The Wheeler Mustangs take 'em one at a time. They give other teams a good whipping and then send them packing.

The Booker Kiowas took their kicks Friday night at Nicholson field 35-6, then gladly caught the first yellow bus out of town.

The Mustangs have improved their record to 8-0 and are considered to be one of the top two teams in the state according to the Harris and A.P. polls. Wheeler shares the district lead with

the 7-1 Memphis Cyclones and (it looks like a show-down is brewing.

Last Friday night the Booker Kiowas hoped to derail the Mustangs.

On their first possession, the Kiowas found out that it might be easier said than done, as they ran into a brick wall, with names like Salas, Ledbetter, Marshall, Finsterwald, Harrison and Chick.

After forcing the Kiowas first punt the Mustangs went to work offensively at their own 43 yard line.

Behind the blocking of offensive linemen, Travis Cook, Isidro Salas, Jimmy Walker, Beryl Brister, Genaro Meraz, Kevin Hazel, and Ike Finsterwald, the Mustang went to work.

Wheeler formed an 8 play 57 yd. scoring drive behind the running of fullback Mack Marshall and a 233 yd pass from QB, Jason Beers to end Brandon Chick.

With 2nd and goal to go from the 2, QB Jason Beers sprinted around left end for the T.D. Ike Finsterwalds kick was good. Wheeler 7 Booker 0.

Booker started their next possession at their own 24. QB Jose Tudson hit halfback Dustin Hoover on a 21 yd pass to the 45.

Two plays later, senior cornerback Jason Judd stepped in front on a Tador pass to kill the Kiowas drive and give the Mustangs the ball at the Wheeler 32.

This time 4 plays, was all the Mustangs needed. Jason Beers found Brandon Chick for 33 yard pass to the Kiowas 32 yd line.

**Presents Annual Report**  
The Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District was formed on April 6, 1948, with the protection and enhancement of the available renewable natural resources as boundaries of Wheeler County. It is governed by a board of five elected directors who are resident land owners in the District and are actively engaged in farming or ranching.

The current Board of Directors consists of Clarence Zybach (who has been on the board since its creation), Paul Macina, Jim Barton, Danville, Atherton, and John Vermillion.

The District entered into a memo of understanding with the Soil Conservation Service in 1948 to provide personnel specially trained in the field of erosion control. The current SCS staff consists of Fred Allison, Jr., District Conservationist; Kenneth Reed, Range Conservationist; and Calvin Devereaux, Soil Conservationist. Rhonda Ferguson and Mique Snelgroves are employed as District Clients. Don Humphreys is a STEP employee.

The SWCD works closely with the SCS to promote all phases of conservation. Your SWCD is proud to present this report of some of the work and accomplishments during the 1991 fiscal year.

Wheeler County SWCD has been busy during 1991. Most of the business continues to be a result of the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and development and servicing of Food Security Act (FSA) plans. Under the CRP program, highly erodible cropland is converted to grassland with government assistance. Each CRP contract is for a ten year period where the land user receives annual rental payments in exchange for not farming land. Wheeler County has 341 active contracts on approximately 55,222 acres. Wheeler County has reached its 25% limitation.

The Food Security Act of 1985 mandated that every farmer who produces crops on highly erodible soils must have developed a conservation plan by January 1, 1990. These plans must be fully applied by January 1, 1995. Wheeler County has approximately 570 Food Security Act plans.

The Great Plains Program, Resource Conservation and Development Program, and the regular District Programs must be carried out in addition to CRP & FSA. We currently have two active Great Plains Contracts. Fencing, livestock water development, brush management, and Grass Seeding are being performed under GPP.

Some of the accomplishments of the SWCD/SCS for 1991 include: New District Cooperators—28 for 11,390 Acres; Conservation plans prepared—29 for 567.4 Acres; Conservation plans revised—125 for 21,142 Acres; Individuals and Units of Government assisted—478; Individuals applying a practice—261; Grass Seeding—20,000 Acres; Deferred Grazing—30,000 Acres; Cropland Benefited from applying a practice—31,000 Acres; Range and Pastureland Benefited from applying a practice—20,000 Acres; Ponds—6 No.; Brush Management—500 Acres; Prescribed burning—3500 Acres; Wells—5; Water Storage Facility—7; Conservation Presentations and tours—10 with 270 people in attendance. These are only a few of the conservation accomplishments done in 1990.

All services of the Soil Conservation Service and the Wheeler County Soil and Water Conservation District are available regardless of age, sex, race, color, religion, handicap or national origin.

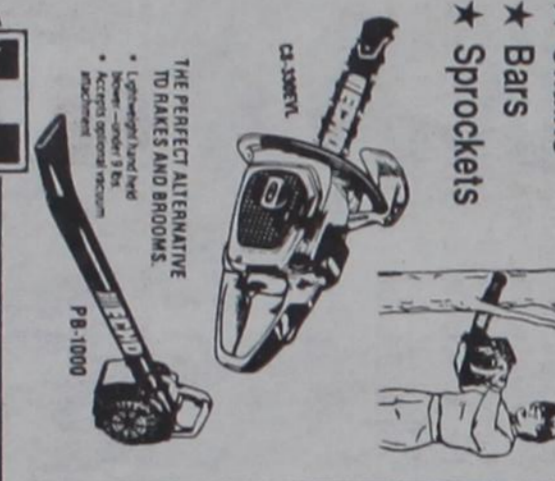

**American Hereford Recognition Given**

The American Hereford Association, headquartered in Kansas City, has given recognition to 44 Texas-owned cows for their production excellence in the Total Performance Records Program. Recognition given in the AHA Program's Most Efficient Cow Report identifies cow that have efficiently combined fertility and growth, two traits of primary economic importance to each producer.

The criteria for membership is so stringent that only one-half of one percent of the nation's registered Hereford cows can meet eligibility requirements. Every cow listed is four years of age or older, had her first calf at 25 months or younger, had a 370-day calving interval or better, and weaned her calves at least five percent above the herd average. In addition, efficient cows are determined by utilizing the Most Probable Producing Ability (MPPA) ratio, a neutral base for comparing cows not having equal number of calves.

### Replacement Heifers Subject of Workshop

Area cattlemen are invited to a cow-calf clinic scheduled for Tuesday, November 12, 1991. This clinic will focus on the selection and development of replacement heifers.

The first part of the program will be held at the Wheeler County Show Barn beginning at 5:00 p.m. Topics to be covered in this session will be the relationship of pelvic area and calving ease, health programs for the cow herd and replacement heifers, bull selection. Speakers will be Dr. Russell Killingsworth from the Shamrock Veterinary Clinic and Drs. Bed Ed and Lee Ann Hillhouse of Wheeler Veterinary Clinic. They will also demonstrate the use of a pelvic meter and have live animals available for participants to estimate pelvic size.

At 6:30 p.m. the clinic will move to Maxey's Steakhouse for a Dutch treat supper. Following the meal, Dr. Dave Hutchinson, Nutritionist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Amarillo, will discuss winter nutrition for the cow herd and nutritional requirements of developing heifers. Also Dr. Carl Patrick, Extension Entomologist, will talk about external and internal parasite control in beef cattle. Attendance at the clinic will qualify producers who have a Private Pesticide Applicators License two continuing educational units toward the renewal of that license.

### SODBUSTERS PROVISION OF 1985

Many of the producers don't understand the meaning of Sodbuster. The sodbuster provision of 1985 defines the producer eligibility for certain Agriculture programs if a producer break out a field of highly erodible grassland or woodland to plant annual crops without having a conservation plan approved by the local Soil & Water Conservation District.

If the producer intends to break out highly erodible grassland or woodland he or she would need to contact their local A.S.C.S. and then fill out the AD-1026. Then the producer would need to take the AD-1026 form to the Soil Conservation Service Office. Soil Conservation Service has 15 days to

develop a plan. If the producer doesn't have a plan developed within the allowable time, government payments would be stopped. We are asking all producers to report sodbuster land before planning annual crops.

Contact your local Soil Conservation Service in Wheeler, TX. Programs and services of Soil Conservation Service are offered on nondiscriminatory basis without regards to race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion.

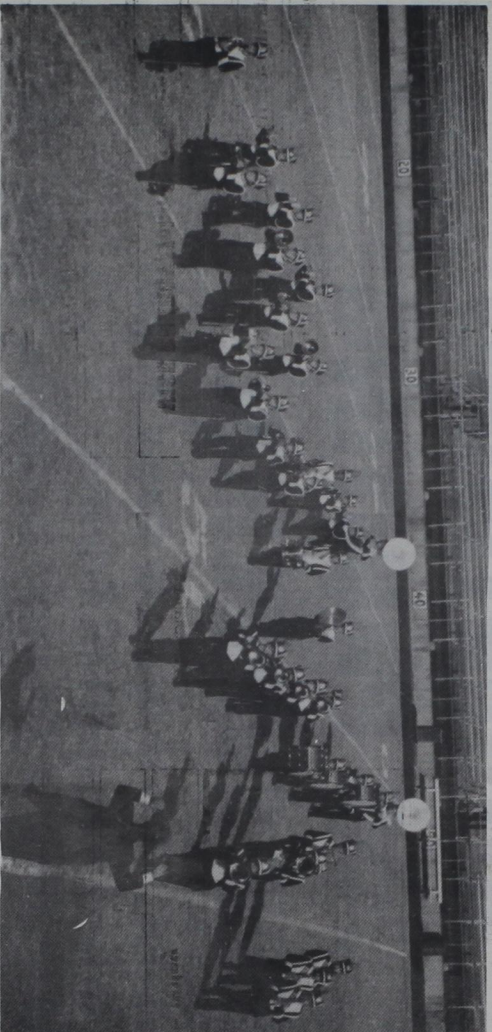

## Stray Livestock Information Given Land Owners

The purpose of this article is to provide information to land owners who may have livestock which have strayed. With the winter season close at hand, livestock strays will increase. Please keep this information and refer to it if you do have stray livestock appear on your property. If you have questions please call the Sheriff's Office and let us assist you so all cases of stray will be dealt with according to law.

The legal procedure for impounding and disposing of estrays is prescribed by Chapter 142 of the Texas Agriculture Code. The estray act was revised by the Texas Legislature in 1986.

An "Estray" is a valuable domestic animal which has strayed from its owner. An animal may be an "Estray" even though its owner is remote or would not reclaim his wandering animal with reasonable diligence, or the animal is found a great distance from its accustomed range. The Estray Act specifies that "Estray" means "Any stray horse, stallion, mare, gelding, filly, colt, mule, hinney, jack, jennet, hog, sheep, goat, or any species of cattle."

A person who finds an estray on his property or on property which he is the custodian of, public or private, must report the presence of the estray to the Sheriff of the County where the estray is discovered within five days after the estray was discovered. If notification to the Sheriff is given within five days the owner of the property is entitled to receive from the owner of the estray a reasonable amount for maintenance of the estray and any damages caused by the estray.

If the owner of the estray cannot be found, maintenance and damages may be paid from the proceeds of the sale of the estray. The owner of an estray found on private property may redeem the animal from the owner or occupant of the property by paying a reasonable redemption fee and any damages incurred by the owner of the property caused by the owner of the animal within a reasonable time after notification, the Sheriff, at the request of the property owner, where the animal is located, must immediately impound the animal.

The Sheriff must impound an estray in the following situations: (1) The owner of the estray is unknown; (2) The owner is unable to be contacted; (3) The estray is dangerous to the public; (4) The estray is located on public property and after notification is not immediately removed by the owner; (5) The estray is located on private property and is not redeemed within a reasonable time after notification.

If the owner of the estray cannot be found the Sheriff must advertise the impoundment of the estray in the local newspaper at least twice during the fifteen days after the date of im-

ponment. Notice of the impoundment will be posted on the Public Notice Board at the Courthouse.

The owner of an estray may recover possession of the estray at any time before the estray is sold by executing an Affidavit of Ownership. The owner must also pay all estray handling expenses before he can take possession of the animal. Before taking possession, the owner must execute an Affidavit of receipt, and deliver it to the Sheriff to be filed in the County Clerk's Office.

Only then can the owner retake possession of the estray. If ownership of the estray is not determined before the third day after the date of the final advertisement or if the estray is not redeemed before the 18th day after the date of impoundment, the county has title to the animal and will sell it at the Sheriff's Sale or through a public auction licensed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The proceeds of the sale will be allocated in the following priority: (1) Payment of the expense of sale; (2) Payment of the impoundment fee and other charges due the Sheriff and (3)

Payment for maintenance and damage due to the owners of the private property from which the estray was impounded. Proceeds remaining will be paid to the owner up to one year from the date of the sale. Up until that time the net proceeds will be kept in the County Jury Fund subject to claim by the original owner of the estray.

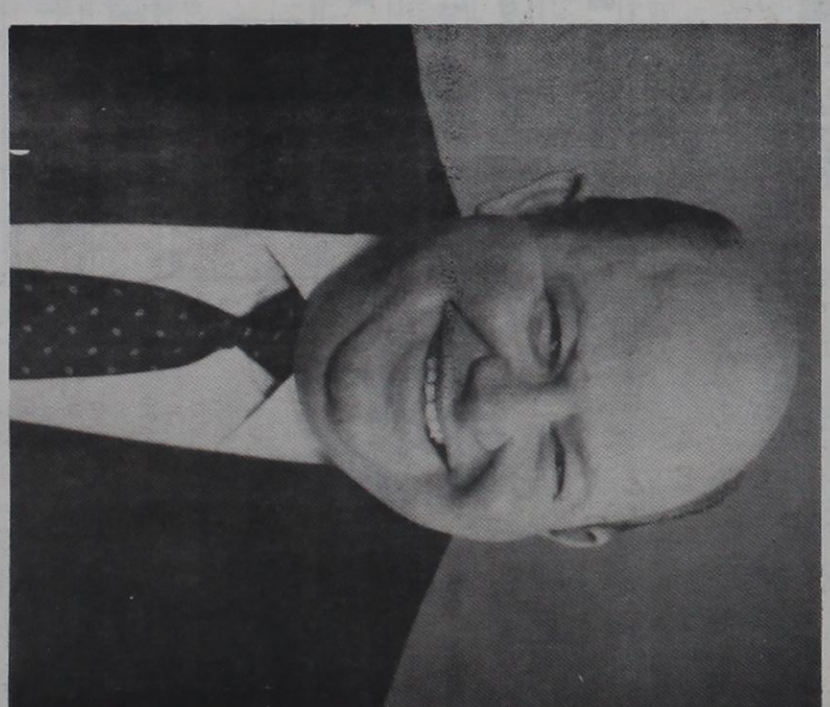

**WHEELER CO. SHERIFF ASSISTS IN INVESTIGATION OF FRAUD**

(Editor's Note: Part of the following story was taken from the Pampanews, by staff writer Beth Miller.)  
 Approximately 1 1/2 years ago the Wheeler County Sheriff's Department received information from officials with the Tri-State High School Rodeo Association that a man that was supposed to be selling advertising for the High School Rodeo finals in Dumas, Texas was mis-representing himself to potential contributors. His story varied with each solicitation and involved almost every county in the Texas panhandle, Oklahoma panhandle, southern Kansas and eastern New Mexico.

The size of the area involved in the investigation and the jurisdictions was bigger than this department could handle without the cooperation of the Texas Rangers and the U.S. Postal Service. All of the information and witnesses were turned over to Gary Henderson of the Texas Rangers and Sam Prose of the U.S. Postal Service. The Wheeler Sheriff's Office stayed informed on the investigation and in February 1991, Jimmy Adams, Sheriff of Wheeler County assisted in a federal search warrant in Albuquerque, New Mexico where the Albuquerque were centered and several thousand dollars in equipment was seized and the operation was temporarily halted. Each phone call to the victims resulted in more questions to be answered, the more complex and large scale this operation appeared. People were willing to give to this scam, but when they found out it was a fraud they were more than willing to go after this man and his entire operation.

Two Albuquerque, N.M., men who solicited funds from businesses and throughout Texas, the United States and Canada were busted in federal indictments unseated this week. Texas Ranger Gary Henderson of Pampa and Sam Prose with the U.S. Postal Inspection Service in Lubbock have been working on the case for about a year and a half, Henderson said.

The two men, James L. Huff, and his son, Bradley Huff, 27, each posted a bond of \$50,000 following the identical 26-count indictments with which they were charged. A preliminary hearing on the two men has not been scheduled a spokeswoman in the U.S. Attorney's Office in Amarillo said.

**U.S. Savings Bonds Are Popular Savings Method**

United States Savings Bonds have been a popular savings instrument for many years. Savings bonds currently sold are Series EE bonds. Many people, however, still hold Series E bonds (sold before 1980). Some of these may have reached final maturity and no longer are earning interest.

Series E savings bonds issued before December 1965 reach final maturity, and no longer earn interest, 40 years after the issue date. Any Series E bonds issued before 1951 are no longer earning interest. Series E and EE bonds issued after November 1965 reach final maturity 30 years after the issue date.

Anyone holding savings bonds which are no longer earning interest should redeem them and place them in instruments where they will earn interest. Bondholders should be aware of the tax consequences in doing this. All interest on the bonds was deferred from taxation while the bonds were held. This interest will be taxed as income in the year the bonds are redeemed. This could result in a significant increase in tax liability if someone had a number of bonds they were redeeming.

The bondholder does not need the proceeds to meet living expenses; the tax on the interest can be postponed further. The bondholder could exchange the Series E or EE bonds for Series HH bonds up until one year after their final maturity dates. Series HH bonds are savings bonds which send interest payments to the bondholder twice a year. This interest is taxed as income when it is received. The interest on the Series E or EE bonds used to purchase the Series HH bonds is not taxed until the Series HH bonds are redeemed or they reach final maturity. Final maturity on Series HH bonds is 20 years after the issue date.

## "Extension Update"

Tax Practitioner Workshops

"Extension Update"

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service, in cooperation with the Internal Revenue Service, is once again offering the Tax Practitioner Workshops across the State of Texas, in the Fall of 1991. These workshops are led by CPAs and attorneys who are experienced in the field of income tax reporting and planning. They provide valuable continuing education opportunities for tax professionals seeking CPE and MCLE credit.

This year, twenty-six General Tax Workshops, designed for practitioners who work mostly with individuals and small businesses, are offered in major Texas cities. The nearest one will be in Amarillo, on December 16-17. Fifteen Advanced Tax Workshops are also offered. They are directed at the practitioner with substantial experiences with individual returns, who does some business work, and feels the need to develop more skills in business related work. One will be offered in Amarillo on December 9-10.

In addition to the General and Advanced Workshops, there will be four each of the Estate Planning Workshops, and three each of the Fiduciary Income Tax, S Corporation and Basic Partnership Workshops. The Agricultural Tax Problems Workshop, which was introduced in 1989, will be offered this year in two locations—Corpus Christi and Lubbock.

Savings Bonds For College

Many parents have purchased U.S. Savings Bonds as one way to save money for their child's education. By meeting specified requirements, saving through bonds can provide tax-free interest.

Interest on U.S. Savings Bonds purchased after January 1, 1990 is not taxable if the bonds are cashed in to pay for college tuition and fees if certain conditions are met. The savings bonds must be purchased in the parent's name, NOT the child's name. Certain income restrictions also apply. If the parents is married and has adjusted gross income over \$82,900, the tax break begins to phase out. It ends at \$94,350, when all interests is taxable. For single parents the income limits are \$41,950 and \$57,700 respectively. These limits are adjusted every year for inflation.

Parents must use the income limits in the year the bonds are redeemed, not the year the bonds were purchased. In the year that the bonds are cashed in to pay college bills, the interest from the bonds is included in adjusted gross income to determine if the parents meets the income guidelines. If the child is many years from attending college when the bonds are purchased, the interest that has accumulated may be large enough to push the parent's income into or past the income limits.

When college bills are received and the bonds are redeemed, records must be kept of the amount of the college expenses and the principal and interest of the bonds redeemed. If all other conditions are met and the value of the bonds is less than or equal to the college expenses, the interest is not taxable.

Parents, especially those who are close to the income limits, should only cash in as many bonds as are needed to pay each bill. Cash in as many bonds to pay for four years of education in the child's freshman year could push many parents beyond the income limits.

For parents who cannot meet the conditions for tax-free interest, there is another way to minimize taxes. In this case the bonds are purchased in the child's name. Interest earned on the bonds is reported annually in the child's name. As long as interest is reported annually no tax will be due when the bond is redeemed. Following this strategy will minimize any tax due on annual interest since it will be the child's marginal tax rate which is likely to be lower than the parent's marginal tax rate. It does, however, reduce the amount of control parents have over how the money will be used once the child reached adulthood.
