Kevin Robinson's Heroic Act May Have Saved Gunship, Grew

An airborne gunner from the 16th Special Operations Squadron has earned a Purple Heart and the 1st Special Operations Wing quarterly explosive safety award for his actions during Operation Dessert Storm.

Sr. A Kevin L. Robinson was honored April 16 for his handling of a Part of the afternoon entertainment 105mm round during an engagement with hostile forces over enemy terri-

The nomination letter for the award said. "His decisive actions quite possibly saved a multimillion-dollar air-

On the Jan. 31 mission, Airman Robinson was loading the 105 mm gun with sensitive white phosphorous rounds. These explosive devices can A crowd gathered early for the breakifdropped or damaged, causing a serious fire.

About five hours into the sevenhour mission, the aircraft began taking heavy enemy fire. When the loadmaster spotted anti-aircraft artillery fire and called for evasive action, the aircraft commander responded and jerked the plane up to avoid the AAA

"I had the round out of the drawer when somebody yelled 'break!' and I just didn't have time to get steady,"

Airman Robinson, who had completed his check ride as a gunner only two months earlier, responded instantly to the training he had received and put his hand over the primer end of the round to prevent it from being damaged.

The airman was slammed backward into the brass barrel of the 40 mm gun, breaking his finger, but leaving the round intact.

TSgt. Roger Betterelli, a lead gunner for the 16th SOS, said, "The rounds weigh about 47 pounds, but when you're pulling g's they can weigh three times as much.

The lead gunner on Airman Robinson's plane, MSgt. Larry Bupp, said the airman did not even realize he had broken his hand until they were back on the ground. "We got ready to go back to loading the 40 mm gun, and he just kept working. I guess the adrenalin was pumping pretty

good," Sergeant Bupp said. Lt. Col. Donn P. Kegel, 16th SOS commander, commended Airman Robinson for his outstanding dedication to the safety of others and said he serves as an example to squadron

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION **AUGUST 10, 1991**

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."




