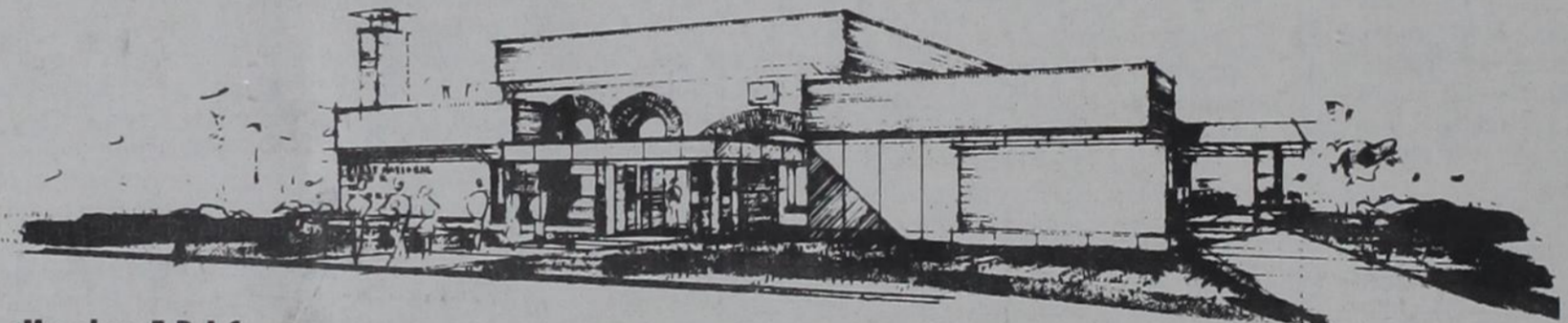

Ain't It The Truth

Won't be but a few days till the 50th anniversary of World War 2 and I understand that one of our Service Organizations want a public apology from the Japs. Maybe I'm stupid are maybe a quart low but how can we accept a So Solly Charlie sort of an apology from an enemy that did such atrocities to our own men and women and to all of the innocent people all over the western part of the world and the Orient. I had friends that were at Attu in the Alutician Islands conflict that were killed laying in hospital tents by Japs trying to improve on their bayonet practice and the survivors were mental cases when they got back home. I saw a pregnant native in the Philippines hanging in a tree with bamboo sticks pushed through her breast and native rope tied around the sticks and she was strung off the ground by these. Her hands were tied behind her and then her stomach was slit open and the unborn child was hanging there by its life cord. This lady was alive when all this torture was preformed. I dont like to be telling you about this and I'm sure you dont enjoy reading it but it happened. We got about a hundred of our prisoners through the Jap lines from the Dagami mountains at Leyte and on the way out we got to visit with some of them and saw their conditions and heard many things they had suffered but our visit was short as all of them were put in a compound with high barriers of

barriap around it. We were told it was to let them recover and to be briefed. I have many young friends that I had grown up with that were sent home to be buried and some that were never found that I loved and still miss and them there were others that were missing members and even their minds, all had given the supreme sacrifice and their loved ones are still mourning them.

On a hill at Okinawa that we had been kicked off of two or three times a buddy and I were on patrol and came across a soldier that had been gut shot and had tried to put on one of those large bandages made for such wounds, you could see he tried to fight off the enemy after being wounded by using his hands to defend himself. The enemy had sort of made a bayonet target of him by wounding him through the hands many times and through the chest and neck and even after death these Japs had boobytrapped this young man. Torture? You bet, them birds were professionals in such. My buddy and I marked the location by puttin this soldiers rifle in the mud by his head with a piece of rag so the bomb boys could get the boobytrap disconnected and removed his corpse.

I am sure that many many thousands of these type of horrible things could be told by your father, son, husband or loved one but even being there we could hardly believe it and certainly wouldn't expect anyone back home to believe human beings could do such an act. at Okinawa we accounted over a hundred thousand Japs but through the whole campaign did I ever see one of our men tortured one of the enemy.

From a country boys point of view it looks to me them birds are trying to take us over now without firing a shot and if some sort of plan dont come to pass we are just going to slip rite in their hands. Mama caught me lookin at each egg in a carton the other day at the Mall and she wanted to know what I wuz doin. I told her I wuz makin durr sure them durr chicken eggs come fum Indiana and not Tokyo, that wuz what I wuz doin.

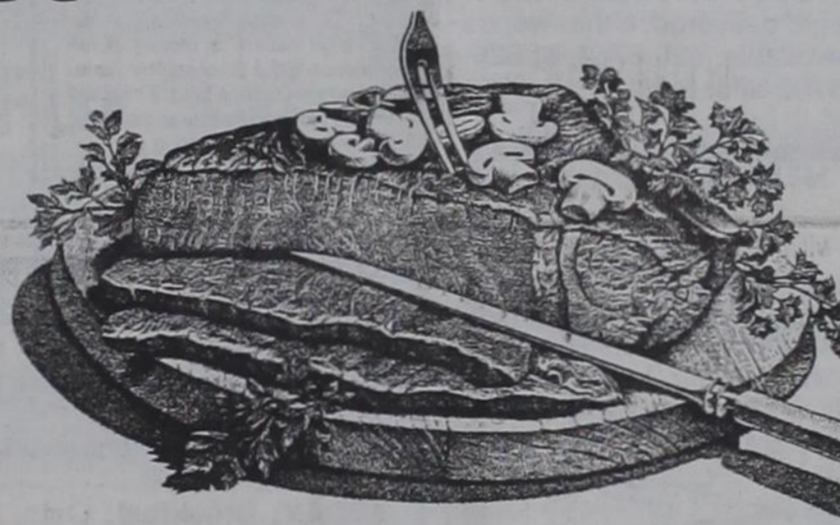

FmHA Purposes Ethanol Fuel For Environment

In an effort to reduce pollution by decreasing gasoline and diesel fuel consumption, the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has been requested by Edward Madigan, Secretary of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), to remind all employees to procure ethanol-derived fuels when such fuels are available at comparable prices with regular gasoline.

Ethanol is a grain-derived alcohol which burns cleaner than regular gasoline, reducing exhaust pollutants. Existing vehicles may use ethanol or ethanol-blended fuel without harm to engines or need for retrofitting. By implementing this alternative fuel policy, the USDA is seeking to reduce American dependence on oil, and improve the quality of the environment.

Beginning on April 17, 1991, the President signed an Executive Order on Federal Energy Management which encourages the use of alternative fuel sources such as Ethanol. This order mandates that USDA cut its gasoline and diesel fuel consumption by 10 percent between Fiscal Year 1991 and Fiscal year 1995.

Prior to that, the Secretary had issued a memorandum in 1990 mandating that USDA employees purchase ethanol or ethanol-blended, oxygenated fuels (ETBE) when using USDA-owned or leased highway vehicles.

Under these two guidelines, credit will be given to agencies utilizing alternative fuels towards the mandated reduction. Accordingly, Secretary Madigan has requested that USDA employees operating vehicles procure ethanol or ETBE-blended fuels when available at prices comparable to unleaded gasoline. He has also asked that drivers approach service stations in their areas that offer ethanol fuel yet do not accept the U.S. Government National Credit Card to determine if they would be interested in being added to a Defense Fuel Supply Center Contract in order to accept this card.

From The Minister's Desk:

In the 1987 baseball season, Paul Molitor, the third baseman of the Milwaukee Brewers, achieved baseball history. he had a thirty-nine game hitting streak which was the fifth longest hitting streak in baseball history. But when Molitor's hitting streak ended on August 26th, 1987 in a game with the Cleveland Indians, the reactions of the fans of the Brewers was bizarre.

At the end of nine innings the game was tied and Molitor had gone hitless. But in the bottom of the tenth inning with Molitor on deck, Rick Manning hit a single, driving in the winning run for the Brewers. While Manning's single won the game, it also denied Molitor the opportunity to extend his hitting streak, and the Brewer's fan booted! These fans forgot that winning was the purpose of the game. They were so engrossed with the trivia of the game that they forgot its purpose.

The fans of the Milwaukee Brewers are not the first people to make this mistake. There are many parents who make the same mistake. These parents become so engrossed with the trivia in the lives of their children that they forget about the important issues of life. For example, —

They seek the best secular education for their children. But in the pursuit of this education, these parents forget to teach their children a faith in God, and such a faith is the most important issue of life.

They seek desperately for their children to be popular. But these parents forget to teach their children to have a character of love, honor, and integrity. Popularity is a poor substitute for such a character.

They emphasize the athletic accomplishments of their children, but these parents forget to emphasize the worth of their children as people. These parents need to have the attitude that John McKay had when his son was a star player on his football team at the University of Southern California. When Coach McKay was asked about his pride in his son's football accomplishments,

he gave an impressive answer, saying: "Yes, I'm pleased that John had a good season last year. he does a fine job and I am proud of him. But I would be just as proud if he had never played the game at all." Coach McKay recognized and appreciated his son's athletic accomplishments, but his love and approval for him did not depend upon them. More parents need to have the attitude of Coach McKay, recognizing that athletic accomplishments are trivia when compared to the worth of their children as people.

Parents are not the only ones who become engrossed with trivia. Churches can make the same mistake. These churches are statistically-oriented, emphasizing mainly attendance and budget statistics. And because of this emphasis, the members of these churches are often anxious, resentful, and impatient people.

Yet the Bible teaches that the basic priority of the church is the development of a Christ-like character in its members. The Apostle Paul wrote: "—We are to grow up in all into Him, who is the head, even Christ, from whom the whole body, being fitted and held together by that which every joint supplies, according to the proper working of each individual part, causes the growth of the body for the building up of itself in love." (Ephesians 4:15-16) Like parents, churches can become engrossed with trivia, forgetting to develop a Christ-like character in their members.

On August 26, 1987, Paul Molitor's thirty-nine game hitting streak ended. When it ended, Milwaukee Brewers fans should have learned an important lesson. This lesson was: "Do not be engrossed by trivia. A hitting streak is not the purpose of a baseball game. Focus on its purpose."

Parents and churches would be wise to learn the same lesson.

LEARN WHAT CHRISTMAS SAFETY'S ABOUT!

A CHRISTMAS SAFETY CHECK

- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines.
